AUSTIN CONFUSION CONFUSING

Local school waiting

Confusion in Austin is certainly nothing new to Texans but the state's current budget crunch is making it hard for the Schleicher County Independent School District to determine its tax rate for 1986-87.

Meeting Monday night the school board postponed setting a rate until the confusion clears in Austin concerning public school funding.

A new budget was approved, however, totaling \$3,462,007.00. This fugure is down more than \$48,000 from last year's mark of \$3,510,980.00. Superintendent J. Weldon Moore said Wednesday the district is anticipating a slight tax hike, pending action by the state

In other action at the meeting the board awarded a bid to Gandy's Milk Company of San Angelo for milk for the school system's cafeteria.

Halbert L.P. Gas Inc. of Eldorado got the bid on the school's gasoline this year and the board awarded a motor oil bid to Griffin Fuels, also of Eldorado.


The board approved participation in the Region XV Service Center Math and Science Cooperative and voted to continue funding

Eagles Point Youth Center. Principals presented student handbooks for each campus.

Construction projects were discussed and the bid for reroofing the high school was awarded to Harrison Roofing. Additional discussion was held on a security fence for the high school and middle school courtyards.

Teacher in-service training begins Thursday, August 21, the board was told. Teachers will be working on curriculum guidelines and will return to school August 25.

On that date a orientation and training will be conducted and on Tuesday all teachers will be in Sonora to receive information on dyslexia and child abuse. Wednesday and Thursday will be work days.

Area sales show slump

Both Eldorado and Mertzon followed state year. For the year, Mertzon has received trends this month and reported decreases in possibly pointing to a softer economy.

Eldorado got \$5,041.04 net payment this period, compared to \$6,213.93 for the same month last year. For the year, Eldorado has received \$36,329.79, compared to \$37,806.58 for the same time frame last year, down 3.91 percent.

Mertzon received \$4,531.00 net payment as compared to \$4,957.14 for the same period last

Local youths compete well

Eldorado youths barely missed being on television last weekend when the American Junior Rodeo Association's Championship Finals was held in Snyder.

Four Schleicher County rodeoers, Ashley Johnson, Crissi McCormick, Brent Moore and Cy Griffin were entered in the AJRA's season-ending finale, but because of the event's schedule, were not included on televised coverage seen locally on San Angelo's K-LST.

Crissi McCormick, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phil McCormick of Eldorado, finished fourth in the average and second in the short go-around in pole bending.

Miss Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Johnson, was second in the average in poles, and joined with Brent Moore in the team roping. Cy Griffin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Griffin, posted times of 4.51 and 17.85 respectively in break-a-way and ribbon roping.

The top six qualifiers from AJRA competition this year were invited to the championship finals, with 274 youths competing.

SLIGHT TAX HIKE SEEN

Council approves new budget

Working with no Federal Revenue Sharing monies and a soft economy, the Eldorado City Council met last Monday night and approved a new budget totaling \$903.825.

The new figure is down from last year's mark of \$929,670 and reflects a decrease of 14 percent in the general fund, one percent in the utility fund and 10 percent increase in the trash

The council established a new tax rate of 60.43 cents per \$100 of assessed value, an increase of slightly less than three percent.

The new budget includes no utility rate increases and funding for the ambulance service, fire department and Eagles Point

The ambulance service and Eagles Point each were granted \$3,100, while the firemen

got \$3,750, exactly the same amount they got last year. In other action the council: (1) Held its official budget hearing, but no

residents were on hand to address the council. (2) Approved the minutes, bills and reports

(3) Heard a report from street superintendent Clay Long on R&H Trey gas line replacement, street patching, paving of West Street near the school, East Street and hospital

sewer lift pump station repairs. Long also reported on progress toward a drainage easement in Glendale as well as estimated costs for the new line.

(4) Learned from city secretary Carolyn Mayo that the Department of Housing and Urban Development is anxious to complete the city's 1982 grant, but cannot do so because of the bonding agent's bankruptcy and liquidation.

Members of the council voted to ask HUD for final payment on the project, which HUD has already agreed too, pending a "draw" for the construction firm which did the work.

(5) Learned that the old civil defense hospital would be moved to Sweetwater by that city's fire department.

(6) Denied a request by the fire department to purchase air packs with \$500 not used for schooling. Fire school expenses were reviewed and additional auto expense were also turned

(7) Hired the firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant and Featherson to conduct the city's annual audit, as required by law. (8) Approved merit raises for three city

employees as suggested by Long.

(9) Wrote off \$3,001.59 in "uncollectables" from the city's accounts receivable list. (10) Discussed the city's Blue Cross and

Blue Shield insurance coverage. (11) Voted to re-establish a municipal court for the city and appointed Jerroll Sanders city

judge. His appointment will mean his wife, councilwoman Bobbie Sanders, will have to resign from the council. Salary and further details on the new court

will be discussed at a future council session.

Gas line leak forces outage

Almost 1,000 gas customers in Eldorado "went without" last Thursday when a gas line break forced City of Eldorado personnel to turn off gas from 9:30 a.m. until mid-afternoon.

City crews were digging with machinery Thursday morning in the alley near the school, looking for a gas leak which the Texas Railroad Commission has targeted in that area.

A piece of equipment struck a three-inch steel line, knocking off a Dresser coupling and forcing shutdown of the gas system.

'We had no time to let anyone know. Some people were indignant because they thought we

should have let them know. Of course that was impossible. It wasn't anything planned," Carolyn Mayo, city secretary, reported.

Every one of the city's 900 customers were shut off by noon with help from eveyone available, including city councilman Richard Preston, who took to the alleys with other city employees.

Notices were printed and put on residents' doors, then city personnel began turning gas back on and lightling pilot lights, etc. about 2 p.m. They worked until 11 p.m.

Tuesday afternoon people were still calling asking for assistance, Mrs. Mayo reported.





The Schleicher County Public Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in Grades K-3 may buy lunch for 90¢; Grades 4-6 for \$1.00; Grades 7-12 for \$1.10. School Personnel may buy lunches for \$1.45 and Adult Visitors for for \$3.00 Students may buy Breakfast for 50¢ and adults for 75¢.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the scale below may be eligible for either free meals at a reduced price of 40¢ for lunch and 25¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Applications will be available from each principal on the first day of school. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number (4) the signature of an adult household member.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year and you may apply for benefits at anytime during the school year.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feed programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing J. Weldon Moore, Superintendent, Schleicher County Independent School District, P.O. W, Eldorado, Texas 76936. Phone Number 915-853-2514.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.







ACTIVITIES HELP TEENS Participation in band, 4-H, clubs, athletics and other afterschool activities is more than just a "good time" for teenagers. After-school activities encourage responsible behavior and help teenagers avoid delinquent behaviors, such as vandalism, says Diane T. Welch, a family life education specialist. Vandalism is commonly thought of as an urban problem, notes Welch, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. According to studies reported by Pennsylvania State University researchers, however, over half the students in rural high schools had committed at least one act of vandalism. Nearly 75 percent of those students repeated their behaviors 3 or more times.

NO NEED FOR VANDALISM

Young people commit acts of vandaliam in order to gain status and prestige, or they see vandalism as a "game" or "contest", says family life education specialist Diane T. Welch. She points out that by participating in extra-curricular activities, teenagers have a chance to learn new skills, to gain status and to develop good feelings about them-

Have you ever responded to an ad for a 'free trial' offer and then been surprised when you received extra un-ordered merchandise--and a bill?

Some companies count on fact that many consumers mistakenly believe they are obligated to pay for the merchandise or to return it at their own expense, says Nancy Granovsky, a family economics

"If you're sent things in the man that you did not order, you have a legal right to keep the shipment as a free gift, according to Federal Trade Commission (FTC) rules," explains the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

Although it's not necessary as a requirement for keeping the merchandise, you may want to write a letter to the company saying you plan to keep it as a free gift, she notes. This may discourage the seller ******************


