New forrnat planned

A new format, including more news and features, has been announced for the Schleicher County Leader-Success starting with the paper's December 17 issue.

The Leader-Success will convert to a news-magazine format, with smaller "magazine" size pages. "The new size will enable us to gain quite a bit of news hole each week and open up a lot of interesting design concepts," publisher Terry B. Neill said this week.

The newspaper will add a crossword puzzle, horoscope, and will now feature an ag page, church page, full editorial page and sports section.

"The new Leader-Success will be innovative. There will probably not be another

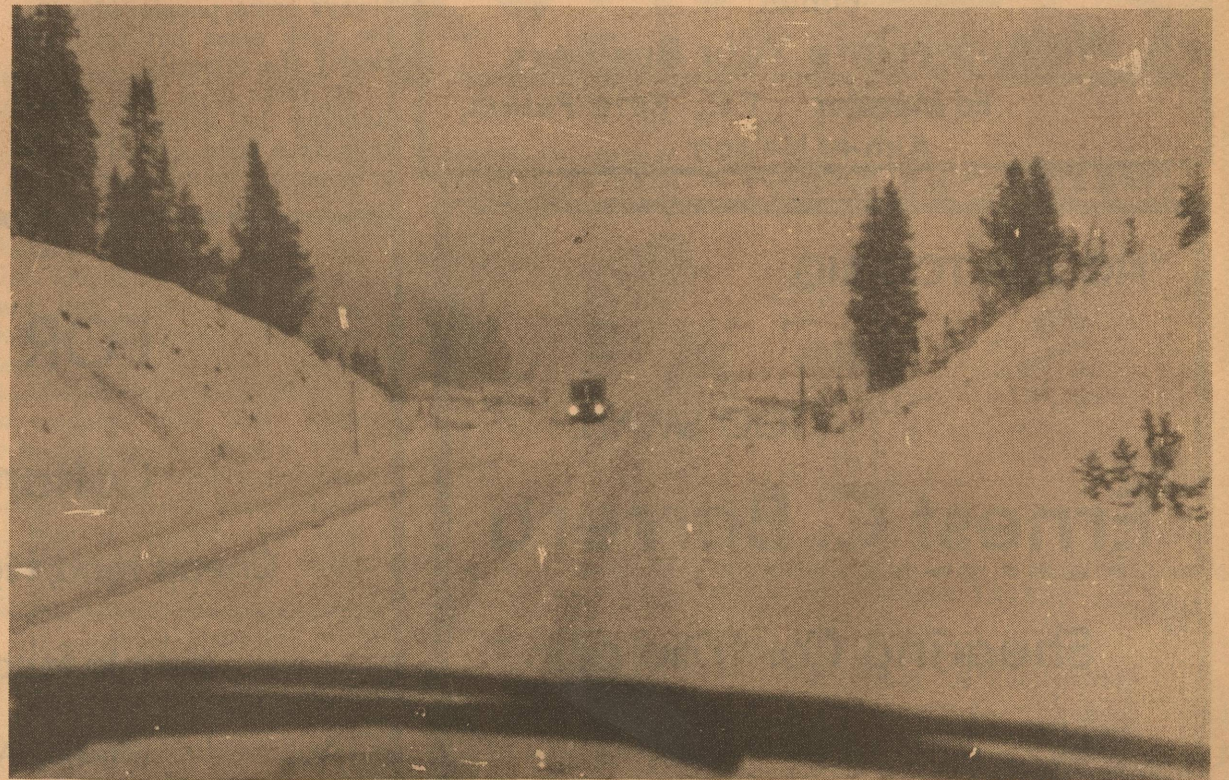
newspaper exactly like it in Texas. We feel the new format is another step in bringing our readers a continually improving newspaper," Neill added.

CAGE SEASON STARTED

Eaglettes win No. 5

The varsity Eaglettes have blended balanced scoring and rugged defense to fashion a perfect, 5-0, season mark, reeling off victories over Junction, Menard and Mertzon.

Coach Jim Eubank's Eagles have also started positively, winning two out of three. Both squads will be in action this weekend at the Irion County Tournament in Mertzon.

The varsity girls entertained Junction in the first game of the season, winning 52-47, as Kotch chipped in 12 points and Patton garnered 10. Six days later the same squads met and EHS prevailed, 39-38, in a barnburner. Helmers and Dean had 10 point efforts, while Sutto added nine.

Eldorado then handed Mertzon a 45-43 setback, as Kotch scored 12, and Dean and Helmers added 10 points each. EHS prevailed on the strength of a 14-4 third quarter bulge.

The Eaglettes belted Menard twice, winning 60-21 and 64-22. Suarez had a 14 point effort in the first game, while Patton ripped the cords for 16 in the second contest.

Top of The Divide

Well, have you had enough turkey yet? How about turkey pie or creamed turkey or turkey croquettes. There seems to be no end of recipes for left over turkey. NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T'S TEXAS RATES

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category:

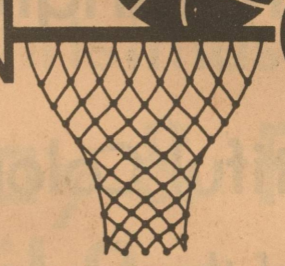
The rate reductions are presently anticipated to occur in two phases on or about October 22, 1986 and November 12, 1986. The matter has been assigned as Docket Nos. 6926 and 7113. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene or participate or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. A complete copy of the tariffs reflecting the potential rate reductions will be on file with the Commission on or before October 23, 1986.

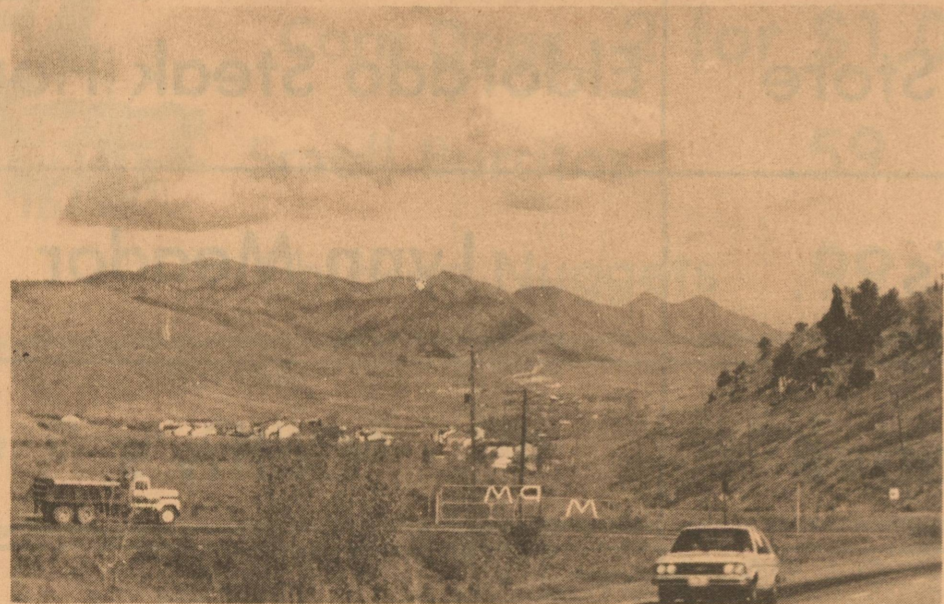

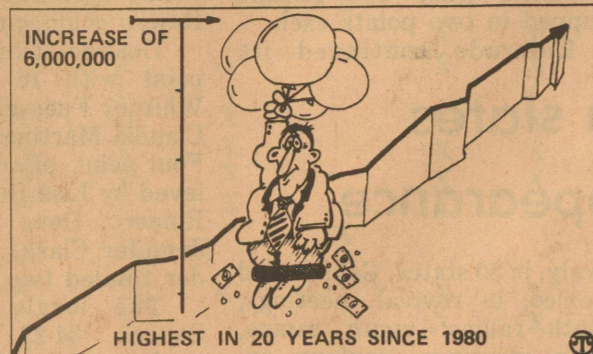

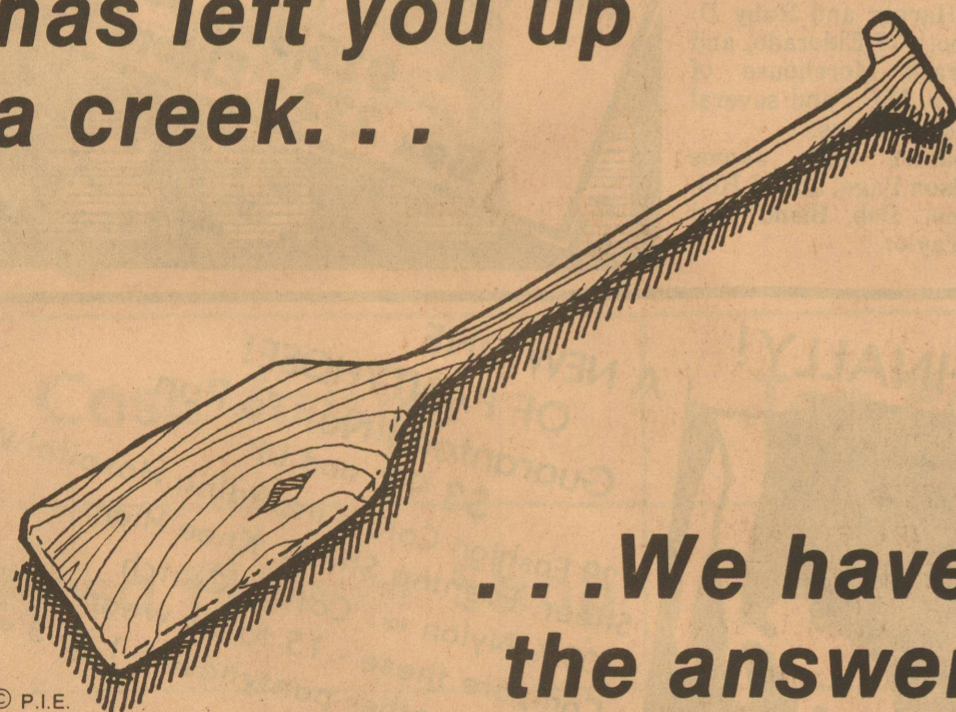

SEEDBED PREPARATION IMPORTANT FOR COTTON

The first step to a successful 1987 cotton crop begins with land preparation this fall and winter, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. A farmer's objective for land preparation should include weed control, plant residue breakdown, moisture storage, breakup of hard pans or compaction zones that could restrict root growth, and getting down some fertilizer. The final goal should be a firm, weed-free seedbed that permits timely planting.

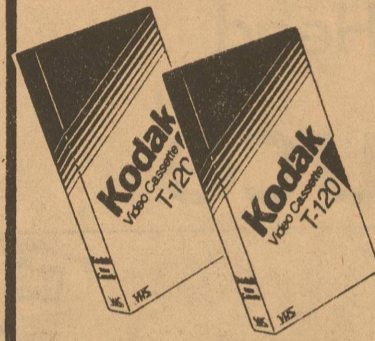

Uninspect lights before decorating.

Be sure to discard strands of lights with frayed wiring, and burned out bulbs BEFORE you decorate.

Also, never leave your Christmas tree lights or outdoor decorative lights unattended. Be sure to unplug them when you go to bed or leave the house.

OWatch for the U.L. seal of approval.

Only buy lights that have been checked for safety. The Underwriter's Laboratory's seal of approval is your guarantee that lights and wiring have been properly safety checked.

Hang ornaments away from lights.

Make sure paper ornaments and tinsel do not touch light bulbs. Also, never adjust outdoor or tree lights while they are turned on or connected to a power circuit.

Always use a wooden ladder or a metal one with rubber-tipped legs when installing outdoor lights. Be sure to stand on a dry surface.

Make sure you don't overload circuits.

Avoid overloading electrical wiring by using more than one circuit for your tree lights. Use heavy-duty extension cords to run to other circuits.

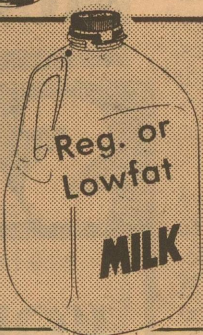

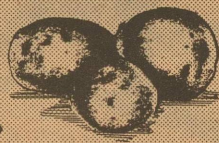
