

## AN EDITORIAL **Chamber needed**

One of the most important meetings in the history of Eldorado and Schleicher County is scheduled for next Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Memorial Building. At that session a chamber of commerce for our community should become a reality.

A chamber of commerce is desperately needed here. You can't find a single growing, thriving community in Texas that does not have an active, effective chamber of commerce.

Given the state of today's economy, a chamber is even more important. True, it is harder for merchants to find the money to support such an organization during tough times, but one thing should be remembered: a chamber should be open to and supported by the entire community.

We favor a sliding scale for dues, with the

bigger businesses paying more per year to belong and the smaller firms paying less. We also think there should be special memberships for farms, ranches and individuals.

We've been involved with several chambers and industrial foundations and know for a fact that they work. Each and every person in Edlorado should be on hand for the meeting-your help is needed.

In any community progress takes place because a group of dedicated people are making things happen. The chamber of commerce is the logical organization to motivate, organize and direct this effort.

Eldorado punched it out with Junction but lost, 16-6. Russ Dacy put EHS's only points of the night on the board with a 10-yard touchdown run in the first half.

Eldorado led Junction, 6-2, at halftime, but the hosts, spurred on by a homecoming crowd, put two scores on the board in the final half to take the victory.

Stanton will run out of the wishbone offense and have the perfect dominating fullback for it in Derek Sorley, a hard-hitting 170-pounder.

"They run just about anything on defense. It seems like last year they were in the perfect defense all night for whatever we tried to do," San Miguel lamented.

#### **TEXAS PECAN CROP** SHORT

The 1986 pecan crop will be short in Texas as well as in other pecan-producing states, but the quality of the Texas crop will be the best in 10 years, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The Texas crop should be between 25 and 30 million pounds, about 40 percent of normal. Prices to growers should be good due to the shorter crop, but consumer prices should be about the same as last year. The lighter the color of the kernel, the better the quality. Pecans should be stored in the home freezer to preserve quality and can be used as needed.







Many consumers are cutting back on saturated fats by choosing lean meat, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist. Results of a recent national study conducted by Texas A&M University showed that consumers evaluate the leaness of a cut of beef primarily by the amount of trimmable fat, or the "plate waste" fat that would be cut away and not eaten. The degree of marbling in the meat also contributes to its fat
