WTU plans refund

West Texas Utilities Co. plans another refund to its retail customers in December of this year.

The company was to file a request Monday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas requesting permission to refund a total of \$3.8 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs during the months of December 1986 through July 1987. The total includes \$3.4 million actual fuel cost savings, plus \$.4 million in interest.

Leroy Reeves, WTU local manager, said recently negotiated contract revisions reflecting the continued soft price of natural gas makes the refund necessary.

"As our cost for boiler fuel went down, we simply over-collected under the fuel rate approved by the PUC," Reeves said.

This will be the sixth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985. The fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted five times since 1985, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel, has continued to decline.

WTU's base rates have not changed since December 1984. How-

ever, on May 19, 1987 the Company filed for an increase in base rates necessitated by the completion of the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon. The assured supply of coal under a long-term contract is expected to help stabilize WTU's power plant fuel costs.

The refund will be made through one-time credits to retail customers in December subject to approval of the PUC. The typical residential customer will receive about \$7.00.

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


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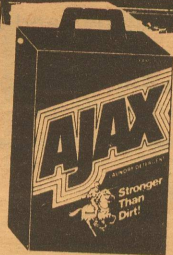

Linthicum to head SC Drive

Horace Linthicum of Eldorado has been appointed area chairman for the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander of Abilene, CRCC general chairman.

This Schleicher County supporter is among 250 statewide chairmen assisting the CRCC fundraiser which benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo.

Aubrey Stokes, San Angelo Attorney, is co-chairman of this 28th

annual event. Midwest Feedyards in San Angelo serves as a regional collection point.

"The agricultural community has always believed in the philosophy of neighbor helping neighbor, and the Cattlemen's Round-Up is a prime example of that belief," says Shelley V. Smith, WTRC president/executive director.

"Livestock donated by ranchers are collected at a designated point in each community and transported to the auction site," Alexander explains. "The local chairman's job is to make a personal pledge, then ask others to join him in this drive which is anticipated to raise \$300,000 this fall."

Sales of livestock are converted to dollars and the amount helps provide out-patient treatments for the more than 11,000 handicapped children and adults who will be treated this year at the Rehab facilities.

Scheduled CRCC sale dates include Cattle Sale - September 28 at Abilene Auction; Horse Sale - October 3, Abilene Auction; Coleman Sale - October 7; Stephenville Sale - October 7; Junction Sheep and Goat Sale - October 12; San Saba Sale - October 15 and Brownwood Sale - October 28.

The Round-Up idea began in Coke County back in 1960 on the late Conda Wylie's Fort Chadbourne ranch. He came to Shelley Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be cut from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses at the Rehab Center. This spontaneous gathering of livestock continues to be a vital part of the Center's annual budget which is generated by donations, gifts, and third party reimbursements.

Since its establishment 34 years ago, WTRC always has aimed toward treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap. Treatment and diagnostic services provided include physical, occupational and speech therapies, audiology, orthotics, psychology, education, social services and diagnostic clinics. Patients are admitted by referral, and are treated without charge except for braces and hearing aids.

Harris Catering will be preparing brisket for the barbecue, which is expected to start at 12 noon. Further details on the event will be forthcoming next week.

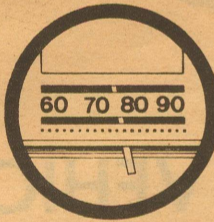
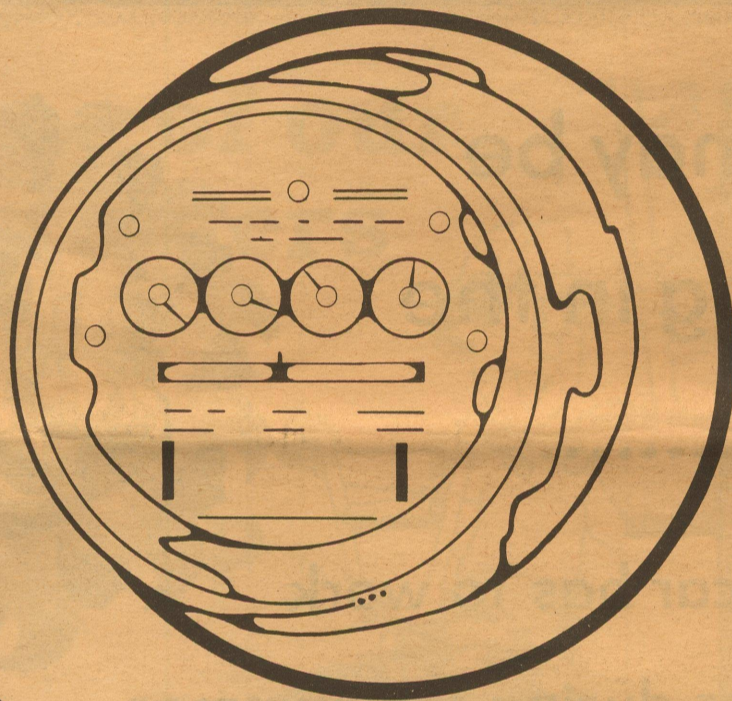
Boosters plan barbecue after scrimmage

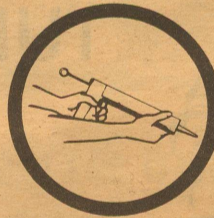
Tickets will be \$5 for adults and \$3 for children 12 and under.

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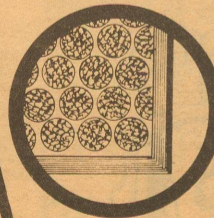

The Texas Legislature, after meeting for 29 days and 19 hours of the 30-day, second called session, reached an agreement on state appropriations that will be felt by Texans beginning October 1.

On that date the new six percent sales tax will go into effect and Eldorado residents will begin paying sales tax on garbage collection bills paid to the City of Eldorado.

state telephone calls, local telephone service, custom computer software, data processing, garbage collection, private club memberships, janitorial and cleaning services, non-residential repairs and remodeling, landscaping, lawn services and surveying, exterminating, security services, credit reporting, information services and insurance.

According to Carolyn Mayo, city secretary, each city must keep accurate billing records and sales tax records, and must obtain a sales tax permit if they do not already have one. In most cases the city will remit the collected sales taxes to the Comptroller monthly. "When a city imposes the local option sales tax on garbage collection, locations outside the city limits are taxed as well," Mrs. Mayo said.

Another change made by the legislature was the maximum fine increase for municipal courts. The maximum a city judge may now fine an individual is \$2,000 for ordinance violations related to fire safety, zoning, or public health and sanitation and \$500 for all other ordinance and criminal law violations. The new law goes into effect September 1.

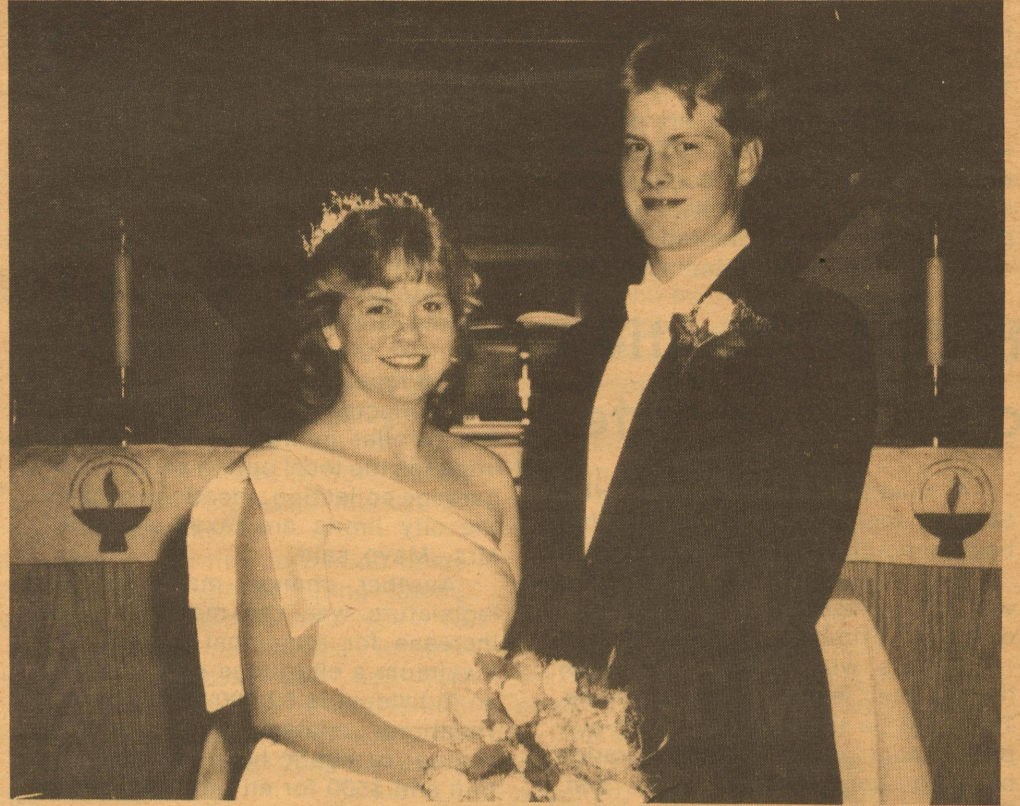

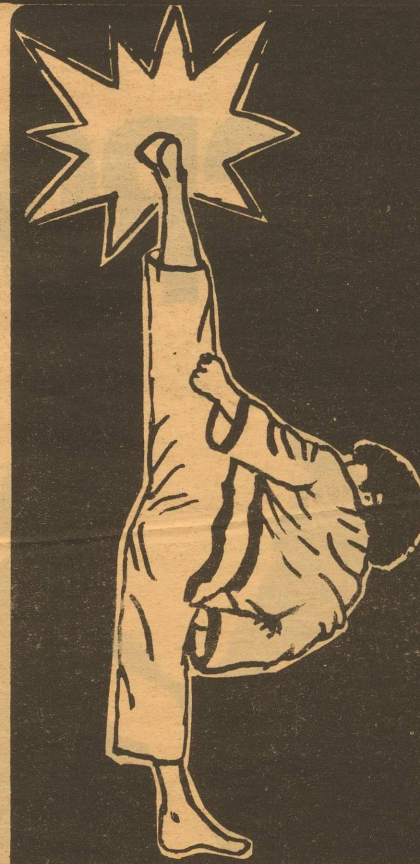


