

Ballot busy for May 7

Absentee voting is now underway for seats on the Schleicher County Hospital Board, Eldorado City Council and Schleicher County Independent School District Board of Trustees.

Persons who think they may not be in town for the May 7 voting can vote absentee for city and hospital board candidates at Eldorado City Hall. School board absentee voting is at the county

clerk's office.

Voters wanting to vote absentee can do so between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday at City Hall.

Filing deadline for local offices passed Wednesday afternoon, but as of 9 a.m. Wednesday morning six persons were seeking three council seats and six were filed for two seats on the school board. All four incumbents on the hospital board are

seeking re-election but are unopposed.

City council incumbents Rooster Jackson, Richard Preston and Terry B. Neill have filed for re-election, while Dora Bosmans, John Callison and Carlos Estrada are also seeking seats on the council.

Running for two school board seats are Tip Finley, Buff Whitten, George Gower, Joe Max Edmiston, Dobbs Lively and

Steve Sykes. Incumbent Ronnie Mittel is not seeking re-election and the other available seat is the one vacated when Chris McCra-vey resigned.

Running for new terms on the hospital board are Hyman Sauer, Bill Dakan, Jerry Jones and Floyd Butler.

Balloting for the three elections will be conducted on May 7 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the Memorial Building.

Country star set for dance

Recording star Kenny Dale will play for the Saturday night dance at this year's World Championship Cowboy Campfire Cookin' and Pasture Roping. The dance will be held on the slab at the rodeo arena in Eldorado.

Newly-signed to Republic records, Kenny Dale's newest release, "Two Will Be One", is enjoying excellent airplay and response from the listening audience.

Kenny gained national recognition in 1974 with a "monster hit" that has become a standard in the industry; "Bluest Heartache of The Year". That was followed by a string of hit singles and he has now garnered four albums to his credit; "Bluest Heartache", "Red Hot

Memory", "Only Love Can Break a Heart", and his latest, "When It's Just You and Me".

Two singles also made the charts and received heavy airplay during 1982. "Moanin' the Blues" and "I Think I'm Losing You" are cut from different cloth but have that unmistakable Kenny Dale touch.

Early Eldorado school 'the hub'

Desks were stacked along the walls, bright lights gleamed and sweet music played as girls, in long check and calico ruffled dresses, swirled around the open floor of this one room wood frame school building in 1895.

This was the local school building of Eldorado, a newly-established town.

The building served many purposes in the community. This particular night as a dance hall. On other occasions it was used for church services. The desks served as pews and the platform provided a good place for the pulpit. Many revivals were held

here. Social and political community affairs were held here as well as school classes. If the walls of this old building could talk, some tall tales could probably be told.


This was Eldorado's first school with seven pupils at the beginning. The first teacher was Miss Goldwire and a little later E.E. Stricklin. Judd Nicks, one of Schleicher County's long time residents, was one of the first pupils.

The number of students grew fast as Eldorado became more populated. The class room soon became over crowded. Seating

had to be improvised by letting the younger students sit on the platform ledge or ready made seating from planks and arms made at the local blacksmith.

The class was usually well behaved with a few exceptions. One of those exceptions being the arrival of the mail stage to town. The stage was heralded by a bugle, heard all over town. At the first sound of the bugle, books could not hold the attention of the students. Children could be seen leaning out the windows.

Occasionally a horse would run loose or just to see the

1988 Tax Reform underway

As income tax deadlines approach, conservation districts remind ranchers and farmers of the aspects of the 1986 Tax Reform Act that affect the deductibility of soil and water conservation practices. It is not possible to give full details relating to this aspect of the Act. The following information is

given only as a reminder. Specific questions should be addressed to a tax consultant. The tax reform measure does allow for the deduction of certain expenditures for soil and water conservation practices that otherwise could be capitalized. Expenditures may qualify if the practice is included in an indivi-

dual conservation plan, a county conservation plan established by the SCS state conservationist, or a plan (such as a forestry plan) approved by a comparable state agency. Expenditures in connection with draining or filling of wetlands or preparing lands for the operation of a center pivot irrigation system are not an allowable deduction.

A county conservation plan (which should be available in each county) outlines common conservation practices that (with or without SCS technical assistance) are approved in that particular county. For example, a farmer could install a windbreak (a practice that may be approved in his county) with the help of a county Extension agent and qualify for a tax deduction.

As a service to taxpayers, the IRS has provided each SCS field office with a supply of the IRS tax form #8645.

Maybe we like seeing these things but it is just good to see all the kids facing in the same direction and doing what someone tells them to do pretty much on cue. Considering that this is the same ten year old that can't

locate matching socks or fold laundry, it gives me great pleasure to see that he has memorized not too few musical notes and can play them back pretty much in order.

Of course at the end we all got to go to our child's classroom and see, at least for that night, a child who did almost everything right.

Wall senior on All-State basketball team





REFRIGERATE EASTER EGGS-If you're tempted to color baskets and baskets full of eggs for Easter, remember to store them properly or to not eat them. A recent study in the Poultry Science Journal showed that hard-cooked eggs stored at room temperature spoil in less than a week but eggs put in the refrigerator after two days at room temperature keep for three weeks. Hard-cooked eggs kept in their shells and stored the whole time in the refrigerator show the least bacterial growth. It's best to remove the Easter eggs from the basket as soon as possible, refrigerate them and use them within a few days.




