## Cookin', Roping sitting on 'Go!'



This year's World Championship Cowboy Campfire Cookin' and Pasture Roping is attracting attention from all over Texas and the nation, according to Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce spokesmen.

Chamber secretary Cindy McGinnes says her phone has been "ringing off the wall" with folks wanting information on one or more facets of the Memorial Day weekend activity.

"There has been lots of interest. We're expecting more entries in every aspect of the R-Bar this year," Mrs. McGinnes said. Jo Ward, chamber director and secretary of the event last year, agreed.

"We've had a lot more interest this year than last. If the

weather holds up we should have a record crowd," Mrs. Ward added.

Tickets to the dance are starting to sell this week, according to chairmen Jerry and Glória Swift. Ticket sales had been slow up until this week, the Swifts reported.

Kenny Dale, country and western recording star, will play for the Saturday dance, scheduled for 9 p.m. on a covered slab at the rodeo arena. Tickets are \$7 each in advance and \$8 each at the gate.

Persons wanting tickets can attain them from the Eldorado Success, The Hayloft, The Top, Shot's, from most R-Bar chairmen, and the chamber office, located in the museum.

Over 800 invitations were mailed out by Western Heritage Art Show and Sale chairmen Herman and Deanne Walker and interest in this year's show is running high. One art enthusiast plans to fly into Eldorado Friday from Dallas.

The western art of 10 of the nation's finest artists will be on display. Invitations were mailed locally, as well as to prospective buyers in San Angelo and Midland and Odessa areas.

The art will first be viewed at a cocktail party for the artists and buyers Friday night, starting at 6:30 p.m. The party will be held against a chuckwagon backdrop on the slab adjacent to the art show. Guests are invited to tour the wagon area and get acquainted with the cooks.

"The second annual R-Bar Western Art Show is shaping up to be an outstanding addition to the weekend.

"Excitement is running high around the show headquarters.

Art enthusiasts from all over West Texas are looking forward to the show.

"We have even had a call from one collector who plans to fly in from Dallas.

"The art this year is going to be outstanding! We have four new artists to the show this year. Each of them have numerous national awards in recognition of their outstanding work.

"Garnet Buster of New Braunfels paints knockout still lifes of southwest and Indian origin. He works in both water-color and oil.

"Steve Devenyns of Cody, Wyoming is noted among collectors all over the nation for his miniatures of cowboys and their horses. He works in oils, water-colors and pencil.

"George Kovach of Blackwell is the upcoming master of Hill Country landscapes. His works rival Salinas and Wood in their depth and richness of color.

"Earl Kuhn is probably the leading watercolorist of the West presently. His attention to detail and proper depiction of the American cowboy stand above any other.

"One returning artist is Duward Campbell of Lubbock. Duward has walked away with awards and recognition for his pencil work for a number of years. He is a master with colored pencil.

"Edd Hayes of Humble captures the cowboy in some really sticky situations. His rodeo pieces have brought him recognition nationally and he presently is working on several monument size pieces of past rodeo greats.

"Allen Kinney of Kerrville works with light like few artists are able. His "Night Scenes"

have been sought after for many years now for their unusual glowing affect. He accomplishes this with colored pencil on dark illustration board.

"Ray McGuffin of Ft. McKavett brings his ranch life to canvases in oil. The feeling of having been there is alive in every work.

"I, as chairman of the show, just try to pick up the pieces, left over with such a fine group.

Walker paints scenes of the ranch life working in oils, pencil and bronze.

"We just hope folks won't miss this opportunity to see this fine work. It is certainly the best gathering of western art to be seen in this region for some time. The show is located at the fair grounds, 1 mile south of Eldorado on Hwy. 277 in the roping club house. The hours are from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and 12 noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday," Walker concluded.

Sponsoring the art show are the First National Bank of Eldorado, SS Cattle Company and Eddie Sutton of Dimmitt, First National Bank of Mertzon, Ranch House Meats and Home Delivery Service, Menard, Judy McDonald Quarterhorses, Sonora; Mike and Annthinette Mankin and Pam Meador.

Details are presented below on each facet of this year's R-Bar event, named for the first brand ever used in Schleicher County.

### FRIDAY, MAY 27

During the day Friday the various cooking teams will set up their chuckwagon and chuckbox camps and those operating concessions can also set-up.

The cocktail party will start at 6:30 p.m. and last until 8. At 9 p.m. a pickin' and singin' around the campfire will be held. Local musicians and those coming in for the fiddling contest the next day are asked to join in with their instruments.

There will be an "Old Liars Contest", and lots of music and song. Those attending might want to bring lawn chairs.

### SATURDAY, MAY 28

Grounds open to the public at 9 a.m. Entry can be made by the general public at the first gate, with those with horse trailers asked to use the third gate and pull past the 4-H center into the east pasture. Ropers will enter the arena for the goat roping through the east end of the arena.

At 9:30 a.m. the Working Stockdog Contest will be held in the rodeo arena. Chairman is Steve Sykes. Only non-professional stockdogs can be entered.

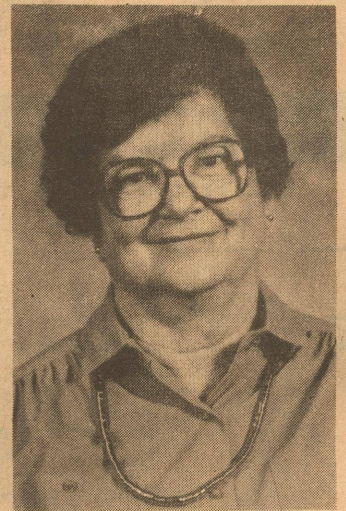
The dog contest will be highlighted by cowboy relay races in the arena and hay tumbling races, according to games chairman Kim-et Nelson. First, second and third places will be named.

The art show and sale starts at 10 a.m. preceded by the raising of the colors by Weldon Jenkins and his group of Boy Scouts.

Entries for all games will be due at 10 a.m. They will include 42, spades, the tortilla toss, horseshoes and washers. Trophies will go to 42, horseshoe and washer pitching winners.

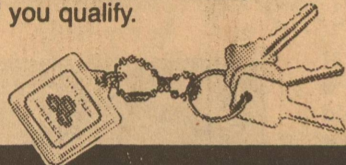

# Council 'mum' on police idea

## UNTIL AFTER RUNOFF ELECTION

Meeting in regular monthly session Tuesday, May 10 the Eldorado City Council officially remained "mum" over the issue of hiring a night watchman or creating a police department, but did vote not to pay the county its \$800 per month allotment for law enforcement.

The council approved all monthly bills with the exception of the deputy transfer, but took no action on hiring a watchman or creating a police department until after the runoff election this Saturday, when the council will again be complete.

Ruben Flores, former deputy sheriff, was on hand at the meeting to discuss the law enforcement change possibility with the council. He said he was experienced in law enforcement and wanted to stay in Eldorado. After a brief discussion the item was tabled.

According to Carolyn Mayo, the Council did not pay the \$800 allotment because the sheriff's department is short-handed and does not have any officer on duty in the early morning hours.

Larry Donaldson, representing D&D Feeds, was not present as scheduled, so after brief discussion Mayor Bob Lester called for opening of bids for 3.5 acres of land out of Abstract 1056, Block LL, Survey 46, G.C. & S.F. also known as the Old City Landfill.

Bids submitted were as follows: Charles Kellogg, \$100.00; Martin Garcia, \$400.00.

Motion was made by Edwin M. Jackson, Jr. and was seconded by John Nikolauk that bid be awarded to Martin Garcia for \$400.00. Motion carried.

The April minutes were distributed to those present and motion was made by Barbara Jackson that they be approved. Motion was seconded by John Nikolauk. Motion carried. The April Tax Report was circulated for initialling. Financial reports for the month of April were distributed and the Secretary pointed out revenue accounts under budget and expense accounts over budget. Bills were reviewed and motion was made by John Nikolauk that they be paid with the exception of the monthly county deputy transfer. Motion was seconded by Richard Preston. Motion carried.

Johnny Griffin, who leases Joe Christian's irrigated fields adjacent to the sewer plant asked the council about the problems he was encountering with not enough water from the plant. He was told about the violations outlined by the Texas Water Commission on their inspection May 9, 1988 and it was pointed out to him that all the irrigation would now have to be done from the third pond.

It was also pointed out that agreement with Christian dated December 14, 1983 allowed for irrigation as water was available. The question arose concerning the fresh water supply used by Griffin to prime his pump line. All city personnel were not aware of the existence of the line until May 5, 1988 when the meter reader turned in a reading. After

discussion, motion was made by Barbara Jackson to permit Griffin access to the fresh water at the standard rates without deposit. Motion was seconded by Edwin Jackson, Jr. Motion carried. Copy of violations letter from the T.W.C. will be forwarded to both Griffin and Christian upon receipt.

Danny Crowder met with the council to discuss the 1939 firetruck currently leased by the Shriners under lease dated April 12, 1983. He reported that due to liability insurance coverage for parades the Shriners would be terminating the lease and relinquishing the truck to the city.

After discussion, motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. and seconded by Richard Preston that the truck be advertised for bids. Bid opening was scheduled for the June regular meeting with the council reserving the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

Written trenching bid from Crowder with Trio Specialties was received by the council. Mayor Lester opened bids as follows:

Carl J. Cahill, Inc., 50x150x20' deep, \$5500.00 with shooting by hour; Carl J. Cahill, Inc., 50x300x20' deep, \$11,000.00 with shooting by hour; Trio Specialties, 50x150x20' deep, \$4,000.00 with \$2,000 shooting clause; Trio Specialties, 50x300x20' deep \$7,000.00 with \$3,000 shooting clause.

Action on the bids was tabled until further in meeting.

Ruben Flores met with the council about possibility of the city hiring nightwatch of city policeman in the future. Flores stated that he was experienced in law enforcement and was desirous of staying in Eldorado if possible. After brief discussion, item was tabled until the full council could meet after runoff election.

The Secretary reviewed history of the past year of calls from the hospital and nursing home for blocked sewer which included 19 hours labor on seven trips in eight days' time from April 30, 1988, through May 7, 1988. This period included three weekend days.

After discussion, the secretary was instructed to prepare billing for the seven trips at \$12.00 per hour per man per original agreement. She was also instructed to prepare letter for the Hospital Board of Directors that the city personnel would not be allowed to enter the building in the future to remedy the same problem. The decision was unanimous.

The secretary reviewed ongoing problem with gain rather than loss on the private gas pipeline due to apparent master metering problems for the past 5-6 months. She asked for permission to seek outside help. Permission was granted.

The Keeney pipeline south of the gin was discussed with the secretary reporting that the leak on the private pipeline had not been fixed in the past six months.

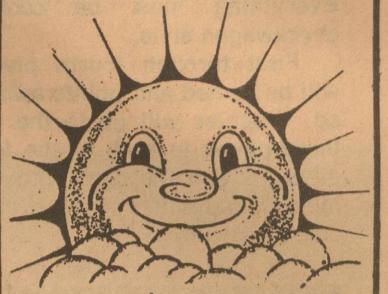

This is a riddle: Who is smaller than most, plays the guitar, has five daughters, still thinks he was mistreated as a child, and has a square forehead?

Give up? Of course you do. It is my brother Carlo. He is fifty years old today. Can you imagine? I have a brother who is somehow only four years older than me and yet he is fifty and I am nowhere near that age.

How is it Carlo could age so much faster than I? Well, no matter, I am only telling you this because Carlo is one of those people who took every opportunity to risk not even making fifteen years let along fifty.

In our family Carlo is noted for several things, not the least of which is his rather prominent forehead. Carlo's forehead is "kind-a" square, mainly from him using it as a "stopper".

Carlo was one of those kids who would "break his fall" by landing on his forehead. That would not have been so bad but he did from a three-story cherry tree and the roof of the house. I always thought his head was a little big for such a short guy, and maybe that is why he landed on it so often.

I am not so sure how many ladies felt this way, but, like most Giovanniitti males, Carlo was unconcerned with numbers. I really think it ironic that today, as streams of young men come to his home courting his daughters, Carlo sits there trying to convince himself that these young men have something on their minds completely different from what he used to think about when he was dating.

Now, on top of all that, he is fifty years old. Half a century has gone by and he still is in the same place. That is maybe the only problem with being from a large family, there is no way to move up or down. I'll always be his little brother which, I must say, was much more of a chore for him than for me, and he will always be younger than Fred, Janine, and Joe. It appears we're all frozen in time, moving along yet always staying in the same place. So maybe being fifty isn't all that bad...then again?
