## Absentees shatter SC record

Poll watchers think this Tuesday's Democratic Primary in Schleicher County will draw the largest voter turnout in the history of the county.

Absentee voting, which ends Friday, March 4, has already exceeded all previous years' totals. Schleicher County Clerk Helen Blakeway reported 212 absentee votes cast as of 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, easily surpassing the old record of 140.

Mrs. Blakeway said she would not be surprised if more than 1,000 Schleicher Countians vote March 8 in the Democratic Primary. "If more than 1,000 vote that would probably give

one of the highest voter turnouts percentage-wise in Texas this year," she added.

There are several candidates for locals to vote for on the Tuesday ballot but the race drawing record numbers of voters is the one to fill retiring Sheriff Orval Edmiston's seat.

Chief Deputy Ronnie Norris and Deputy Ruben Flores are both running for the Democratic nomination and have been conducting active campaigns.

Other races on the ballot include:

Little interest has been shown by Schleicher Democrats in the

crowded list of candidates for the White House. Names on the ballot include Al Gore, Bruce Babbitt, Michael S. Dukakis, Dick Gephardt, Gary Hart, Paul Simon, Jesse L. Jackson, Noebert G. Dennerll, Jr., Lyndon H. LaRouche, Jr., David E. Duke and W.A. Williams.

## AIDS education underway

Many persons have inquired about the instruction in Eldorado Public Schools concerning drugs and AIDS. In order for the public to know that local students are informed about the adverse use of drugs and about AIDS, the following information is given.

In grades, two, four, six and seven drug education is done through health and science study units. The high school health classes do an extensive unit on drugs, utilizing information from textbooks, videos, guest speakers and debates.

The high school health classes have had a guest lecturer who

discussed AIDS and will do more study in the unit covering diseases. The school has sponsored an open public meeting on AIDS with Dr. Forlano presenting the information. The school libraries have a variety of information on both drugs and AIDS as shown in the examples below:

## Calcote was tough pioneer

PEG LEG DID NOT STOP STORE OWNER

After the Civil War in the late 1860's, times were difficult for most southerners. Many had lost everything, homes, land, money and even families. One thing they did not lose, though, was their spirit.

They began to move westward to find a better place to make homes for their families. It seemed better to take their chances with the hostile Indians, than try to cope with the carpetbaggers and unfair politics. A sense of lost freedom was felt and they needed a place to start over, to plant roots for their families; build new homes.

One of these southern families was Robert Lee Calcote's family. Robert Lee was born in 1866 in Louisiana. The Calcote's moved west to Hylton, Texas Taylor County when Robert Lee was a small child.

It was in Hylton that Robert Lee met and married Emma

Henslee as a young man. They had eleven children.

Yearning to venture further into the west, Robert Lee came to Schleicher County in 1900. He bought land between Sonora and San Angelo.

The land was located only eleven miles north of the newly established town of Eldorado. The perfect place to build a general store. Travelers and freighters could not make the trip between these two points in one day. The weather was often bad and the dirt road would be muddy and impassable.

The Calcote Store would furnish a place for travelers to camp overnight, also supplies and fresh horses for the freighters. Robert Lee worked hard building a wood frame building and clearing land, drilling a water well, and other preparations needed for the business.

Calcote was coming from San

Angelo one day, loaded with supplies for the store. A storm blew up and it started to rain hard. He stopped the wagon and horses to cover the supplies.

He reached into the wagon to get his coat, not remembering that his gun was wrapped in the coat. He pulled out the coat and the gun discharged, hitting him in the leg. He was unable to continue the trip.

Robert Lee lay wounded for many hours. The owner of Pecan Station finally found him and took him to a doctor. Calcote's life was saved, but they removed his leg, and suffered a long recovery.

Thereafter he was called "Peg Leg" referring to the wooden leg he made and wore until he died in 1925.

Robert Lee Calcote was a well known character in Schleicher County pioneer days, an example of raw courage, hard work, and endurance that he, as well as many others, experienced during this period of new growth for the west.

By most capable they mean a person that can be respected and trusted for their good judgement, high morals, and rapore and experience with dealing with the public.

They want a person that can set a good example for the benefit of our community--youth in particular--and maintain a law level of criminal action.

They also commented on the fact that "rascism" was "old hat" "passe" even in Schleicher County. Their votes were going to the person, male or female, that best fit the afore-mentioned qualities.

Response on choice for president and other places was so low, that I wonder, do we have a lot of Republicans voting again in the Democratic Primary?

No matter, because we had a lot of Democrats voting in the Republican Primary last primary year...which goes to show, these people are going to exercise their privilege to vote any way they so choose.

I consider and endorse the following for party candidates.

Best bets for president were however mentioned most in this order--Gore, Gephardt, Dukakis. The straw vote will reveal some, but precinct caucusing will tell all.

Everybody has heard of Lloyd Bentsen and everybody in District 67 has heard of Joe Sullivan, the "persevering politician". Ole Joe never gives up and since I've known him has not won a race. He won't win this one either for U.S. Senator.

Best bet is Lloyd Bentsen, a

'feather in Texan's Stetsons'. His clout and position in national government is a plus for Texas. No offense Joe, but Bentsen's just got more going for him and Texas.

Going into races for judges, keep these names in mind, because you won't remember their court titles--Woodie Jones, Bob Gammage and Marilyn Aboussie.

Jones is running against incumbent Jim Brady. Woodie Jones is new at this, but he's the man to be the judge, 3rd Court of Appeals Place 1. Aboussie, a lady from San Angelo, is another plus. Don't forget to "X" her name, even if she has no opponent, she deserves the applause.

Same goes for Gammage. And remember Lloyd Doggett for Justice Supreme Court, Place 1.

Let's not forget the controversy on appointment or election of these judges. This ballot will contain a statement at the bottom. Be sure to read it well. Results of this vote are only "feelers" to see if warrants attention to be included on November General Election. Until State Legislature gets some compromise going, I prefer to maintain my right to elect the person of my choice. Best bet "X" for this statement.

You may not remember these judges on their court titles as there are so many. I can't. I do know the ones I have mentioned and I know I'd like to be able to maintain the right to vote for them.

At last we have a candidate well qualified to represent District 67 as State Representative, David Currie, unopposed. He will be a fine contender in November.

There was not much comment on uncontested places. They were either satisfied with the candidate or else not concerned with places on levels other than county. All in all the focus was on "who will be Super Tuesday's Schleicher County Sheriff?" And "will there be a 'write in' in November's General Election?"
