A few days ago there was an article in the "other" paper about some pending legislation in the United States Congress to require the manufacturers of plastic hand-guns to put enough metal into these weapons so they would be detectable by the usual metal detector.

Now that does not seem too unreasonable to me. Of course, out here in Schleicher County we don't have to worry too much about people sneaking guns into any of our public places. There is not very much to steal or to hijack around here. But a few of us travel on airlines now and then or go to the big cities where possible acts of terrorism or other violent activities may take

However, there is an organization in this country opposed to the government requiring manufacturers to build guns a certain way. This organization through its lobbyists is putting tremendous pressure on congressmen to vote against such a law. This group, in fact, is opposed to any laws that even remotely restrict the manufacture, sale, transfer, or use of firearms.

The National Rifle Association (NRA) is about the only organization fighting this bill. All of the major law enforcement organizations have put their full support behind this law to make

# Election on tap here May 7

With the city election coming up May 7, in combination with the school board and hospital board elections, it is important to recognize the fact that how well your city, hospital or school operates physically and financially is dependent upon the leadership on the various boards.

These people are expected to set up policies in agreement with State and Federal guidelines and make decisions with both their hearts and their minds without personal prejudice that will affect the entire community.

Sometimes their meetings and jurisdictions go smoothly, and sometimes they are anything but smooth with different opinions, different priorities, and different people represented.

It is important that the community be well-represented and those persons elected be

well-versed in the various aspects of city government, hospital administration and school administration. These people are not expected to always agree - in fact, if they always agreed there would be reason to suspect a coalition or a "shady" situation.

A local politician was even over-heard stating that if he always agreed with his fellow politicians, he would not be doing his job properly. The ability to express a differing opinion allows exposure to more than one solution to the problem.

One person cannot run the city, hospital, or school. The majority must rule, and anyone thinking that their being elected to the various boards will make a tremendous change in the way things are handled is very mistaken and will find themselves corrected within a short tenure.

The ability to cooperate with others and even compromise is an asset of any person elected to public office. Election to any public board is an honor, yet holds a great amount of responsibility. Anyone elected can make changes - small or large - but not alone.

On the city level, the city "bosses" outline priorities for the city personnel and have complete leverage in the way the City of Eldorado is run. The outside superintendent and the city secretary must report directly to the countil and not to each other.

Both are assigned duties which should coordinate. Personnel under the superintendent and the secretary must answer first to their respective supervisors and ultimately to the council.

The current form of city government is thusly separated into two main functions - summarized as "inside" and "outside". Sometimes the two meet head-on, but neither could properly function without the other.

City Hall and express great concern over the large pothole in front of your home, the office personnel can be sympathetic to your problem and can refer it to the outside superintendent of his personnel, but she cannot assure that it will be fixed.

Likewise, if your bill is outrageously high it will not do any good to complain to the man fixing the pothole in front of your home. You must contact the office, who may need to arrange for your meter to be re-read and verified.

By the way, the office does not estimate billings except on very rare occasions. The billings are computed on the approximately 1500 meter readings obtained between the 12th and the 15th of the month.

If all of this confuses you, call City Hall and they will help you determine if you need to speak ith someone "inside" or "out-

Each of us knows subconsciously, if not consciously, there is always more to any job than what we see on first viewing. There is always an open chair at the city council meetings for visitors although there is not a big "welcome" banner permanently afixed to the City Hall.

Notices of city council meetings are posted on the front door 72-hours in advance of any meeting. Meetings are normally held the second Tuesday of the month with special meetings as necessary.

If you see a potential problem or an existing situation that needs attention, your council wants to know about it. The council needs to be aware of any problem, no matter how small.

They are fully aware that if everything appears "rosy", something is being overlooked. There is always something needing attention and several opinions available on the means by which to accomplish the goal.

Voting is a very personal and important liberty. Take advantage of it on May 7 and vote in all the elections - city, school and hospital - at the Memorial Building.

Your city government, or any other local government organization, could be compared to your old Chevrolet (or Ford) pickup. Sometimes it needs the jumper cables applied to that old battery to provide a new spark, more potent gas in the tank, a little more lubrication to quiet the rattles, or new tires to smooth out the bumps in the road.

We take it for granted until it loses its get-up-and-go and won't get us where we want to go.


