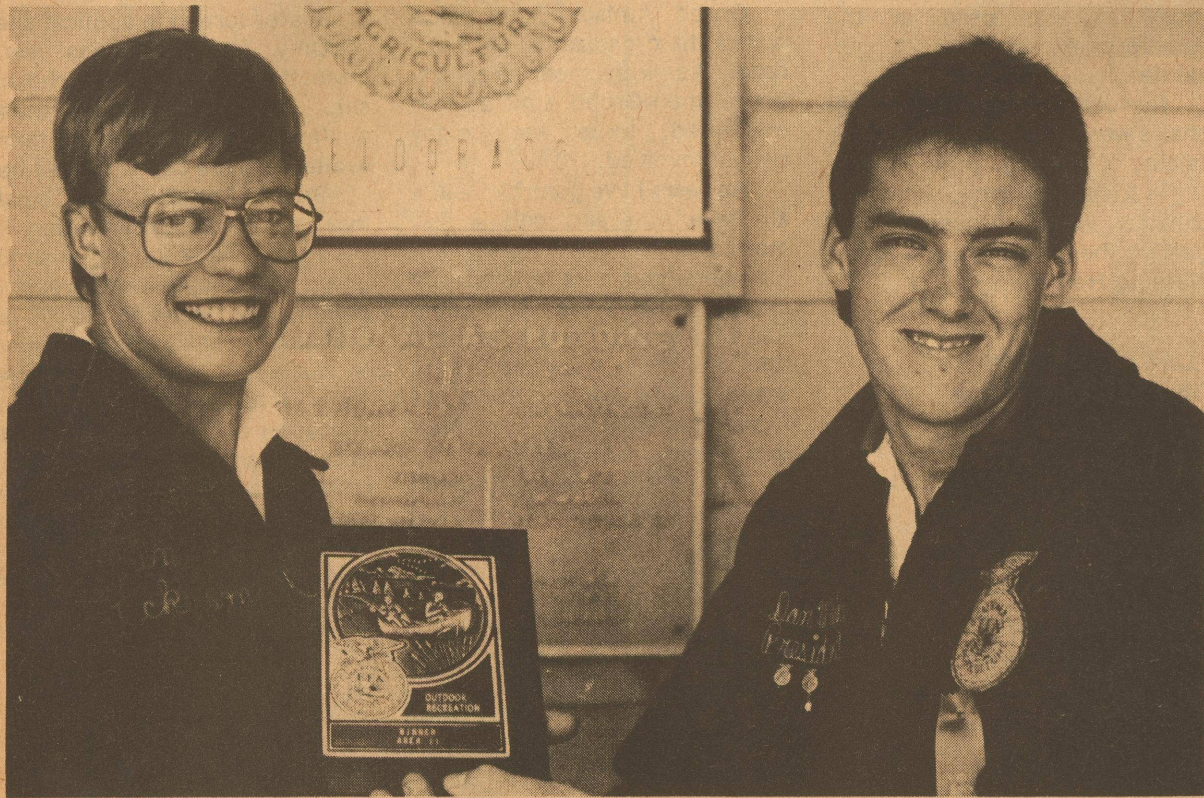

Held in conjunction with the World Championship Cowboy Campfire Cooking and Pasture Roping, last Saturday's Fiddlers Contest drew lots of entries and enthusiastic spectators.

Capturing the big crowd's imagination were tiny Julie Ann Carpenter and even tinier Jake Wyatt, both of San Angelo. They won first and second in the 18 years and younger class, while fiddle veteran Chester Derrick of Odessa was claiming first place in the 60 and older and overall championship.

Kacy Lynn Fairchild of Camp Wood was third in the youngster group, with Russ Book of Van-court fourth and Lisa Book fifth. Lance Mitchell of Eldorado was sixth.

Billy Hogan of Harper was also a crowd favorite, enroute to a victory in the 19-59 group. Sheronna Kingston, last year's overall winner, took second behind Hogan, and Wilford Wagner of Junction was third. Lometa Stavelly of San Antonio and a member of the San Antonio Symphony, took fourth.

In the 60 and older division, Derrick was first, followed by Josephine Wallace of Camp Wood, J.D. Kilgore of Ozona and Charles Pharis of Sonora.

rattling of pans around the chuckwagons last weekend as the second annual World Championship Cowboy Campfire Cookin' and Pasture Roping was held in Eldorado.

Visitors came from all over the United States for the cowboy event, including Maine and Illinois, and those attending got a good look at West Texas weather--wind and dust sprinkled with an early morning shower.

Attendance exceeded last year, even though high winds Saturday and Sunday made viewing the chuckwagons and watching the pasture and goat ropers less attractive.

Activities included in the R-Bar event included the campfire cookin', pasture roping, Western Heritage Art Show and Sale, Working Stockdog Contest, fiddling contest, goat roping and assorted cowboy games.

R-Bar planners rented two large, 60x90' tents, which were utilized as headquarters for concessions and tradespeople and to cover the slab adjacent to the rodeo arena.

Tradespeople included a hat-maker, spurmaker, and horse-shoer.

Friday was scheduled to be set-up day at the Eldorado Rodeo Complex for the event, but many concessions were already in place early Friday morning around the big tent.

At 6:30 p.m. Friday the Western Heritage Art Show and Sale opened for a preview and a cocktail party. Invited art fans from all over Texas attended the party and show and several pieces of art were sold.

Following the party a pickin' and singing around the campfire

was held with various guitar players, fiddlers and harmonica buffs participating.

Dawn Saturday was marked by cloudy skies that soon turned to drizzle, but dampened few spirits as cooks erected tarps around their chuckwagons and fires and slickers were favorite attire.

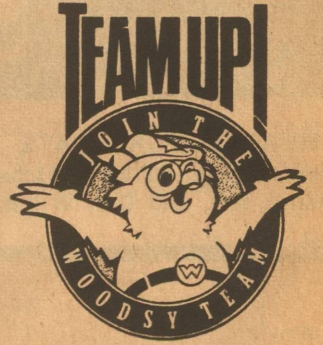

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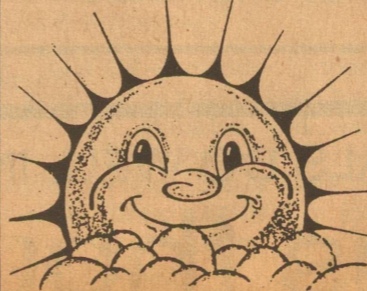
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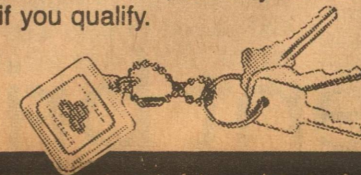

Presently these projects are being considered where the same amount of money that was allotted last year for Meals for Friends for three days a week program, would be used with government money to increase services in the above listed areas. But we need the community support and help because still volunteers would be the key to the success of these programs.

The goal of these services is to meet the needs of those in our county that have needs we need to meet. The transportation van would be considered as a public transportation: for anyone—free to those 60 years and older—and for a small fee to all others riding; the aim to serve anyone who needs to travel—physical as well as social—the van would travel in the county as well as out of the county according to those riding—it would be on a scheduled time frame so appointments can be scheduled and all will be aware of where the van will be going that day.

The Senior Citizens Center would be an idea for years to come for our commissioners to set as a goal for our county. This would be the way all residents could not only be fed with food but have social needs met.

It would be a way our community could become involved: meals could be served here, activities planned, as well as a way to utilize the talents of our residents to make this a vital center for all. (The school, the hospital and nursing home, organizations, and anyone or group of interested and concerned residents.)

Any questions you may have call and talk with your county commissioner. The boxes are in the following locations and we thank them for their cooperation with this project of your county representatives.

PUBLIC NOTICE

CITY OF ELDORADO
Water Supply Customer

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform customers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
 - if the home is less than five years old, or
 - if you have soft or acidic water, or
 - if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

Eldorado's water supply has been tested at less than 0.02. If you would desire more information you may contact the City of Eldorado, P. O. Box 713, Eldorado, TX 76936 or the Texas Department of Health, 1100 W. 49th St., Abilene, TX 78756-3192.

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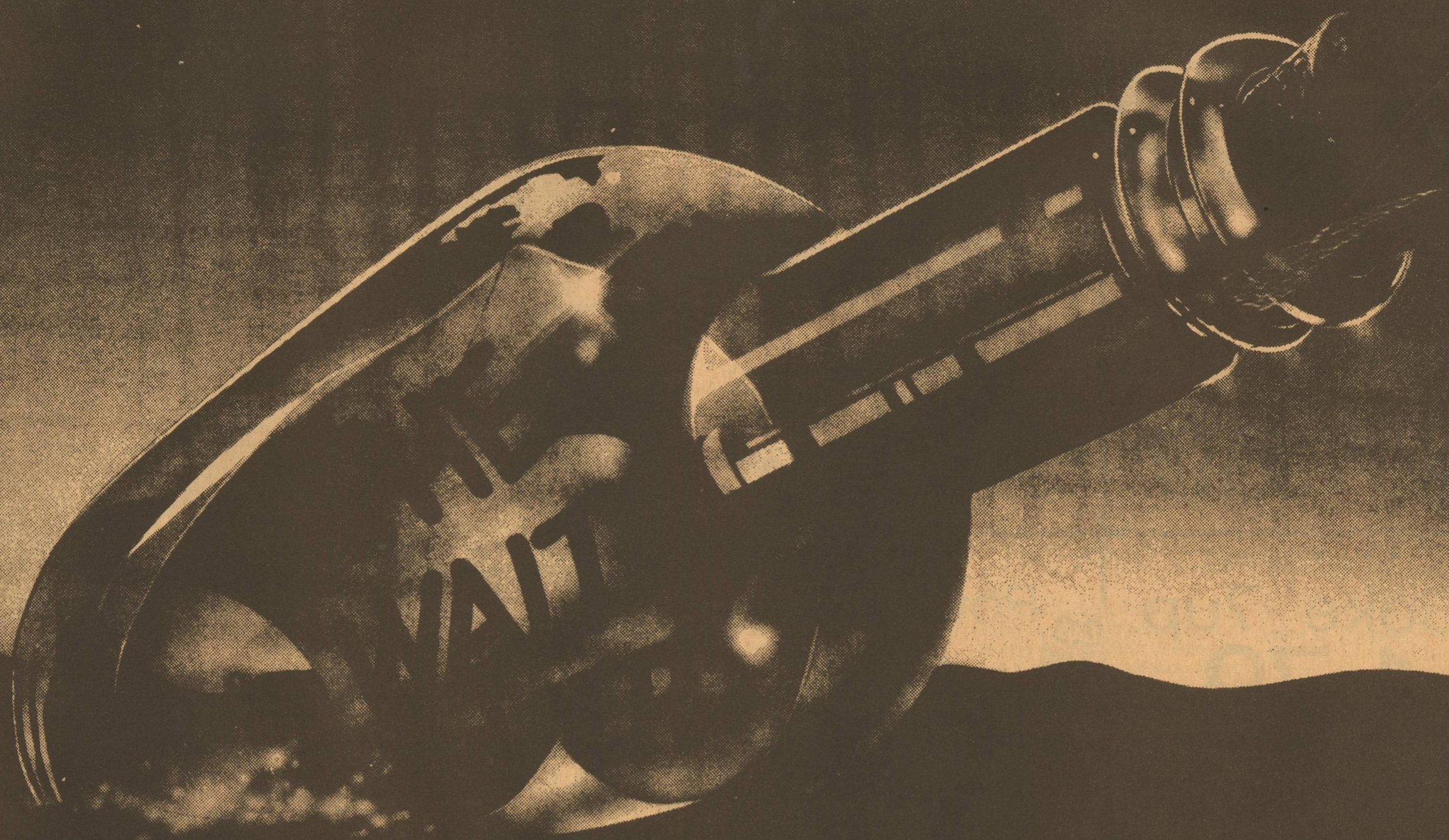

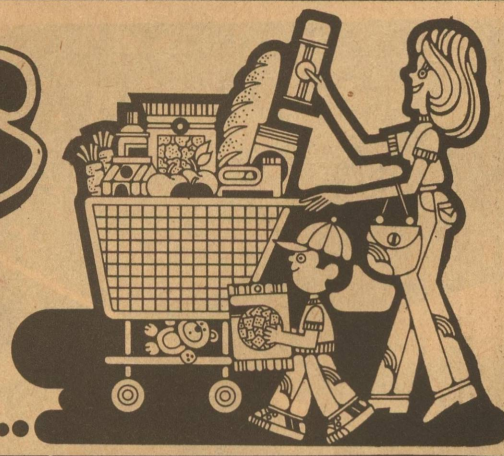
