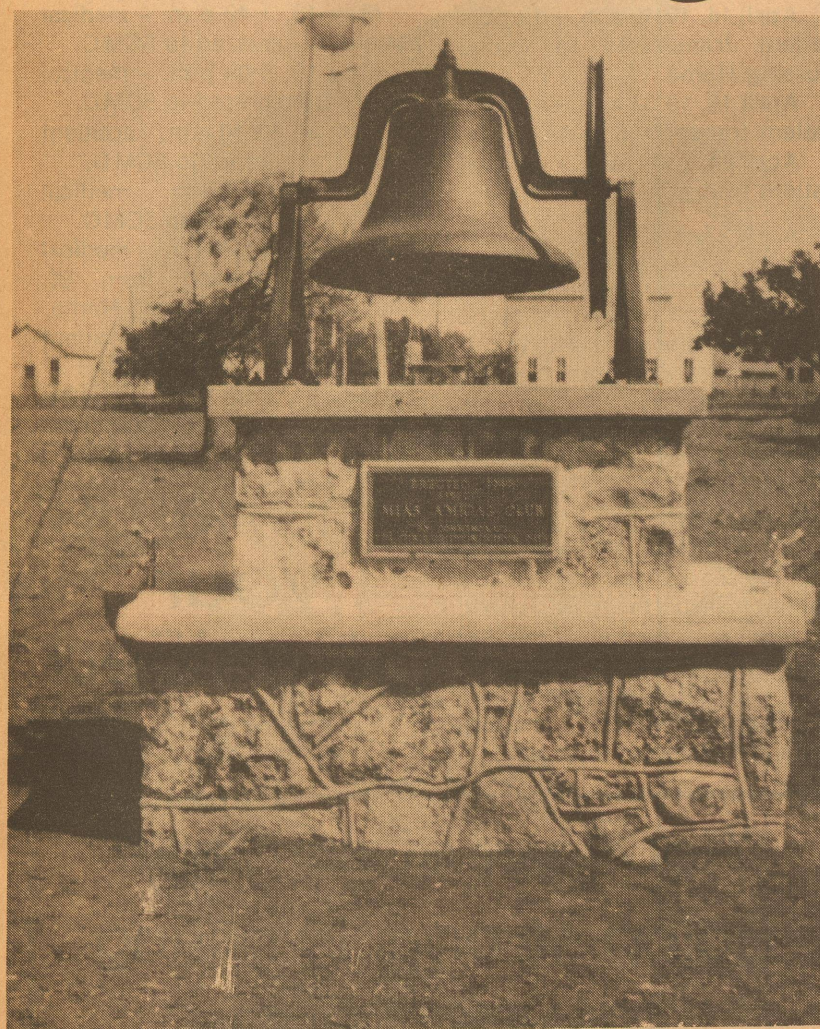


# Mias Amigas scheduled here this week

## REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD

# City has law enforcement idea

A regular meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, June 14 at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall with all councilmen in attendance with the exception

of Bob Lester who arrived later. Also present were Jerry Jones and Roger Powell with the Fire Department. Jones and Powell presented

a written request for funding for a total of \$11,650 from the City. This being a sizeable increase over last year's funding, the council stated they would take

the request into account in the 1988-89 budget which was being prepared.

Fire Department representatives stated they were willing to do mosquito spraying if the council desired. The council plans to review the situation after a trial run by the city crew using the fogger following a different spraying timetable.

Bids were opened and read for a 1939 Ford Pumper. Bids presented were from John T. Mitchell, \$100; Tri-Cities Shriners, \$500; and Floyd West, \$400. Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by John Nikolauk that the bid from Tri-Cities Shriners be accepted. Motion carried.

Motion was made by John Callison that the City Council offer \$1,500 per month to the county court if another qualified law officer could be hired. Motion was seconded by Barbara Jackson and motion carried.

It was decided that due to pros and cons aired about animal control, the service would be placed on an "on call" or "complaint" basis. Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by John Nikolauk that

the Animal Control officer be paid a \$25 per week retainer with hours accumulated as requested. Motion carried.

The secretary relayed a request from the City of Mertzton to use the local landfill due to problems with water contamination. It was the unanimous opinion that the request be formally denied in motion by Richard Preston and seconded by Dora Bosmans. The motion carried.

Applications were reviewed for the position of Utility Superintendent with the council designating ones they felt needed closer review. The secretary was instructed to compose letters to previous employers to obtain written recommendations on nine of those applications submitted. It was decided that the council would again review the applications within a reasonable reply time.

After a discussion of employee efficiency, Mayor Lester stated that he would call for an employee meeting the next morning to announce the council appointment of Juan Arispe as

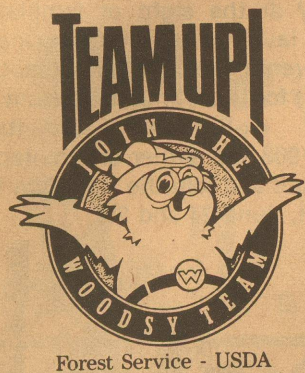

**Bond sales in Texas**

Sales of United States Savings Bonds in Texas amounted to \$28,200,757 during March 1988 for a six-month total of \$152,635,454. T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Texas, announced recently. These sales represent 43.6 percent of the state's fiscal year 1988 assigned dollar goal of \$350 million.

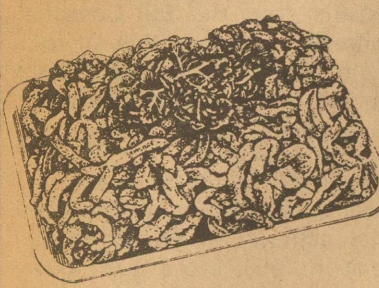

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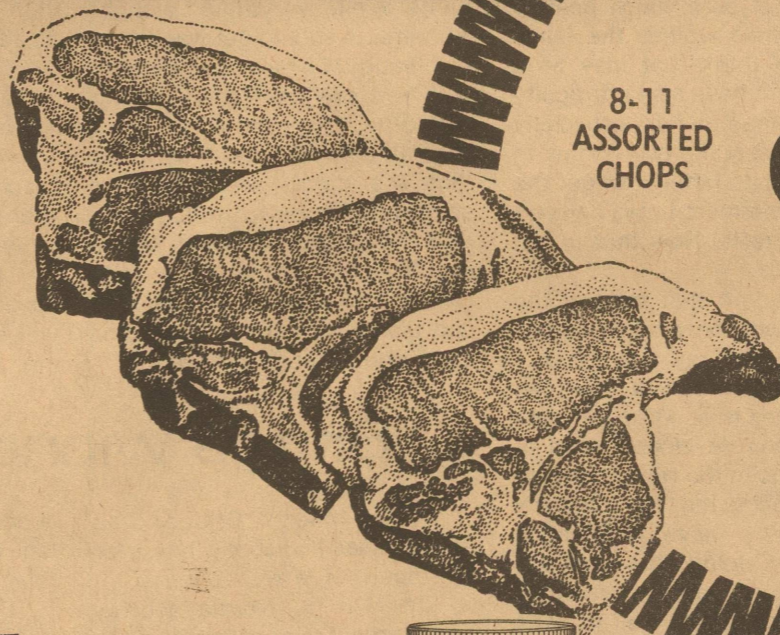

## STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

GTE Southwest Incorporated, in accordance with the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates in Texas, effective July 6, 1988. This proceeding has been previously docketed by the Commission as Docket No. 5610.

The proposed changes in rates will affect approximately 970,500 of the Company's Texas customers who represent all classes of customers subscribing to the Company's local exchange and foreign exchange services within the State of Texas, as well as all entities subscribing to the Company's billing and collection services within the state. The proposed changes in rates are designed to increase the Company's intrastate revenues by \$81,407,000, or approximately 11.8 percent annually.

A complete set of revised rate schedules has been filed with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and is available for public inspection in each of the Company's Business Offices in the State of Texas. A summary of the Company's rate filing has also been sent to the Mayor's office of each affected Municipality.

Ragsdale, Workshop Coordinators from College Station, participants will learn to identify range plants, evaluate rangeland potential and current condition, manage rangeland for livestock production and wildlife habitat and practice ranch planning. Leadership training will feature discussion of interpersonal relations, communications skills and group leading practice.

Field trips away from the Center will be to a Kimble County ranch and the Kerr Wildlife Management Area in Kerr County.

Range Workshop instructors include Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists, teachers from Texas A&M and Texas Tech Universities, a range specialist from the Soil Conservation Service, and other members of the Texas Section SRM involved in the management of the rangeland resources.

This will be the thirty-fourth consecutive year for this educational activity for youth which began in 1955. More than 1000 youth have benefited.

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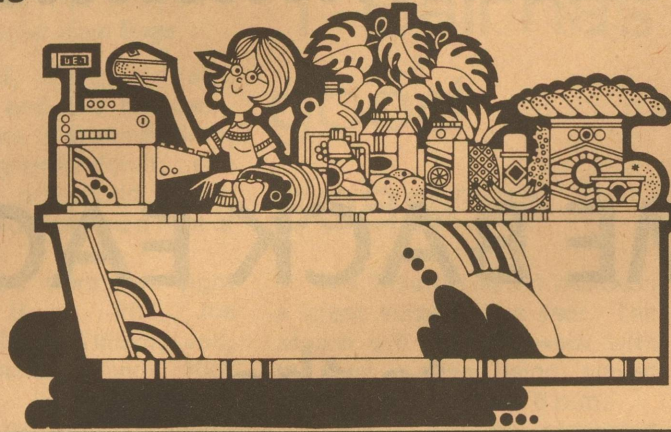
