

She was born March 3, 1897, in Kimble County. She came to Schleicher County about 1910,


and was married to Gene Edmiston August 8, 1915. She and her husband were lifelong ranchers, and she was a member of the West Side Church of Christ of







#### STATEMENT OF INTENT **TO CHANGE RATES**
