Seeing Mias Amigas sprawled across the front page of this week's SUCCESS made me very happy, and a little lonely too, since I cannot be there. But I can thank you for the good story you have written about the organiza-

tion. You have talent for the writing you are doing and I want to congratulate and thank you for it. Hope the SUCCESS managers and/or owners keep you busy. I am enjoying the picture you

carried. I can name all but one, possibly another about whom I am uncertain. So far as I know all are dead now except Lula Mae Evans and myself. I think Lula Mae is still living.

Lack of a car driver kept me at home this time. I did want to attend, but being in the very late 80s now my doctor thinks I should behave when it come to distances and let someone else drive my car. I do all right around town or down to Lubbock, but otherwise I am more or less grounded about driving. And there are no flights that would put me in Eldorado. Getting there from San Angelo would be a problem and a worse one when I reached Eldorado without a personal car.

It occurred to me to tell you that I have a number of early day pictures of the group attending in various years. If the museum there has a place of safe keeping for old photographs I would really like to send mine there.

It was a very small little club at first. Travel in those days was largely by train. Some of us had married and moved some distance away. Getting back home was a real task and expensive too for our slim pocket books. The motivating factor was to get there at the same time. So we set the last Friday and Saturday in June as the date and organized the club so that there could be plans made for entertainment before hand.

Will Whitten gave us our name and it is a good one I think. Hope they never change it. He was the son of Judge Whitten a well known early day leader, as are some of his descendants who are still living there. I wrote the little poem which you have set at the beginning of your story. In those days I did a great deal of singing, solo work, etc. trying to find expression for my sentiments and feelings. (Later it was organization work.)

I loved the old semi-classic, "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms". The poem came one day, when the organization was getting more mature. And so was !! I was driving my new Packard car down for the reunion. Must have been about the mid 40s. I had been singing "Believe Me" to myself as I drove along. The words began forming in my mind. And I rejected different ones and substituted another as I progressed. I was to thrilled by it an the thot I might have something to surprise my dear friends by singing at our opening meeting. And I did! I wrote out copies and we all sang it with real feeling. Right then and there they adopted it as our official song. It make me thrill with joy when I saw you had used it, in the news story.

My young son was beside me that day and approved of what I had written. In fact I tested it out on him! The tune is not too singable but I hope the organization keeps the words and repeats them at least.

Your story gave me a feeling of nostalgia and makes me recall some of the things we did for fun. Don McCormick was our gallant knight in those days nad helped in our every scheme or plan. In 1949 we had a hay ride which he had arranged. It was the very MOST, so we had one again the next year. For a number of years we met at the C.C. West home. Mrs. West is in this picture. Jim West is her youngest child. I am sure you know him.

Cora Lee Mebane and Ada came to the meetings occasionally, but Agnes was a faithful





Sorry there was no article last week but my brain was on vacation even though I had returned. The longer I live here the less urgent do the problems of the rest of the world become. I used to worry about all sorts of things.

Take for instance, this latest shooting event in the Persian Gulf. Like most other Americans I feel a certain amount of pity for the folks on that airplane. I am sure that many of them had no great love for America but they were probably not combatants and didn't even know that Iranian civil aviators did not, as a matter of principle answer warnings from The Great Satan's warships.

It seems to me that the situation may very well have been a no win affair. The Irainian airplane was only at 7,500 feet and descending at the time it was downed by the missiles. Having seen a few radar blips in my time I can assure you that it is not very easy to tell anything about a plane from the size of the mark on the screen. I am still not so sure what we are doing in the Gulf anyway.

Our protection of international shippng does not seem to me to be very helpful to Texas, especially our oil industry. Closing the Gulf would sure put a premium on West Texas Crude. Besides all that America only gets about 25 percent of its crude from the Persian Gulf. Who knows, maybe if the Gulf was shut down Japan and Europe would have to buy oil from us?

When you add to that the fact that if we had no military presence in the Gulf we would not risk losing any American lives in any shooting incidents. We could also avoid making the kind of mistake that takes the lives of civilians, such as this aircraft downing.

Now maybe there is something I am missing in all this. Maybe there is some broader issue about freedom of the high-seas and things such as that which I just fail to comprehend being so far from the seas, but I can't see that our policy in the Persian Gulf is very well thought out. I am not the only one who feels this way. There are a few senators and congressmen who believe that our plicy will and did result in just the sort of mistake that gives those fanatics who run

other innocent civilians.

Given the usual reaction from the Ayatollah it won't be too long before some American gets kidnapped or killed or a car bomb blows up in the yard of one of our embassies. The problems seems to be that unlike most intelligent people, the leaders of Iran just get worse when we try to use muscle and they get worse when we try to use diplomacy. When you deal with crazy people who also happen to have an army and navy there may be very few right answers. The Iranians invite this very kind of disaster and then blame the Evil Americans; that seems to me a no-win situation.

PUBLIC NOTICE

CITY OF ELDORADO Water Supply Customer

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform customers or this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

If your home or water system has lead pipes, or If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and -if the home is less than five years old, or

you have soft or acidic water, or

-if water sits in the pipes for several hours Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and

to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

Eldorado's water supply has been tested at less than 0.02. If you would desire more information you may contact the City of Eldorado, P. 0. Box 713, Eldorado, TX 76936 or the Texas Department of Health, 1100 W. 49th St., Abilene, TX 78756-3192.





Supplemental Food Program set

The Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is designed to improve the health of financially eligible pregnant, breast-feeding and postpartum women, infants and preschool children at nutritional risk. WIC services will be offered in Schleicher County for the first time beginning August 1, 1988.

The Texas WIC income guidelines are 185 percent of poverty. All women, infants and preschool children are encouraged to come by Eldorado Satellite Clinic at the Memorial Building in Eldorado for an appointment.

All WIC applicants are screened for their height and weight and all applicants over six month's old are given a finger stick test for anemia. The Public Health Nurse will evaluate the results of the physical assessment and determine the applicant's nutritional eligibility.

While attending a monthly nutrition education class to learn the relationship between health and good nutrition, WIC participants will receive vouchers redeemable at WIC approved community grocers. vouchers are redeemable for milk, cheese, eggs, dried beans, fruit juice, iron-fortified cereal and iron-fortified infant formula.



Dear Editor:

July 17-23 is National Rabbit Week. I bet you didn't know that. Well, now you do.

I know you've been reading about the Rabbit Club in the Success. Since the club's formation in January, 1989, a lot of us have developed rabbit fever.

The symptoms are excessive talk about rabbits, buying everythink that hops and has fur on it, and multiplying your two pet rabbits into 30 or 40 rabbits. I know that all sounds really fatal but seriously I'd like to present some facts about rabbits and why rabbit raising can be enjoyable and profitable.

1. Rabbits make great pets.
They can be trained to use a litter box, make very little noise, and become accustomed to handling easily

2.As a hobby, the hobbyist has a variety of breeds to choose from, a multitude of shows he can enter his rabbits in. It's also easier to transport rabbits than some other show animals.

3. As a profitable sideline, the raiser can have several profitable markets for his rabbits. He can sell rabbits for meat, pets, labratory use, for industry, or breeding stock to larger commercial breeders. With the Angora rabbits, their wool can be sheared or plucked and made into garments.

4. Rabbit meat per portion has less fat and calories than chicken, veal, lamb, beef, or pork. The cholesterol content is 50 compared to beef at 320, light chicken at 90, dark chicken 60, and pork at 420. Its is primarily a white meat, fine in texture and has a low fiber content which makes it easily digestable.

5. Rabbits are small but four does and one male rabbit producing four litters per year per doe can produce as much edible protein annually as the average beef cow. The acreage that it would take to feed one beef cow can produce enough food stuff to readily feed many more than five rabbits

rabbits.

I realize it's hard to think about eating something so cute and so furry but after all, deer and some of the other animals we eat aren't that bad looking either. So I leave you with a

recipe. Try it, you'll like it!

COUNTRY FRIED RABBIT

1 fryer rabbit, ½ cup flour, 1½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper and butter or shortening.

Shake moist pieces of rabbit in paper bag in mixture of flour and seasoning. Place rabbit pieces in ¼ inch of hot butter or shortening in heavy skillet, turning to brown evenly on all sides; remove excess fat from skillet and add 2 cups boiling water; cover and simmer for one hour until tender. Turn rabbit once.
