# Fort McKavett stands test of time

RESTORATION UNDERWAY

Founded in 1852 Fort McKavett has been relatively untouched by time. When the last of the soldiers marched away in 1883, nearby settlers moved into the vacant buildings, and organized the nucleus of the village of Fort McKavett. Constant use and maintenance over the past century kept many of the post structures in near original condition.

Fort McKavett was designated a State Historic Site on May 17, 1968, together with Fort Richardson in Jack County, Fort Griffin in Shackelford County, Fort Lancaster in Crockett County, and Fort Leaton in Presidio County.

In response to the pressure of westward expansion, the U.S.

Army replaced the line of military posts established in 1849, with a new line of posts farther west, stretching from the Rio Grande to the Red River. Fort McKavett was one of these new posts.

Five companies of the 8th Infantry, under command of Colonel Thomas Taniford, arrived on the San Saba River on March 14, 1852, and established the "Camp on the San Saba". By October of that year the post had been officially named Fort McKavett in honor of Captain Henry McKavett, 8th Infantry, who had been killed in the Battle of Monterrey during the War with Mexico. The new post quickly assumed its role as a vital link in the military frontier defense

system. In addition to serving as a deterrent to Indian raids, the fort provided protection for the Upper El Paso Road--by then an important artery for emigration to the California goldfields.

Built on a high hill on the south bank of the river, the fort had an ample water supply and a healthful climate. Native limestone and oak and pecan groves furnished basic building materials, although finished lumber had to be freighted from the supply depot in San Antonio. Large gardens were cultivated in the rich soil near the river; fishing was excellent, and there was enough game to delight

hunters and supplement the routine Army diet of beans and salt pork.

In the early months of Fort McKavett's existence, military duties were necessarily subordinate to the arduous work of construction. Only portions of the buildings had been completed by August 1853, when the post was inspected by Colonel W.G. Freeman of the Inspector General's Department. Freeman noted that Fort McKavett suffered from problems characteristic of all western posts--difficulties with supply, lack of proper uniforms and weaponry, and so few horses that the current

experiment in mounted infantry patrols could not be carried out with any degree of efficiency. Although the Army maintained two mounted Dragoon regiments, mounted troops were not used extensively in frontier defense until after the Civil War.

Much construction had been completed by 1856, when the fort's second official inspection occurred. Colonel J.K.F. Mansfield reported that quarters for the troops were in order, the officers well housed, and the hospital in good condition. Colonel Mansfield commented that "this command is in good discipline and well-command-

ed," and that "This is undoubtedly an important post in the chain, and should be maintained."

Regiments serving at Fort McKavett in the 1850s, in addition to the 8th Infantry, were the flamboyant 2nd Dragoons and the 1st Infantry. Prominent officers included Colonel Charles A. May, a hero of the War with Mexico, and Lieutenant Samuel B. Holabird, Quartermaster General of the Army.

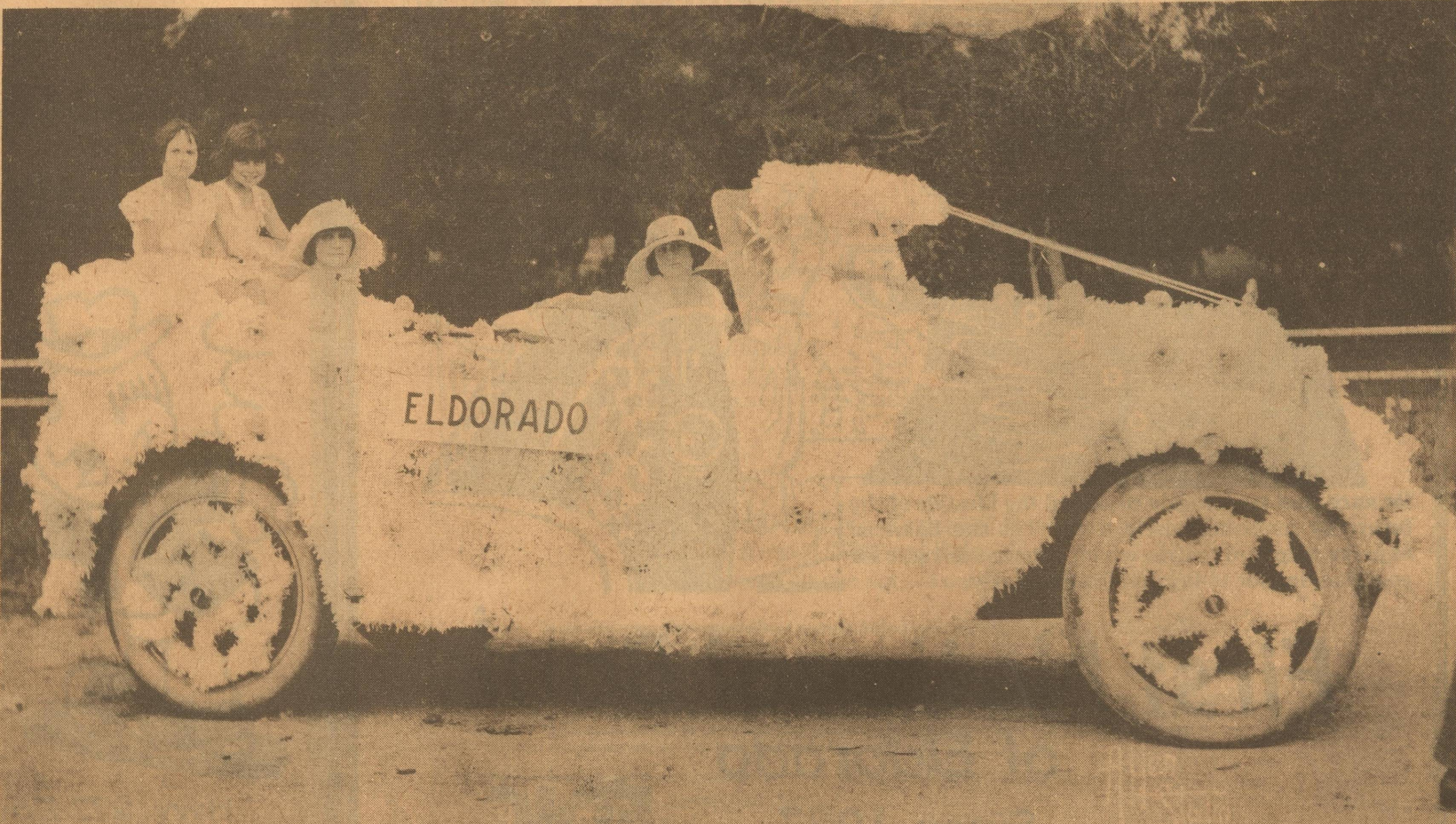
The spirit of patriotism was exhibited on the Fourth of July when the entire community

Saturday morning will begin bright and early with food booth and arts and craft booths on the courthouse lawn.

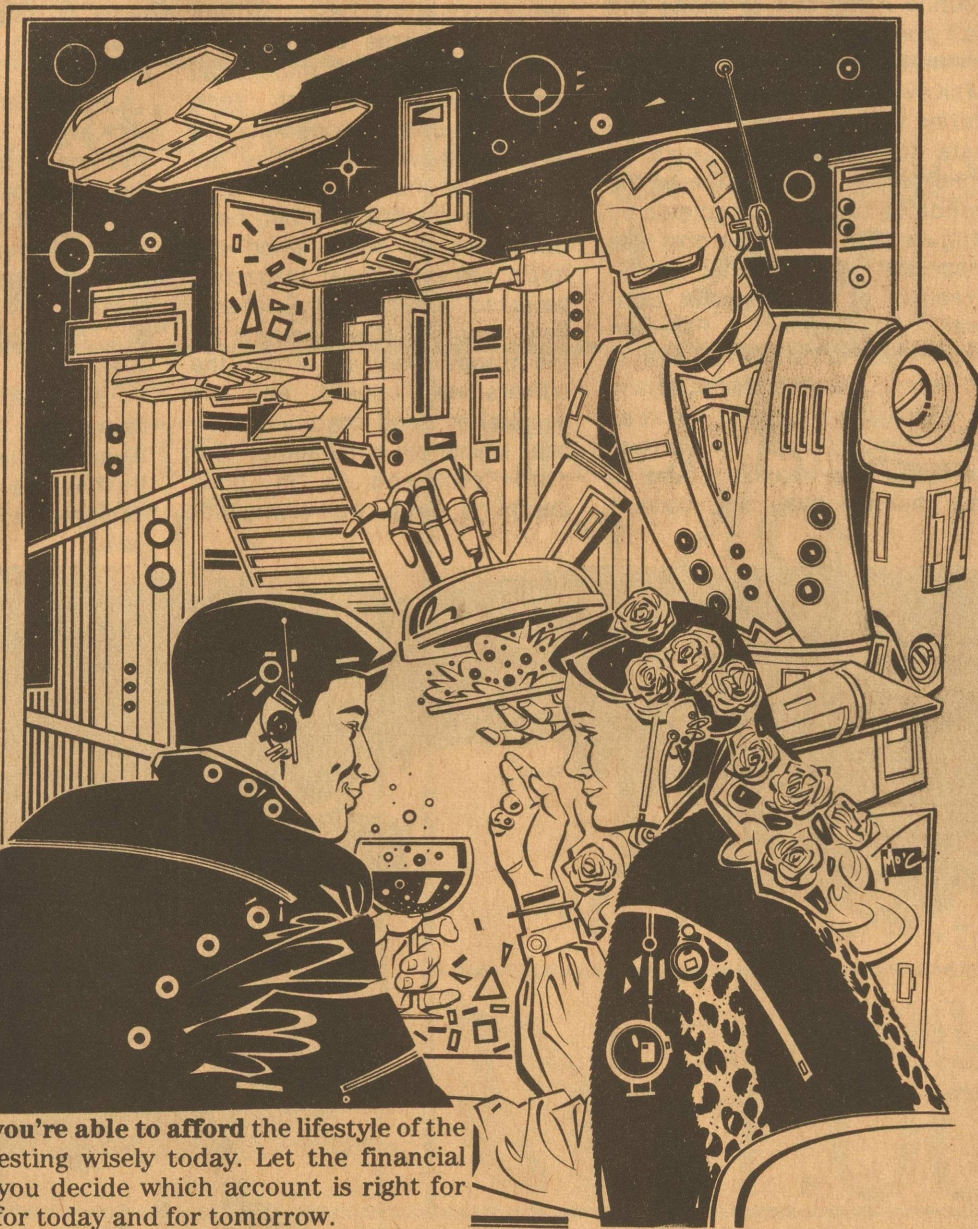
A Fun Run will be first on the agenda, with Little Mr. and Miss

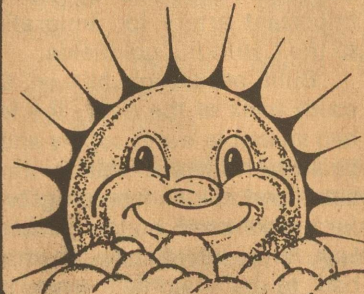


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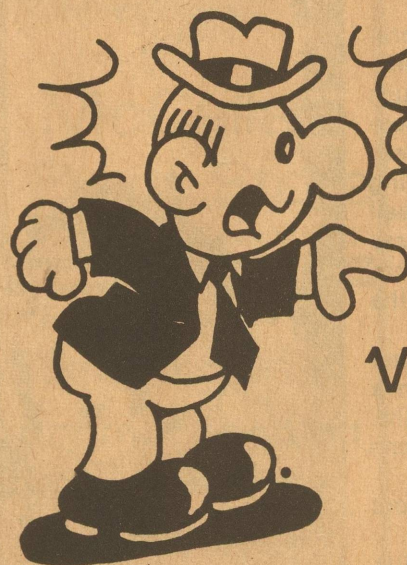

## Ticks can carry Lyme Disease

Summer is the season for ticks in Texas. And anyone working or playing outdoors, should be alert that some ticks, and the corkscrew-shaped organism they carry, can inflict serious arthritic misery.

People can contract Lyme Disease after being bitten by an infected tick carrying bacteria called spirochetes. Lyme Disease is named for the Connecticut town where it was first recognized in the United States in 1975.

The first symptom is often a red circular rash that enlarges. Victims seem to have a flu-like illness with fever, headache, chills, a stiff neck, and extreme fatigue.

Later, other health problems may include arthritis, and disorders of the heart and nervous system lasting months or years. The disease can be passed from a pregnant woman to her unborn child.

Lyme Disease was detected in Texas by microbiologist Julie Rawlings at the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Laboratories in Austin. Suspecting the presence of the disorder, she began looking for it while examining lab specimens submitted for Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Today, health professionals at TDH's laboratories use a blood test to detect the disease.

"If a doctor begins treatment soon after infection, consequences such as long term joint problems can often be prevented," Rawlings explained. "If you have Lyme Disease symptoms and a known tick bite, you should go see your doctor."

She added that Lyme Disease is not a life-threatening health hazard, but can cause long-lasting discomforts.

"We have found the spirochete in six kinds of ticks in Texas," Rawlings said. These are the Lone Star Tick, the American dog tick, the brown dog tick, two types of rabbit ticks, and the Ixodes tick.

March 10, 1928 he married Ruby Thornton in the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Thornton, in Brady. They moved to Eldorado in 1939 where Johnny was employed by Schleicher County, retiring in 1970 due to his health.

He is survived by his wife, Ruby, of the home; one son, Gordon of Ponder; one daughter, Mildred Hignight of Kermit; five grandchildren, John Hignight of Ozona, Charles and Robert

Hamm of Houston, Rickey Hamm of Midland, Shila Fisher of Arlington; six great grandchildren, Jason and Amanda Hignight of Ozona, Brooke Hamm of Houston, Samantha and Heath Hamm of Katy, Shawn Fisher of Arlington.

Water Supply Customer

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform customers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
  - if the home is less than five years old, or
  - if you have soft or acidic water, or
  - if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.
