Deer Season gets underway here Saturday

Only one thing can make a West Texan forget home and family, the oil depression, faltering stock market, and the National Football League. That's the opening of the fall hunting season and this year it's a week early, starting this Saturday, November 5.

This year's longer season, which features one extra week, runs through Sunday, January 1. The bag limit is the same as last year—four deer, no more than two antlered bucks.

Most Schleicher County landowners are already aware that doe permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer on the Edwards Plateau.

Hunters will need only the appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer in "either-sex" counties this year.

Texans will go into a deer season which promises to be the fifth straight record year for whitetail. Fawn production survival, mild winters, and lush grazing have increased Texas deer numbers to an estimated 5 million. The state leads the nation in numbers and harvest, as hunters take more than

350,000 annually.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department urges hunters to harvest their allowed limits because many areas are over-populated and during a hard winter, forage and stock competition could result in a food supply shortage.

Experts say that although deer numbers are up, hunters may not get as much of a look at game as in other years due to lush habitat and visibility. Deer won't have to feed or move around in the daylight hours.

One plus for hunters could be the prediction of some who think that the rut may come earlier this year, due to good body conditions, and cooler weather. This could bring the herds into the open early in the season.

Shooting hours for all game animals and birds (except migratory game birds) are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Lots of mature turkeys remain as well and it looks like another bumper crop for turkeys in 1988.

Voters going to polls Tuesday, November 8

Schleicher Countians will get to do something next Tuesday that they only get to do about 20 times in their lifetimes—should they live to be 100. That's right they can use their American right to vote and select a new President of the United States. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and

close at 7 p.m. next Tuesday. Voters in each precinct should cast their ballots as follows: Precinct One—First United Methodist Church; Precinct Two—Presbyterian Church; Precinct Three—Memorial Building; and Precinct Four—School Administration Building.

Absentee voting, unhampered this year for the first time by

statement of reason, is brisk, according to officials in the county clerk's office. Absentee voting ends November 4 at 5 p.m.

While the Michael Dukakis and George Bush race has attracted most of the attention both in Texas and across the nation, there are three amendments included on the ballot

which should be considered by voters.

Number One calls for a constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways.

Number Two would create a constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue.

Number Three would create a constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the

permanent school fund and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas.

National polls have the Bush-Dukakis race anywhere from eight to 13 percentage points in

Eagles must win

For the first time in several years the Eldorado Eagles go into the last game of the regular season with a shot at the Texas High School playoffs this Friday.

The Eagles of Coach Armando San Miguel edged Wall, 13-3 last Friday evening to move their season mark to 4-4-1 and their loop record to 2-1-1. The Eagles must defeat the Winters Blizzards on their home turf this Friday night to qualify for the playoffs as the second place team from District 6-AA.

Should the Eagles prevail against Winters they would meet the Stanton Buffalos, District 5-AA champions, the next Saturday in bi-district.

The Eagles notched touchdowns in the first and second

periods against Wall and held on for the victory. Wall booted a 27-yard field goal in the third period for all of Wall's points.

Juan Ramirez got EHS on the board first with a six-yard run in the first period. The PAT failed and the locals led, 6-0. Stoney Harriman got the Eagles' other score on a 23-yard pass reception from Bradley Bass.

Eldorado had 11 first downs to seven for Wall, while grinding out 169 yards rushing to 69 for the hosts. EHS had only 51 steps passing to Wall's 62, and completed two of six passes with one interception to five of 14 with two interceptions for Wall.

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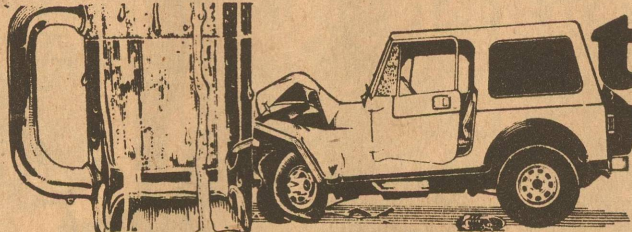

favor of Bush, but neither candidate appears to have a vocal following in Schleicher County. The county did vote for Reagan both in 1980 and 1984, however, and local officials seem to think Bush will carry the county handily on Tuesday.

The District 67 race for State Representative is expected to be a close one with Democrat David Currie Paint Rock and Republican Harvey Hilderbran of Uvalde seeking the slot.

Currie talked to the Eldorado Success Monday, reporting cautious optimism in his camp. "We have to run strong in the rural

counties, Schleicher, Edwards, etc. to offset his advantage in Uvalde and Kerrville. The rural areas will have to make up the difference," Currie said. "According to reports we're getting, however, we are doing better in Uvalde and Kerrville than we thought we would," he concluded.

There are no contested races locally with Sheriff Ronnie Norris, County Attorney Tom Giovannitti, Tax Assessor-Collector Dorothy Evans, Commissioner Johnny Mayor and Commissioner Prissy Paxton facing no opponents.

County Clerk Helen Blakeway said 166 persons have voted absentee as of Wednesday morning, with a lot more expected to follow suit before Friday.

Voters should remember to take their voter registration cards to the polls with them. "If anyone has a question about what precinct they are in they should look on their registration card—it tells you. Then look at the list of voting places in the Success," Mrs. Blakeway said.

A sample ballot will be included in this week's issue of the Success, as well as a precinct map of Schleicher County.

Buckling up



Venison is protein rich

Venison is classified as red meat, rich in protein, minerals and vitamins, and low in fat. In addition to poor handlings, its quality may be affected by the animal's age and sex and the way it was killed. Home Economist Carol Ware offers these tips for cooking it:

--Trim all cuts well of surface fat before cooking. The gamey flavor is exaggerated in the fat.

--Use an acid like vinegar or tomatoe sauce to tenderize. Cover the meat with the acid and let it marinate at least 24 hours. One reference suggests four days under refrigeration.

--Cook venison as you would lean beef. Tender cuts can be pan fried, broiled or roasted, but must be kept moist with bacon or other fat. Less tender cuts should be cooked by moist heat.

--Don't overcook venison. It has short fibers that toughen quickly when cooked too long or at too high a temperature.

Decrease sugar in sauce recipes. Venison has a sweeter taste than other meats.

4-H Teaching Guide to help kids relate

Awareness of the problems facing young people prompted a 35-member statewide group of 4-H youth development workers and extension specialists to put together the teaching guide, said Dr. Judy Flynn.

Flynn, district extension director from Amarillo, has trained more than 350 counselors, school administrators, county extension agents and juvenile probation officers to use the teaching guide. "We felt one of the important things accomplished by the training was putting concerned youth workers from different organizations in touch with each other so they could plan for action in their counties," she said.

Donna Brauchi and Joe Van Zandt, extension agents in rural Gray County, helped develop the program and have trained 45 school teachers and numerous 4-H leaders in their county.

"People think growing up in rural areas is ideal," said Brauchi. "But every child at some time goes through a phase of low self-esteem and the kids here are just as likely to experience peer pressure and other problems as those who live in the cities," she said.

In Houston, the curriculum is being taught to all 4-H club members and this spring, Houston ISD counselors will be receiving the materials for classroom use.

According to Harris County extension agent Sandra Farris, a unique element of the Houston area program is that 79 4-H Ambassadors, outstanding 11th and 12th grade 4-H members, have received the training and are now teaching some of the lessons and serving as role models for youngsters enrolled in after-school day care programs.

With plans to teach the curriculum in 97 counties this school year, it will be some time before the effects of the program are known.

But Davison said initial experience with the teaching guide has been highly positive.

He said teachers who are interested in obtaining a copy of the guide and participating in training should contact the "At Risk" Program Coordinator for their school district, or their regional TEA office. Other youth workers can contact the Texas Agricultural Extension office in their county.

FEVER IN CHILDREN

Fever is not an illness itself, but a symptom of disease, often of infectious nature. In most healthy adults, the oral temperature stays close to 98.6 Fahrenheit, while the normal body temperature of young children and babies ranges from 97 to 100.5 depending on activity level, time of day, and the route of measurement. The axillary (taken under the arm) temperature is about one degree lower and the rectal temperature one degree higher than the oral temperature.

For accurate information concerning body temperature, it is necessary to use a thermometer. There are several different types. Due to relative low cost, the glass mercury thermometer is generally recommended; however, electronic digital instruments work quickly and are easy to use.

Liquid crystal thermometers, such as those meant to be applied to the forehead, indicate temperature changes by color differences and are convenient but not as accurate as the other methods. They may be used to follow temperature trends to decrease the frequency of more exact measurements.

A baby's temperature should be taken rectally. The axillary method may be used in toddlers who resist taking of rectal temperatures. A cooperative child, who will allow the bulb to remain under the tongue with lips closed at least two minutes, is essential for oral temperature measurements, as there is the danger of biting and breaking a glass thermometer in addition to potential inaccuracies.

Viral infections, such as colds and the flu, and bacterial infections are common causes of fever in childhood. Most fevers in children are due to brief viral illnesses. Fever is part of the body's natural defense systems for fighting disease and, if low to moderate, need not be treated. However, the disease causing

the fever may require therapy. Although temperatures of even 104 to 105 almost never lead to permanent damage, the child will be more comfortable if the temperature is lowered with medication. Acetaminophen (Tylenol, Tempra) is available without prescription in liquid and chewable forms for children. The child should be given ample fluids and dressed in light clothing. If, despite these measures the fever remains high, sponging with lukewarm water (not alcohol) is helpful and may be repeated as often as necessary.

Certain children are prone to having convulsions with high fever. These are generally brief, though terrifying to the parents. The child is usually sleepy after the seizure. A doctor should be consulted. It is important to treat fever early in these individuals to prevent further convulsions. Most children outgrow the tendency for febrile seizures by age 5 or 6 years, and are not harmed by the episodes.

Sick infants may not have fever with infections. In fact, their temperatures may drop below normal. If a small baby looks or acts sick, he should receive medical attention, as well as at any time that the temperature rises above 101 rectally. Serious illness may progress very rapidly in babies and small children, so prompt evaluation is warranted. The seriousness of the illness is not necessarily indicated by the degree of fever.

Although most fevers in children require no specific treatment, it is wise to consult a doctor if the temperature is very high, the fever is prolonged, or the child has vomiting, drowsiness, or complaints of pain. Special care should be taken with the child yet too small to tell you what hurts or how he feels. Most likely the fever will have been caused by a self limited viral infection but treatment of the underlying disease may be required to resolve the fever.

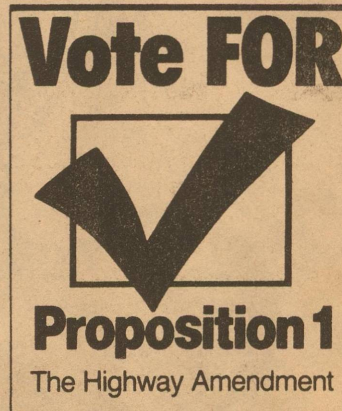

Dear Jack,
I want to thank you again for
the fine assistance and the many

courtesies that you showed to me
during the preparation of this
case for trial and the trial itself.
You can be justly proud of
Margaret Nixon and the other
members of your staff. You can
especially be grateful for the
support of your board. Their
presence during the trial certainly
did not hurt anything.

The jury who considered this
was a very conscientious jury. As
you know, they found that both
the doctor and the hospital were
negligent in failing to properly
resuscitate the child and that the
hospital was 2 [two] percent at
fault in causing the Plaintiff's
injuries in this case and Dr.
Respass was 8 percent at fault. I
believe these findings were more
an act of diplomacy on their part
than a particular criticism of
anything that was done wrong by
either the hospital or Dr. Respass.
You should talk to the
jurors, however, and see if there
is any improvement in care that

should be considered as a
learning experience from this
ordeal.

The main thing that the
community should know is that
by the jury's answer to question
Number 1, that the Plaintiffs
failed to give proper notice to the
hospital of their claim for damages
within six months of the
event, the Plaintiffs could not
recover anything from the hospital.
In addition, in Texas, if a
Plaintiff is 51 percent or more at
fault, then they recover nothing.
The only damages that they
found were for the child, but they
found that the primary cause for
those damages was Mrs. Chavarria's
own negligence in refusing to
follow the advice of Dr. Respass
to go to San Angelo to have her
c-section. Since the jury found
that she was 90 percent at fault
for any damages in the case, the
Defendants do not have to pay any
damages.

Accordingly, the hospital won
its lawsuit twice. The Plaintiff
could not recover against it
because the Plaintiff did not
receive a favorable answer to
question Number 1 pertaining to
proper notice. In addition, even if
the hospital would have received
proper notice, the jury's finding
that Mrs. Chavarria was 90
percent at fault also prevents her
from recovering anything from
either the hospital or Dr. Respass.

work with you in this case and to
get to know you and the board. If

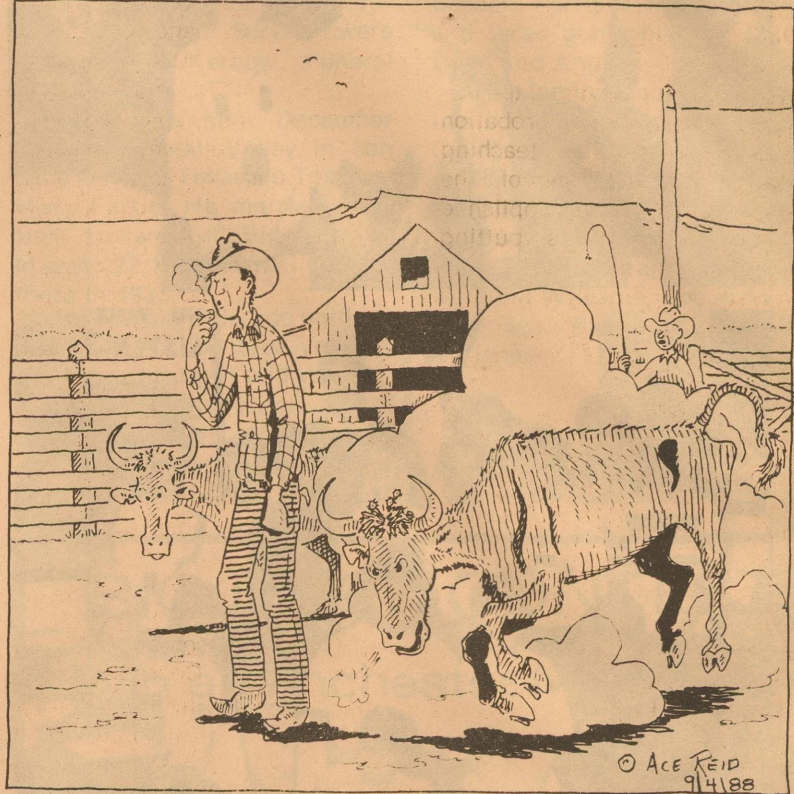

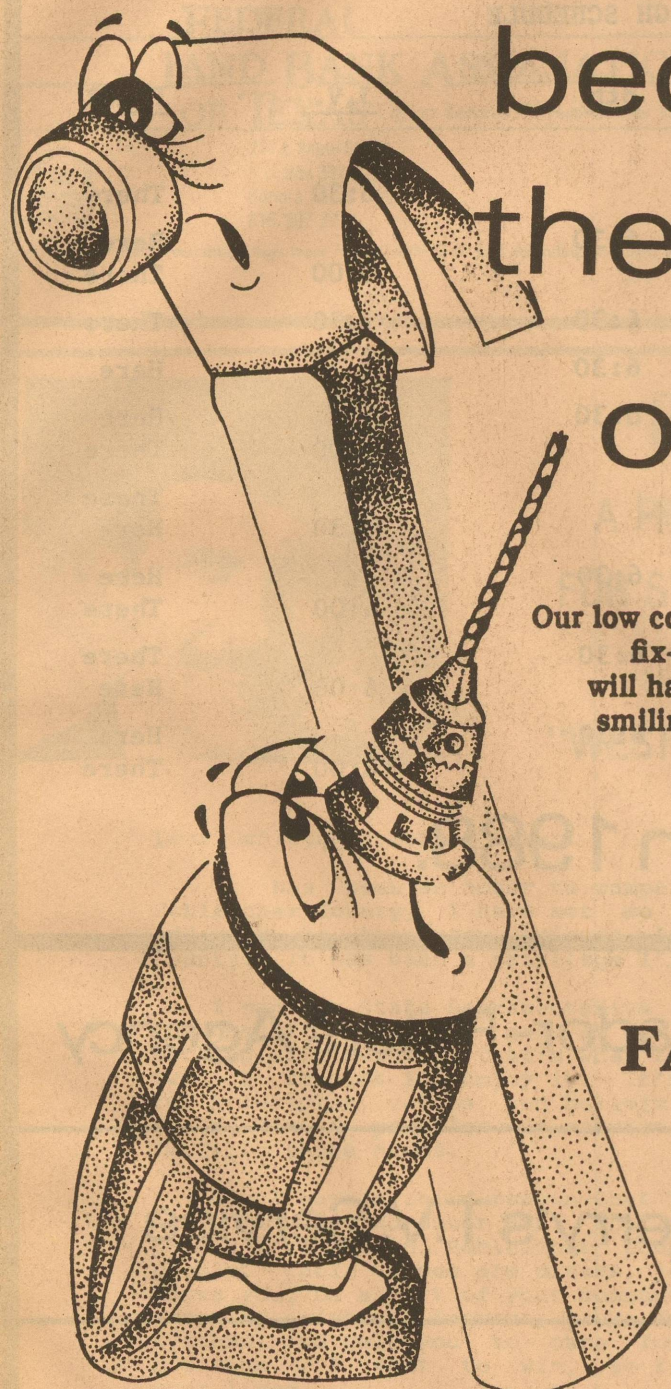

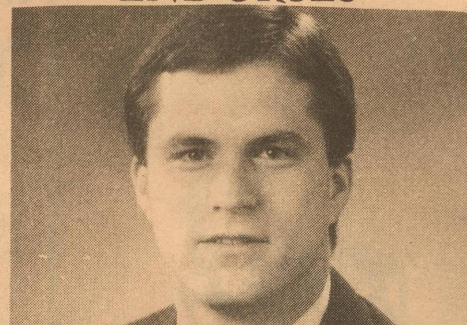

The family requests memorials be made to the Schleicher County Hospital Auxiliary.

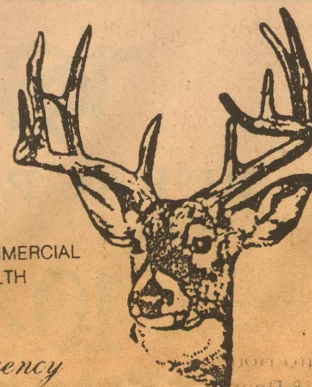

Changes should be told

The most common reason for failure to receive a Social Security check is not reporting a change of address. A change of address may be reported to any Social Security office by phone or mail.

Some people apparently think that's all they have to do to report a change of address to the post office. However, the post office will forward mail to the new address for only one year, after which any mail that does not contain the new address is returned to the sender.

People who have their checks

sent directly to their bank and fail to report a change of address also risk having their checks interrupted. Social Security periodically checks to see if the proper person is receiving the checks and if there is no response to the mailed inquiry, the checks may be stopped.

In addition, direct depositors who fail to report a change of address may miss receiving important information mailed to beneficiaries that may affect their checks.

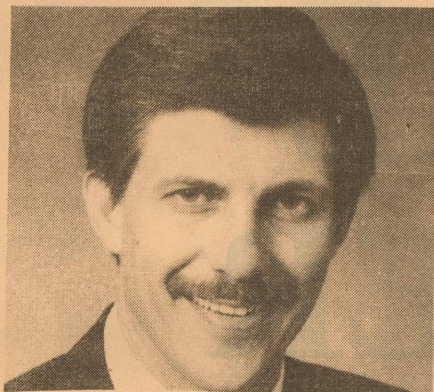
This charge is part of a plan authorized by the FCC in 1984 and designed so that business and residence customers would more directly contribute toward the cost of providing local telephone service.

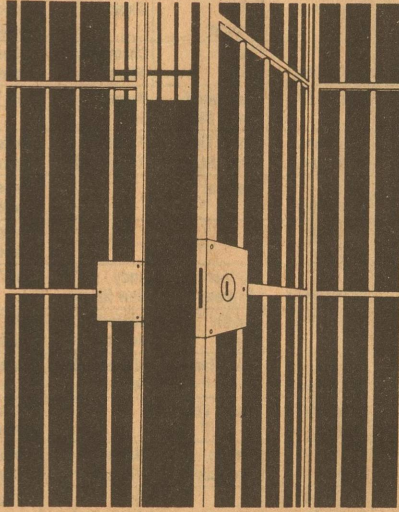
