## Eagles too tight

"We're pushing too hard right now. Our kids just need to go out and have fun. Relax, play football and let the chips fall where they may," Coach Armand San Miguel said Wednesday.

Those words are the head mentor's recipe for a victory over Junction this Friday night and a return to winning ways that the squad opened the season with. Since whipping Iraan and Eden, the Eagles have lost to Sonora and then to Mason, 25-7, last Friday.

"Our kids need to get back to believing in themselves. Right now their confidence is a little shaky. They need to lighten up a little," San Miguel added. "They've been pushing."

Bradley Bass scored in the second quarter on an option play and Carter Edmiston kicked the PAT as the Eagles only trailed tough Mason 12-7 at halftime. But the bottom fell out in the final two quarters.

Outstanding players on offense

for the Eagles Friday were Edmiston, Jimmy Saldivar, Trey Preston--and the entire offensive line. "The line did a decent job, we had one six minute drive that was stopped on a penalty," San Miguel added.

On defense Ward Evans was outstanding, as was Edmiston, who had an interception in the endzone.

Kickoff for this Friday's tussle with Junction will be at 8 p.m. in Kimbell County. The field is located just behind Junction High School.

Junction will field one of the top athletes in West Texas in 6'4", 220-pound Rance Roberts, and All West Texas selection at tight end. Roberts also anchors the Eagles' "29" defense at middle linebacker.

As usual the Schleicher County War Birds will be outsized on both lines.

Junction enters the fracas with a 1-3 record, defeating Wall and losing to Menard, Sonora and Ozona in close games.

## Amy doing nicely

It was just a little over a year ago that Amy Robertson was preparing for her trip to Seattle, Washington, where she would undergo major bone marrow transplatation surgery.

Amy suffered from aplastic anemia, a bone marrow disease. The surgery would take place at Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center.

Amy spent several months in Seattle confined to Hutch Center after the surgery was performed. The recovery period for this type transplatation is lengthy and extremely dangerous. Most of the confinement was in sterilized isolation.

Kathleen Robertson, Amy's mom, was a bone marrow match and was the donor.

Amy's father, Gene, and grandmother, Ruth O'Harrow, stayed with her during those long months of recovery. She required an adult with her at all times.

Sheryl, the oldest daughter of the Robertson's, stayed with grandparents in Marietta, Oklahoma, where she attended school.

Meanwhile.....back in Eldorado, the whole county was busy raising money to help this family with God's help have a normal, healthy little girl.

Every citizen, group, club, business, organization, church and even Eldorado Air Force Station joined efforts in many different projects to raise money. Sutton County and Marietta, Oklahoma also helped.

The funds collected helped defray the cost of the very expensive procedure of bone marrow transplatation. The expenses were well over \$100,000 and this did not include the transportation and living expenses of the family during these months in Seattle.

Amy was able to keep up her school work by individual tutoring offered by the Hutch School. She also received tutoring after her return to Eldorado.

Homecoming was in December--and what a joy it was!

"Amy's Army" met the family at the airport in San Angelo with large greeting banners and yellow ribbons. These yellow ribbons were tied on trees and fences, marking the way home to Eldorado.

Sheryl came home the next week and the whole family was together again for Christmas.

The Robertsons returned to Seattle in August of this year. Amy received a week of testing. The tests were difficult but the results were good--not a sign of aplastic anemia! Amy will be under the care of a local doctor and does not have to return to Seattle for five years.

Any started to school in September at Eldorado Elementary just like all the other normal, healthy third grade students.

But for God, is there family, friends, home and miracles.

## Teacher respect on Texas increase

West Texas residents say teachers in their communities are doing a very good job; are caring and well informed in their subject matters; are hard working and deserve a pay raise.

These findings are the result of a public opinion poll released today in the West Texas area by the Texas State Teachers Association. The telephone poll was conducted for TSTA by the Texas Poll which is sponsored by Harte-Hanks Communications and Texas A&M University and has a margin of error of three percentage points. It was conducted between August 15 and September 1, 1988.

Speaking at news conferences in Abilene and San Angelo today, TSTA President Charles Beard said the poll shows that 78 percent of the West Texas Region gives the local schools a passing grade, with 51 percent

giving an "A" or "B". Similarly, nearly 65 percent graded teachers as "good" to "excellent."

Beard said TSTA commissioned the poll out of concern for a growing teacher morale crisis throughout the state. He said a similar poll of teachers conducted last spring found that 37 percent of Texas teachers were seriously considering leaving the profession due to low pay and low morale. The poll showed teachers believed the public held the profession in low esteem.

"This new Texas poll proves that West Texans support their local teachers," Beard said. "We hope these findings will be a big boost to morale everywhere."

The poll found that 77 percent said teachers are caring; 79 percent said they are hard working; and 78 percent said teachers deserve a pay raise.

I am pretty sure that Ben Johnson is fast without drugs, but I don't know if he is faster than Carl Lewis. The other problem is now we, the spectators, will be wondering who else is using drugs and just not being caught.

This has been one of the better Olympics. Most of the nations with credible teams are present. The athletes seem to be much more closely matched. It is such a shame that some of the competitors and their mentors have lost sight of the real goals of athletic competition.

We need to re-instill in all the athletes and ourselves that it really is important "how you play the game". That proverb is true in athletics and it is true in life. Whoever the fastest man in the world is this year, more than likely, some other man will be the fastest next year.

If you saw Edwin Moses lose in the 400 meter hurdles you know that I am talking about. He did everything right but his 33 year old legs could not beat those younger legs. The lead in the 400 hurdles has finally passed but Edwin Moses ran the best race of his life because he did with all the skill, courage, intelligence, and speed that he could muster. # Teams run well

The Eldorado High School Cross Country teams competed well at the San Angelo Cross Country Meet last Saturday against some very stiff competition.

The girls placed third behind state-ranked Wall, while Irion County finished second. Wall totaled 47 points, Irion County 75 and EHS 80. District rival Ozona finished sixth with 164 points.

The girls were led by Claudia Martinez in 11th place with a time of 13:55. The other runners were Luanne Peaslee, 12th, 14:07; Roxanne Martinez, 13th, 14:09; Adriana Martinez, 26th, 14:57; and Ermelinda Rodriguez, 37th, 14:58.

Coach Harvey Wink said, "The girls ran super. There were over 80 girls in the race and all of ours finished in the top half. The girls really improved their times

from last week as well as the times they ran last year in this race. I hope the girls realize how close them came to Wall. Wall went to state last year and have most of their team back. Maybe with lots of hard work and some luck we can get even closer to them."

The boys ran into back-breaking competition by moving up a division and running against 5-A schools. As one might expect, a Class AA school did not fare too well against 5-A, although the locals did defeat Midland Lee.

The boys finished ninth behind Odessa High. EHS had 183 points, while OHS posted 88. Abilene High was second with 89 and San Angelo Central third with 99.

Marco Sandate was the best Eldorado finisher, taking 13th in a time of 17:11. Other runners included Dusty Barton, 25th, 17:46; Hector Chapa, 44th, 18:51; David Rodriguez, 51st, 19:20; Robert Martinez, 55th, 19:38; Joe Montalvo, 56th, 19:56; and Ramiro Barajas, 58th, 20:14.

Junior varsity runners were

Felix Ochoa, 20:12; and Armando Balderas, 20:35. The boys showed lots of improvement from the last run, Wink related.

The junior high runners will get their first action this week after being rained out two weeks ago. Both the high school and junior high teams will travel to Kerrville this week for competition.

"The course at the college is extremely tough with hills and tight turns. You can really see what kind of condition you're in when you run this course."

The junior high will run at 10 a.m., high school girls at 10:30 and JV boys at 11. Varsity boys will go at high noon.

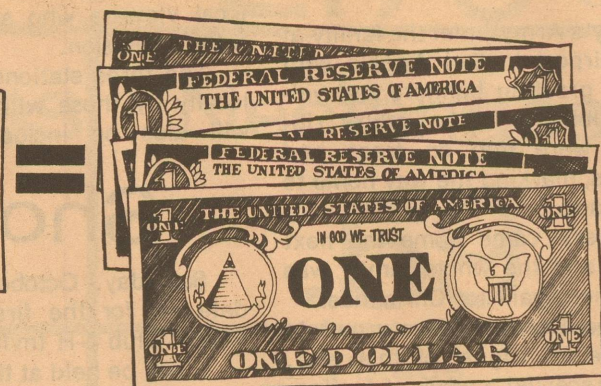

## Bible Study planned

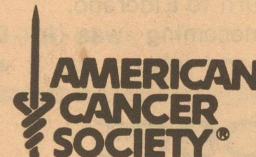
A new Bible Study is being formed at the First Presbyterian Church of Eldorado, and will run for 11 weeks.

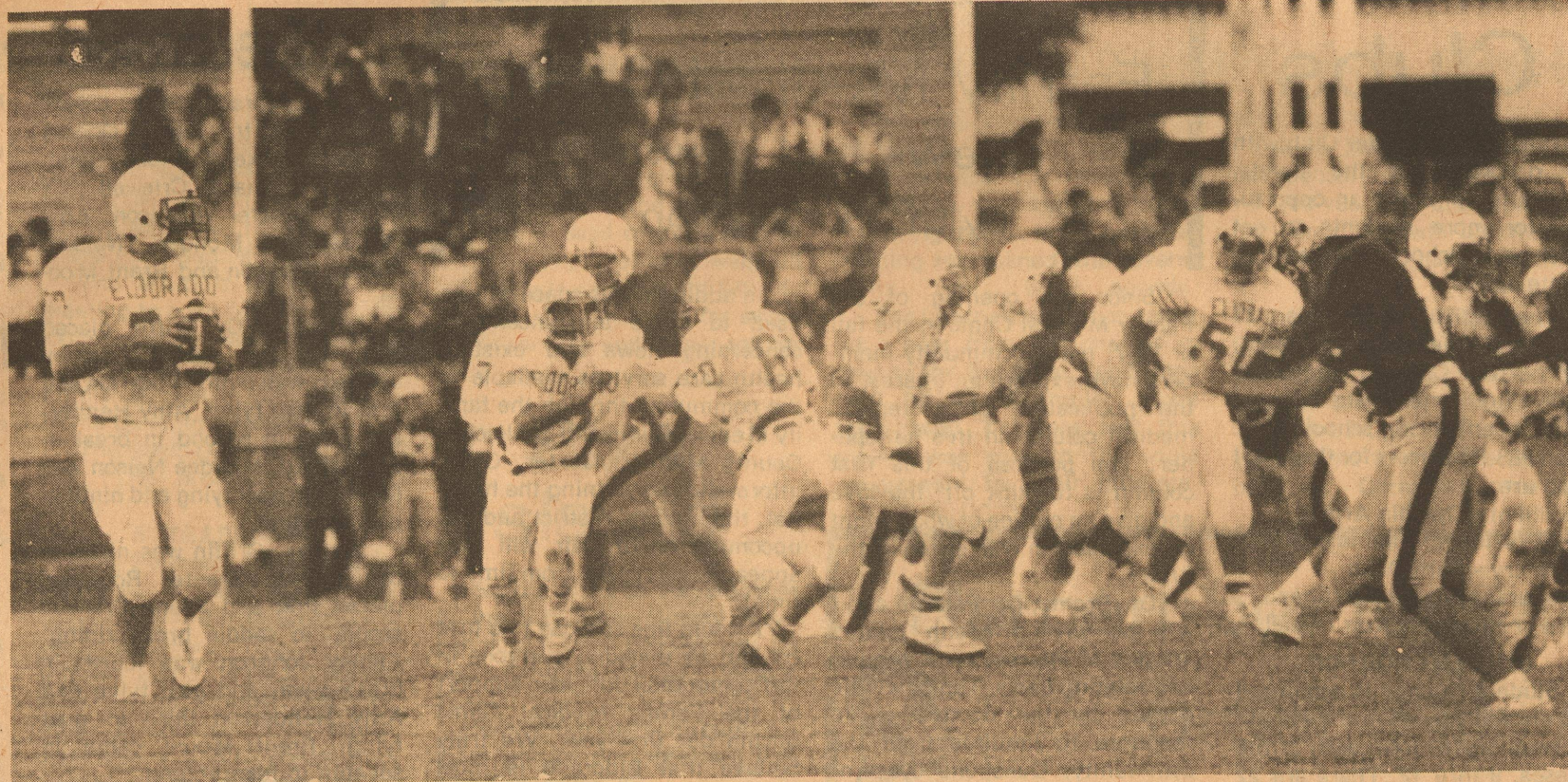

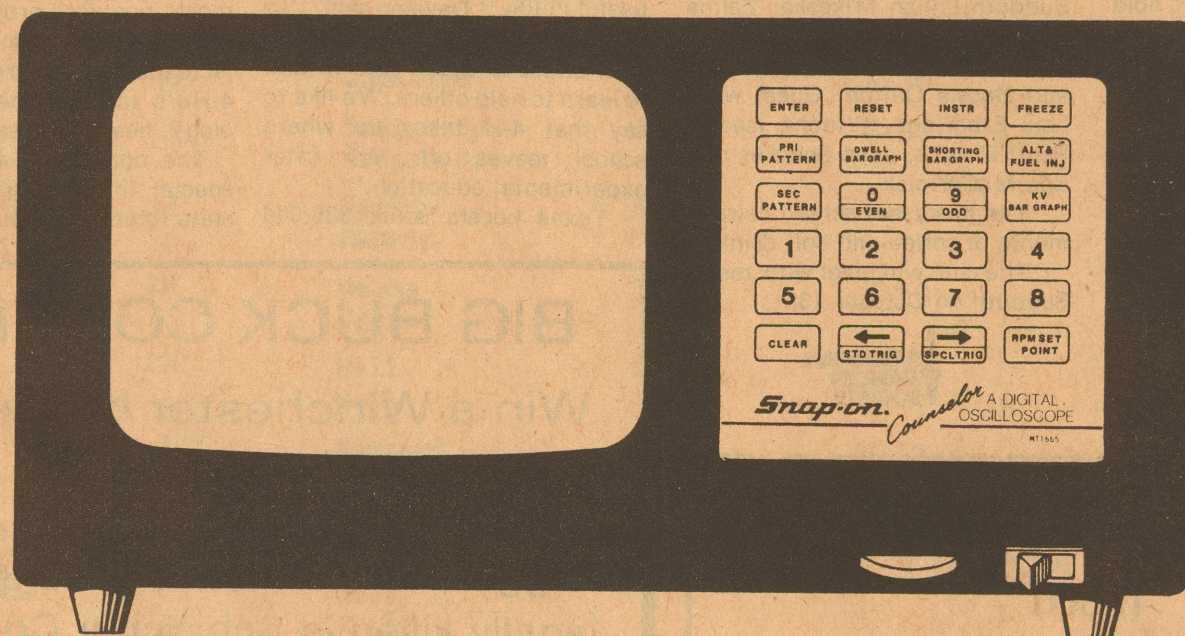

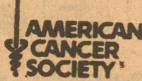

## 4-H good for U.S. kids

No one can question the fact that young people are the future of America, and the 4-H program is continuing to play a vital role in preparing youth for the future by providing training in leadership, citizenship and coping skills.

Thus the theme of the upcoming National 4-H Week, October 2-8, "4-H for Youth for America," points to this country's richest resource, its young people.

"Through 4-H we try to provide youth with opportunities to learn and experience what life has to offer," said H.T. "Tom" Davison, assistant director for 4-H and youth programs with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The extension service is the parent organization of the 4-H program, an informal, out-of-school educational program, for youth from the third grade to 19 years of age.

"We also lay the groundwork to help 4-H members explore opportunities for personal growth and to gain skills that will be useful in life," Davison said. "In addition, 4-H helps youth to deal with stress and self-esteem and to learn to help others. We like to say that 4-H takes up where school leaves off. We offer experimental education."

Texas boasts some 388,000

4-H members; nationwide, 4-H is more than 4.5 million members strong and is the nation's largest youth organization. More 4-H members today live in suburbs and cities of more than 50,000 population.

Recent research shows that former 4-Hers are more likely to assume community leadership, political and other citizenship roles than people who participated in other youth organizations. "4-H membership teaches youth that the community and giving to the community are important," Davison said.

Vital to the 4-H program are voluntary leaders.

"Voluntary leaders are the backbone of the 4-H program as they provide the organizational leadership for local 4-H clubs as well as training and resources in a host of subject-matter areas," said the 4-H official.

Almost 620,000 volunteer leaders across the U.S. is estimated to have a value of more than \$1 billion a year.

Looking at the 4-H program in Texas, Davison said that the most popular project area is foods and nutrition. Other projects that attract large numbers of 4-Hers include energy, embryology, health and safety.

The number of 4-H clubs and special interest groups in the state totals more than 3,300.
