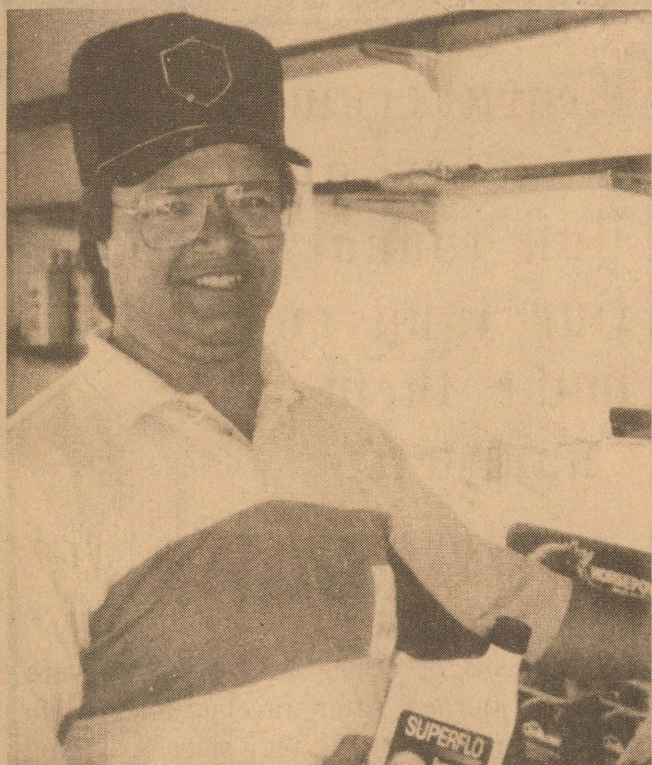

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A Touch Of History

The small town of Eldorado might not have been paradise to all its citizens in 1915, but to some teenage boys returning home after they had ran away--it was paradise! Ernest Sweatt and Clyde Meador were enticed by wonder lust of far away places at about the age of 15. They mounted their horses and rode west of the Pecos in search of greener pastures. It did not take these boys long to realize the greener pastures were at home in

Eldorado. With extremely congenial attitudes the boys swore never to run away again upon returning. This trip did accomplish another event, the boys were given a life-time nickname. Sweatt was given the name "Greasy" in reference to the black, shiny horses he slipped away riding. Meador was given the name "Pecos Pete" in reference to the far away place they rode to.

Ernest Howard Sweatt was born October 6, 1900 in Mason County, Texas.

He moved to Schleicher County in 1902 with his parents, Nathan Edmond Pierce and Sarah Alice Sweatt, and his sister O'ella. In 1910, a brother, William Irving "Bill", was born to the family.

Greasy attended school in Eldorado and later went into the leather repair business. There was quite a demand for this trade in the 1920's, many saddles and harnesses had to be made and repaired. He learned the trade from

Rex McCormick.

Sweatt's first marriage was to Dixie Simpson. Two children were born to this couple, Ernest Howard, Jr. and Sarah Olivia.

In 1932 a second marriage was performed to a pretty young school teacher, Bernice Newlin. The couple made their home in Eldorado.

Greasy was elected sheriff in 1940 and served continually for the next 16 years, with the exception

of 1947-1949 when Wallace Joiner served the position.

During his years as sheriff, Greasy earned a lot of respect and made a lot of friends. He had a way with people, and the law, never meeting a stranger. The children all liked him, and knew with his greeting he would have a piece of chewing gum to present to each child.

One of Sweatt's favorite hobbies, along with hunting and fishing, was

playing Polo. He played on the Eldorado Polo Team and was a good player. The team won a lot of tournaments in and out of state.

After Greasy died, April 16, 1972, a poem was sent to the family in a sympathy card sent by H.A. and Dixie Belk. In part it stated, "Let me live in a house by the side of the road and be a friend to man." The family felt this was so true of Greasy Sweatt.

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Herrera Amnesty Services Slates Eldorado Visit

Julia Grimaldo Herrera Amnesty Services was founded May 2, 1987 by Julia Grimaldo Herrera and the Rev. Moses Herrera in Bryan. She has given the "Qualified Designated Entity" designation by the Department of Justice on May 13, 1987.

Although the first office was in Bryan, the Bryan office served an

extensive area around the Brazos County area. Subsequent offices were opened by Mrs. Herrera in San Angelo, Laredo, Amarillo, and San Antonio, and has been approved by the Department of Justice to open an office in Austin.

In addition she has operated an extensive outreach program through

the Herrera Amnesty Mobile Unit in conjunction with Radio Festival and other radio stations throughout the state of Texas. She has assisted over 13,000 persons in the Legalization Program and processes over 10,000 persons through these offices for Legalization applications.

Ms. Herrera has sponsored and participated in outreach efforts of the I.N.S. Outreach Department in Austin, Dalhart, Memphis, Demmitt, Temple and other small communities in the rural areas. She has done a lot of this with the assistance of Thomas Esparza, Jr., Attorney at Law, Board Certified Specialist in Immigration and Nationality Law.

There is a great need to make available information on the Legalization Process because there are many areas where there is

no one to turn to for information. In her extensive travels throughout the state of Texas assisting thousands of persons, the cry for "Information" is loud and clear.

Together working as a team to get this information out, and cooperating with radio stations, tele-

vision stations, sending out Newsletters, etc., legalization applicants can be educated that the process is not complete, that to achieve the ultimate permanent residency and eventually citizenship, each step must be completed and the I.N.S. regulations must be complied with.

Mrs. Herrera will be in Eldorado this Sunday, April 23 to present certificates of completion to residents of Schleicher County, who have completed the Phase II Application Process. The ceremony will be held in the Memorial Building at 3 p.m.

Church Served Eldorado 30 Years

The First Christian Church of Eldorado has closed its doors after 30 years.

Members met March 30 to disburse the remaining funds of the church after the sale of the property.

The majority of the remaining money was received through tithes and donations from Schleicher County members, therefore, it was decided to donate it back to charities and non-profit organizations in Eldorado, with the exception of one.

The monies will be donated to the following

organizations: Schleicher County Hospital Auxiliary, Schleicher County Fire Department, Schleicher County Emergency Service, West Texas Rehab Center, Eagles' Point Youth Center, Meals on Wheels Program and the Schleicher County Transportation Van.

The First Christian Church was built in 1959 and has been a great service to the community. Although its doors are closed, the hearts of its members remain open to give and receive the love of the people of Eldorado.

The next meeting will be the third Monday of May with Eleanor Powell as hostess. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. and will include a luncheon.



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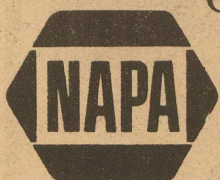
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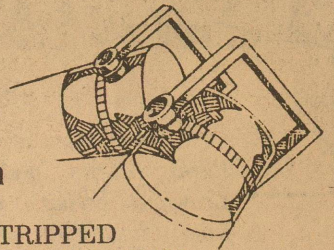

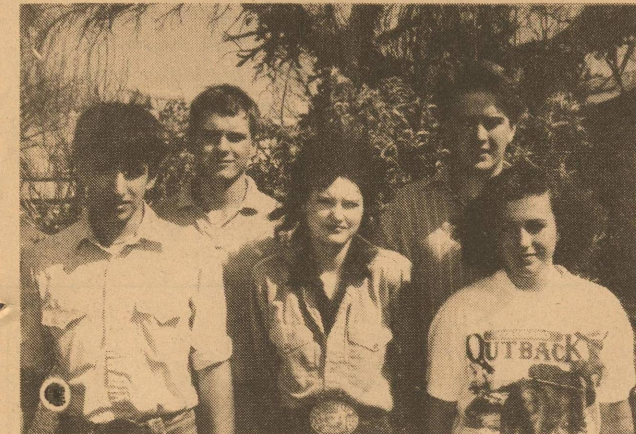
FFA Judging Teams Do Well

Richard Harris, Deputy Sheriff: "The oil business is in sad shape and I think they are raising their prices because it costs more to get it out of the ground."

David Jenkins, Deputy Sheriff: "Well I just think its funny that the prices went up right after the spill happened."

Smokey Taylor, Pharmacist: "Definitely! Definitely! Exxon is probably the number three largest corporation in America, second only to Ford and General Motors. So they're using this. Within a few years they will go ahead and win all the money back that they are losing on the cleanup. It is estimated to be from \$100 million to maybe a billion dollars on the cost of the cleanup. They will make their money back through this inflated price. They are exploiting the people to pay for their mistake."

Buzz McCormick, Exxon manager: "I plead the fifth!"

Shari Wink, Kindergarten Teacher: "Probably yes. Because it just spilled and they are going to go ahead and jack it up because people know when oil spills that it is time to make the gas go high. Just like when the Iranians raised the price of the oil, then they charged us more for gasoline. And yet there is underground oil here that they can get to, but they're not pulling out of."

Ray Ballew, Chief Appraiser: "I don't think the oil spill caused the price to be jumped up. I think that it is because of the onset of summer and spring driving time and just the increase in oil prices from \$15 a barrel to around \$20 a barrel."

Johnny Griffin, County Judge: "I believe they have artificially raised the price and used the oil spill as a reason to add another nickel a gallon to the price of fuel. And, like Ray said, the summer driving helped a little, but I believe they used that too, to add to it."


