

Those three-way mirrors will do it every time. Just a front-view and the angles of one's of them is a shock.



Do you believe that the major oil companies are using the Alaskan oil spill as an excuse to artifically raise the price of gas?


Richard Harris, Deputy Sheriff: "The oil business is in sad shape and I think they are raising their prices because it costs more to get it out of the ground."

David Jenkins, Deputy Sheriff: "Well I just think its funny that the prices went up right after the spill happened."

oil nere that they can get to, but they're not pulling out of."


Ray Ballew, Chief Appraiser: "I don't think the oil spill caused the price to be jumped up. I think that it is because of the onset of summer and spring driving time and just the increase in oil prices from \$15 a barrel to around \$20 a barrel."

Johnny Griffin, County Judge: "I believe they have artificially raised the price and used the oil spill as a reason to add another nickel a gallon to the price of fuel. And, like Ray said, the summer driving helped a little, but I believe they used that too, to add to it."
