A Touch Of History

Bailey came to the newly formed county in Texas named Schleicher. He bought about 27 sections, eight miles southwest of Eldorado. It was called the Bailey School Settlement.

The tall mesquite grass covered the low, rolling hills and level prairie like a plush green carpet. It was excellent ranchland for sheep and cattle. This land this battle, Lilburn Hazelwas new and unsettled.

Bailey Ranch School was created by an order of June 12, 1907. It had a large, one-room building which served the double purpose of church and school. It was named in honor of Robert Bailey.

The church held serthe Commissioners Court vices once a month and Sunday School every week. The events remembered the most by the old-timers were the camp meetings. Families would come in wagons for the two-week meeting. They all camped solidated with Henderson out, cooked on open fires, and had a real good time singing, visiting, praying and story telling. A lot of "good old fashioned Christian fellowship" under

The baptizing was performed in a deep rock tank near the church. A platform was built for the tank, but Zelma Spencer Henderson said she could still remember the water dogs swimming around when she was baptized in

The first person buried in the church cemetery was Mrs. John Spencer in 1908. Today there are around 36 graves in the small cemetery.

The Bailey Ranch Baptist Church closed May, 1953, but many fond and cherished memories remain in the hearts of these early pioneers, of their country church and school.
