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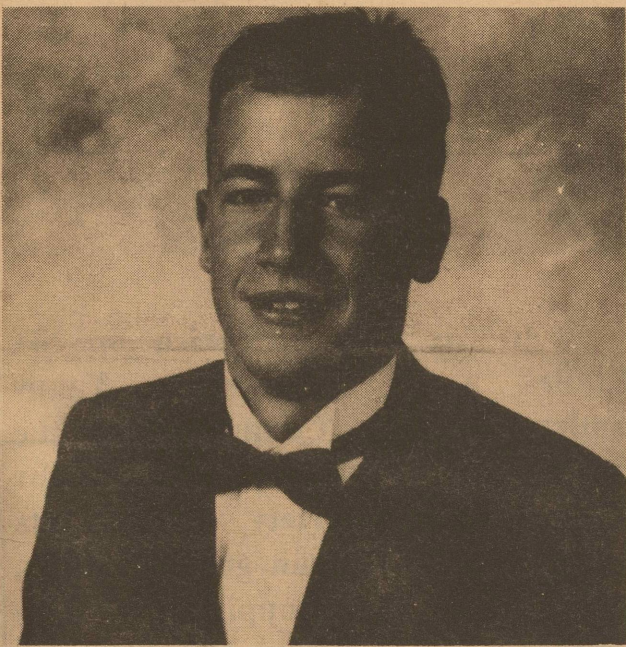

My 'every so often' came this time in the form of a phone call from a cousin, just getting interested in her 'roots'.

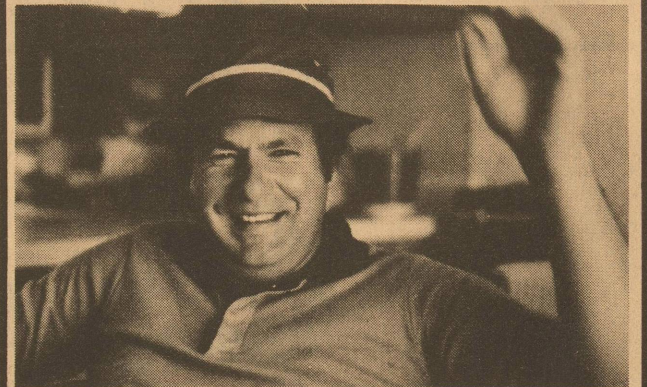
Hopefully we will be exchanging information and sharing what we learn.

# An Apple A Day

**KILLER BEES;** The Killer Bees that are expected to enter the United States next year after their long sojourn from Brazil are not so much overly aggressive as overly defensive. Thus, if a person disturbs a hive, the bees react more quickly in a swarm, can pursue farther than their European counterparts (more than a half mile), and inflict more stings (100 or more).

For a small number of stings, the treatment is to remove the stinger and sting sac. Try to rake the stinger out, rather than squeeze it with tweezers

(tweezers can actually aid injection of the residual toxin still in the stinger on into the skin). Apply a paste of baking soda or meat tenderizer to the site to relieve itching or a cold compress and aspirin to reduce pain. Benadryl (an over-the-counter antihistamine) is often used orally to aid in reducing the ill-effects of certain stings.

Those people who sustain a large number of stings and those who experience any unusual symptoms should attain medical help as soon as possible.

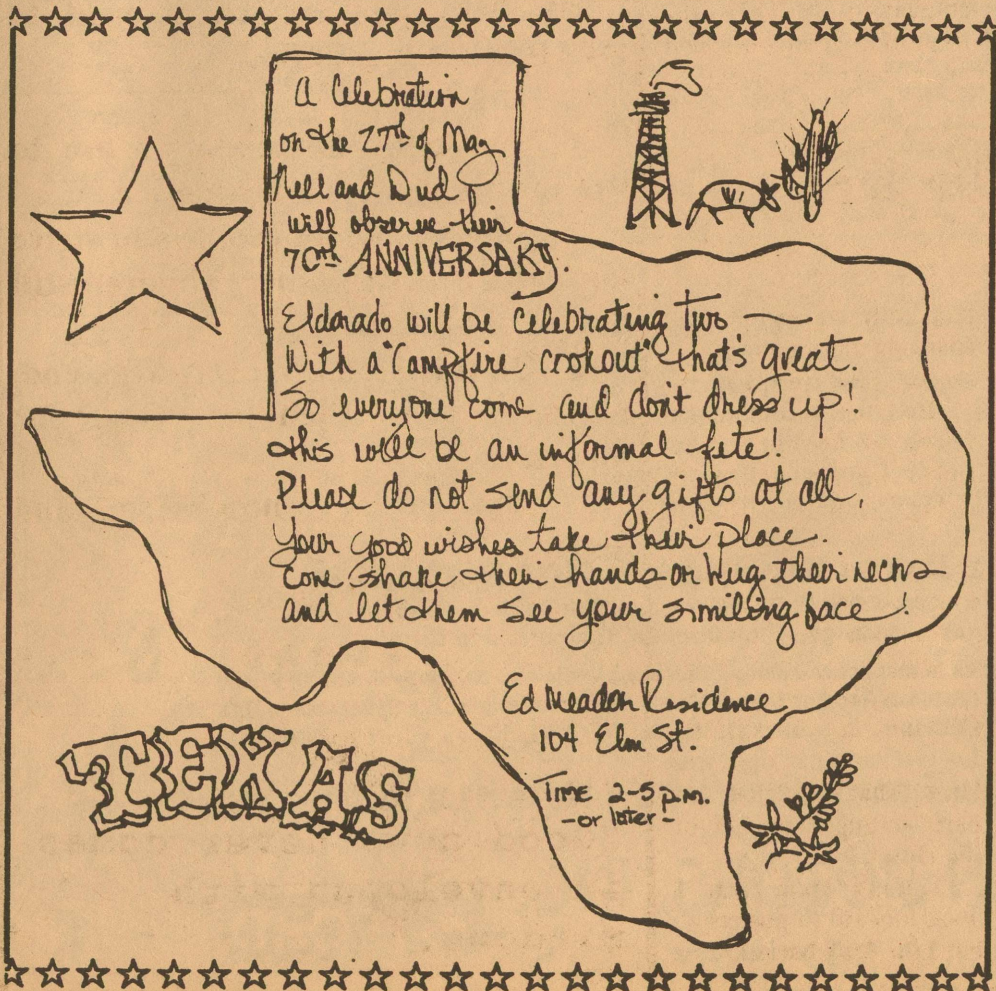

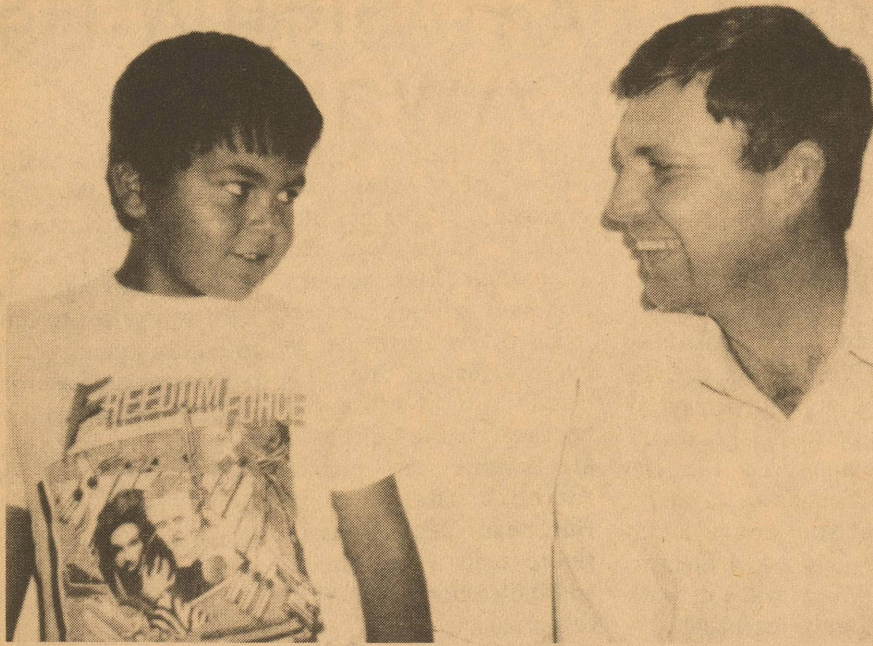

## SWTEC Presents Safety Show To Elementary Students

On Friday, May 19, employees of Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative presented a safety show to over 220 children from the Eldorado Elementary School.

There was a 17 minute film entitled Safewatch showing hazards with regards to kites, antennae, irrigation pipes, and downed electrical wires.

The actual demonstration was on a 120 volt set-up showing operation of safety devices on power lines. On 7200 volts the demonstration included the effect of trees growing into electrical lines, and

kites and pipes in contact with lines; the use of rubber gloves and how they protect linemen and what could happen if a glove has even a tiny pinhole. Also shown was the danger of household

current. Since 1987, cooperative employees have shown this demonstration to over 1200 people, including Eldorado Elementary, Big Lake Elementary and the Eldorado Lions Club.

# Statewide TEAMS Scores Show Improvement

Statewide results of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills tests released showed continued improvement in test scores and percentages of students mastering the reading, writing and mathematics examinations at grades 3, 5, 7 and 9.

More than 900,000 students in the four grades were tested in February on

the statewide basic skills test.

Seventy-two percent of third graders mastered all tests taken in 1989, compared to 69 percent in 1988 and 63 percent in 1987. Grade 5 passing percentages increased to 74 percent in 1989, compared to 72 percent in 1988 and 60 percent in 1987. At grade 7, passing

percentages remained stable, with 72 percent passing all tests taken, compared to 73 percent in 1988 and 65 percent in 1987.

The highest level improvement was shown in grade 9, where 62 percent of students taking the TEAMS test passed, compared to 58 percent in 1988 and 1987.

Eleventh graders were tested on the exit-level TEAMS exam in October, 1988, and results released last December showed 75 percent passed all tests taken, compared to 72 percent the previous year. The exit-level exam was administered again in May, 1989. Results will be available later this summer.

## Proper Grazing Important

The old adage "take half and leave half" is as appropriate today as it has ever been. The perennial grass and forb-based rangelands of West Texas are highly susceptible to destruction by overgrazing.

Root growth and development are limited by top removal. Research has shown that when 50 percent of plant top is removed, root growth is not retarded. However, when 90 percent of plant top is removed, roots stop growing completely. This in turn decreases the drought resistance of the plant and plant vigor in general declines.

Proper grazing management may be obtained through continuous, year-long grazing; however, more rapid range improvement may be obtained through a rational grazing system whereby pastures are rested periodically throughout the year.

Some of the most popular grazing systems are the Merrill 4 pasture - 3 herd system, the two pasture switchback, the 3 - pasture - 1 herd, the three pasture - 2 herd, and various forms of high intensity - low frequency grazing regimes.

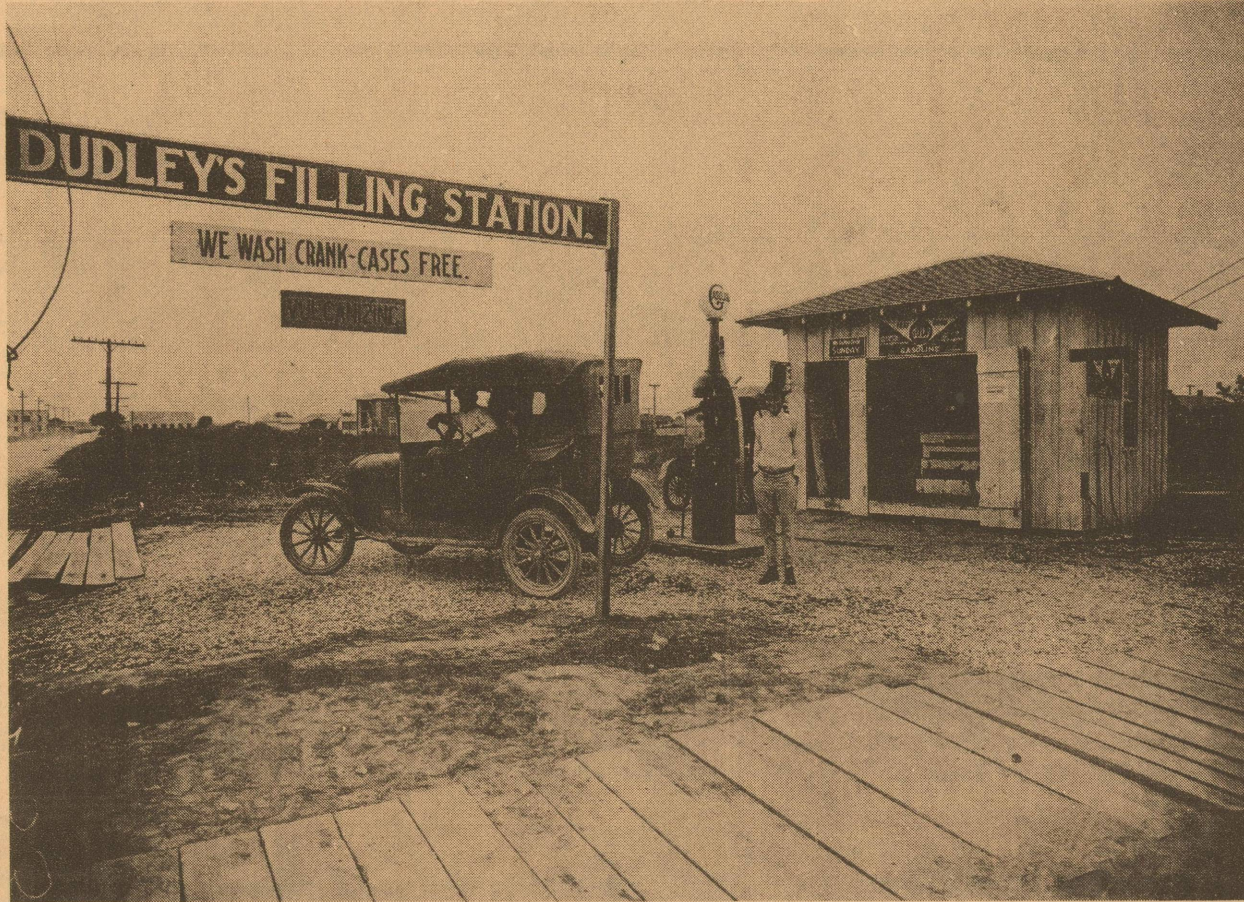

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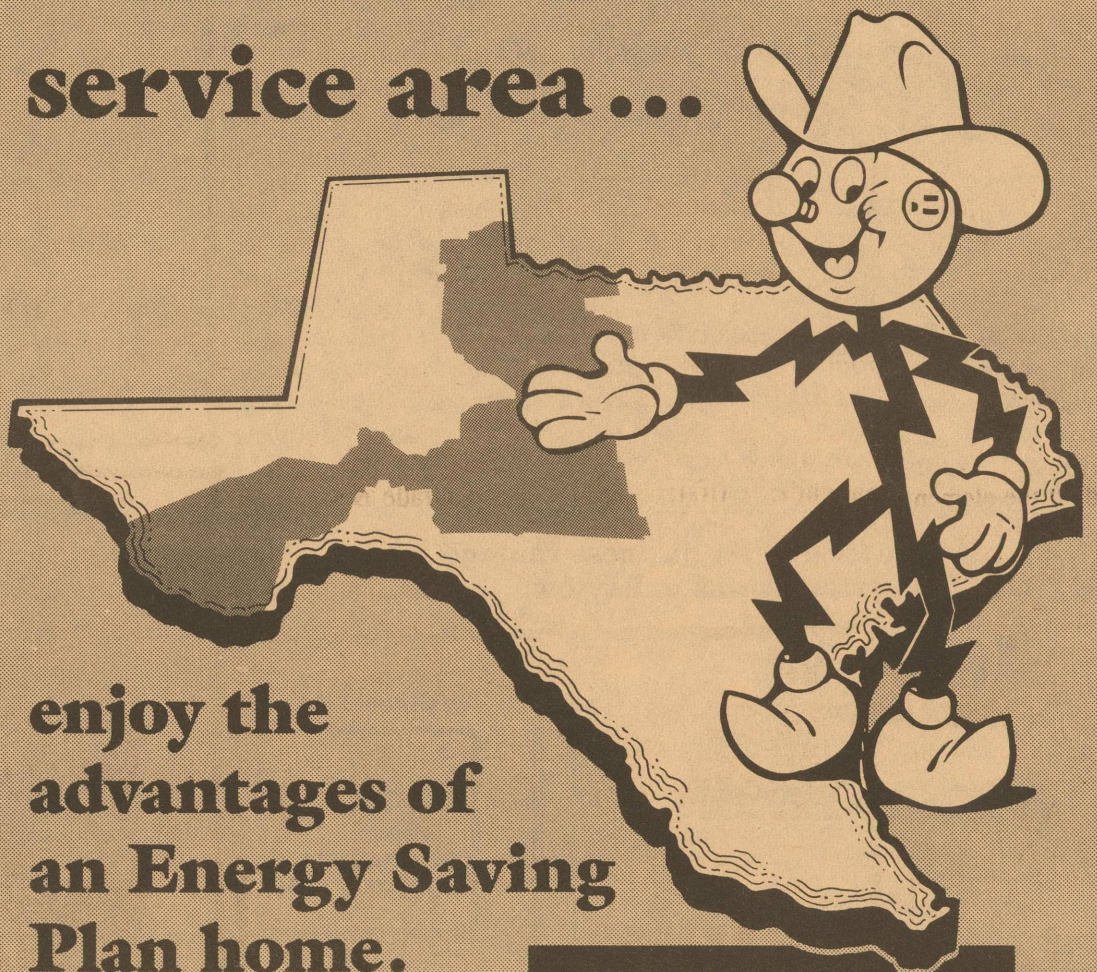
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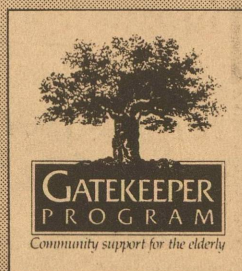
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# Relays Dedicated To Shannon Harber

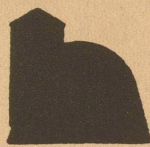

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## Blood Drive Set For Eldorado May 26

United Blood Services will be in Eldorado, Friday, May 26, to accept voluntary blood donations. The blood drive is from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Memorial building. Those who want to donate may schedule an appointment by calling Sherry Lux at 853-2164.

"There is absolutely no risk of getting AIDS or any infectious disease by donating blood," said Paula Kennemer, Donor Resource Specialist of United Blood Service. Only sterile and disposable equipment is used during the donation process. Everything, from the swabs to the blood bags to the needles, is used once and then thrown away.

United Blood Services is the non-profit community blood provider, serving patients in 24

hospitals in a 25 county area.

Since blood cannot be manufactured or synthesized and can be stored only 42 days, a safe and adequate supply of blood must be available to meet the needs of area hospital patients. Currently, more than 1800 units of blood must be collected each month to meet area demands.

Blood used by patients in the United Blood Services system is freely provided by volunteer blood donors, so there is no charge for blood itself. United Blood Service charges a processing fee to recover the operational costs of the blood center, including collecting, testing, processing, storing and delivering blood and blood components. Health insur-

ance usually covers the fee.

Healthy people over 17 may donate blood. State law requires that 17 year olds have written consent of the parent or guardian. Each donor receives a thorough pre-donation interview, including a careful review of medical history and a check of temperature, pulse, blood pressure and blood iron level. After the blood is collected, it is typed and tested for diseases which could be transmitted to the recipient. Should any of these tests indicate the need for medical attention, the donor is notified by mail.

The actual donation takes about 10 minutes. The donor relaxes in a comfortable chair while one unit (about a pint) of blood is collected in a

special container. Afterward, donors enjoy a light refreshment before returning to their normal routine.

If you feel you are in good health and are able to donate, we welcome you to stop by the Memorial Building and give the life sustaining gift, DONATE BLOOD!

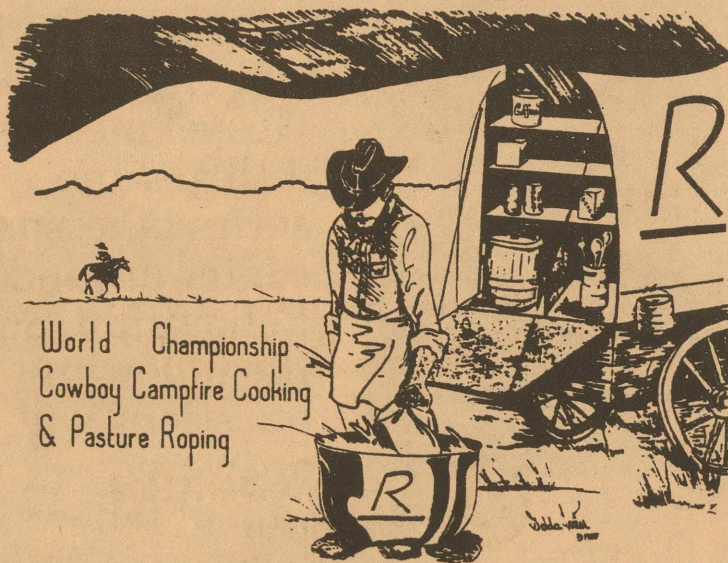

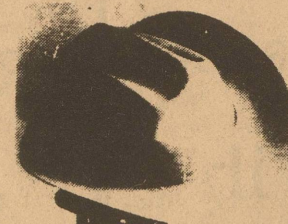
