## An Apple A Day

KILLER BEES; The Killer Bees that are expected to enter the United States next year after their long sojourn from Brazil are not so much overly aggressive as overly defensive. Thus, if a person disturbs a hive, the bees react more quickly in
swarm, can pursue farther than their European counterparts (more than a half mile) and inflict more stings (100 or more).

For a small number of stings, the treatment is to remove the stinger and sting sac. Try to rake the stinger out, rather than
(tweezers can actually aid injection of the residual toxin still in the stinger on into the skin). Apply a paste of baking soda or meat tenderizer to the site to relieve itching or a cold compress and aspirin to reduce pain. Benadryl (an over- the-counter antihistamine) is often used orally to aid in reducing the ill-effects of certain stings.

Those people who sustain a large number of stings and those who experience any unusual symptoms should attain medical help as soon as possible.

## Proper Grazing Important

The old adage "take half and leave half" is as appropriate today as it has ever been. The perennial grass and forb-based rangelands of West Texas are highly susceptible to destruction by overgrazing.

Root growth and development are limited by top removal. Research has shown that when 50 percent of plant top is removed, root growth is not retarded. However, when 90 percent of plant top is removed, roots stop growing completely. This in turn decreases the drought resistance of the plant and plant vigor in general declines.

Proper grazing management may be obtained through continuous, yearlong grazing; however, more rapid range imprôvement may be obtained through a rational grazing system whereby pastures are rested periodically throughout the year.

Some of the most pop ular grazing systems are the Merril 4 pasture . herd system, the two pasture switchback, the 3 pasture - 1 herd, the three pasture - 2 herd, and various forms of high intensity - low frequency grazing regimes.

In 1964 they were called the Petticoat Preakness for the girls and the BVD Relays for the boys in grades four through six. The name was changed to the Romper Relays in 1980.

Mrs. Harber taught in the Eldorado Schools from 1962 until 1980 when she retired from teaching to take care of ranching interests. She dedicated her life to the nurture and care of children in all walks of life. It was once said, "Nothing great was ever achieved without enthusiasm. Some people are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon hthem." Mrs. Harber touched students and teachers alike with her enthusiasm -- helping influence many to achieve their goals in life.

On March 14, 1989, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application which proposes to revise its Toll Restriction Tariff in Section 21 of the General Exchange Tariff. The Commission received the application as Docket No. 8700 .

The application proposes to reduce the monthly rate for Toll Restriction residence service from the current $\$ 15$ a month to $\$ 5$ a month per residence access line. This proposed application will affect approximately 2,487 residence customers who presently subscribe to toll restriction. It is estimated that the proposed rate schedule will reduce the Company's annual revenues from this service by approximately $\$ 298,000$, which is less than one percent of the Company's total intrastate revenues. If the application is approved, the effective date of the rate reduction will be set according to the Commission's Order.
