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Colorado Flier Is Missing Over Austria

COLORADO CITY, Jan. 9 — The Colorado City first pilot of a B-24 Liberator, 1st Lieutenant Calvin E. Jarnigan, is missing over Austria, the War Department informed his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charley Jarnigan, here this week. The message stated that Lt. Jarnigan failed to return from a mission on December 15. He entered the air forces in July 1942 and received his pilot's wings and commission in February, 1944, at Frederick, Oklahoma. He was sent to duty overseas in June, 1944, and was recently awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal awarded him previously for "meritorious service" in aerial flight while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy. A younger brother, Clyde W. Jarnigan, shipfitter third class, is stationed with the U. S. Navy somewhere in the Pacific theater.

War Ain't The Only Thing That's Hell

COLORADO CITY, Jan. 9—A 91-year-old retired farmer who still owns "a little piece of land" in Mitchell county is completely disgusted with the state of the nation, according to a laboriously penciled letter received this week by T. H. Roensch, Mitchell county agent, and Graham Hard, Home Demonstration agent. The Extension Service here, along with those all over the country, recently mailed out form letters explaining to farm owners and operators the necessity for filing income tax forms by January 15. Enclosed was an unofficial blank to make the figuring of income on crops and livestock easier. The nonagenarian farmer, a non-resident of the county now, replied return mail: "It makes me very sad to think I have to pay you income tax on that little piece of land. I am 91 years old and sick all the time. I have had too

itch for six years but the doctor calls it eczema. I have rheumatism and can't get around good. Now you say I must pay you income. "I have to pay a federal tax on all my medicine. That ought to be enough. When I got your letter saying you wanted income tax on that farm I got so worried I fell off the front porch and sprained my shoulder and now I can't use it none, either. "So I just took the papers you sent to the bank and told them to worry it out for me. I have got enough to worry about like it is. And I didn't understand the papers you sent anyhow. I don't see too good. And I don't see how you are going to get any money." Roensch and Miss Hard are busy trying to frame a letter explaining to the ailing gentleman that unless two thirds of his income is derived from his land the government no longer calls him farm-

er; just what his personal allowances are; and that the extension service, instead of trying to collect, was merely trying to be helpful about the whole thing.
