Jewell Bailey To Be Featured Speaker

One of the featured speakers to perform at the Covered Wagon Dinner Theater in Sonora Friday, July 7, will be Jewel Bailey of Eldorado. Dinner is served at 6:30 and the performance will begin at 7:30.

Ms. Bailey will tell the story of an Irish family's migration to America. "I want to tell you of this Irish Roach family, immigrants from Ireland, how by sheer, strong spirit, deep Christian faith, perseverance and hope, met the challenges of the

New World, America," stated Ms. Bailey.

Her family immigrated to American from Ireland in 1880, after the potato famine. During those days, ships sailed only every six months. There were storms at sea, they lost their course, floundered six weeks before docking at Ellis Island. From there they went to Lampasas County in Texas.

Ms. Bailey's father, Ambrose Roach, and his three brothers, John, Matthew and Robert, bought the McCrohan

Ranch north of Eldorado. Two of the brothers, Matthew and Robert, sold their interest to the other brothers. The partnership of the four brothers lasted 25 years before it was dissolved.

She will tell her story while wearing the dress her mother was married in, in September of 1903. There will also be a style show featuring the clothes from her mother's trousseau. There will also be bagpipes.

"I will be telling this

story in my mother's words," continued Ms. Bailey. "My talk is to tell of America and what people can do in America. We have a lot of Golden Opportunities here."

Ms. Bailey was born on the ranch in Schleicher County August 8, 1908. She graduated from Eldorado High School in 1926 and from Hardin Simmons University in Abilene in 1929 with a degree in education.

She married T.J. Bailey in June of 1929 in the First Baptist Church of Eldorado. T.J. passed away in 1986. Two children were born to the couple, Joe Bailey of Dallas and Martha Henderson of San Antonio. There are three grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

The Bailey's restored an old barn on the Roach ranch in 1975. It served as their second home.

Ms. Bailey is active in church work, Federated Club work, past district president of Texas Woman's Federation clubs, and on the state board 12 years.

SCISD Board Has Called Meeting

A called meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held June 26 at 7 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Rita Reeves was present to request the district to contribute funds in the amount of \$4,500 to help operate the youth center. The request will be included in the July agenda.

A motion was made by Scott McGregor and seconded by Dobs Lively to approve the Meador-Peters bid for property/liability insurance including \$194 premium for coverage of corporal punishment liability. The motion carried unanimously.

Tip Finley made a motion, seconded by Scott McGregor, to sell the tract of land proposed as the site for the multi-purpose county park to Schleicher

County and to donate the proceeds of the land sale to Schleicher County for use in construction of the park. SCISD also agreed to grant an easement across the property owned by the district as necessary access to the proposed park, with all sale and easement agreements proposed being contingent upon the successful completion of the grant process. The motion carried unanimously.

Jerry McDonald was unanimously nominated as the TASB District 23 representative.

An update on construction and maintenance was presented to the board. Regarding the gym, the new floor is being installed but is not finished. Construction manager Lee George is to report the week of June 26. Contracts must be signed and win-

dows and doors installed and backboards moved.

The local maintenance crews will paint the walls and beams and will sand blast the interior brick walls. The dressing room lockers are being built and two coaches' offices are being remodeled. The board is considering installing energy efficient lighting in the gym with a 3.5 year payback. Research is being completed on this.

A report on the rent house at 209 Bluebonnet Drive showed that approximately \$10,000 in repairs needs to be done.

The board voted unanimously to issue a call for bids for the construction of additional tennis courts to be built adjacent to and immediately south of the visitors stands at the football field. The bids are to specify the cost of building two courts, 2.5 courts, three courts and 3.5 courts, complete with fencing and lighting.

Lessa Albin was hired as a secondary teacher, subject to assignment, at the Eldorado base pay. They also voted to employ Sharon Mittel as a full time secretary.

The meeting adjourned at 9:37 p.m.

Algur H. Meadows, with his wife Virginia, created the Meadows Foundation in 1948 to benefit the people of Texas. The foundation has been particularly interested

in imaginative, innovative ways to solve community problems; in projects leading to organizational self-sufficiency; in capital plans which enable programs to flourish; and in ways to alleviate pain, ameliorate social ills, and promote better human relationships.

The foundation has granted \$5,147 to Schleicher County Medical Center to purchase a new monitor-defibrillator for the emergency room.

The Meadows Foundation is one of the largest private foundations in Texas and among the 20 largest in the nation.

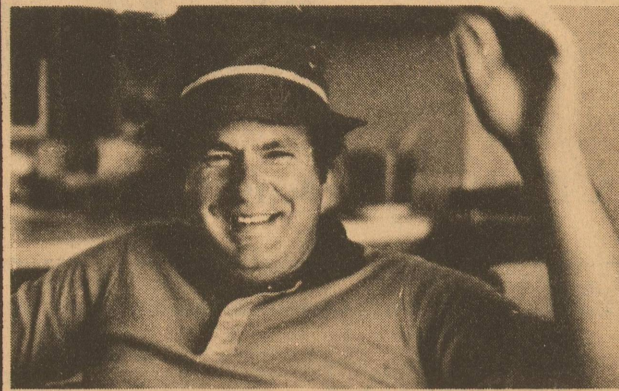

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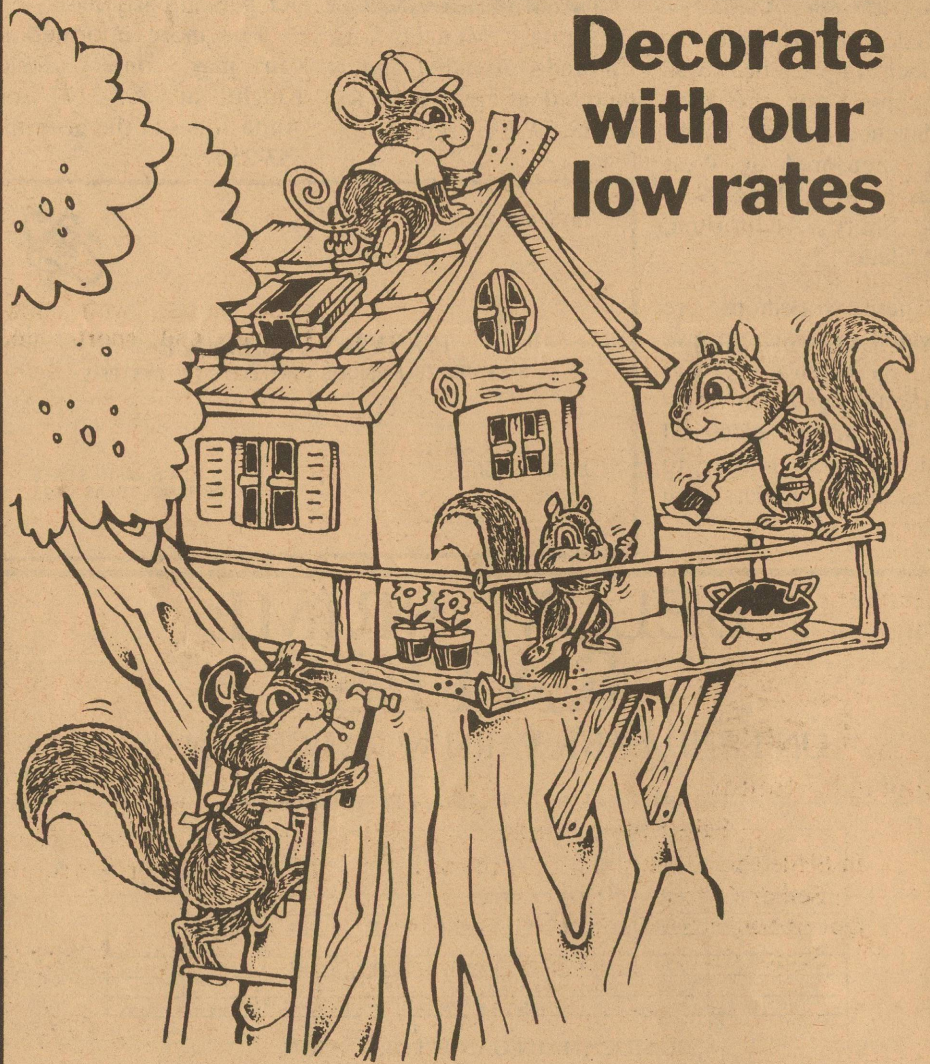


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'Razzle Dazzle' Visits Nursing Home

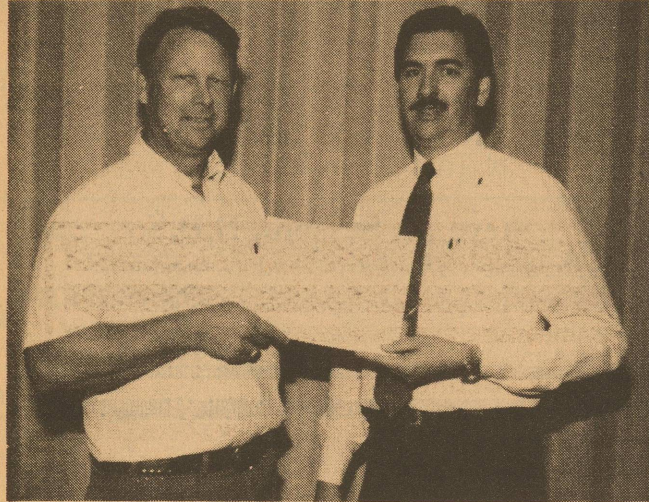
Competition at Huntsville where she set two new records in skipping rope.

"...abuses to people rather than abuses to the flag..." Kris Kristofferson

"Congress passed laws in 1976 designating penalties for the mistreatment of the U.S. flag. Anyone found guilty of mutilating, defacing, burning or trampling one can be fined up to \$1,000 and imprisoned for up to a year.

"Law prescribes that when a flag is worn out or damaged, it should be disposed of in a dignified way, preferably through burning."

On July the second near Rapid City, South Dakota, Willie Nelson and Kris Kristofferson were

trying to draw attention to another kind of abuse, the perishing people of the Pine Ridge Sioux Reservation. Kristofferson stated abuses to people rather than abuses to the flag should be of prime importance. He further stated that public attention to the problem, more than money, was the point of the alcohol-free concert.

John Trudell, of the reservation, says that the government doesn't honor its laws. A governmental thumb-hold on the American Indians keep them from prospering. This reservation has an 85 percent unemployment rate

and a high poverty level. The welfare administered by the government does not meet the needs of those who qualify on the reservations. Trudell says that the Indians are being exterminated and reproduce to survive as the life expectancy of the reservation Indian is only 44 years.

70 percent of America believes we should have an amendment that makes it unlawful to burn the American flag. I am one of the 70 percent. I also believe that the descendants of Native Americans should be treated with the respect and dignity they deserve.

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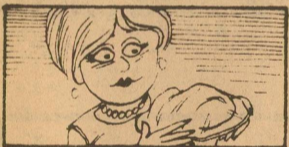

This is the FINAL parent workday. Anyone interested in helping is welcome.



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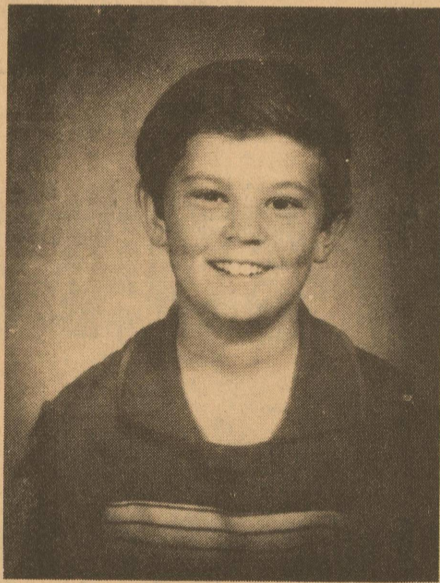

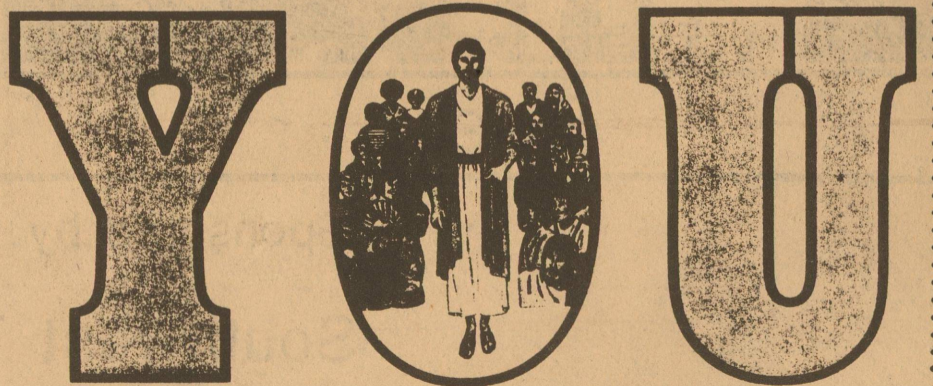

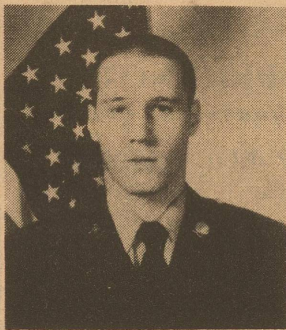
