Varsity Boys District Basketball Champs

We played Ozona High School for the District Championship in Sonora on Friday, February 16. This was a big ball game and the crowd was great and our people supported us very well.

Unfortunately, in the first ball game our girls were defeated by Iraan. We would like to say as a team and a coaching staff congratulations to them on a fine season and we know that they will do better in the future! During our ball game we

started out real well. We hit the first six points and they had to call a time-out. They were playing a trick defense. It was some kind of triangle-and-two. They were covering Jeff and Mike and had one free man in the middle. They were leaving Justin and Robert wide open. It took a little while to get used to it.

Right before half-time, they went on a little spurt, and the pressure hurt us a little bit. They were up seven and decided to pull it out. We went to our one-three-and-one-half-court trap and it really bothered them. It caused a couple of turnovers and a couple of quick shots and we knocked it down to a two point lead at half-time. Ozona was leading 24-22.

During the third quarter, we upped our pressure with the full-court man-to-man and really came out with a lot more intensity. We completely took them out of everything they

wanted to do. We held them to two points during the whole third quarter.

Probably the killer for Ozona, was that David hit a three-point jump shot from NBA range right at the buzzer. This put us up by 10.

The fourth quarter was just a matter of how bad the game was going to be. At the end of the third quarter, all of their kids walked off with their heads down and at that moment right then, I really felt like we were going to win the ball game, I just didn't know by how much.

Our pressure kept on and we took them out of everything and they were forced to go straight up man-to-man and come out of their little trick defense and from then it was just a matter of us scoring at will.

SCISD Board Meets In Regular Session

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held Monday, February 12 at 6 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Ray Ballew, chief tax appraiser for Schleicher County, was present to discuss with the board the preliminary value report from the State Property Tax Board.

BRAVO awards were presented to the maintenance and custodial personnel for exemplary and dedicated service.

Superintendent Larry Blair

reported that the Asbestos Management plan has been rewritten and submitted to the Texas Department of Health for approval. Ted Cleveland of Professional Services Industries, Inc., of San Antonio, is preparing the bidding specifications for required asbestos abatement. The district is anticipating bid letting in May and abatement beginning in June.

The board was further informed that bid specifications are being prepared for the track resurfacing project and for the wireless language lab.

It was reported to the board that Sonora will host a two-hour board training session on Thursday, February 22 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. for any school board member needing training hours.

The financial report for the month of January was approved and a motion for the district to participate in a Cafeteria Plan was tabled.

The board approved the application to the Texas Education Agency for SCISD to include Agriscience 333H-Soil and Crop Science Honors in the curriculum offerings for the 1990-91 school year.

Board Policy Update #35 was approved and the board voted to call the election on May 5 to fill the following school board positions for three-year terms extending from 1990-1993: seat vacated by Sam Henderson, Jr.'s resignation; seat occupied by Phil McCormick; and the seat occupied by Lynn Williams.

The final action by the board was to extend to Scott Barton, Judy Blair, Doug Kuhlmann, Ken Newman and Glen Nix, one year contracts, all subject to assignment.

PTA Meets, Shows Video On 'Parenting'

The Eldorado PTA met Thursday, February 8. A video on Active Parenting was shown.

Parents present participated in a survey associated with the video as to whether we as parents teach what we believe or teach as we were raised. Results were very interesting.

Proceeds from the Super Bowl Bake Sale were discussed. This sale gave the PTA a little operating money for future activities, thanks to everyone who supported the sale.

Myrta Rathbone told the PTA of the need for chair pockets for the Writing to Read program for first and second grades. These back covers with pockets would allow for storage space for materials to be left at the work stations. The project was approved and Darlene Edmiston agreed to head the project. Some of the ladies met on Tuesday, February 13, in the multipurpose room to begin making these covers.

Another project discussed was the need for trees for the playground to help with shading. A tentative date of February 17 was set for the planting, which did indeed take place on that date. Enron Company donated their backhoe for digging

while Mike Haynes offered his services to operate the equipment. Helping in the digging and transplanting were Steve Goode, Jay Behrens, Melanie Behrens, Kyla Behrens and David Behrens. Providing lunch for the workers were Barbara Behrens and Denise Goode.

"A special thanks goes to John Kotsch for assisting with placement of the trees so as not to interfere with underground utilities, Craig Menzies for assisting with transplanting procedures and Jay and Melanie Behrens for donating the trees," commented Connie Andrews, PTA secretary.

A nominating committee was chosen to get together a list of those interested in holding an officer's position. "If you have not been contacted and you are interested in becoming a PTA officer, please contact me and I will get your name to the committee," stated Mrs. Andrews.

The cost one way locally is \$.50 and round trip is \$1.00. The fare one way to Sonora is \$1.00 and round trip

is \$2.00, while the fare to San Angelo is \$1.50 one way and \$3.00 round trip.

Fares for Senior Citizens (60 years or more) are paid by the CVCOG Area Agency on Aging. Seniors may make voluntary contributions in any amount to help pay transportation costs.

This computer was purchased through a grant from the Big Country Library System and the Texas State Library Association. These organizations buy three computers a year for small libraries in Texas.

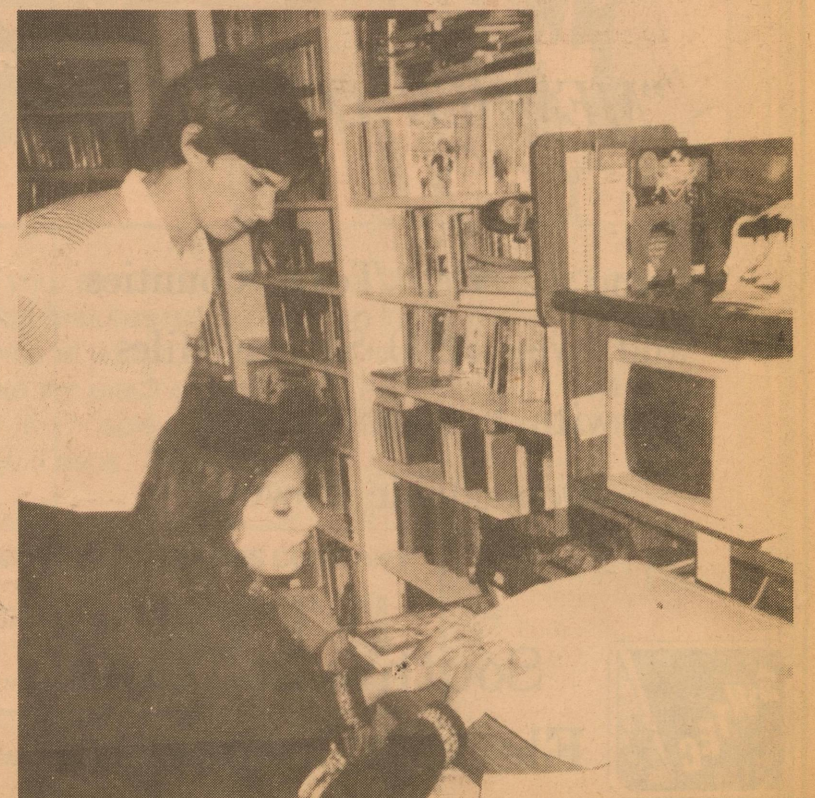
Chuck Fitts has been teaching basic computer skills after school to Jerri Whitten, Sharon

Life Among The Fishes

Well, Maxine and I went to see the movie, "Driving Miss Daisy". This movie has been nominated for eight or nine Academy Awards. It was well-made, and very well acted. It was also refreshing to see an entire movie with less than three cuss words, and those were relatively mild, and, no violence. Of course, I am sure that the movie isn't doing well at the box office mainly because it lacks both of the above mentioned movie necessities.

On the other hand, the thing that really might make it a movie that very few people will

even like is that its subject matter never seems to be broad enough for many of us to feel any sense of identification with either the black chauffeur or the rich, Jewish widow. The movie also covers a considerable number of years for a two-hour movie. It begins just after World War II and ends in the 70s.

The central issue seems to be the widow dealing with the changing South and her relationship to blacks. The problem is that the only blacks she knows are servants. How was she to

learn about the emergence of blacks in the Southern community when she herself was not very well integrated, both because of her own nationality and age. In spite of the fine performances by the two central characters, the movie did not seem to build to a climax (if that was even intended) nor did it present any dilemmas difficult enough for her to struggle with feelings toward blacks as a people.

The movie is based upon a play, and as a play I can imagine that the intimacy of the theatre would, in fact, enhance the

story's basic thesis. The movie took the story out of that realm and made the interaction of the two people too well-known. This film might show better on the little screen (TV).

This is only my opinion, of course, so don't fail to go just because I might not be giving rave reviews. If for no other reason, go to hear language in a movie that did not include vulgarities or innuendo. There is some genuine humor in the beginning of the picture and the movie does not over-dramatize the subject.

Hospital Update

LifeLine is an emergency response system which helps people live independently. You wear a button on a chain around your neck. In an emergency, you press the button. This activates a unit attached to your telephone which dials Schleicher County Medical Center.

When they receive your help signal, they begin by calling you to see what help you need. If they are unable to reach you by phone, they call a "Responder" to come to your home to check on you. A Responder is a friend or neighbor

whom you have chosen to be called in case of emergency.

When the Responder arrives at your home, he presses the reset button on your LifeLine unit. This signals the hospital that help has arrived. They then call to see what the situation is and what sort of help is needed. They will send an ambulance if indicated.

The unit also automatically

calls for help if you become unconscious or are otherwise unable to reset the unit periodically.

Due to several LifeLine subscribers recently passing away or moving into the nursing home, there are several units available at this time. If you would like to have this service, contact Schleicher County Medical Center.

An Apple A Day

Smoking Limits Medication Usefulness: The chemicals generated when tobacco burns can limit the effectiveness of medications. For example, tar and nicotine appear to speed up some of the liver's drug metabolizing enzymes and prematurely end a drug's active life.

Some smokers have to take nearly twice as much theophyllin

line to prevent asthma attacks as nonsmokers. Smoking also can increase blood sugar in diabetics and slow blood flow, which can keep high blood sugar levels at that point for a longer period of time.

Smoking may also reduce the effects of anti-anxiety drugs, neuroleptics, bronchodilators, antidepressants, and antiarthritics. HeartCrops

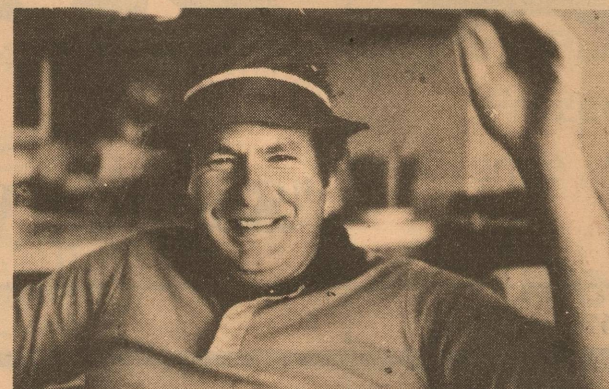

Surveys show that a surprising high percentage of readers fail to understand certain abbreviations. 42% of classified readers didn't know the meaning of "WSW lists" in one study.

The Eldorado Riding Club did not seem too enthusiastic about playing Palmetto Polo in 1955 when president, Horace Linthicum, introduced the game to the club. They began to practice and hit the ball around from their horses, and found the game to be difficult, competitive and exciting. The club began regular practice and became very good players.

In 1955, Eldorado Polo Team played teams from Big Lake, San Angelo, Miles, Christoval, Sterling City, Ozona and Barnhart. These were teams in District 5.

The highlight of the teams accomplishments was in 1957 when, after downing Lubbock to win the western title, traveled to Florida for World's Championship matches.

After winning at Lubbock for West Texas Championship, the local club began making

plans for the Florida trip. A number of benefit performances were given to raise money.

Saturday, March 16, 1957, the horses were loaded on a large truck owned by O.B. Bradshaw and departed early that morning, accompanied by A.G. Clark and Ollie Phillips. Members and their wives, in private cars left over that weekend, and the entire delegation was safely settled in New Smyrna Beach, Florida by Thursday.

The Eldorado members were royally entertained with barbecues and dances prior to the games, and the Governor of Florida extended letters of welcome upon their arrival. Twelve women and 13 men were in the Texas delegation.

Members of the Eldorado Riding Club and their families who journeyed to Florida

were: Horace Linthicum, his daughter Susie Walker, his sister Mrs. Bob Berger; Mr. and Mrs. A.G. Clark; Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Whitten; Mr. and Mrs. Hal Whitten; Mr. and Mrs. Tucker Clark; Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Phillips and two daughters; Mr. and Mrs. Sam Henderson; Mr. and Mrs. Arch Ory; Sam A. Whitten; Rance McDonald; Curtis Short; all of Eldorado; Mr. and Mrs. Howard Westfall, Sonora; Mr. and Mrs. Bing Crosby and Mrs. Williams of Christoval.

The Eldorado Riding Club brought home two trophies. One was presented by Florida's State Senator, E.W. Gautier, proclaiming Eldorado the World's Palmetto Polo Champions, and \$750 for placing first. The other trophy was presented for being judged the best dressed and mount in the Grand Parade.

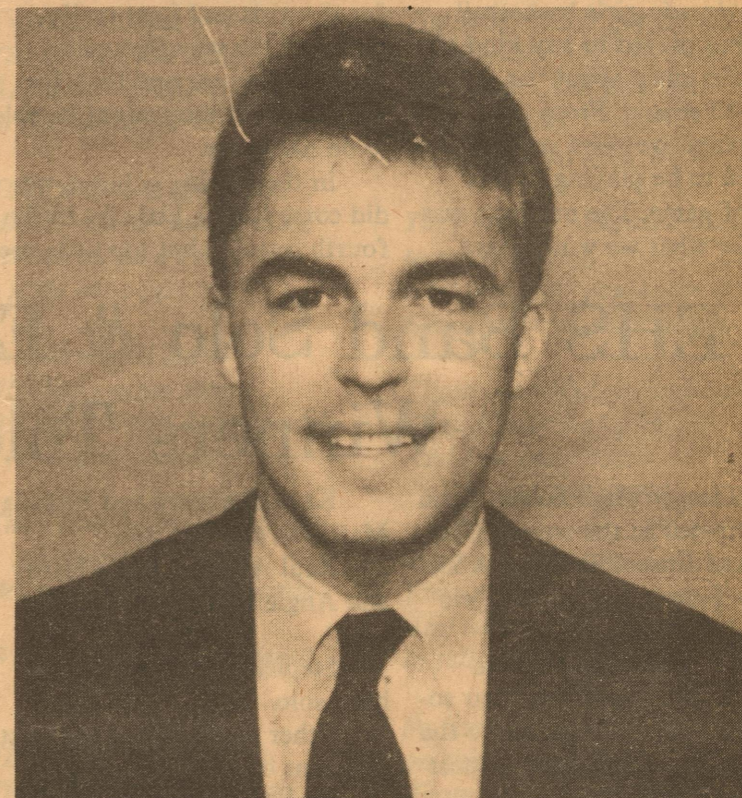

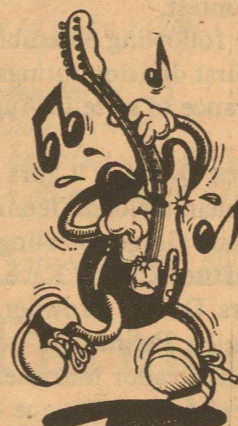
Twelve of them will help

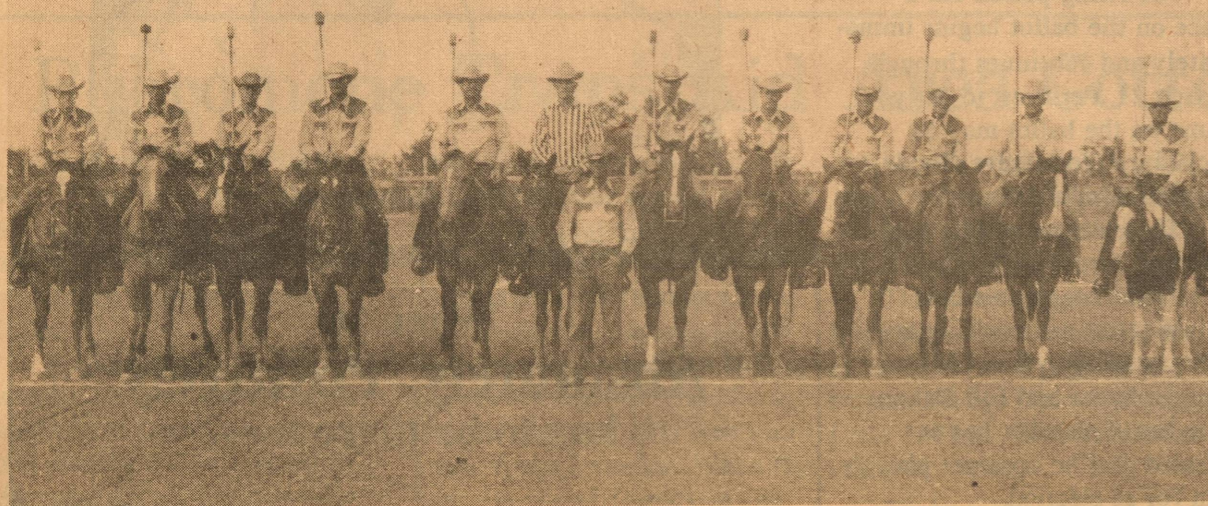

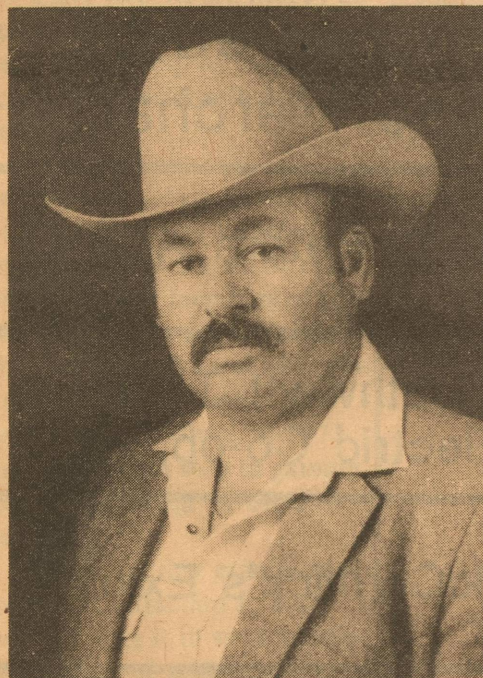

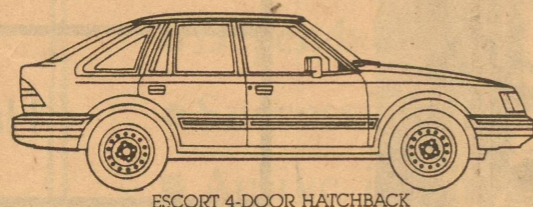
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Playoffs Cap Season for Varsity Girls

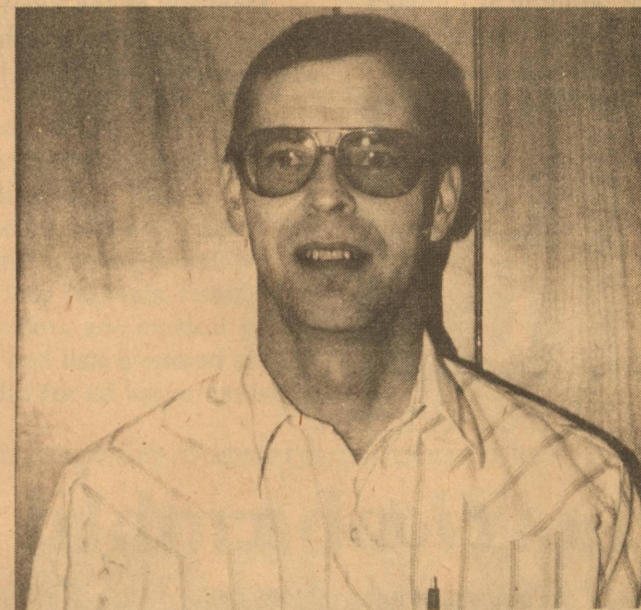

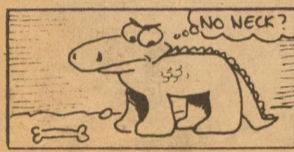
Scholarship Deadline Nears

Pheromone Traps Aid Area Cotton Farmers

Frequent travelers through West Texas have no doubt spotted small, brightly colored lantern-like structures perched atop fence posts near cotton fields.

A traveler curious enough to stop and examine the object might have found a number of boll weevils inside, leading to the conclusion that the device was some sort of trap. Tom Fuchs, Extension entomologist at San Angelo, and other entomologists have monitored 94 of the devices for the past 10 years.

The traps, more correctly called boll weevil pheromone traps, are used as a sampling tool to monitor weevil activity and populations in the spring and early summer. By catching a small ratio of the total population at a given location, entomologists are able to determine how many weevils are nearby at a given time. The insects are enticed into the trap by a naturally occurring material called a pheromone.

"A pheromone is a hormone-like substance secreted to the outside of an insect's body that causes a specific reaction from other members of the same species," Fuchs explained. "The identification and laboratory synthesis of the boll weevil pheromone, grandlure, in 1971 was a significant step in gaining a better knowledge of the boll weevil."

Fuchs said that grandlure is a powerful attractant to boll weevils. Using it in strategically placed traps, he said, allows entomologists to estimate how many weevil are in an area at different times of the year.

The entomologist said traps are generally installed and baited with grandlure the last week of April or the first week of

May. They are checked weekly until the first or second week of July. After that time the cotton begins to "square" or enter the first stages of blooming. Once squaring starts, Fuchs says, the weevils begin to feed on and lay eggs in the cotton. While feeding, they secrete their own more attractive pheromone. When this happens, the efficiency of the traps is greatly diminished.

One of the most important findings produced by the traps is the approximate date the weevils emerge from "diapause," a stage similar to hibernation in higher animals. This phase is crucial because of its relationship to the success of the delayed uniform planting date used in this area for boll weevil management.

"The underlying premise of the uniform planting date program," said Fuchs, "is that the planting date is delayed so that 95 percent of the weevils have emerged and died prior to the availability of cotton squares. The remaining insects will amount to only five percent of the total population, and damage from boll weevils will be minimized."

Fuchs says the program

works well when boll weevil populations are low and emergence occurs primarily in May and June.

The entomologist said the traps show that very cold weather lowers weevil populations tremendously. The winters here from 1985 to 1988 have been relatively mild.

Fuchs said results of recent weevil studies show that 85 percent of the variability in trap catches from year to year can be accounted for by the severity of the previous winter.

Overall, said Fuchs, weevil

numbers have increased dramatically since 1984. He said if a management program could be developed to reduce these relatively late-emerging weevils, the effectiveness of the delayed uniform planting program would be greatly improved.

For now though, Fuchs' 10-year study using the traps has shown little change in the weevil's emergency patterns. The study does indicate the impact a very cold winter has on overwintering weevils, an important point to farmers trying to protect their cotton crop.

Social Security Claimants Have Right To Representation

Many people do not realize that they have the right to be represented by an attorney or any person of their choice in business with Social Security. While most people handle their own claims, many use a representative when applying for benefits or appealing an unfavorable decision.

The appointment of a representative must be in writing. A form for this purpose is available at the Social Security Office. If the person is not an attorney, he or she must state in writing his or her name, that he

or she is accepting the appointment, and then sign his or her name.

Social Security works with the representative just as it does with the claimant. The representative may get information from the claimant's file, give evidence to support the claim, be present at any interviews, and appeal the decision in the case. The representative will be notified of any decision in the case.

However, the representative cannot sign an application for the claimant. The representative's authority ends when the

claimant requests that it end or after the final decision is made in the case.

Any fee that the representative wishes to charge must be approved by the Social Security Administration. Any agreement between the claimant and the representative that charges or collects a fee which is not approved by the Social Security Administration may be subject to criminal prosecution. In addition, he or she may be disqualified from representing Social Security claimants in any proceedings before the Agency.

'Moving Wall' To Be On Display At GFAB

The Concho Valley Vietnam Veterans Association, Chapter #457, is sponsoring the Vietnam Memorial Moving Wall which will be on display in San Angelo at Goodfellow AFB from March 26 to April 2.

The Moving Wall is an extension of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. and contains the names of 58,175 war dead and MIAs.

The concept of building the Moving Wall grew out of discussions by John Devitt, Gerry Haver and Norris Shears, Vietnam veterans from California, concerned with what they might possibly do to somehow "keep alive" and share the power and good that Devitt had experienced while attending the dedication of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington.

The Moving Wall stands six feet in height at the center and gradually tapers to three feet panels at each end. Each of the two sections are 126.2 feet in length, for a total length of 252.4 feet, which is slightly less than the length of a football field.

Both structures are now constructed of aluminum panels mounted to aluminum framing and supported by structural steel bracing. The minimum area required for display is 220 feet by 64 feet. However, the angle of 120 degrees requires a

minimum area of 220 feet in length.

Name rubbing can be done on the new structure with amazing results. All items left at the memorial are collected on the last day, marked, boxed, and shipped to Vietnam Combat

Veterans, LTD. office for storage in their warehouse.
