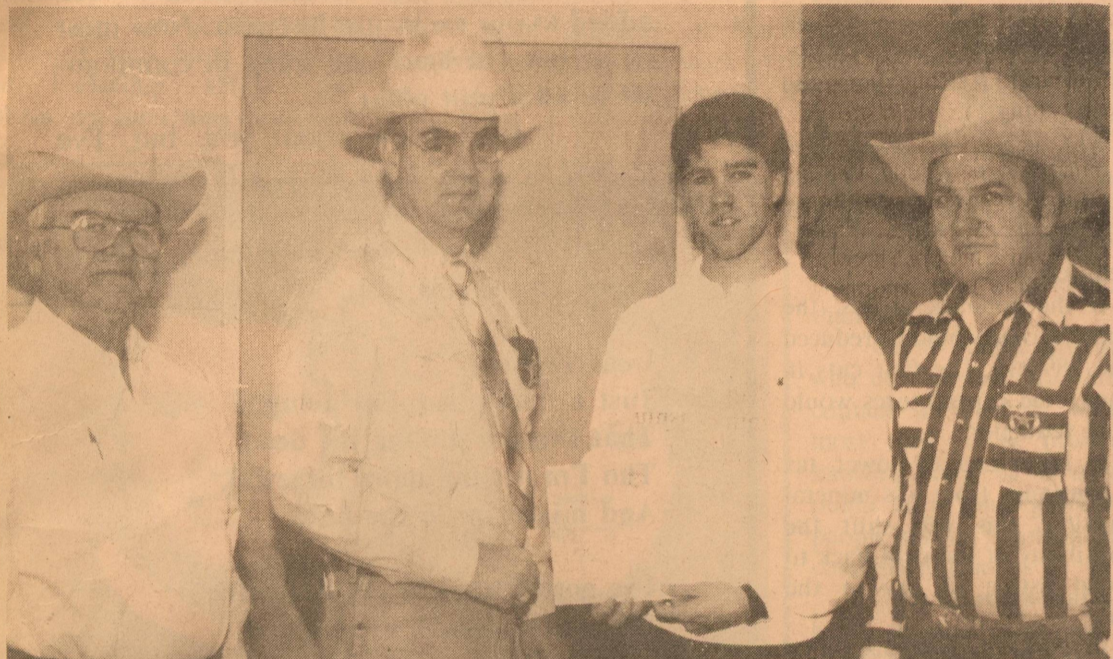

Gearing Up For Eldorado Stock Show

Deadlines Near For Exhibitors

Stock show time will be here soon. It is time now to search for your very best recipes and enter the stock show food show.

This year there is a change in the age division of the youth food show. Age divisions are: senior, ninth through 12th grade; junior, fourth through eighth grade; and sub-junior, kindergarten through third grades.

Deadline for entries to be turned in to the courthouse is 5 p.m. Wednesday, January 10. The cooked recipe is due at the show barn on Saturday, January 13 at 9 a.m.

You may enter as many categories as you like, but you will only be allowed to sell one entry. The food show is one of the major fund raisers for the stock show. A blue ribbon entry

will bring \$25 and a red ribbon entry will bring \$20. The "Best of Show" in each age division will receive the entire selling price.

Rules for the youth food show are:

1. All foods must fit in one of the following categories. Food should not require refrigeration. Any food not meeting these requirements will not be allowed to show or sell.

2. Categories: yeast breads, cakes, pies, candies, and cookies.

3. No quick breads, muffins, etc. No cream pies. No cupcakes. No mixes.

4. Recipes must be generous. To sell you must have at least three dozen cookies or three dozen pieces of candy.

5. Must exhibit entire recipe.

6. May enter as many categories as you like, but may sell only one entry.

7. Exhibitor must be a member of 4-H, FFA or FHA.

For those interested in entering items in the women's division, entries are due at the show barn between 1 and 6 p.m. on January 10. These entries will include art, hobbies and crafts, clothing, canned foods, etc.

The dog show will be held on Friday, January 12 at 5 p.m. There will be three age divisions. Dogs will be judged in two categories, dressed dog and groomed dog. Dogs should be at the show barn at 4:30 p.m. and must be on a leash.

Ten File For County Offices

The January 2 deadline for the 1990 Democratic Primary election was met by ten people in Schleicher County.

The offices and candidates are listed below: County Judge - incumbent-Johnny Griffin; County Clerk - incumbent-Helen Blakeway; Commissioners Court, Precinct 2 - incumbent-Kerry Joy; Precinct 4 - incumbent-Ross Whitten; Justice of the Peace -

incumbent-Pancho Bradley, Ruben Flores and Phil Edmiston; Treasurer - Gary Smith, Bea Porter and Karen Henderson.

The primary election will be held on March 13. People must register to vote by February 13 to participate in this election. Candidates must win a majority of votes in the primary, or in a subsequent runoff, to become their party's nominee in the November 6 general election.

City Leaders Adopt Ordinances

The Eldorado City Council met in regular session Wednesday, December 20 at City Hall with all councilmen in attendance with the exception of Richard Preston. A note was made that this meeting was called to transact business from the meeting of December 12 which could not be held due to a lack of a quorum.

George Gower of the Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce met with the council to review a proposal for the implementation of a hotel/motel tax in Eldorado. It was stated that City Secretary Carolyn Mayo contacted Edith Shaw and tried unsuccessfully to contact Cramer Sofge.

After some discussion, John Callison made a motion that an ordinance be drafted and a hearing be called for January 9, seconded by Barbara Jackson. The rate of tax was proposed for four percent to the chamber of commerce, one percent to the city, and one percent be retained by the motel owner. The motion carried and a copy of the contract between the Sonora chamber of commerce and city of Sonora will be obtained for reference.

A hearing was then held on Proposed Ordinance #105-89 restricting parking around the school and was reviewed with no citizens present in response to the Hearing Notice. Roger Powell made a motion that the ordinance be passed as drafted, it was seconded by Dora Bosmans. The motion carried.

This ordinance states that no parking shall be allowed on the North side of West Fields Avenue (kindergarten and first grades), it shall be a Loading Zone Only with a 10 minute parking limit and there shall be a designated cross walk on the North side of West Fields Avenue and on the South side of

West Fields.

The ordinance also designates a Loading Zone only in the One-Way drive adjacent to Grades two through four of the elementary wing between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. on school days. No parking will be permitted except for the loading or unloading of passengers. Pedestrian crosswalks will be marked.

It also states there shall be no parking on the West side of North West Street in the paved area adjacent to the front of the gym from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days. A pedestrian crosswalk shall be marked.

Those who are dropping kids off at school in the morning or picking them up in the afternoon may do so, but do not leave your car. This ordinance will be enforced by the local law enforcement personnel and tickets will be issued.

A second hearing was held on Proposed Ordinance #106-89 establishing truck routes. The secretary clarified information concerning tax revenues. With no citizens present to make comment on the proposal, motion was made by Roger Powell, seconded by John Callison, that the ordinance be approved and the motion carried.

This ordinance makes it unlawful for any commercial vehicle in excess of 17,000 pounds gross weight to travel on any street, avenue or alley within the limits of Eldorado except on designated U.S. or State highways or a designated truck route. This includes any and all truck tractors, van trailers, semi-trailers, house trailers and/or any vehicle designed or operated for the transportation of property whose weight or whose rated or licensed combined body and load weight exceeds the 17,000 pounds limit.

Certain exceptions are made

to this ordinance and are available at City Hall. The ordinance shall be enforced by local law enforcement personnel. (For further information or clarification on these ordinances, you may contact City Hall.)

John Nikolauk is to meet with State Highway Department officials to request a study of East and North Streets for designation as State maintained connecting highways. Motion was made by Roger Powell and seconded by John Callison to set a fine at no less than \$50 plus costs and no more than \$200 plus costs. The motion carried.

Other topics of discussion included:

-- A notice has been published by Jack Dean and Carolyn Mayo for the public to be aware of the need to contact City Hall before digging within the City and to report damages to city property, including meters and regulators.

-- A hearing before the RRC for Parker & Parsley Injection Request is set for January 10 in Austin. Mort Mertz and James Powell have expressed interest to represent Eldorado and Schleicher County in opposing the request to inject fresh water.

-- Absentee Voting is scheduled from January 2, through January 16 at City Hall for the Hospital Rollback Election.

-- The possibility of Brett Dacy returning to work after back surgery to the position of animal control officer was discussed with the council's approval to holding the position for him if delay is not too long.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo gave an updated Superintendent's report in his absence, due to illness. A report was given on water, gas, sewer and landfill

SCMC To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90 to 97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt, has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers

at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be made available to local women on Sunday, January 21. The mobile unit will be parked at Schleicher County

Medical Center. Appointments may be made by calling 853-2507.

Investigation Continues In Kellogg Murder

On Wednesday morning December, 27, a man was found dead Northwest of Eldorado on Jackson Road. At about 6:20 a.m., a passing motorist found the body of Jerry Ray Kellogg, a citizen of Eldorado. Kellogg had been shot to death. The Bexar County Medical Examiner determined that Kellogg, age 35, had died of multiple gunshot wounds.

The case is being investigated by the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department and Texas Ranger Dan Rhea of Ozona.

Evidence concerning the case has been delivered to the Department of Public Safety Laboratory in Austin.

Further information is not available at this time, as the case is still under investigation.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

Time does not permit me the pleasure of visiting each person that signed the petition for the tax roll-back on the hospital district. I do not enjoy paying taxes. However, I do enjoy the services of all the taxing entities in the county. Among these are the high-quality school that affords our young people a good foundation to pursue a wide variety of careers. The county provides a good network of roads and also several recreational opportunities, such as golf, rodeo, baseball, airport, parks, etc. These are all tax supported.

The hospital district has some major financial problems. However, they are not impossible to overcome. The best thing going for it is the quality of service that is available on short notice when needed. I have used them recently and was very pleased with the professionalism with which they cared for me.

True, the increase is fairly large, percentage wise, however, it does not seem exorbitant when the dollars are added up. One of the reasons for the increase is to apply more money to retire the debt of the district and spend less on interest. With a declining tax base, it looks as if an early retirement of the debt would, in the long run, spread the burden to more industrial tax payers, giving some long-term savings to home owners and other personal property owners who, at the present time, pay approximately 15 to 20 percent of the tax roll. In the future this figure will probably increase.

Some of the things that will help our community stay strong and perhaps attract some industry that would help our economy and real estate values is the quality of school, medical care, county and city services at an economical tax rate.

At the present time I know of no major taxpayer who has confronted any of our taxing entities about exorbitant spending in retaining high quality services.

I am in agriculture. One might think that I have very little at stake as to whether Eldorado and Schleicher County have a strong economy or not. The way I see it, the less industry in the county, the higher my share of the taxes for school, county and hospital will be.

The hospital has been one of the more stable employers in the county, even though they have been forced to cut some benefits and salaries. When the services are used more, hopefully, these well-deserved benefits can be restored.

The hospital tax base has been getting smaller the last few Years:

- 1985 - \$258,437,110
- 1986 - \$255,600,910
- 1987 - \$190,391,994
- 1988 - \$189,327,878
- 1989 - \$173,006,298

The percent of taxes paid by different segments of the base: 1984 - Minerals, 65.7 percent; Utilities and Industrial, 20.33 percent; Real Estate (land, homes, business), 12.52 percent; and Personal Property (commer-

cial), 1.20 percent. 1989 - Minerals, 43.53 percent; Utilities and Industrial, 29.09 percent; Real Estate (land, homes, business), 26.56 percent; Personal Property (commercial), .82 percent.

If the rollback election carries, it would reduce the tax levy by \$89,963 - Minerals, \$39,160; Industry and Utility, \$26,170; and Real Estate and Personal, \$24,633.

640 acres of grass land would save \$8,02, a house valued at \$50,000 would be reduced \$26, a house valued at \$18,000 would be reduced \$9.36.

If the rollback passes, the hospital income would be reduced by the \$89,963. The first cuts in the budgeted expenditures would be debt reduction.

If the trend of lower tax base continues from less mineral production, this will shift the responsibility of the debt back to the real estate to pay in the future.

If you have questions, I'd be glad to visit with you and answer any question I can. I hope you will seriously consider this issue and keep in mind the welfare of the community.

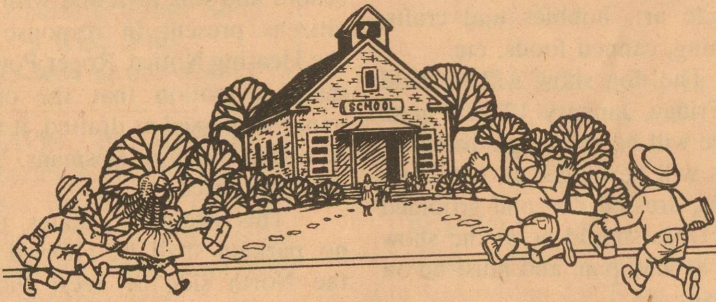
Cigarettes and Coffee: A nerve-wracking pairing: Coffee drinking can add significantly to the jumpiness experienced by most people who quit smoking.

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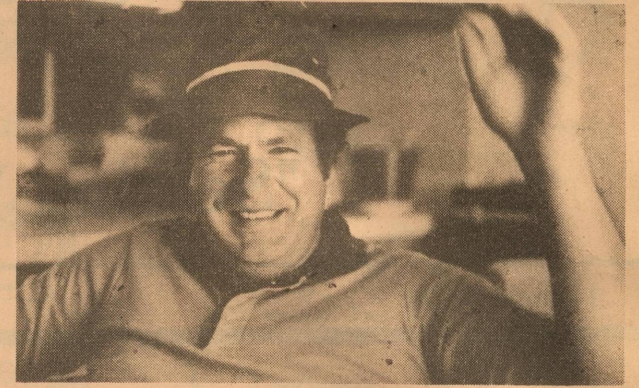

Finding Greatness As Easy As Looking Around You

There is no greatness where there is not simplicity, goodness, and truth.

---Leo Tolstoy, Russian author Tolstoy wrote War and Peace before BMWs and "yuppies" ever came into being. He wrote before we could use Gold Cards to buy Gucci bags and before we had "power lunches" with "power brokers".

1990 begins the end of a century that has seen Hiroshima destroyed and the Eagle land. It has brought depression and breathed prosperity, given rise to demagogues and laid low the Berlin Wall.

The history books' great events will be accompanied by great names -- those names often associated with large headlines and leadership ability. But Tolstoy saw something more than

wealth and fame. That something was in the three words: simplicity, goodness and truth -- three words that are deceptively simple. This kind of greatness is not easy to achieve.

As we make our New Year's resolutions, perhaps we could make the attempt to be great in our own way. That means being the best at what we do, being generous and honest with those around us.

I've found plenty of examples of greatness at home in the 21st District. It is in the people who volunteer to give their time and talents to others, or to lend a helping hand or a kind word when most needed. For instance:

*Lillian Schnabel of San Antonio carries on the work of her late husband O.P. Schnabel

by continuing his "Beautify San Antonio" project. The project has had a noticeable impact on the physical beauty of San Antonio.

*Clara Phillips of Kerrville spends her time volunteering for the Social Agencies Co-ordinating Unit, an organization set up for people who need help paying for food, rent, electricity and other basic necessities. She serves as Secretary for the Volunteer Services Council for the Kerrville State Hospital and still has time left to organize the coming year's school board elections.

*Bobby Trimble of Midland has received national recognition for his leadership in starting a "Christmas in April" program in Midland. The program uses volunteers to do repair work on the homes of the poor and elderly.

*Debi Nightingale of San Angelo, confined to a wheelchair by polio, raised money to buy an elderly friend, also disabled by polio, an updated, custom-made wheelchair. Debi reached out to help someone a little worse off than herself.

Great people are the ones who do the most for those they contact on a daily basis. The most may be as private as a knowing smile or it may be as public as a rousing speech. The people may be family members or community leaders.

Each of us has the ability to be great when measured by Tolstoy's definition. It will be measured not by fame, wealth or popularity, but by our own actions and by our own ability to see those actions as worthwhile endeavors.

As we start the New Year, let's look around us and try to recognize the great people in our lives. Chances are, there are more than we expect. And chances are, we have the ability to be like they are.

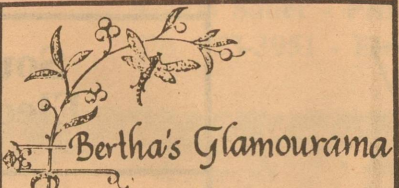
SS Rep Slates January Visit To Eldorado

He farmed near Roscoe for many years and moved to Sweetwater in 1957 where he owned Turner & Son Gulf Distributors and later a Mobil service station.

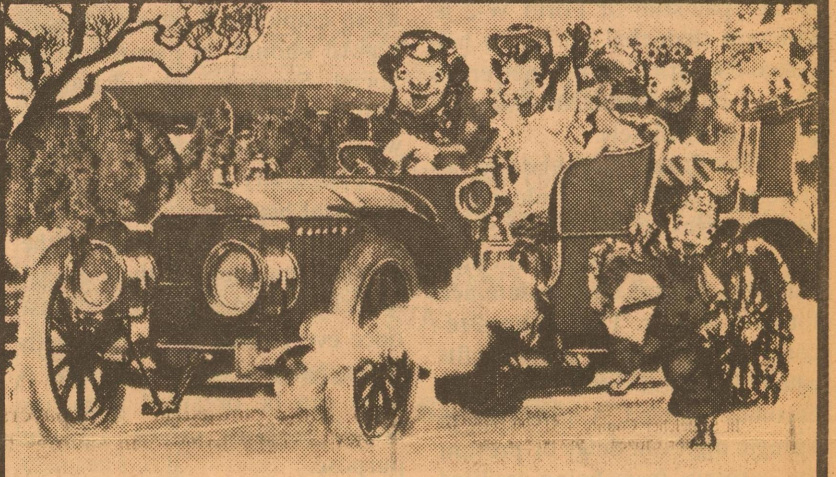
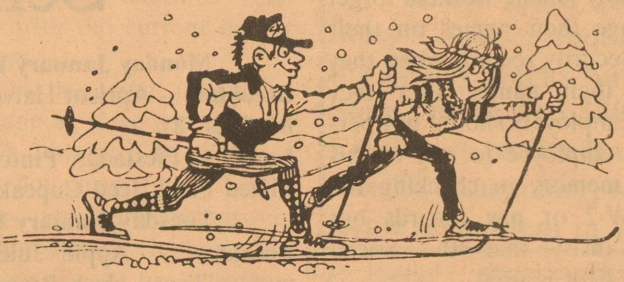

Check Your Pay Stubs, Says SS Rep

To protect their Social Security earnings records, workers are urged to check the Social Security number and name shown on their pay stubs to make sure they are correct, Social Security officials reminded. They should also check the Social Security number on their Form W-2 they receive in January.

If a person discovers that the Social Security number on his or her pay stub or Form W-2 is different than that on his or her Social Security card, the error should be reported to the employer immediately.

The Form W-2 wage and tax statement is used by employers to report wages to the Social Security Administration where lifetime earnings records are maintained for each worker. The earnings records are the basis for benefits when a person retires, dies, or becomes disabled. A difference in a single digit can delay or prevent the earnings from being credited

to the correct record.

Many female workers forget to change their names on their Social Security records when they change their names after they marry. Employers should not permit the employee to rely on his or her memory in checking the Form W-2 or pay records but should insist that the Social Security card is used.

When a mistake is reported to an employer, a corrected wage report should be sent to the Social Security Administration. The employee should also check with the Social Security Office if it is necessary to change a name in Social Security records.

Employees should check the earnings credited to their Social Security earnings records at least once every three years, especially if they change jobs frequently. A form can be obtained from any Social Security Office for this purpose.

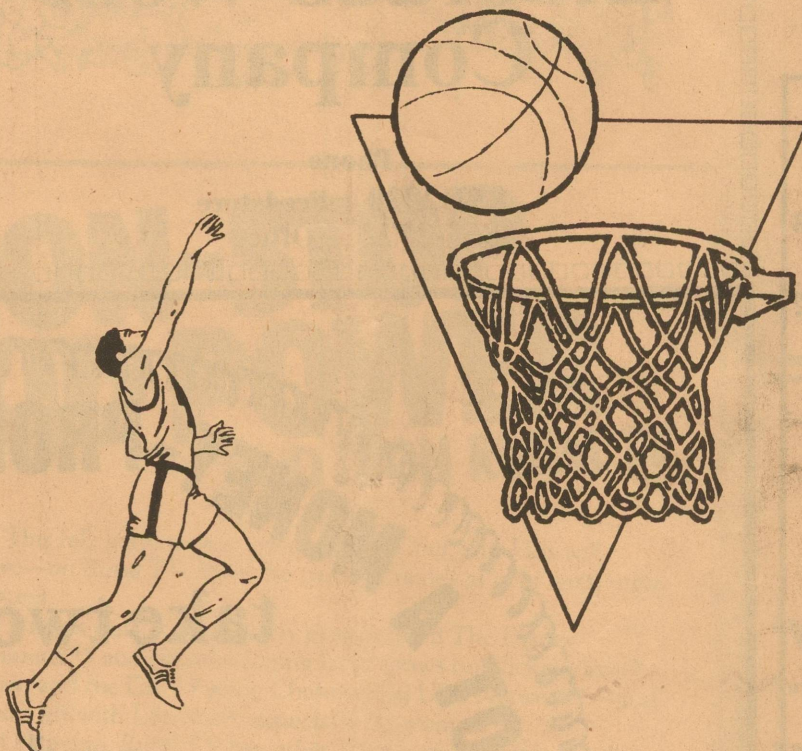

Child Support Delinquents To Be Reported To Credit Agencies

Attorney General Jim Mattox announced that beginning immediately, his Child Support Enforcement Division is reporting non-custodial parents who owe past due child support to consumer credit reporting agencies. "Past due child support is as much of a debt as a past due car payment," said Mattox. "People who fail to pay child support will now run the same risk of having their credit rating lowered as they would if they fail to make car payments."

The Attorney General's Child Support Enforcement Division will automatically report on a monthly basis the names of non-custodial parents who have been located and who owe more than \$500 in past due child support. The monthly report contains the amount of arrearages owed by each individual and a list of new non-custodial parents who have become delinquent. The delinquency will remain on a person's credit record for at least seven years, beginning when

the case is initially submitted. Mattox said that reporting these names will give the Texas child support program another creative and innovative enforcement tool. "If you have bad credit because you don't pay child support, it will be very difficult to buy a car, a house, or any other big ticket item that you need credit for," Mattox said. Mattox said that creditors should evaluate a non-custodial parent's child support delinquency before granting credit. They should know that child support is an automatic judgment; is renewable from month to month; and is not satisfied until the order expires, which usually occurs

when the child turns 18. It takes precedence over most other debts. The CSED notifies delinquent parents before their names are submitted and gives them a chance to pay their past due amount. If the parent believes that the past due amount is incorrect, he or she can request an administrative hearing to resolve the dispute. "We'll take every precaution to ensure that a non-custodial parent's due process rights are protected," Mattox said. "But if you owe child support, the best way to protect your credit rating is to contact your local child support office and make arrangements to pay what you owe."

Change Address With Social Security

The most common reason for failure to receive a Social Security check is not reporting a change of address. A change of address may be reported to any Social Security Office by phone or mail. Some people apparently think that's all they have to do to report a change of address to the post office. However, the post office will forward mail to the new address for only one year, after which any mail that does not contain the new address is returned to the sender. People who have their checks sent directly to their bank

and fail to report a change of address also risk having their checks interrupted. Social Security periodically checks to see if the proper person is receiving the checks and if there is no response to the mailed inquiry, the checks may be stopped. In addition, direct depositors who fail to report a change of address may miss receiving important information mailed to beneficiaries that may affect their checks. If you have any questions about reporting your new address, call the nearest Social Security Office.

Conversion Of Hospital Would Cost More Than Money

Two weeks ago I explained how replacing our hospital with a clinic operated by Shannon would actually cost the taxpayers \$137,331 per year. Besides money, what would it cost to convert from our hospital to a 24 hour clinic?

1. We would end up with only one doctor instead of two, so we would give up having a choice.
2. We would have only one nurse, instead of two, on stand by in case of emergency. Probably the nurse would be an LVN, whereas now we have an LVN and an RN always on duty.
3. We would give up our ability to keep any patients here: everyone needing inpatient care would have to transfer to San Angelo, creating hardship on friends and family. To visit the patient would mean incurring the expense of the trip, maybe the expense of taking off from work and the expense of time spent in traveling. Or maybe the patient just would not get visited.
4. The doctor you see might be a temporary fill-in for a week or a weekend, whereas now you see either Dr. Peaslee or Dr. Johnson who work together closely; this means we give up continuity of care.
5. We would lose at least one of our current doctors (the other has not committed, so far as I know). The doctor that would be provided for us as a



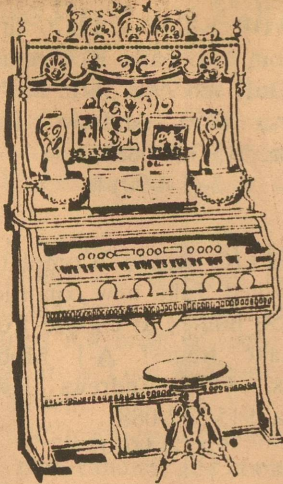
