Bradley Re-elected -- Porter, Henderson in Runoff

Approximately 850 people voted in Schleicher County on Tuesday, March 13. Approximately 750 voted in the Democratic Primary and approximately 100 voted in the Republican Primary.

In the two contested local races, Frank "Pancho" Bradley won the Democratic nomination for the office of Justice of the Peace. There will be a run-off election between Karen Henderson and Bea Porter for the position of County Treasurer.

School Board Renews Contracts

The Schleicher County School Board met Monday night. Approximately 75 citizens, including a representation of the Eldorado High School Senior Class, attended this meeting. Many of the people in attendance were there in support of teacher and coach, Matt Chalmers.

It had been rumored locally that Mr. Chalmers' contract would not be renewed.

According to School Board Chairman, Phil McCormick, no recommendations had been made prior to this meeting,

concerning Mr. Chalmers' contract, therefore, no action had been taken.

The recommendations that were made at the Monday night meeting by Superintendent Larry Blair were that Contracts for all school personnel would be renewed, subject to assignment. A Growth Plan was attached to Chalmers' Contract. The School Board voted unanimously to accept Blair's recommendation.

Other action that was taken Bravo Award was

Other action that was taken during the Monday night meeting was the presentation of

the Bravo Award to Jim Glidden for being "An Outstanding Good Guy."

P.T.A. President Steve Goode reported that the P.T.A. had completed a tree planting project.

The Board approved the purchase of a new 59 passenger bus at a cost of approximately \$33,000 and a bid was accepted for asbestos abatement engineering services.

The Board also accepted the resignation of Ann Darnell. Ms. Darnell plans to further her education by pursuing a Doctorate Degree.

Texas Sees Growth In Taxable Sales

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that sales tax rebates to Texas cities are up almost five percent so far this year as compared to last year.

The March rebate checks sent to cities totaled \$69 million, an increase of nearly 13 percent over last March's payments.

"The increase for the first three months of the year is right in line with our forecast of five to six percent growth in taxable

sales for this year," Bullock said.

Houston received \$12 million, the state's largest payment and an increase of 15 percent over last March's payment. Dallas received the state's second largest payment of \$7.4 million, an increase of seven percent over last March's payment. San Antonio received \$4.1 million and Austin received \$3.1 million.

Payments to counties totaled \$7.3 million this month, com-

pared to \$5.9 million last March. The 23 percent jump over last March's payments is partly due to the increased number of counties collecting sales tax now, Bullock said.

This month's checks include taxes collected on January sales and reported in February by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Eldorado's payment for this period was \$5,377.44 as compared to \$4,558.66 for the prior year, an increase of 17.96 percent. Payments to date are \$20,490.23 as compared to 1989 payments to date of \$17,779.60, an increase of 15.25 percent.

Schleicher County's payment for this period was \$2,861.80 as compared to the previous year of \$1,537.30, an increase of 86.16 percent.

Merchants collect the sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its six percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax. All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

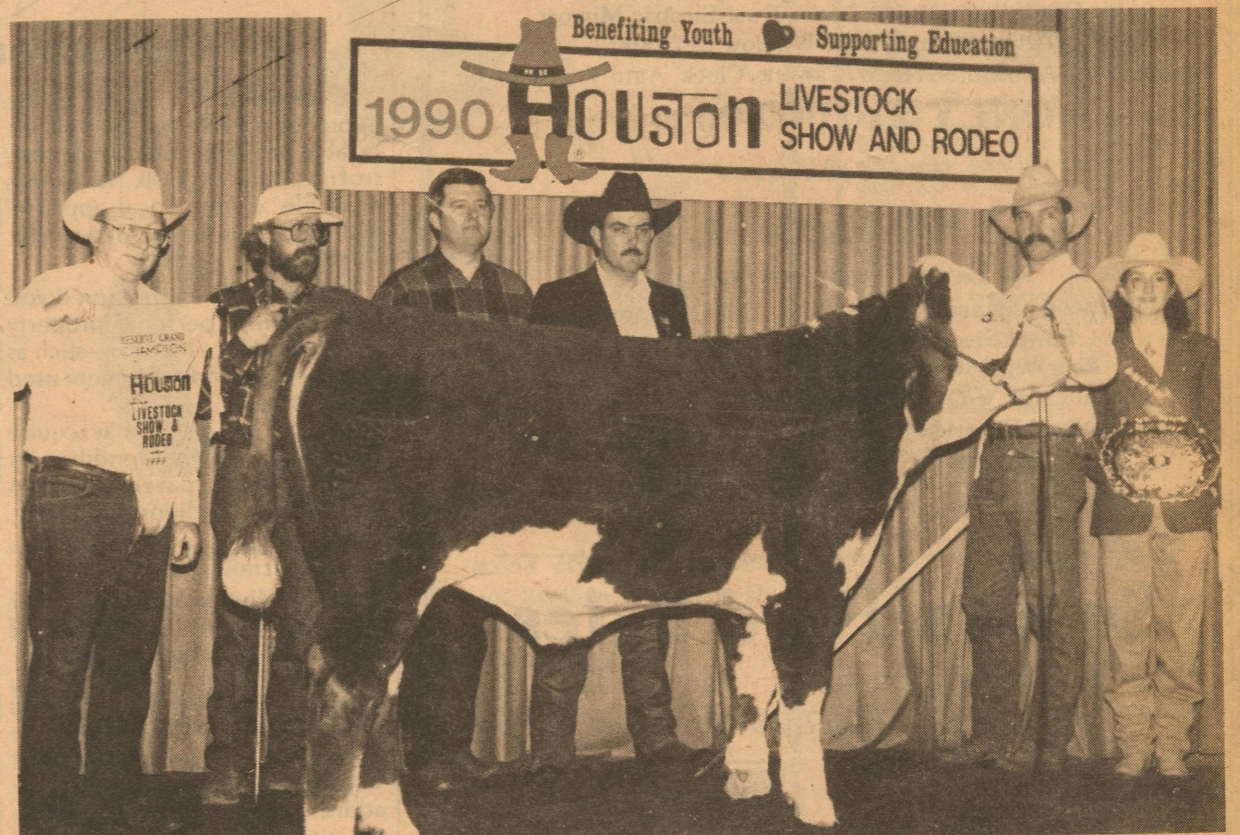
Rocking Chair Ranch Scores Double Victory

Life Among The Fishes

For those of you who might not be steeped in the classics, today is the "Ides of March", a day very fateful, and fatal I might add, in the life of Julius Caesar. In fact, it was the last day of his life. We only have Shakespeare's word for it, but a few of the members of the Roman Senate, seeing a possible Emperor in the making, decided to cut in on his act.

The guy with the mean and hungry look appeared to be the ring leader, a real political hack. What probably hurt, along with the stab wounds, was that even one of Caesar's friends, Brutus by name, took a stab at assassination. This may have been the be-

ginning of stereotyping Italians as always carrying knives.

Some of them came "not to praise Caesar, (that was pretty obvious) but to bury him" which was by then pretty necessary. Maybe this stabbing incident is where the phrase "hack politician" comes from?

"Trots" were side-by-side translations with the Latin text in one column and the English right beside it. For some reason, the

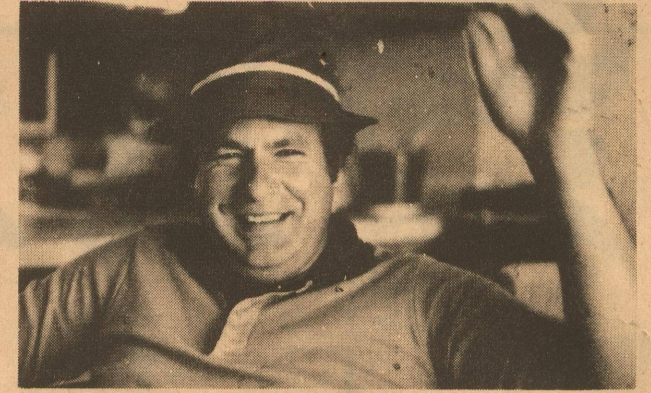
more obscure the writer, the easier it was to find such a book. Of course, using such aids didn't help on the grammar tests, but I could get my homework done before dawn.

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS—



RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A **rendition** is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1990. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The **advantages** of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district wants a higher value for your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for

paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

- You can also file a **report of decreased value**, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1989. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1990.

The **last day** for filing or post-marking 1990 renditions is Monday, April 2. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the April 2 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Passive Smoking Can Cause Snoring: An Italian study of 1615 children aged 6 to 13 documented that 118 were habitual snorers and 137 snored apart from when they had colds. The snoring was significantly associated with rhinitis, previous tonsillectomy, and smoking by parents.

Sixty-nine percent of the habitual snorers were exposed daily to cigarette smoke, and the prevalence of snoring was related to the number of cigarettes smoked. It ranged from 5.5% of the children in households with moderate smoking to 8.8% in heavy smoking households. British Medical Journal.

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

4. If a kite falls into a power line, abandon it. Attempting to remove it is dangerous.
5. Don't use metalized kites. This type of kite has been banned by the Consumer Product Safety Commission.



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

Business Owners Should Render Property Now

Jim Robinson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), reminded business owners that they must file property rendition forms with local appraisal district offices by April 2, 1990.

The legal deadline for renditions is actually March 31, which falls on a Saturday this year. As a result, the 1990 deadline has been moved to the first working day after March 31. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by April 2, 1990.

A rendition is a report a property owner files each year, listing taxable property he owns or manages as of January 1.

"The law requires certain

property owners to file renditions every year," noted Robinson.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 must file a rendition statement with the local appraisal district. "Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition. It is to their benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value," Robinson explained.

"When business personal property isn't rendered, the chief appraiser is forced to estimate the value," he added.

The chief appraiser may

also require other property owners or managers to render property; if so, the chief appraiser will send a notice and the appropriate rendition form.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but Robinson pointed out that homeowners who do render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers, for several reasons.

First, by filing a rendition, property owners ensure that the correct address will be on their value notices, notices of hearings which may be scheduled if they

protest the appraisal of their property, and on their tax bills.

"It is essential that property owners receive this information in a timely manner," said Robinson. "For instance, if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes plus penalties that result from late payment."

Second, rendition is an opportunity for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value.

Third, by recording an opinion of the property's value, the property owner has ensured that the chief appraiser must send the owner a notice before placing a higher value on the property.

This notice allows the property owner time to gather information to protest the appraisal if the proposed value is too high.

If a property is appraised by more than one appraisal district, the property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district office.

Property owners whose homes were damaged last year by a storm, flood, or fire may also file a special type of rendition report with chief appraisers, called a report of decreased value. The deadline for filing this report for 1990 is April 2.

Rendition and report of de-

creased value forms are available at local appraisal district offices.

The law requires that the property owner provide all information requested on the form. Noted Robinson, "It is a criminal violation to make false statements on renditions and reports of decreased value."

Rendition forms and decreased value reports are confidential and not open to public inspection.

Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated.
