Republicans Select State Delegates

Schleicher County Republicans met in Convention Saturday, March 21, at the Memorial Building. In attendance were delegations from the four voting precincts along with several guests.

Republican County Chairman, Randy Mankin, called the convention to order at 6:30 P.M. The Invocation was led by Jimmy Heath and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Beth Heath. A brief statement of the rules was read.

Several letters of encouragement and support addressed to the Convention from such dignitaries as Senator Phil Gramm, Congressman Lamar Smith, State Supreme Court Chief Justice Tom Phillips and State Representative Harvey Hilderbran were read.

Committee appointments included Credentials Committee, Lauri Wade, chairwoman; Rules Committee, Barbara Behrens, chairwoman. Temporary officers of the convention were appointed and the roll of delegates was called. A quorum being present, the convention continued with credentials, rules and permanent organization committee reports.

Election of officers followed. The following were elected: Barbara Behrens, convention chairwoman; Annthinette Mankin, convention secretary; and Jay Behrens, sergeant at arms. The nominations committee was appointed with Annthinette Mankin as chairwoman and the permanent resolutions committee was appointed with Jimmy Heath as chairman.

The convention took a break from its work as it was treated to an enlightening speech

by Bob Groseclose, State Republican Executive Committeeman. Groseclose discussed the importance of reestablishing the Republican Party in Schleicher County and congratulated County Chairman Randy Mankin and the assembled delegates on their efforts in holding the recent Republican Primary. He also touched on topics such as redistricting and the need to take the Party's conservative message to the public.

Following the address by Groseclose, Mankin presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation and thanked him for his many years of service and dedication to the party. Two local Republicans were singled out for recognition also. Certificates of Appreciation were awarded to Annthinette Mankin and Jimmy Heath for outstanding service.

The convention then had a report of the nominations committee. The committee recommended that Randy Mankin and Barbara Behrens be selected as delegates to the State Convention. Jimmy Heath and Kathy Mankin were recommended as alternate delegates. The convention discussed the committee report and voted to adopt it without change.

The permanent resolutions committee presented three resolutions to the convention without recommendation. These resolutions were discussed and two were amended. All three resolutions were adopted by the convention.

Resolution #1 called for state assistance for rural health care facilities. Resolution #2 called for local government entities to be organized with single

member districts allowing for some at large seats. Resolution #3 called for the restricting abortion except in cases of rape or incest or to protect the life of the mother.

Another resolution was presented from the convention floor and was adopted unanimously. It was attached to the permanent resolution committee report and labeled Resolution #4. It called for the Line Item Veto to be

made available to the President of the United States.

As no other business was brought before the convention, Barbara Behrens announced that the State Republican Convention would be held in Fort Worth on June 29 and 30, and that the newly elected State Delegates would be directed to present themselves with their credentials and all resolutions to the Secretary of the State Convention for seating. The convention was then adjourned.

Contacted after the convention for comments, Randy Mankin stated that he was very pleased with the proceedings. He said "It speaks well of the Republicans of Schleicher County that they turnout in these num-

bers in this kind of weather for their County Convention. We had 21 people here tonight and a number of guests. That is almost a quarter of our Primary turnout and indicates the depth of support we are finding in Schleicher County for the conservative message of the Republican Party. I seriously doubt that the Democrats had a quarter of their primary voters attend their County Convention."

Mankin went on to say, "I want to thank the many citizens of this county who have been so very helpful to the Republican Party. I also want to assure them as well as the rest of the county that we are back, and this time the Republican Party is here to stay."

Jobs Available For Area Youth

Jobs will be available for area youth again this summer through the Summer Youth Employment and Training Program operated by the Concho Valley Council of Governments. The eight week program will be operated June 4 through July 27 and will allow youth to work up to 30 hours per week.

Public agencies and private non-profit organizations are used as worksites.

The purposes of the program are to provide basic work experience to better prepare the youth for the world of work, perform meaningful work in the

community, and provide economic resources to enable the youth to return to school in the fall. Counseling and labor market information will be provided each participant working this summer.

To qualify for the program, youth must be at least 14 years of age and meet low family income guidelines. Applications will be taken April 6 at the Schleicher County Courthouse, Commissioner's Court, at 3:30 p.m. Students should bring a copy of their social security card, birth certificate and utility bill or phone bill to show proof of address.

American Cancer Society Volunteers from 15 counties, including two from Schleicher County, attended the 1990 Community Crusade Kickoff for ACS District 4 in San Angelo on Saturday, March 31.

Delia Pina and Rita Reeves represented the Schleicher County Unit of the ACS at the kickoff which featured the theme, "The Great American Food Fight Against Cancer". This annual meeting serves as the first official function of the Community Crusade -- the educational and fundraising drive sponsored and conducted by ACS volunteers from our community each spring. Testing For Census Workers

Testing for Census workers for Schleicher County will be held in the Schleicher County Library in Eldorado on April 19 at 1:30 p.m.

Applicants must be 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, have a valid driver's license and a social security card (which they must bring to the testing site).

The work will last between two and eight weeks for most workers. They will receive \$5 per hour plus .24 cents per mile for any official use of their car.

Extended Absentee Voting Period For April 10 Runoffs

The extended absentee balloting period opened Monday, April 2, for those registered to vote in the Tuesday, April 10 runoffs, Texas Secretary of State George Bayoud said.

Registered voters will have until Friday, April 6, to appear at county courthouses and polling places across Texas to cast absentee ballots in the April 10 Democratic and Republican party primary runoff elections, said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer. The deadline to register to vote in the runoffs was March 11.

"If you have made up your mind who you are going to vote for, consider taking advantage of the extended voting period," Bayoud said. "It's real convenient and you can avoid the lines on election day."

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee balloting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person, absentee ballots during the extended period, Bayoud explained. In the March 13 primaries, about 15

percent of those who voted cast their ballots during the extended period.

On April 10, the primary runoffs will determine the outcome of those races in which no candidate received more than 50 percent of the votes cast on March 13.

At the statewide level, Democratic Party primary voters will nominate candidates for governor, state treasurer, and one seat each on the Texas Supreme Court and Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Republican Party primary voters will nominate on the statewide level candidates for Agriculture Commissioner and Land Commissioner.

On the local level, the office of County Treasurer, on the Democratic ticket, is a runoff election between Bea Porter and Karen Henderson.

Did you get your census form filled out? We were one of the lucky (?) families who had a census taker come to the house to do the long form (I guess that is what you call it).

Came across some tidbits of information in the Old Farmer's Almanac about the census from the early 1790 census to present day. Thought I would share some of them with you.

-- In 1800 there were 26 Eskimos living in Nebraska.

-- In 1980 the average person received 266 letters, 45 periodicals, 134 circulars and three parcels through the mail.

-- In 1900 there was one post office for every 991 persons. In 1980 there was one post office for every 7,469 persons.

-- In 1810 Philadelphia produced 16 million "American segars".

--In 1870, 473 Americans recorded their occupation as "mule packer".

-- 1870 was the last year in which the census recorded that more total horsepower was provided by animals than by machines.

-- 1915 was the last year in which spending on fuel wood exceeded spending on oil and gas.

-- White women were not

asked their age until 1800, non-white women not until 1820.

-- In 1790 only 5.1 percent of all Americans lived in "urban places" with more than 2,500 inhabitants. There were only 24 such places in the nation. In 1980 there were more than 7,000 "urban places", and 73.7 percent of the population lived in them.

-- During World War II the Census Bureau predicted that the U.S. population would stop growing by 1980, peaking at 153 million.

-- In 1989 the Census Bureau predicted that the U.S. population would stop growing by 2038, peaking at 302 million.

Absentee voting is taking place right now. Please vote. Let's have Karen Henderson as our next County Treasurer.

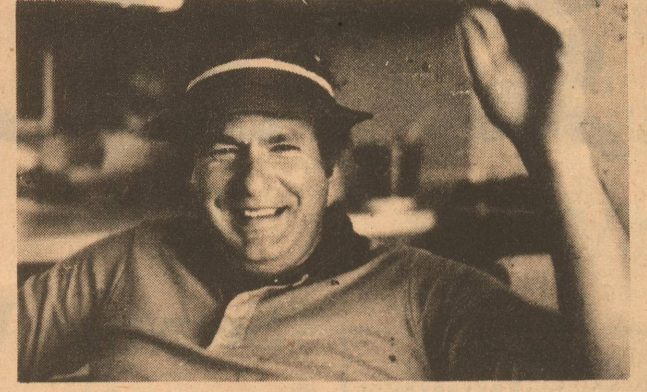

The great Pig War officially began on January 19, 1841, when Texas Secretary of State J.S. Mayfield received a steaming communique from Jean Dubois, Comte de Saligny, charge' d'affaires for the French Legation in Austin. Saligny charged that one of his men had suffered an unprovoked attack from a burly local named Bullock who owned Bullock's Inn next door to the Legation. Bullock, in turn, complained that the employees of the French Legation had "most maliciously and wantonly killed" his hogs. Saligny countered with an accusation of malicious and wanton behavior on the part of the pigs: they destroyed his fence, broke into his house, ate his bed linen, and ruined his papers. Memoranda flew and finally, on April 4, the Count de Saligny left in a snit, his case unresolved. The government of France reluctantly sustained his position, and for a short time, diplomatic relations between Texas and France were broken off because of the Pig War.

Taxpayers' Information Pamphlet Available From Appraisal Office

Ray Ballew, chief appraiser for the Schleicher County Appraisal District, offers area property owners a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" to help them save on their property taxes.

Published in both English and Spanish by the State Property Tax Board in Austin, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings. Ballew noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts (such as municipal utility, junior college, and hospital districts).

Homeowners may qualify for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on

residence homesteads, Ballew said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet lists and explains each exemption and how to apply for them.

For example, all school district homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. In addition, certain disabled homeowners and those aged 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 school exemption for the value of their homesteads.

"A school tax freeze, or ceiling, on the residence homestead is a benefit for a homeowner who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year," Ballew said.

"In other words, the homeowner's school taxes cannot in-

crease above the amount assessed in the year the homeowner first receives the over-65 homestead exemption. This tax ceiling stays in effect as long as the elderly homeowner owns the homestead and doesn't make an improvement or addition to the house, such as a pool or patio," Ballew continued.

New legislation provides an additional tax benefit for certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over-65 homeowner is at least 55 at the time of the older spouse's death, then he or she can retain the tax ceiling. Before this new legislation took effect, the younger surviving spouse would have lost the tax ceiling.

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that over-65 homeowners do not need to reapply

for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1989 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling must apply in 1990.

Homeowners are also eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption if the county levies a tax for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

Ballew added that any taxing unit may offer a local-option homestead exemption that allows a percentage of each residence homestead's appraised value to be exempt. In 1990, a taxing unit may exempt up to 20 percent of each qualified homestead's appraised value.

The pamphlet also describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, other disabled persons, and senior citizens.

Productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to owners of agricultural or timber land. It is available in two forms, generally referred to by its location in the Texas Constitution: "1-d" or agricultural-use appraisal and "1-d-1" or open-space land appraisal.

Landowners who wish their land to receive 1-d appraisal must apply each year. A signed, sworn application must be filed with the chief appraiser by April

30. However, owners of land receiving 1-d-1 appraisal do not need to reapply, unless the chief appraiser requests in writing that they do so.

Because the qualifications are less restrictive, many landowners choose to apply for 1-d-1. However, if the land's use is changed to a nonagricultural one, the period for recapturing lost taxes is longer than for 1-d appraisal.

"Appraisal district personnel can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax renditions, and exemptions," Ballew said. The information is also found in the "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" pamphlet.

He said the pamphlet also

contains information about preparing and presenting a protest to the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB is an appointed body that examines appraisal records and hears protests to ensure that property values are fair and uniform.

Another section deals with the procedures voters must follow to petition for an election to limit the amount of tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

"I urge all property owners in the Schleicher County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and avail themselves of all possible property tax relief," Ballew said. "Remember, all applications must be filed with the appraisal office by April 30, and protests must be filed by May 31."

Graveside services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in Eldorado Cemetery, directed by Kerbow Funeral Home.

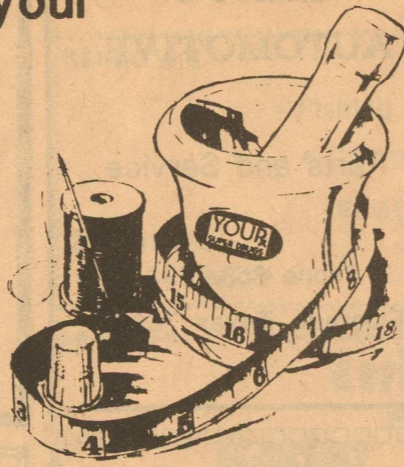
She was born September 18, 1904, in Tom Green County. She was a homemaker and member of the Methodist Church.

Hospital Toughens Credit/Collection Policy

In an effort to reduce Accounts Receivable and improve cash flow, Schleicher County Medical Center has revised its policy on collections. The gist of it is, money will be expected before the patient leaves.

OUTPATIENTS

Medicare: Payment of deductible and copayment amount will be expected at time of service. Hospital will accept assignment for the amount to be paid by Medicare. Hospital will file on one coinsurance for patient to be reimbursed.

Insurance and Self Pay:

Payment in full will be expected at time of service. Hospital will provide patient with bill which patient can use to get reimbursed from his insurance carrier. If the bill is over \$75, hospital will accept 50 percent or \$75, whichever is greater, and will accept assignment on primary insurance policy only, self pay patient will be asked to sign a note for the balance.

INPATIENTS

Medicare: Payment of deductible will be expected at time of admission. Hospital will accept assignment for amount to be paid by Medicare. Hospital will file on one coinsurance for patient to be reimbursed.

Insurance: Payment of deductible will be expected at time of admission, copayment amount will be expected at time of discharge. Hospital will accept assignment on primary insurance only.

Self Pay: Payment of \$100 deposit will be expected at time of admission, balance or note for term payments will be expected at time of discharge.

FOLLOW UP

Delinquent accounts will receive warning letters and/or a personal phone call and will be referred to a collection agency if satisfactory response is not received.

ment, is against gun control, is for a strong drug reform, and wants to promote Texas agriculture."

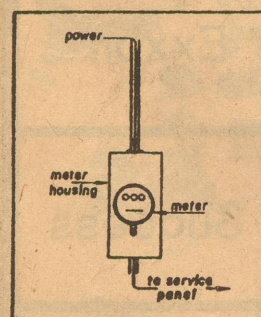

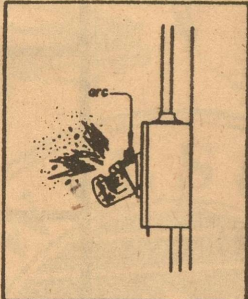

Cattle, Ranch Thefts Were Multi-Million Dollar Problem In 1989

The theft of livestock and ranch equipment in 1989 cost Texas and Oklahoma cattlemen and farmers millions of dollars, according to Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, a Fort Worth-based producer group that has fought the problem for more than a century.

In an annual report given to its members, TSCRA Secretary-General Manager Don C. King said in 1989 the association's 32 field inspectors, all certified peace officers with special Ranger commissions, developed 103 theft cases, primarily involving cattle thefts. Working closely with state and local law enforcement officers, the inspec-

tors recovered or accounted for 4,478 head of cattle and horses, 23 trailers, 216 saddles and miscellaneous ranch property valued at more than \$3.59 million, or \$9,841.68 per day.

"I cannot emphasize too strongly the important role that brand inspection in Texas played in resolving many of these cattle-related cases and the eventual recovery of these valuable animals for their owners," King said.

The cattle raisers group also employs approximately 82 brand inspectors who identify five to six million head of cattle at the time of their sale each year. They report their findings to the group's

Fort Worth headquarters, where the information is tabulated for computer retrieval.

The theft of livestock in Texas is a felony offense even for the theft of one animal. This is a serious offense, a prison offense, King said, and with the help of the court system we are sending a strong signal to thieves that this kind of behavior will not be tolerated.

The cases worked in 1989 by the TSCRA field inspectors and other law enforcement officers, when presented for prosecution, resulted in almost 430

years of prison, probated, suspended and deferred sentences for the offenders. The courts ordered those convicted to pay more than \$143,700 in restitution to the victims. Fines and court costs were assessed in the amount of \$23,866, King said.

King encouraged all cattlemen and owners of farm and ranch equipment to take steps to protect themselves from theft. He invited them to contact their local TSCRA field inspector or the Fort Worth office for theft prevention information and other details.

A Week In Washington, D.C.

Attending Presidential Classroom was more than just participating in seminars, touring Washington, and watching Capitol Hill Function first-hand. We listened to what everyone had to say and gave our opinions. We learned to support why we felt the way we did on an issue. It was seldom that we agreed, but everyone was always given a chance to speak.

Learning other viewpoints on issues was possibly the most beneficial experience I had in Washington. Given the chance to discuss key issues, we were able to pretend for a moment that we students were Washington.

What went on on Capitol Hill didn't seem quite so foreign. We realized that everyone couldn't get exactly what they wanted. We had to learn to compromise, and as the week went on, compromise became more and more a part of the "game".
 Every conversation that started gave me new insights. I had known exactly what I had wanted when the discussion had started, but by the end I wasn't quite as sure. I was so sure I knew, and then someone would propose something that if we mixed the two plans together, it would be even better.

Then a third person would come up with another way to improve the plan. By the time we were done, none of us were responsible. The more we tried to come to agreement, the more we realized that Washington is made up of more than just one person.
 Compromise was probably what made Washington more than just a place by the end of the week. The whole group of 391 students had gone to Washington thinking that they knew all the answers. When we got there we realized that none of the answer keys we had made were the same.
 I guess it made us think a little harder about how the government worked. Apparently getting something done about something wasn't quite as easy as we had originally thought. Maybe we had just a little more respect for those people whom we have elected to work for us up on Capitol Hill.
 The key to all I learned in Washington, D.C., is summed up in the simple statement: I learned of places and policies, but more importantly I learned of people and the coming together of their ideas -- our ideas!

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July 30 Is Deadline For TDA's 1990 Family Land Heritage Program

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said that July is the deadline for long-time Texas farm and ranch families who want to apply in 1990 for recognition by the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program.

Those farm and ranch families who are certified by TDA as maintaining their property in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more will be recognized at a ceremony in Austin on October 11.

"The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes much more than mere ownership of a piece of land," Hightower said. "It also helps to chronicle the uniquely personal histories of this state's agricultural pioneers -- a proud record which might otherwise be lost forever."

Since it was launched by TDA in 1974, over 2,400 properties throughout the state have been enrolled in the program. Fayette County has 87 farms and ranches certified by TDA as

meeting the qualifications of the program; Houston County has 72 certified properties; Austin County has 55 certified farms and ranches.

In addition to the ceremony in Austin, the recognized families will receive a certificate from TDA and a history of their property will be listed in the 1990 Family Land Heritage Registry.

Texas residents may apply for Family Land Heritage recognition if they can trace the line of ownership of their property since 1890 or longer and can show that the land has been in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more.

Application forms and additional information about the program are available from county judges, the chairs of County Historical Commissions, all TDA district offices, or by writing the Family Land Heritage Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.
