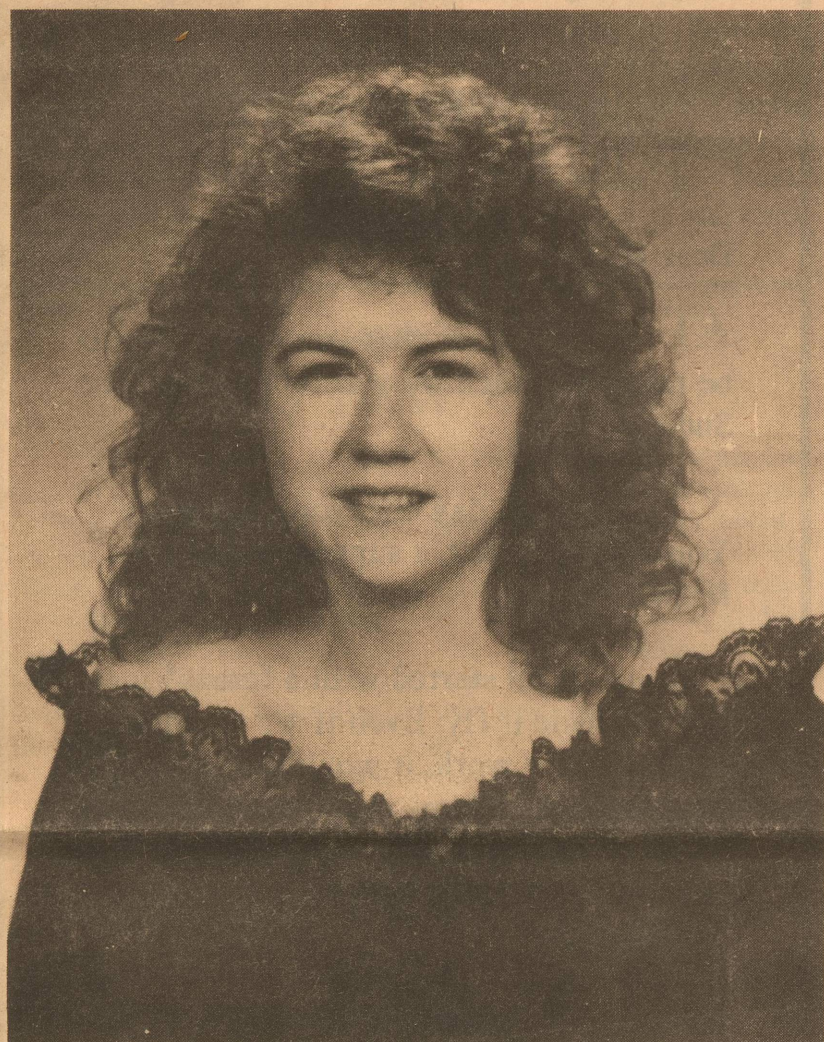

ceived include District band four years, Regional band four years and Area band two years. She also received the American Legion Award.

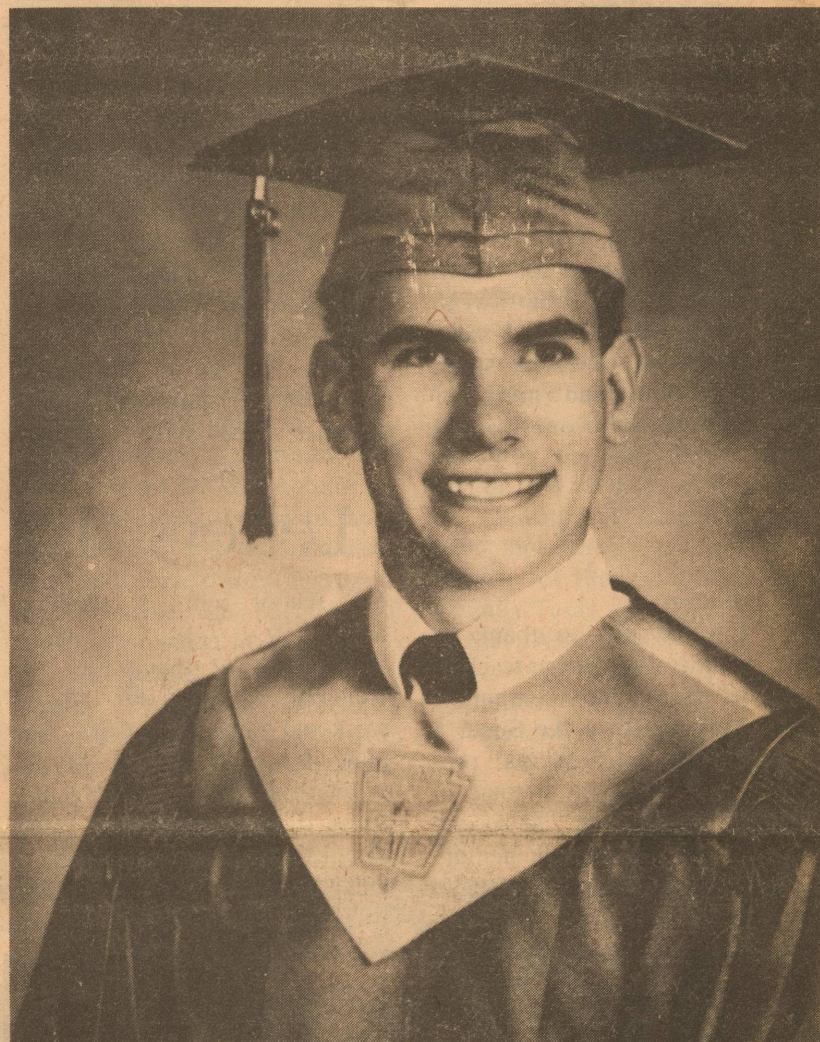
Laura's grade point average is 94.425. She plans to attend Abilene Christian University.

I have met many people, most of whom I consider my friends. Some became very special friends -- friends to share lives ups and downs with. You know who you are. There are many memories that I will always cherish.

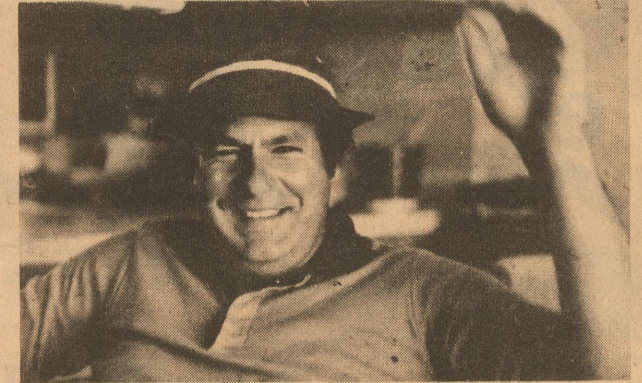
I have one more thank you. A very special lady always stood by me and gave me support. She is a special friend, a special person. Thanks, Evelyn Stigler, you are special.

Four years ago Maxine and I met a group of high school freshmen here in Eldorado. They were the youngest members of the High School of Religion at our church and we were going to be their teachers. Tomorrow night they will graduate, many will leave Eldorado, for school or the service and a few will stay, but they will no longer be in high school.

This is very hard for me to write because I want what I write to them to be special. I can't name everyone of them, space wouldn't allow, and much of what I would say to one I would

say to the others.

I want to tell them that I love each of them with the love that only God can give me to share with them. I know that some of them never felt that love, and to them I ask forgiveness for not having made Jesus so present to them that they could not have resisted his affection for them. A brother misses his sibling by feeling incomplete.

I wish them happiness, most especially the happiness that comes from knowing their God. I wish them peace, the peace that only comes from God. I know that God will grant them these and much more.

Pecan Nut Casebearer Spray Dates Predicted

The 1990 predicted spray date for the pecan nut casebearer is later than usual due to weather conditions.

The predicted spray dates for Schleicher County are May 26 - June 2. It looks like we could have a very low egg lay.

Spray materials to use to control the pecan nut casebearer are:

Dipel -- Two tablespoons

Malathion 50% EC -- Two and one-half teaspoons per one gallon of water.

Guthron 12% EC -- One and one-third tablespoon per one gallon of water.

Sevin 50% WP -- Two tablespoons per one gallon of water, per one gallon of water.

Diazinon 25% EC -- Two teaspoons per one gallon of water.

SCISD Board Meets For Regular Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on May 21 at 6 p.m. in the administration building.

The meeting was called to order by Phil McCormick, president, and the oath of office was administered to newly elected board members Chris McCravey, Phil McCormick, and Lynn Williams.

Officers were then elected with Phil McCormick retaining the position of president; Terry Green the position of vice president/secretary; Scott McGregor, Lynn Williams and Larry Blair, superintendent, elected as an adult committee and to review the monthly financial report. Tip Finley was appointed as a member and Terry Green as alternate to the TASB Legislative Committee.

Ray Lewis Ballew reported to the board that based on preliminary appraisal figures the

district may expect an approximate \$10 million increase in tax value.

Dr. Blair presented John Kotsch with a Certificate of Merit from the Concho valley Council of Governments for the outstanding job he has done in directing the summer youth employment program.

Bravo awards were presented to Melissa O'Harrow and John Callison for their voluntary time and efforts with the golf teams. The PTA was presented a Bravo award for coordinating the "Apples for Students" campaign so successfully, planting trees on the school grounds, supplying prizes for the Middle School Spring Fling, making slip covers for the Writing to Read Lab, furnishing cookies in the teacher's lounges, and providing active parenting classes.

The three campus principals presented a report on achievement tests, TEAMS scores, enrollment projections, and student handbooks for 1990-91. It was

pointed out that student handbooks are being disseminated early this year in order that parents making clothing purchases over the summer may take into account the dress code.

TEAMS scaled scores for all students were presented as follows:

Third Grade -- Math, SCISD Ave. 827, Less Sp. Ed. 848, State-wide Ave. 849; Reading, 806 SCISD Ave., Less Sp. Ed. 832, State-wide Ave. 815; Writing, 808 SCISD Ave., Less Sp. Ed. 835, State-wide Ave. 779.

Fifth Grade -- Math, SCISD Ave. 888, Less Sp. Ed. 889, State-wide Ave. 823; Reading, SCISD Ave. 826, Less Sp. Ed. 824, State-wide Ave. 803; Writing, SCISD Ave. 853, Less Sp. Ed. 853, State-wide Ave. 785.

Seventh Grade -- Math, SCISD Ave. 853, Less Sp. Ed. 865, State-wide Ave. 835; Reading, SCISD Ave. 825, Less Sp. Ed. 834, State-wide Ave. 802; Writing, SCISD Ave. 834, Less Sp. Ed. 848, State-wide Ave. 792.

Ninth Grade -- Math, SCISD Ave. 829, Less Sp. Ed. 838, State-wide Ave. 801; Reading, SCISD Ave. 832, Less Sp. Ed. 845, State-wide Ave. 796; Writing, SCISD Ave. 754, Less Sp. Ed. 758, State-wide Ave. 750.

Projected enrollments totaling 759 students for 1990-91 school year are as follows: PK 20, K 55, 1st 62, 2nd 53, 3rd 60, 4th 59, 5th 59, 6th 51, 7th 56, 8th 81, 9th 57, 10th 61, 11th 49, and 12th 36.

Because some of the carpeting in the elementary is wearing out prematurely, the district has been working with the contractor to correct the problem. Dr. Blair informed the board that since its last meeting, documents have been signed to resolve the issue. The district has received a check for \$5,637.77 from Mark Burk Construction. Also, he has released to the district a CD for

\$4,362.23 which he had held pending settlement with the carpet manufacturer, thus meeting the agreed upon \$10,000 settlement.

Terry and Carrol Green and Dr. Blair attended the National School board Association Convention in New Orleans, April 20-24. They reported that schools all over America have issues facing them similar to our local concerns; the value of the convention, they felt, was in seeing the different solutions utilized in other school systems across the nation.

Superintendent Blair reminded board members that each new board member must complete 20 hours of initial training, and returning members must complete six hours of training annually. Several opportunities for such training were discussed.

This year SCISD Board adopted a plan for providing its own workers' compensation. The cost to the district this year to date has been approximately \$5,900 as a result of Mildred Phillips' accident. If there are no other claims, the district's net savings over projected workers' compensation insurance premium costs will be \$21,000.

Blair reported that because of pending legislation funding is so uncertain that budgetary decisions will have to be postponed until later in the summer. He also reported that two worn-out buses were sold at auction in Abilene on May 4 for \$4,000.

Judy Blair reported that the district has developed a plan for the participation, design, and selection process for a state-mandated gifted/talented program. At all grade levels K-12, beginning in the fall of 1990. The district is now in the process of identifying new students for the program. Parents will be notified by mail if their child has been selected to participate in the program. Questions concerning the program should be directed to Mrs. Blair at the Middle School office.

Superintendent Blair further discussed with the board enlarging the restroom facilities at the football field; moving the June board meeting to the 18th, and appointing a screening committee made up of teachers, administrators, and board members to aide in selecting an elementary principal.

In action items, the board accepted a low bid of \$10,267 from A/V Texas for a wireless language lab to use in teaching foreign language classes in the high school. They also accepted the low bid of \$33,836 from Southwest Track Builders for resurfacing the track and a low bid

of \$87,368.46 from South Texas Insulation, San Antonio, for asbestos abatement in the auditorium, the gym, the boiler room, and the ceiling of the old gym. All of these projects are contingent upon the successful passage of a school finance plan by the Texas Legislature.

Board members approved participation by the district in the region education service center program for the 1990-91 school year and approved student handbooks for the 1990-91 school year. Also, to bring the wording in line with current legal requirements, the board adopted the Texas Association of School Board's policy update concerning make-up work after unexcused absences-suspensions. The new policy stipulates that the highest grade for satisfactory make-up work shall be a grade of 75.

The financial report and budget amendments for the month of April were approved, and Dr. Blair was appointed to the Education Service Center's Region Advisory Committee. Finally, Blair shared Lori Dykstra's letter of resignation, and thank you notes from the Bill Hodges family and from Betty Creel.

A special meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Thursday, May 17, at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall with all councilmen in attendance with the exception of John Nikolauk and Roger Powell. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Preston. Also present was Debbie Ballew, councilwoman-elect.

DAVID TODD (TODD ENGINEERING):

David Todd met with the council to discuss criteria for pastureland irrigation vs. farmland irrigation which includes monitoring of fluids irrigated, containment of tailwater, purchase or lease with five year minimum with full control of water. He advised that the council not pursue condemnation due to time period involved. Property values were discussed. John Callison reported that the Railroad ROW was available for purchase above the sewer plant and that he had discussed possibilities of leasing pastureland from Charles Kellogg who owns property north of the wastewater plant. The secretary reported on ROW tracts available as well as assessed value of the Railroad ROW property.

Contract for Engineering Services for the 1989 TCDP Project was presented with discussion held concerning different types of elevated water storage tanks and explanation given by Todd of the requirements of Texas Department of Health. Execution of the contract was tabled.

MARY AND JOE CHARLES CHRISTIAN:

Joe M. Christian was unable to attend the meeting due to illness; therefore, his wife, Mary, and son, Joe Charles, met with the council to discuss possibility of the City leasing the 52-acre sewer farm owned by the Christian family. The meeting with the council was recorded for Mr. Christian's information. Questions were answered by the council and Mr. Dean regarding standards required by the Texas Water Commission and plans for the future, including the City's options. Control of the watering rights was discussed and the secretary was asked to contact Tom Giovannitti to draft lease to include the upkeep of equipment, piping, fence, roadway, etc. Lease consideration was discussed with no agreement reached. Upon receipt of the draft, the secretary was instructed to send copy to Joe Charles Christian and to Mrs. Christian.

Oath of Office was administered to newly elected councilpersons John M. Callison, Dora Bosmans and Debbie Ballew. Discussion was held concerning election of Mayor Pro Tem for the upcoming one-year period. Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans that John Nikolauk continue in that capacity. Motion carried.

OATH OF OFFICE/ELECTION OF MAYOR PRO TEM:

Due to Mayor Preston's need to leave for work and the absence of the Mayor Pro Tem, Mayor Preston appointed Barbara Jackson to fill the position for the remainder of the meeting.

Bills received since the last meeting were reviewed and motion was made by John Callison that they be paid as presented. Motion was seconded by Dora Bosmans. Motion carried.

WASTEWATER PLANT UPDATE:

David Todd continued explanation of problems with the wastewater plant and recent break in wall of Stabilization Pond #2. He proposed application for TDOPC Urgent/Emergency Need grant to install 30 ml. polyethylene liner at a cost of approximately 50-75 cents per square foot for a total cost of approximately \$100,000. He pointed out that the plant contained too much fluid at the pre-

sent with an inability to discharge or irrigate due to wastewater quality compliance problems. The problems with lost clay liner were discussed. He stated that he needed application papers completed as well as letter from the Texas Water Commission to pursue the 100 percent grant funds. Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans that Todd Engineering and Gary Traylor and Associates pursue the emergency grant funds. Motion carried.

Jack Dean reported that aeration of the pond was improving test results but that test results were still out of compliance. He circulated pictures of the plant which showed problem break area.

GAS AT AIRPORT:

Request previously aired to move gas meter from golf Club Shop to new County Airport Building was reviewed. After discussion, motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the City cap the Golf Club Shop line and reconnect the new Airport Building. Motion carried. (NOTE: No billing is prepared to County for

either water or gas billing at this facility.)

ENGINEERING CONTRACT - 1989 TCDP:

After brief discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans that Engineering Contract be approved. Motion carried. It was noted that further word had not been received from TDOC on 1987 Project Amendment.

SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE:

Pictures taken by Superintendent Dean were circulated to the Council members showing cover on landfill.

Discussion was held concerning Steven Santellano's certification by State as "D" Wastewater Operator. His certificate was received several days previous to the meeting. After discussion, motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Debbie Ballew that Mr. Santellano receive .38 cents per hour merit increase. Motion carried.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at approximately 10:30 p.m.

SCMS To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at

this early stage has a 90 to 97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Saturday, June 16. The mobile unit will be at Schleicher County Medical Center in Eldorado.
