## Jerry Kidd Selected Member of Tall Program

Jerry Kidd of Christoval has been selected as a member of the new Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership program. Dr. L.S. Pope, who coordinates the program for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that "TALL" is designed to improve the leadership skills of young agriculturalists from across the state.

"TALL provides a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to build leadership potential in young men and women in the 25-40 year age range," Pope said. "We must recognize that agriculture is changing and that leaders of tomorrow will face different challenges from today. They must understand the complex nature of society and be aware of a broad range of issues facing agriculture."

The two-year program includes nine sessions within the state, plus trips to California, Washington, D.C., and an out-of-the-country experience. Members are selected after a rigorous examination and interview process and must have shown unusual leadership potential to qualify. Sessions last three days to one week and touch on the major issues facing agriculture and the food and fiber industry.

A native of the hill country, Kidd and his wife Lisa, have two children. They are engaged in ranching in Tom Green, Menard and Schleicher Counties, and live near Christoval on the Horseshoe Nail Ranch. The Kidds are managing partners of the ranch with his aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Green of San Angelo. They are primarily involved with registered Simmental and Simbrah cattle and commercial angora goats.

Kidd, a graduate of Texas A&M, served as a County Agricultural Extension Agent in Hidalgo and Tom Green Counties from 1974 to 1983. Currently he is serving on the Texas Simmental Simbrah Board of Directors, and one of three junior advisors to the Texas Junior Simmental Simbrah Association. He is active in several area livestock shows serving as a judge as well as working on various committees. He presently is the San Angelo Stock Show Simmental superintendent and member of the West Texas Fair heifer show. He is also a member of the Texas Farm Bureau and Schleicher County Soil & Water District.

## Payment For Social Security Representation

Persons dealing with the Social Security Administration (SSA) do not have to be represented by an attorney or anyone else; however, some people feel more comfortable if they are represented.

The representative may be an attorney or any other qualified person and may be entitled to a fee even if the claim is denied; however, any fee charged must be approved by SSA. Even a contract between the claimant and his or her representative for payment of a specified fee is not binding.

Any fee due the representative is usually paid from money due the claimant when a claim is approved. If this amount is insufficient to cover the fee, the claimant is responsible for paying the balance.

Representatives use a special form to file for a fee. If he or she is an attorney and wishes to collect the fee from money due the claimant, the form must be filed within 60 days of the date of notification that the claim was approved. The claimant is sent a copy of the form and has an opportunity to comment on any of the representative's statements before a fee is set.

The claimant is notified by SSA of the amount of the fee due the representative. If either the claimant or the representative is dissatisfied with the amount set by SSA, he or she may request a review. The request must be in writing and made within 30 days of the date of the notice. The review is conducted by someone who did not participate in the original decision and is final.

I was one of those kids, when tested that always did well with that part of the aptitude test where they give you a flat

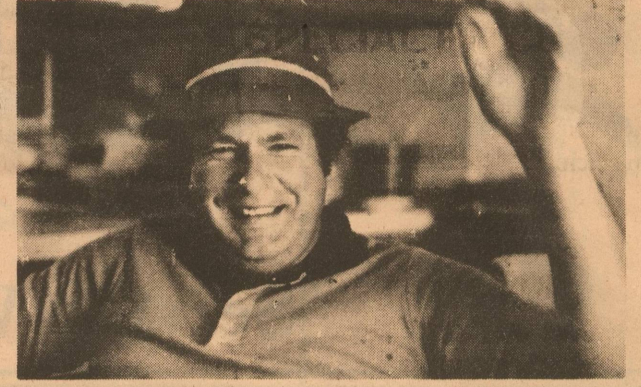
view of something and ask you what it would be when folded along the dotted lines.

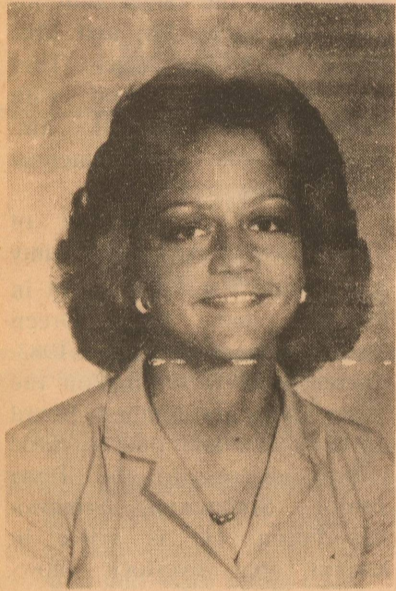

Leukemia Linked to Preconception Radiation: A pregnant woman who receives abdominal radiation risks leukemia in her child, but two new studies suggest that a father's exposure to radiation before conception also could be dangerous.

Investigators in England and China reported that the child's risk for leukemia may be even greater when the father has been exposed. It is thought the radiation causes mutations in the sperm cells that may predispose the child to the cancer.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$60.00. A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

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# SONY Student Project Abroad Program

Two Texas high school students have been chosen to represent the state in the "SONY Student Project Abroad Program." Sponsored by the SONY Corporation of America as part of its 30-year anniversary commemoration, the program is designed to give the students selected a better understanding of the Japanese culture and high-tech industry. Students will receive a 15-day all expense paid trip to Japan in July as part of the program.

Ellen Gayle Patterson

from Alamo Heights High School in the Alamo Heights Independent School District and K. Michelle Davis from Longview High School in the Longview ISD were named as the two winners for the program. Keal Wood from Boswell High School in the Eagle Mountain-Saginaw ISD and Susan Emmons of Hereford High School in the Hereford ISD were also selected as first and second alternate, respectively.

The students were selected by Texas Education Agency staff members, from a group of

over 130 applicants, on the basis of their academic records in science and technology, community leadership, teacher recommendations, and an essay explaining why they would like to participate in the program. The two Texas students will be part of a group of 48 students participating in the program; two from each of the 24 states in and engineering site in Japan. The trip will also include group guided tours to major cultural and historical areas of interest in the cities of Tokyo and Kyoto, as

well as a three to four-day stay with a Japanese family. At the conclusion of the trip, the students will be required to brief SONY executives on what they learned from the experience, which SONY of America employees people or has a significant presence.

The comprehensive itinerary for the 15-day trip is designed to encourage young students with a demonstrated interest in science, mathematics, and technology, by placing emphasis on group and individual visits to corporate manufacturing

## Breast Cancer Detection Unit

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, which services Eldorado, received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a

peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant

which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast Cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope of survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast

exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

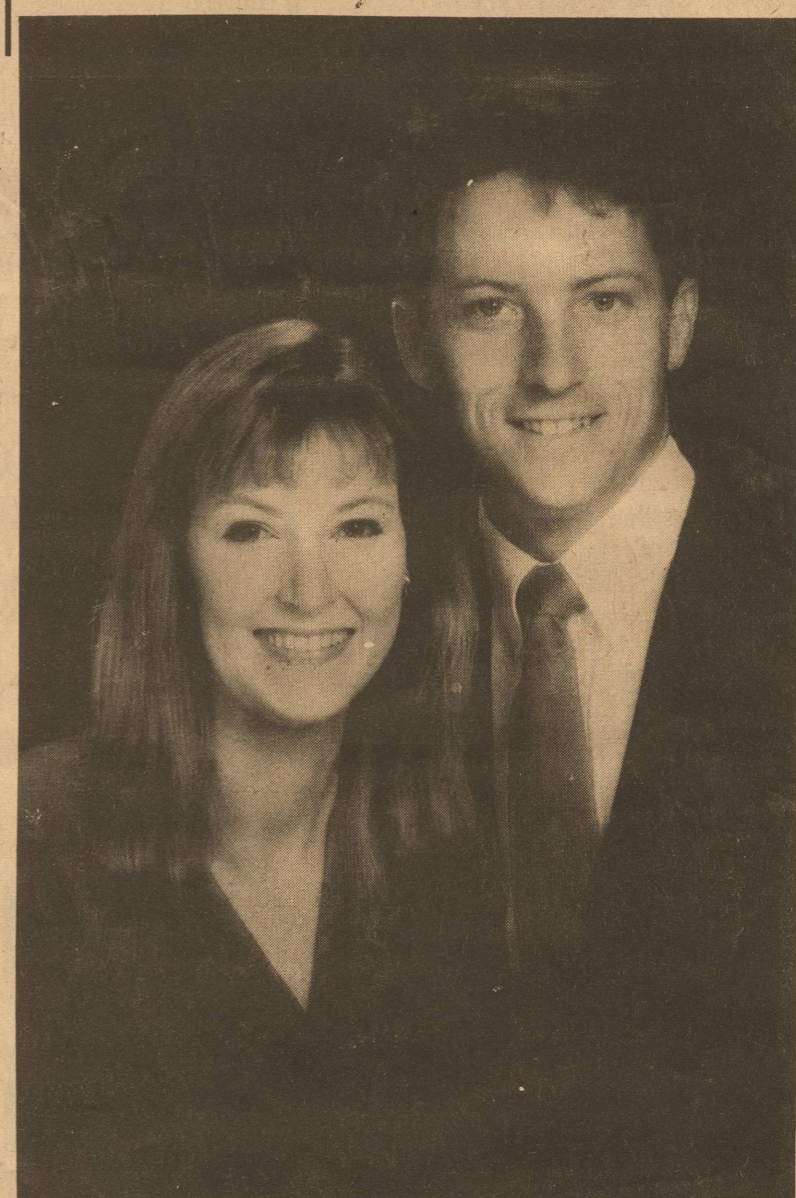
\* A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

\* A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

\* An annual mammogram from age 50.

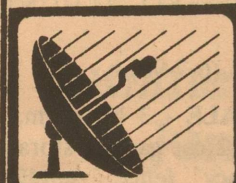

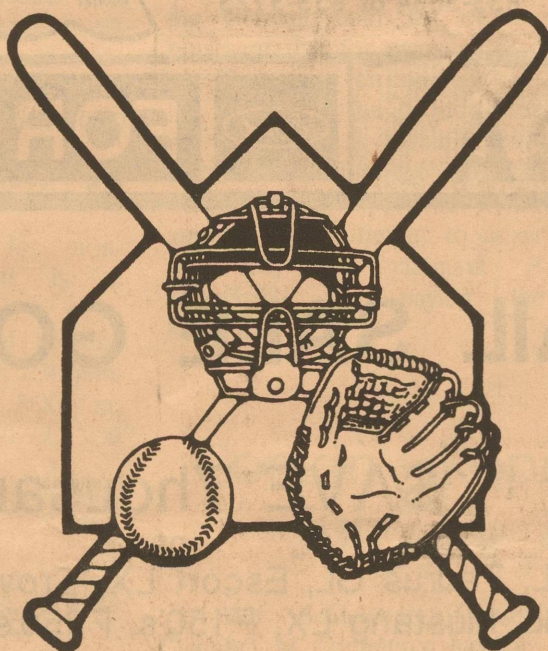

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
