upon nightwatch and ordinance enforcement services since
January, 1989. No response has January, 1989. No response has the letter. It was the unanimous decision that another letter be drafted but directed to the Commissioners' Court stating that the July payment would be held due to Sheriff Norris' failure to respond as requested.

Mr. Dean reported that a customer had requested services in Block 42, O.T. for water, gas and sewer services. All tap fees had been paid as well as
deposits. The water and gas deposits. The water and gas however, the sewer service was approximately $200^{\prime}$ away which would require digging in the alley to connect. The City's Utility Ordinance has provided for $100^{\circ}$ extension by the City with the customer to provide anything in excess of the $100^{\circ}$. Mr. Dean asked the Council to consider the City extending the line the additional $100^{\circ}$. After discussion, the request was denied due to a
variance from the established policy; however, discussion was held and the Council emphasized the need for the plumber making the estension to provide sufficient bonding to protect the City and adjacent property owners from damages which might occur. This customer will need private sewer lift pump.

bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Beil and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant and identified as Cause No. 4 Coutt of Travis County, Texas.
Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT\&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976 , and February, 1987. of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/ 800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of $\$ 4.53$ to $\$ 5.95$ per WATS/ $/ 800$ service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification.
The refunds will also include interest at the rate of $7.80 \%$ per annum
