Mankin Attends Republican Party Convention

The Republican Party of Texas met in convention at the Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth, Texas this past weekend. Among the estimated 10,000 delegates and alternates attending was the Schleicher County Delegation led by Randy Mankin, Schleicher County Republican Chairman.

Republican Gubernatorial Candidate, Clayton Williams addressed the Convention Saturday afternoon. Williams charmed the standing room only crowd with his down home wit and conservative philosophy. Williams was interrupted by several standing ovations and a five minute flag waving procession of supporters.

In his speech Williams pledged to lead the party to victory in November and answered his critics claims that Texas couldn't ride horseback into the 21st Century by saying "You can --- If you're riding a good horse!"

United States Senator Phil Gramm also spoke to the crowd and encouraged them to work hard for the election of all Republican candidates. Reminding the delegates of the falling of the Berlin Wall and the failure of communism across eastern Europe, Gramm asked the delegates to take the message to the voters that with strong conservative leadership America can show the way through the 1990s and into the next century.

Contacted for comment, Randy Mankin expressed his pleasure with the proceedings "I am proud of the Republicans of Schleicher County for standing up for their principles and voting in the Republican Primary. By doing so, those concerned citizens made it possible for us to hold our Precinct and County Conventions which in turn allowed us to bring a delegation to this State Convention."

"All citizens of Schleicher County should take pride in the fact that some of the resolutions adopted into the State Party Platform can trace their roots back to Schleicher County where they were adopted at our Precinct and County Conventions," Mankin Continued. "In partic-

ular, the plank in the State Platform opposing abortion was submitted to the State Convention from Schleicher County. Another plank calling for passage of a constitutional amendment granting the President with the Power of the Line Item Veto was a product of our County Convention."

"I hope every voter in the county will take a long look at our candidates and listen to their views o the issues. From State Representative Harvey Hilderbran to Clayton Williams, from Railroad Commissioner candidate Beau Boulter and State Treasurer candidate Kay Bailey Hutchison to U.S. Senator Phil Gramm, I think the Republicans offer the best hope for the future," Mankin stated.


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Sales Tax Increased July 1

Meador Appointed to Selective Service System Local Board

Edward F. Meador of Texas, has just completed the initial training program for newly appointed Selective Service System Local Board members. Meador was recommended for this position by Governor William P. Clements and appointed in the name of the President.

Although Selective Service System boards are in an inactive status, they would be responsible for deciding claims for certain classifications such as conscientious objection, hardship, and religious ministry should a draft be reinstituted in time of national emergency by the Congress and the President.

Meador's initial training consisted of 12 hours of instruction over a 2-day period focusing on an intensive orientation to the Selection Service System, the major duties and responsibilities of Local Board members, and procedures to be followed by the Local Board.

He will receive continued training in changes in the law. regulations, responsibilities, and related agency policies and procedures.

This training ensures that the young men of Schleicher County who are registered with Selective Service and accept this responsibility of citizenship receive a fair and effective classification process by trained and objective individuals should the need for such a system arise.

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Test Children For Attention Disorder

School children having learning or behavior problems may have an attention disorder, says the Texas Medical Association, and summer is a good time to pursue testing.

"Children aren't bad or lazy," says TMA member Carol K. Daniel, M.D., director of child development and genetics at Scott and White Hospital in Temple. Usually a cause exists when children have trouble in school, she says.

One reason may be attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder, a condition that may affect from 6,000 to 600,000 Texas children between 5 and 18 years of age. Actually, the disorder occurs in much younger children, but it usually is not detected until children are in structured group settings such as school

The disorder, which may originate in the brain, primarily is a problem of inattention--a child has difficulty focusing on a mental task such as reading or math. In such situations, the child becomes hyperactive and begins fidgeting or squirming and has trouble staying seated.

Some children have the disorder without hyperactivity, however. These children tend to appear more anxious, withdrawn, sluggish and drowsy.

Other behavioral symptoms of ADHD include being easily distracted by outside stimuli, having difficulty waiting a turn, blurting out an answer before the question is finished, and having trouble following instructions and listening to what is being said. Symptoms also include shifting from one unfinished task to another, talking excessively, having difficulty playing quietly, interrupting others often, losing things, and engaging in physically dangerous activities like running in the street without thinking of what might happen.

While more severe cases often are diagnosed early, milder cases may require "real detective work" and may not be diagnosed until middle school. If a problem is suspected, parents and teachers should talk to a school nurse or counselor and a physician,

Because children with ADHD are inattentive and impulsive, they may develop negative behavior patterns, as well as

emotional problems. A physician can recommend a psychologist to help parents learn more effective behavior management techniques and receive individual or family counseling. They also may suggest a support group of other parents of children with ADHD.

Studies have shown that ADHD children are at an increased risk for school failure, behavior problems, and alcoholism and substance abuse. However, with early diagnosis and treatment, many of these problems can be prevented or lessened.

What You Can Do About Them

First it's tree pollen.
Then grass pollen. Then ragweed.
What it all adds up to is sneezing, itching and congestion for a lot of people. And, in temperate climates, people can experience allergy-irritating substances almost year-round.

"In some areas, seasons run together. For people in such areas, there are relatively few times in which some pollen count or another is not high," said Dr. David P. Huston, associate professor of medicine and of microbiology and immunology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In a temperate area, Huston said, tree pollens start heavily in March and are succeeded in the coming months by a series of other pollens. January and February can be relatively irritant-free for many areas.

According to Huston, people who suffer from seasonal allergies are not helped by the air pollution that plagues metropolitan areas.

"The air pollution present in many cities is an added burden to allergy sufferers," Huston said. "It is unlikely they would be allergic to any of the chemicals in the air; however, the chemicals and smoke can definitely aggravate their symptoms."

Another group of people who suffer from allergies linked to temperate climate are those afflicted with perennial allergies.

"These are the people allergic to things which, unlike a specific pollen, are present in their environments year-round," Huston said.

Topping this list of irritants are pets, dust-borne contaminants and molds.

Many people are allergic to the dander of animals they keep in their homes, Huston said.

Others have what is commonly called a dust allergy, but is in fact a reaction to contaminants found in dust. Roaches and mites contribute heavily to this.

Molds are also common causes of allergic reactions, Huston said. Air conditioning systems and air ducts frequently harbor these allergy villains.

What to do?

"Avoidance is clearly the best of all alternatives," Huston said, "but we have to be realistic. Avoidance is not always poss-

Over-the-counter relief is available for allergies that cause runny noses, itchy eyes and congestion, he said. Most commonly used are antihistamines, but they can cause drowsiness.

Prescription drugs, including new antihistamines that do not cause drowsiness, are also available through physicians.

"Allergy shots are not necessarily the first line of therapy," Huston said. "The shots do help some people, but they should be reserved for patients whose allergy symptoms cannot be adequately controlled through other means."

Huston said aflergies and allergy-like reactions can be the result of conditions other than pollens and perennial irritants. Foods, for example, can be a source of aflergies, and some dyes and other substances can cause affergic-like reactions.

Careful screening by allergists can help patients pinpoint the causes of their suffering. Once that is accomplished, the right form of therapy can be recommended.
