Elementary/Middle School Honored

Congratulations are in order for the Eldorado Elementary and Eldorado Middle School campuses. Each of those campuses has been selected to apply for awards and recognition by the Governor's Educational Excellence Committee. Campuses across Texas were selected based on either gains in performance on the TEAMS test, or in consistently high performance on the TEAMS test over the past three years. The two SCISD campuses were selected to apply for the exemplary performance awards because they exceeded the criteria set by the Governor's Committee.

Schools that scored at least 10% above the statewide average for each of the last three years on the TEAMS test were eligible for selection. The elementary was on of 279

elementaries throughout the state meeting or exceeding the criteria. The middle school was one of 131 such campuses.

This is the first year for the program. Next year the selection criteria will change. One reason for the change will be the state-mandated addition of the TAAS test and the elimination of the TEAMS test. Test scores are predicted to fall significantly throughout the state since the TAAS test involves more higher level thinking skills than did the TEAMS test. The previous test only involved the assessment of basic skills.

SCISD is honored to have the recognition. It didn't happen by accident nor did it happen without a great deal of

effort and support. Each of the campuses is working extra hard this year to once again earn exemplary status. The test will be

harder, but with continued support from all concerned the tradition of excellence will be carried forward.

The Eldorado Eagles scored their first home game of the year last Friday night and scored three times in the first half to claim a victory over Menard. Both teams were scoreless the second half of the game and the final tally ended 19-0.

Eldorado elected to receive the ball and Ramiro Barajas had a good return to the Eldorado 49 yard line. On

Eldorado's third play of the game, Clifton Brown took the hand-off from Cy Griffin to the offensive right side, then cut back to his left and 44 yards later scored the first touchdown of the game. The extra point attempt was no good.

In the second quarter, Eldorado faced a fourth and five situation on Menard's 35 yard line. Cy Griffin rolled right and passed the ball to Fito Gonzalez

for a fourteen yard gain and a first down. This ended up being an important play in the drive, because the Eagles scored from six yards out by Justin Paxton in this same drive. The two point attempt was no good and the score stood at 12-0.

The Eldorado defense, which has played well this season, kept Menard's offense under control in the first half. It also set up Eldorado's final touchdown of the night. A fumble recovery by Justin Edmiston allowed the offensive to score late in the second quarter. Cy Griffin dropped back and found Ramiro Barajas down the right sideline for a 26 yard touchdown reception. The extra point was good by Justin Paxton.

During the game interceptions were made by Cy Griffin and Ramiro Barajas. Fumbles were caused by Fito Gonzalez and Chris Meador. Fumble recoveries were made by Cy Griffin, Justin Paxton and Justin Edmiston.

"We played a good first half and went ahead 19-0. Being ahead by this much, our intensity dropped somewhat and consequently, we did not play as well the second half," replied Head Coach Doug Kuhlmann.

"We are improving each week as a football team and it will be our ability to keep improving each week, which will determine our success in future games.

"I am very proud of the athletes attitude and the hard work of all the football coaches during the year," added Kuhlmann.

The Eagle football team would like to thank all of the businesses who bought ads for the football poster and the Success newspaper for donating their time and money to print the posters.

This week the Eagles will host the Irion County Hornets at 8:00 for Homecoming. Irion County has good size and supports a 1-1 record.

County Agents Report

PESTS AND PESTICIDES

Agricultural chemicals are so vital that eliminating them would mean a 40% drop in the world food supply. This is enough food to feed two billion people, more than the combined populations of China and India.

Even with the use of agrichemicals, insects world-wide still destroy enough stored grain to feed half the population of Africa.

Insects and the diseases they carry have killed more people than all the wars in history.

To develop a new crop protection chemical, researchers need between seven and 10 years and must invest some \$35 million. This does not include cost of a manufacturing plant. Majority of the costs are for tests to assure that the new compound is safe for the environment.

Today's pesticides are: * Less persistent in the environment. * More effective in smaller

quantities. * Applied with greater knowledge of and concern for the risks, and * More strictly regulated by federal and state laws.

There are numerous uses for pesticides which are frequently overlooked. Hospitals and doctor's offices are kept germ-free with pesticides. They also keep restaurant and school kitchens free of insects and rodents. We depend on pesticides to free our homes of termites, roaches and rodents. Special collars protect our pets from fleas and ticks and garden chemicals help us grow healthy vegetables, flowers and lawns.

The American pioneer planted four kernels of corn for every plant he hoped to harvest: "One for the maggot/one for the crow/one for the cutworm/and one to grow."

million people a year and killing 800,000 - most of them children under five.

River blindness carried by a black fly afflicts a million Africans yearly, leaving 700,000 of them blind. The tsetse fly, carrier of sleeping sickness, has taken over in 25% of Africa.

Insects on the continent of Africa destroy between 25% and 75% of the country's crops.

One locust swarm observed in eastern Africa was 100 feet deep along a mile-wide front, blackened the sky like a giant cloud and took nine hours to pass by.

America has the best food protection system in the world. The Food and Drug Administration, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the Department of Agriculture all play a vital role in ensuring that American consumers have plentiful, quality foods. Pesticides, which protect

crops against harmful insects and diseases, are a vital component of the best food production system in the world today.

BENEFITS OF PESTICIDES

Pesticides are the least understood and most controversial chemicals in use in our society. Their value is questioned by many people, who perceive them as unsafe and unnecessary chemicals.

Farm chemicals protect crops from insects, weeds and diseases. Without crop protection, food prices would jump 40 to 75 percent, according to university studies. Shortages, lower quality would be common.

Without pest control services, over 50 percent of our food crops would be destroyed each year.

Crop protection chemicals contribute more than 40 percent to the GNP, such as the agriculture, food services, home construction, and hotel and motel

industries.

Without pesticides trillions of dollars of construction would be in jeopardy by termites. Rodent damage would soar beyond \$1 billion in damage to property and health losses already experienced.

Insects transmit 15 major diseases.

We have the best health protection from pests among all nations, the least percentage of property damage, and the lowest post-crop food losses in the world.

The quality, quantity and variety of foods we enjoy today contribute to longevity. Since 1900, the average life span of a child born in the United States has increased from 47.3 years to 74.7 years, according to the National Center for Health Statistics.

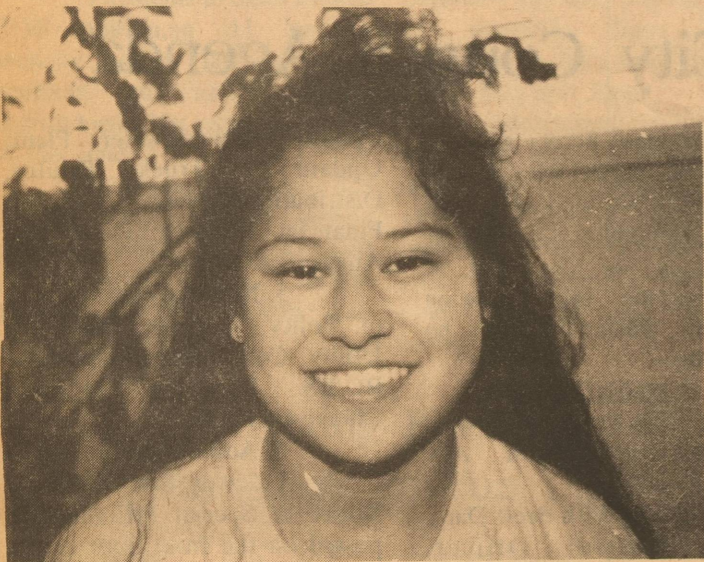

SCISD Board Minutes

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on September 10, 1990, at 6:00 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Several individuals addressed the board. Cindy Stevenson brought to the attention of the board the worn condition of the uniforms and sweat suits for middle school girls athletics.

Elementary principal Harold Steele updated the Board on current programs and plans for the elementary campus. He discussed the morning program done by the 4th graders over the public address system, the Super S program for obtaining Apple Computers, the PTA fund raiser,

the elementary's participation in E-Day, the Veteran's Day program, the plans for the Christmas program, and the Running club and physical education demonstration. Mr. Steele noted that elementary students are being encouraged to read through two reading programs: the Book-It program, teachers set reading goals for their classes and students meeting their goal get certificates for free personal pan pizzas. The Bluebonnet program involves students reading at least 5 books from a list of 22 books nominated by the Texas Library Association. In February, students will be asked to vote for their favorite book from the

Bluebonnet list. The votes are tabulated across the state and the winner receives an award from the Texas Library Association. Books read for the Bluebonnet program will count towards the student's goals in the Book-It program. Mr. Steel also explained that because of curriculum changes made by Senate Bill 1, grading procedures will need to

change. He and the elementary teachers are presently working on a new report card format that will better reflect the curriculum.

Ray Ballew reported on tax collections, noting that three parcels are going to sale due to delinquent taxes, three delinquent tax payers have signed payout agreements, and two have paid delinquent taxes.

Under information items, Dr. Blair reported to the Board that enrollment figures were up 26 students when comparing the first day of school this year to the first day of school in 1989. At present there are 310 students in elementary, 243 in middle school and 200 in high school for a total of 753 students.

According to Blair, Southwest Track Builder, Inc. is in the process of correcting the problems associated with the track renovation; however, the asbestos abatement has gone into the liquidated damages phase and the job is still not complete. The district has contacted an attorney in preparation for a more extensive legal battle. The abatement work itself is adequate; however, the insulation work does not meet specifications for color, consistency, uniformity, or workmanship. Board members voted to withhold payment until the job is done satisfactorily.

After members discussed travel plans for the TASB/TASA Convention in Houston September 21-24, they were informed that federal grant funds are available for the establishment of Head Start programs in counties not currently serving preschool children. Competitive

applications are due the last week of September. In Senate Bill 1 a provision exists whereby early childhood education providers outside the public school can coordinate services with the school for disadvantaged three and four year olds.

Other items of discussion included the giving of complimentary passes for athletic events, the need for repair of the transmission on the district's blue suburban, and the possible development of a policy for dealing with fund raisers.

Members voted to pay bus drivers \$3.80/hour waiting time up to a maximum of 8 hours if the driver was not otherwise employed by the district.

Other action taken by the Board included designating \$100,000 of the fund balance as reserved for Worker's Compensation costs. Also, a transportation contract with the Gilstraps was approved.

A bid of \$18,981 for DDM for 19 computers was accepted, and the financial report and budget amendments for the month of August were approved.

In final action, the Board approved the employment of a half-time aide to help with large pre-kindergarten class.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:08 p.m.

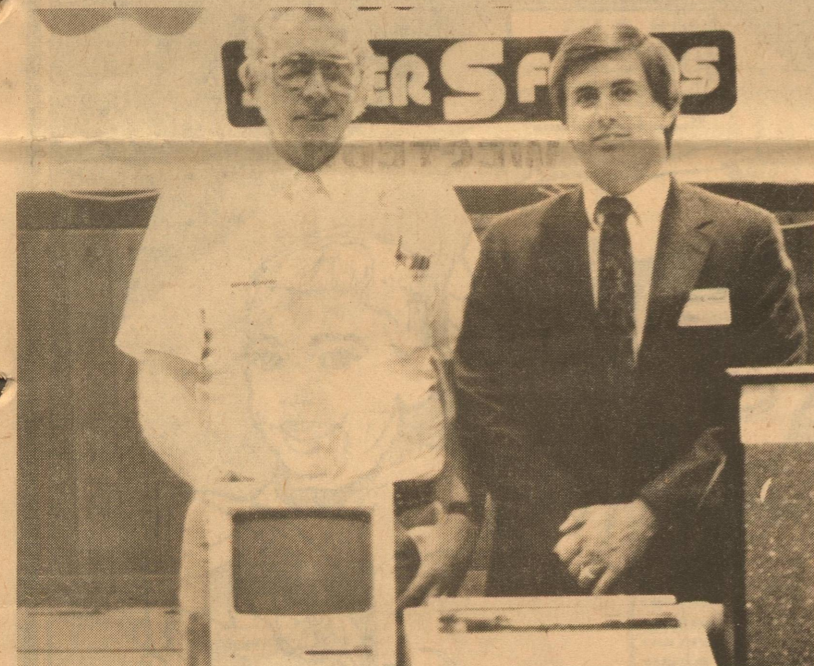

Dennis Scott and Alan Buxkemper present an Apple Computer to the Eldorado Elementary School.


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Sales Tax Shows Large Increase For Schleicher County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that sales taxes collected in April, May and June of this year showed a healthy increase over last year's collections.

"This is further confirmed of a recovered Texas economy and of a state that's in economic expansion," Bullock said.

The Comptroller's office today sent \$148 million in sales tax rebate checks to cities and counties throughout Texas.

Payments to cities totaled \$135 million, an 11 percent increase over last August's payments and an 8 percent increase over last year's payments at this time.

Houston received \$23 million, the state's largest payment, while Dallas received the state's second largest payment of \$14 million. San

Antonio received \$7 million and Austin received \$5 million.

Rebate checks to counties totaled \$13 million this month for an increase of 18 percent over last August's payments. The sizeable jump is largely due to more counties collecting sales tax now than last year, said Bullock.

This month's checks reflect taxes collected on June sales and reported in late July by businesses filing monthly returns. Also included in this month's payments are sales taxes reported by quarterly filers whose collections reflect sales made in April, May and June.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its share and sends cities and counties the local portion of the sales tax each month.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

To our knowledge, the heaviest recorded rainfall in the county was at Charlie Brazzell's ranch. The Brazzell Ranch is 4 miles east of Eldorado on the Menard highway.

On July 15, 15.6 inches of rain fell in about a ten hour period of time. The total amount of rainfall, as measured by the Brazzells, since July 15 was 51.9 inches.

Schleicher County and Sutton County received heavy rains again this past week. From Sunday morning until noon Monday, measured rainfall was reportedly more than 12 inches in areas of these neighboring counties.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
