Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Special Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, October 23, 1990, at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall. Present were Barbara Jackson, John Callison, Dora Bosmans and Debbie Ballew. A quorum being present, Barbara Jackson acted as Mayor Pro Tem and called the meeting to order.

CITIZENS PRESENT:

Gary Smith, representing both the newspaper and as a citizen, addressed the Council concerning his understanding regarding complaints being filed for violations of the livestock and chicken ordinances. The process by which a written complaint is filed and the procedure followed by the Municipal Court to act on the written complaint were reviewed. A question and answer period was held in which traffic control was discussed, particularly in the area of the school. The possibilities of a City Marshal was discussed, with the Secretary instructed to check with the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement and other small communities. Information was distributed to Mr. Smith from the City's efforts to obtain Ordinance enforcement through the Sheriff's Office. **NIGHTWATCH:**

Nightwatch personal, Andrew Spinks and Bobby Phillips, met with the Council to review policies, time allocation, patrol perimeters, and discuss any problems. It was reported that there were still problems with getting the radios in good working order.

PHILIP BRYANT:

Philip Bryant, representing Fidelity Security Life Co., presented formal quote from the company for supplemental health coverage for the City employees during working hours. Procedures were discussed, including the establishment of a reserve fund. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Debbie Ballew that a letter by prepared for Mayor Preston's signature submitting notice to the TML Workmen's Compensation Joint Insurance Fund that the City desires to cancel coverage effective 1/1/91. Motion

Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Debbie Ballew that application be executed by Mayor Preston for submittal to Fidelity Security Life Insurance for budgeted workmen's compensation premiums with monthly premiums to Fidelity Security Life to be paid from the fund and any accrued funds to be reserved for approved expenditures.

TRUCK BYPASS:

John Callison reported that he had not received any further word form the owner of Blocks 88 and 89 proposed for truck bypass.

1987 GRANT UPDATE: Letter from Todd Engineering was

distributed to the Councilmembers. The letter outlined the options available to the Council to complete the lift station in the project. According to the letter, changeout of the pumps to single phase would cost approximately \$1700 whereas the installation by WTU of three-phase power for the pumps would run approximately \$4800. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans that Todd Engineering be contacted to proceed with the changeout in order to cut costs and speed completion prior to the October 31 deadline. Motion carried.

STREET LITES: The Secretary reported that WTU had surveyed post availability for the street lights in Christian Addition and the installation of 4 additional lights could be accomplished without problem; however, 3 out of the 5 lights proposed to be moved from the downtown area to the East Hill Avenue and East Warner Avenue area were not possible due to a lack of poles at proposed locations. The Council will review the situation further as the need arises after the changeouts

1989 GRANT UPDATE:

The Secretary reported that the survey crews had completed their survey work at the proposed water tower site without incident, but that the bore test crew had caused damages to the 6" water line serving the area. Damages were estimated by Mr. Dean to be \$381.66. Mr. Dean further stated that should the tap for the water line to the water tower supply line not use the damaged portion, the section would need to be further repaired with additional damages to be assessed. A discussion of procedures was held with emphasis given that all contractors make prior arrangements with the City and the property owner before starting work. The Secretary reported that she had visited with WTU personnel to alleviate any problems with the location due to proximity to the high voltage line serving Christian Addition, and the WTU personnel are to check out the situation and report back as soon as possible. MOSQUITO CONTROL:

As a followup to the previous meeting's discussion, it was reported that

the County Commissioner's Court did not approve sharing of expenses at this time to treat the lakes in the City. It was suggested that Spring of 1991 would be a better time, and that all property owners grant permission prior to the City and/or Health Dept. proceeding with any

PARKER & PARSLEY:

The Secretary distributed copies of letter drafted to the Texas Railroad Commission for the Council's signatures. The letter stated opposition to the proposed injection of fresh water from the Edwards Formation in order to recover oil. Due to the amount of water to be used, the formation involved, possible contamination, breakdown of the formation, and setting of a precedent, it was the unanimous decision of the Council that the letter be forwarded as soon as possible.

DRUG TESTING CONTRACT:

A draft of a Contractual Agreement between the City of Eldorado and Damon Clinical Laboratories. Inc. was reviewed by the Council, following discussion, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the Mayor be authorized to execute the contract as drafted proper to forwarding to Damon for their acceptance and execution. Motion carried.

BILLINGS: Bills received since the last meeting of the Council were reviewed. and motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by John Callison that a letter be prepared to the Eldorado Animal Clinic requesting justification for charges for boarding fees for 7 nursing puppies of mother dog held for rabies observation, and that payment be withheld pending a response. Motion carried.

Other billings were reviewed and initialled, and motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the billings be paid. Motion carried.

OTHER BILLINGS: The Secretary distributed Surplus Property Listing as made available: however, such listing did not include the type equipment Mr. Dean requested.

It was announced that John Nikolauk was replacing Richard Preston on the civic leader tour of Chanute AFB. Illinois, and Nellis, AFB. Nevada, on October 25 and 26, and that Mr. Nikolauk was attending the TML Solid Waste Options meeting in November in Austin along with Jack Dean.

Discussion of the City's Inter-Local Agreement with Schleicher County Commissioner's Court was held, and it was pointed out that the annual review as specified in the last agreement was

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Jack Dean reported that the new

landfill pit was nearing completion.

He reported that no problems were encountered with infiltration at the East Street Lift station during the last rain. With regard to the wastewater facility, he reported that the BOD's were still out of compliance due to the weather conditions affecting the operation of the plant. The plant is continuing to gain fluid causing the ponds to rise, and he proposed that a proper meter must be installed to calculate influent. Eldorado Excellence Fund

After several months of planning and preparation, the charter for a unique program has been submitted to the Internal Revenue Services for approval. The charter establishes a nonprofit scholarship fund for ANY Eldorado High School graduate who maintains a specified academic average. The scholarship will be funded by the interest earned on tax deductible donations made as memorials, gifts or contributions to academic

The fund will be overseen by seven unpaid trustees who will administer proceeds deposited in the First National Bank of Eldorado. Trustees for the Eldorado Excellence Fund are Dr. Larry Blair, Judge Johnny Griffin, Joe Ed Hill, Lucy Page, Judge Mickey Pennington, Mary Barton Robinson and Dr. Wayne

Administration of the scholarships and maintenance of student data will be through Schleicher County Independent School District. According to the by-laws for the foundation, only the earnings of the fund will be distributed as scholarships. The body of the fund will continue to grow as contributions accumulate. Ultimately, the fund will support any qualifying student for an entire undergraduate program.

The fund was created for one purpose--to reward academic excellence. It is uniquely Eldorado and ha not been copied after any other known program for public schools. It will rely solely on future donations to fund it. It is an attempt by Eldorado High School graduates of the past to provide an opportunity for Eldorado High School graduates of the future to better prepare themselves.

It is hoped that the fund will become a significant factor for students and parents when decisions must be made about academic preparation while in high school. When the potential exists for any high school student to earn a semester scholarship by maintaining a 92 average in the basic academic subjects for a semester then decisions about whether to study or do something with less potential reward should be easier made.

In the near future, an attempt will be made to contact every graduate of Eldorado High SChool to better acquaint them with the Eldorado Excellence Fund. Several individuals have

already contacted the school to make donations as memorials.
