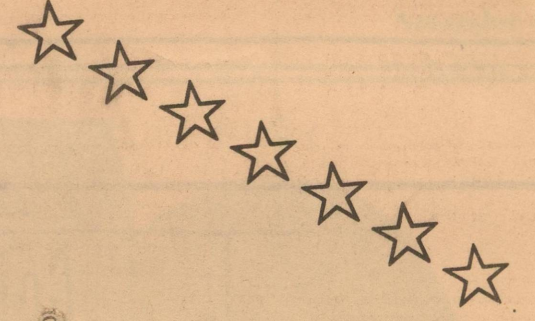

Sim's Pushes To End Daylight Savings Time In Texas

State Senator Bill Sims, Democrat from San Angelo, is planning to introduce a bill to the legislature in January that would repeal daylight-savings time for the State of Texas.

Daylight-savings time was implemented in Texas in 1967. It runs from the first Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October. It was originally installed in an effort to conserve energy. However, this plan does not reduce the amount of energy being consumed. Other states, realizing this, have already exempt themselves from this uniform time act of 1966.

Sims said, "I do not see the need for a change from standard time because it does not conserve energy, but instead creates mass confusion. My grandchildren are going to wake up at the same time regardless of daylight-savings."

The Senator urges all citizens to support this bill in an effort to keep Texas on standard time by contacting your elected official.

Wall Victorious Over Eagles

Wall used an explosive passing and running attack in the first half to claim a 21-0 victory over the Eldorado Eagles. "We knew Wall could throw and run well. In the first half they came out throwing and they had good drives, but we caused some turnovers which kept us in the game. Then we could not move the ball offensively to keep the ball away from Wall. They ended with two scores late in the first half which made the score 21-0 going into the second half," explained Kuhlmann.

Wall scored first on a 40 yard run when the quarterback ran an option to the right and just before being tackled pitched to Brandon Braden, who ran it down the right sideline for the score. The second score resulted after a Wall drive took them down to the two yard line and quarterback Sawn Bof kept it for the touchdown. On the third

score, Wall's Joe Martinez caught an eight yard touchdown pass.

"In the second half our offense started to move the ball and it helped our defense by keeping the ball away from Wall's offense. But we never were able to score off the drives to put us in a position to win," Kuhlmann replied.

Ramiro Barajas and Cole Turner had interceptions, while Pito Gonzalez, Justin Paxton and Wade Rinehart had fumble recoveries for the defense. On offense, the rushing yardage was made by Justin Paxton, Cy Griffin and Clifton Brown. Passes were caught by Ramiro Barajas, Hector Chapa, Justin Paxton and Reyes Lazano.

Eldorado will play the last football game of the season against the Stanton Buffaloes. Game time is 8:00 on Friday night in Stanton.

County Agents Report

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by the Drought & Storm Damage are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in the Eden ASCS Building.

Schleicher County is one of 17 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to

cover part of actual production losses resulting from the Drought & Storm damage.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. Farmers must be unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, to be eligible. The interest is 4.5 percent on Emergency Loans.

Also a Farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss

of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 6-17-91 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a

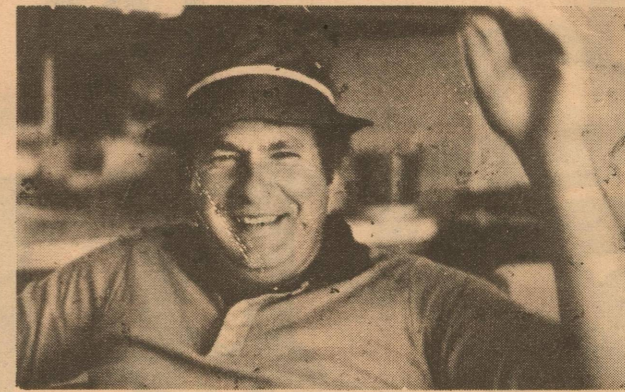
substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperative in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Eden, Tx is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Schleicher County office day is the Thursday following the second Wednesday afternoon of each month from 1:30 p.m. to 3 p.m., in the courthouse.

Steam Treatment of Colds: A study designed to verify using inhaled heated, humidified air to treat colds did not find the treatment to be efficacious.

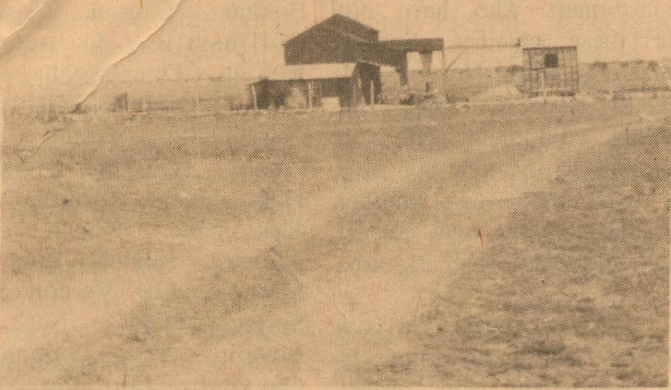

A Touch Of History

September 24, 1904

Tuesday afternoon, the manager of the Eldorado Gin decided to gin out their "first bale" of cotton and after some delay on account of stretching belts, etc. they turned out the first bale of cotton ever ginned in Schleicher County. The cotton was owned by T.G. Chaney and weighed 493 pounds.

This opens a new industry to our town and county, giving the stockmen a supply of seed at home and our farmers

don't have to haul their cotton fifty miles, in the seed to have it ginned, and consume several days in making the trip in the busy season.

To Cotton Owners

"The Eldorado Gin will gin cotton two days a week, each week, Friday and Tuesday, beginning Friday, September 30, 1904. Any cotton left over will be ginned the following day. Charges will be 60 cents per 100 pounds, and \$1.00 per bale for bagging and ties, spot cash.

WORKING CLEARANCE

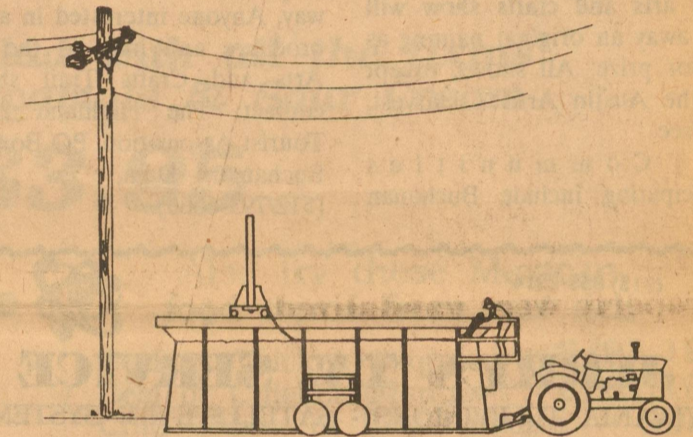
Maintaining the proper clearance from a high-voltage electric line is not just a good safety practice, it's the law. In Texas, any contractor, corporation or individual not affiliated with the utility must follow these guidelines.

- No person will perform any activity within six feet of overhead lines.
- No person will operate or use any tool, equipment, machinery or material where it is possible that these devices will come within six feet of overhead lines.
- No person will operate any equipment, such as derricks, cranes, power shovels, hayloaders, pile drivers, hoisting equipment or similar devices, within ten feet of overhead lines.

When work must be performed within these clearances, the organization or individual responsible must contact the utility and make arrangements to ensure safe clearances.

Violations of these provisions of the law can result in fines, confinement in jail or liability to the utility for damages and all liability incurred.

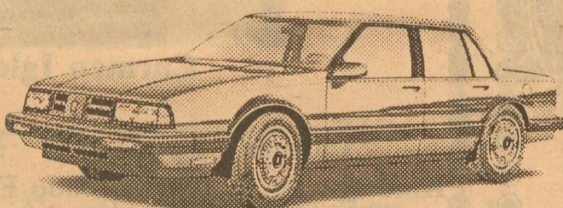

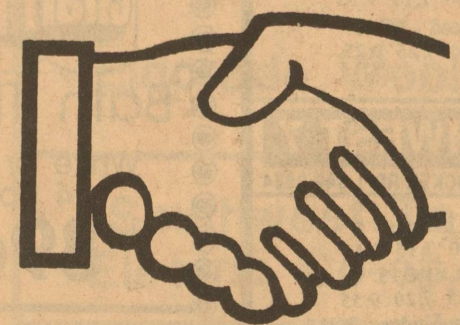

Deer Population Survey

Wildlife personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed annual deer population surveys here in Schleicher County. The resulting population estimate, 63 deer per 1,000 acres or about 51,000 deer county wide, represents no change over last year's estimate.

This year in Schleicher County the deer season opens on Saturday, November 3, and runs through Sunday, January 6. The bag limit is the same as last year - 4 deer, no more than 2 antlered bucks.

Most Schleicher County landowners are already aware that, as has been the case for

several years now, doe permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer here in the Edwards Plateau. Hunters will need only to appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer in Schleicher and the other "either-sex" counties this year.

After reviewing the results of the recent deer population surveys, local wildlife personnel are recommending that Schleicher County landowners located in the northwestern portion of the county try for a harvest of 1 doe or antlerless deer for every 300 acres and 1

buck for every 500 acres. Those landowners in the southern and eastern portion of the county should try for a harvest of 1 doe for every 100 acres and 1 buck for every 250 acres. The recommended rates result from the need to better balance the sex ratio observed in the herd from a desire to produce a healthier deer population that is properly matched to the existing supply of deer foods in the county.

These general harvest rates are based on county averages and may not be completely suitable for each individual ranch in the county. Landowners interested in closely managing their local deer herd need to conduct their own on-site fall population surveys, with resulting harvest recommendations that meet their specific management objectives.

New Area Code Added To Texas

At 12:01 a.m. on November 4, telephone customers in 200 Northeast Texas communities began being served by the nation's newest area code - 903 (previously 214).

Customers in Dallas and in 33 Metroplex municipalities immediately surrounding the city will continue to use the 214 area code.

"Hopefully, most - if not all - of our business and residential customers who need to make modifications in their telephone equipment or service to accommodate the 903 area code have already done so. These modifications are needed so that features like Speed Dialing, Call Forwarding and Route Selection will continue to operate properly," said James A. Spriggs, vice president - general manager, northern operating unit.

But the company has

also taken precautionary steps to avoid call completion problems for customers who have not made these changes, Spriggs emphasized. "From November 4, 1990 to May 4, 1990, our switching equipment will still allow calls to the new 903 area code to be completed - whether the caller used the new, correct area code or the former 214 area code.

"This will allow customers additional time to make equipment and service changes, as well as to inform friends, relatives and business associates outside the new 903 area," Spriggs stressed. "After May 4, callers will not be able to complete calls to the new 903 area without dialing the correct code. If they mistakenly use the former 214 area code, they will hear a recorded message instructing them to dial the new 903 area code.

Vernon, Myrtle Springs, Naples, Nash, New Boston, New Summerfield, Oakland, Quitman, Rusk, Sherman, Sulpher Springs, Talco, Texarkana, Trenton, Turnertown, Van, Van Alstyne, Wake Village, Whitesboro, Winfield and Winnsboro.

GTE Southwest and 10 other local telephone companies who provide service in Northeast Texas announced early last year the need to add another area code to the region served by the 214 area code. The additional area code is needed because continued residential and business growth in the 214 area led to a shortage of available telephone number combinations.

23rd Fall Arts & Crafts Trail

The Highland Lakes are gearing up for the 23rd Fall Arts and Crafts Trail that winds its way from Austin west and north through the Highland Lakes and Hill Country. Seven communities will feature arts and crafts shows that offer works from more than 500 area artists. The Arts and Crafts Trail is set for the weekend of November 10 and 11.

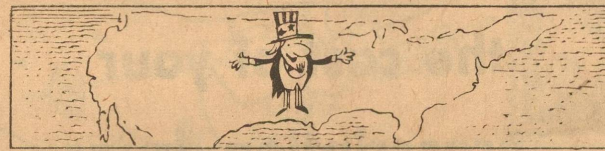

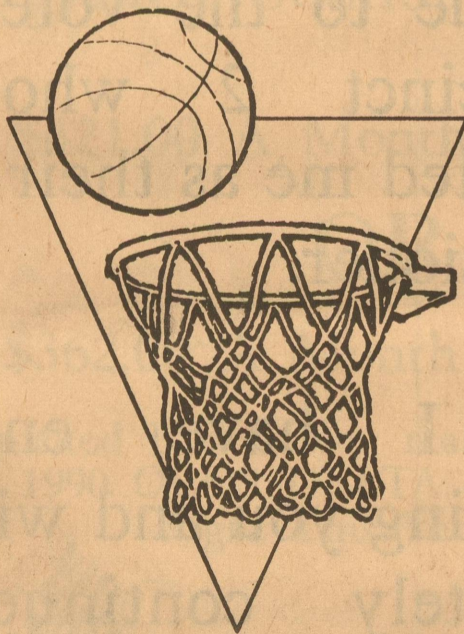

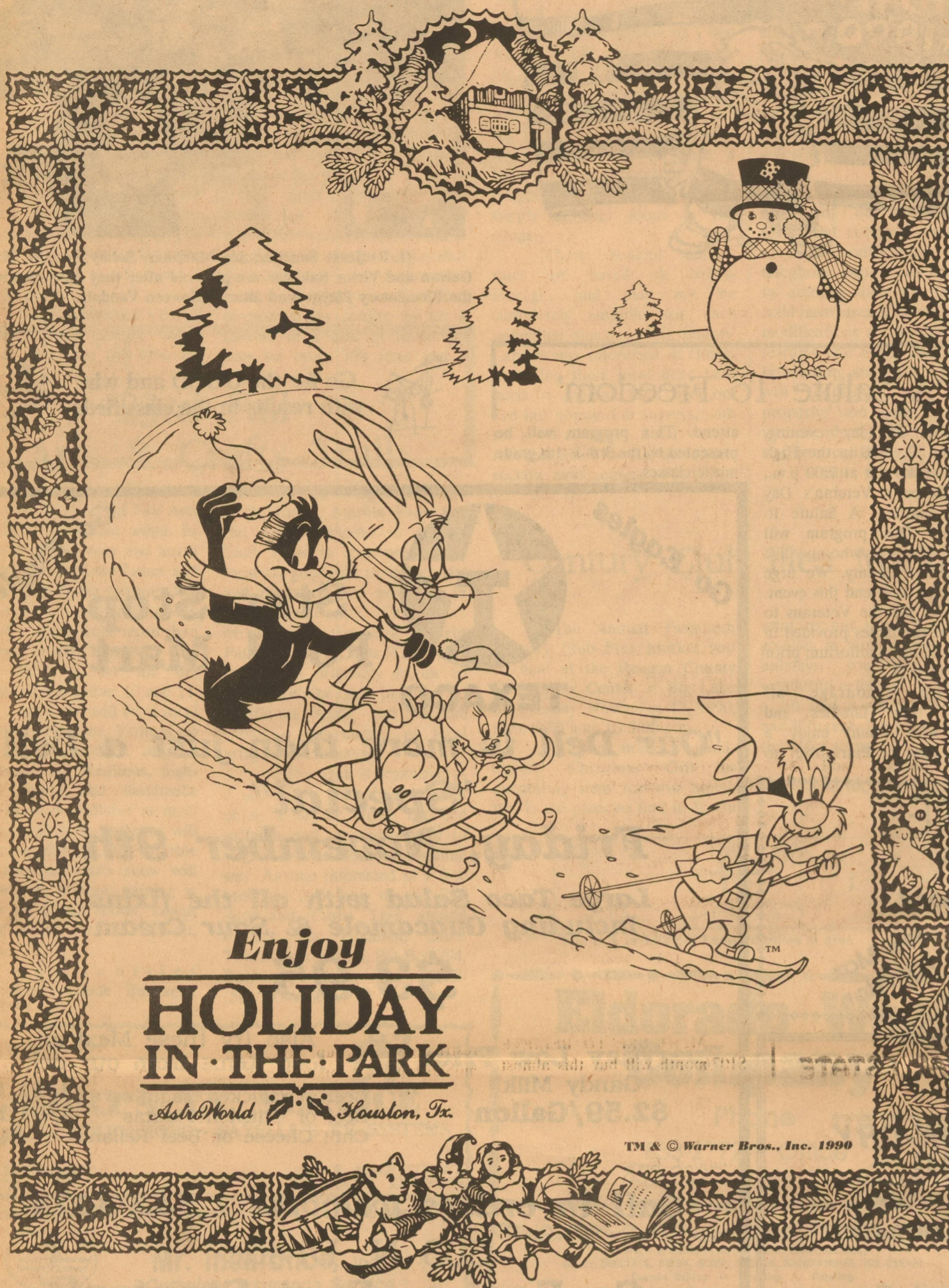
