Twenty-six area 4-H members were honored on November 26 during the annual District 7 4-H Gold Star Banquet in Abilene at the Briarstone Manor.

The Gold Star is the highest 4-H honor given by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the county level. The Eldorado Eagles Girls Varsity Basketball team is off to a great start. With an early season record of 4 wins and no losses, the Lady Eagles seem to be flying high.

In a very close game against Menard on November 20, the girls won 44-41. Amy Henderson led the scoring in this game with 13 points. Katie Hardy scored 9 points and Claudia Martinez had 6.

Coach Bobby Helmers said, "Our girls played a tough Menard team. It took a good team effort to come out on top. We have been playing aggressively in the late stages of the games because our reserves are coming in and providing rest for the starters. The Menard game was no exception."

On Tuesday night, the girls played Rock Springs and won 62-33. Claudia Martinez and Amy Henderson led the scoring with 11 points each, followed by Stephanie Ledbetter with 10 points.

Said Helmers, "It is really hard to single out particular defensive and offensive players because the whole team is doing a great job and contributing to the wins."

The Lady Eagles will play in the Reagan County Girls Basketball Tournament this week-end. Their first match is against Reagan County J.V. Thursday night at 6:00.

The Varsity boys have not fared as well as the girls. Their season record is 1 win and three losses.

Coach Greg Cleveland remarked, "Some of the boys have played well in some games and some of the boys have played well in others.

What we need is for everyone to play well at the same time."

The November 16th game found the Eagles losing to Mertzon 79-60. Justin Edmiston was high scorer in this game with 18 points. Ramiro Barajas and Tim Vasquez made 10 points each. At one point, the Eagles were ahead 33-20. According to Coach Cleveland, a lack of conditioning played a major part in this game.

On November 20, the boys defeated Menard 53-47. Fito Gonzales was top scorer with 13 points, followed by Cy Griffin with 11 points and Travis Shaw and Barry Thoms with 6 points each.

Said Cleveland, "We have a long way to go. We have an inexperienced team, but I see

good things for us before the year is over."

The Menard win was followed by losses to Lake View and Rock Springs.

The most expensive correction is replacing the kitchen vent hood to comply with updated Life Safety Codes, which we already had plans to do. When the typewritten copy of the inspector's findings is received, a copy will be posted on the

bulletin board at the nurses station. Anyone who wants to read the details is welcome to do so.

Very few nursing homes go through inspection with so few problems. I am pleased to be associated with a nursing home this good. It is the public support we get that makes the difference. Thank you for your support.

expressions.

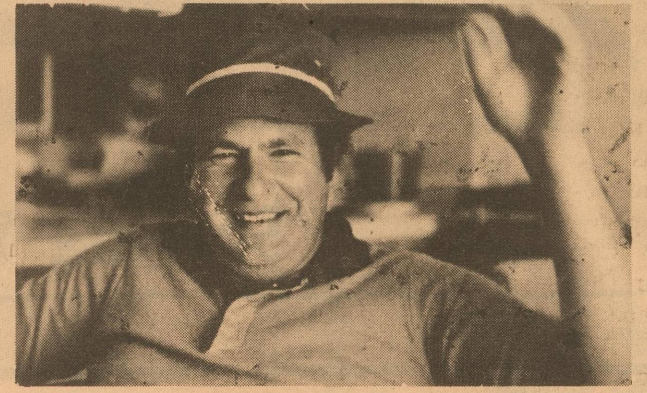

County Agents Report

People have little to fear from the water they drink and cook with every day from municipal supplies.

Even rural and other families - some 17 million people - who rely on a private well to provide for the families' needs - are not at great risk. But they would be wise to have their well water tested for safety and quality.

"The reason is that groundwater is vulnerable to being contaminated with health-damaging substances," says Jerry Swift, Schleicher County Extension Agent.

Before the late 1970's most people believed that water coming from underground was pristine, having been cleansed by filtration through layers of rock and soil on its way from the surface to the well.

That myth has long since been shattered, and now there is a national concern - even horror stories - about what people have done and are still doing to the nation's water supply.

In many areas of the United States, drinking water safety is gauged according to the number and concentration of contaminants the water contains. These contaminants (there are literally hundreds) can include industrial solvents, pesticides, metals, detergents and other substances.

Since 1979, many more red flags have been raised about the nation's water contamination problems.

The EPA estimates that 19,000 uncontrolled hazardous waste sites - landfills, pits, lagoons, deep injection wells - exist in the United States. Studying 10,000 of these revealed that 4,000 were leaking.

Ten million underground storage tanks, including 2.3

million gasoline tanks, present another significant threat.

Municipal wastewater treatment plants and septic tanks, which are responsible for most cases of bacterial and viral contamination, are also significant sources of nitrate contamination. Saltwater contamination, road de-icing and

oil drilling was reported by the U.S. Geological Survey as a serious problem in 22 states.

The quality of the nation's drinking water has become a serious issue for federal and state governments and may prove to be one of the toughest environmental problems of the century.

Information about how homeowners, rural and metropolitan, can have their tapwater tested and how they can become involved in community water quality preservation can be obtained by calling the Schleicher County Cooperative Extension office at 853-2766.

A Special Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, November 10, 1990, at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall with all Councilmembers in attendance with the exception of Richard Preston. Mayor Pro Tem John Nikolauk called the meeting to order. No citizens were present.

TODD ENGINEERING:

David Todd of Todd Engineering met with the Council to bring the Council up to date on the current TDPCC projects as well as the upcoming 1989 Urgent Need Grant.

Mr. Todd reported that inspection had been completed on the 1987 Amended Project as of November 20. He reviewed events prior to and following the Change Order relating to WTU service in the project area. He directed the Council's attention to the Change Order and final billing from Starks Construction Company which reflected a \$1265.00 increase due to the change to single phase pumps rather than the 3 phase as proposed in the bid documents. After discussion, Letter of Acceptance was executed by Mayor Pro Tem Nikolauk as well as Certificate of Completion and Change Order #1. Passage of the Resolution is scheduled for the December 4 meeting which will start close out process and final payment to the contractor. The Secretary reported on financial status of the project and requested that remaining 1982 CDBG funds be transferred to offset expenses as approved by HUD. Dora Bosmans co-signed the transfer check.

Concerning the 1989 project, Mr. Todd presented letter of apology from Enprotec, Inc. who had failed to notify the City of their need to drill test hole at the proposed water tower site, as requested, and resulted in damages to the 6' water line in the ROW on the Catholic Church property off of Cottonwood. After discussion, motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded Dora Bosmans that the firm be requested to submit a corrected billing for work and that they be subsequently billed for damages. The motion further stated that Mr. Dean and Mrs. Mayo review those charges for damages and submit those to Enprotec via Mr. Todd. Motion carried. Further,

the Secretary was instructed to visit with the Parish Council to clear any questions and to review procedures necessary under the TDOC guidelines for acquisition, i.e. appraisal, TDOC acceptable expenditures.

Regarding the 1989 Urgent Need project, the Secretary reported that the Regional Coordinator was ready to forward the Contract with TDOC for the Council's review and execution. With regard to the Council's action at the November 6 meeting to seek engineering firm proposals, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that the Council waive procurement procedures and proceed with execution of Todd Engineering's contract for services as soon as the State Contract is received and approved. Motion carried.

Mr. Todd further stated that the irrigation permit was awaiting acquisition of land or a lease of land for irrigation purposes. Jack Dean, Utility Supt., stated that he had visited with Todd regarding inclusion in the permit application for sprinkler system around plant area for aeration and maintenance of grass.

INTER-LOCAL AGREEMENT:

Agreement as executed by the County Commissioner's Court was reviewed, and motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the Agreement be approved. Motion carried.

BILLINGS:

While the billings were being circulated for approval, the Secretary reminded the Councilmembers of the upcoming CVCOG Annual Meeting to be

held in Brady on December 5, and she asked that they contact her for reservations. Also, the Council was given a listing of delinquent taxpayers who will be filed on by the Schleicher County Appraisal District. After review of the bills, motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the bills be paid as presented. Motion carried.

DAMAGES BY GTE CONTRACTOR:

Mr. Dean reported on denial of request for payment of damages the City had submitted to Burnup and Sims who had damaged a water line near the Leroy Reeves residence. The billing was for \$236.90 and was denied by Burnup & Sims. Followup will be made with GTE representatives. Meanwhile, John Callison requested that the City contact the State to determine if the State would be able to remove rocks in the right of way adjacent to Sunset Acres so the area could be again maintained by the homeowners.

SALARY REVIEW:

The Secretary again reported on increase in expenses related to the family coverage for employees which became effective 11/1. She pointed out that salary review has been scheduled in years past for November of each year, and the 3% cost of living increase was available. After discussion, the Council agreed that Supervisory personnel should make recommendations for merit increases not to exceed the budgeted amount at the next meeting.

HANOVER RRC FILING:

The Secretary reviewed materials submitted by Hanover to the

Railroad Commission (Application for Acknowledgment of Transportation Cost Component of Sales Rate). According to information obtained from the RRC Legal Dept. and review of the past year's rates being charged by Hanover, the pricing from Hanover has fluctuated but not dramatically increased, and the filing is a FERC required procedure only - not a request for increase. The material is available for Council and public review.

ANIMAL CONTROL:

The Animal Control Officer has been registered for TDH seminar in Odessa scheduled for December 11 and 12. The Council discussed expenses related to the seminar, and motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Debbie Ballew that Brett Dacy be paid for classroom time at his regular rate of pay in addition to the City paying for related expenses. Motion carried.

REQUEST FOR PARKING BY GIN:

Mr. Dean relayed request from the Gin for parking empty cotton trailers along McWhorter Avenue. The request was unanimously denied due to safety concerns.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at approximately 9:30 p.m.

hear rumors and if not reassured, they may think the situation is too terrible to discuss."

It is important to consider the child's age and development level when explaining the crisis. One way to determine this level, is to have the child ask questions. Parents will be better informed about the child's fears and can alleviate them without creating new ones.

Eddins says that ignoring children's fears may cause them to surface in other ways.

A change in behavior is the first sign that something is wrong. If the pattern continues for more than one week, parents should consider professional counseling for their child.

If a family member is

overseas, then a good support system is critical. Support can come from a number of places including family, community, teachers and counselors. Maintaining contact with that family member prevents the child from feeling forgotten. Encourage them to write letters or send packages. Older children may keep a scrapbook of newspaper accounts.

"The child may ask if a family member is in danger," Eddins said. "Parents must be honest with the child and not make any promises that cannot be kept."

To help a child through the separation period, relate the homecoming to a major event or make a calendar and mark off the days until the family member

returns. Children are also comforted by routine. Keep changes minimal during the separation.

"I strongly encourage parents to make an effort to communicate with their children," said Eddins. "Honesty builds trust which can dispel fear."

WORKING CLEARANCE

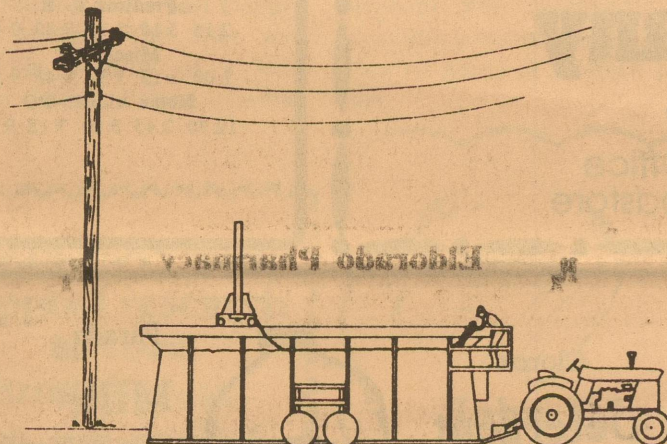
Maintaining the proper clearance from a high-voltage electric line is not just a good safety practice, it's the law. In Texas, any contractor, corporation or individual not affiliated with the utility must follow these guidelines:

- No person will perform any activity within six feet of overhead lines.
- No person will operate or use any tool, equipment, machinery or material where it is possible that these devices will come within six feet of overhead lines.
- No person will operate any equipment, such as derricks, cranes, power shovels, hayloaders, pile drivers, hoisting equipment or similar devices, within ten feet of overhead lines.

When work must be performed within these clearances, the organization or individual responsible must contact the utility and make arrangements to ensure safe clearances.

Violations of these provisions of the law can result in fines, confinement in jail or liability to the utility for damages and all liability incurred.

Finding of No Significant Impact

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Eldorado has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

1. There will be no negative impacts on the environment as a result of the proposed project.
2. Temporary increase in noise, dust or other nuisance that will occur during construction, will be of short duration and low intensity and will cease on the completion of the construction.
3. The project to be undertaken will not affect any known local, state or national historic, architectural or archeological resource presently listed or potentially eligible for

listing in the national register of historical places or in any state or local registry.

4. The project will not be affected by nor will it affect the 100-year flood plain.

5. No effect is expected on protected or endangered wildlife or vegetation.

An Environmental Assessment respecting the within project has been made by the above-named City of Eldorado which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Assessment is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Public Comments on Finding

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Eldorado, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at City Hall on or before December 14, 1990. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Eldorado will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

Release of Funds

The City of Eldorado will undertake the project described above with Community Development funds from the Texas Department of Commerce under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Eldorado is certifying to TDOC that the City of Eldorado and Richard Preston in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments,

decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Eldorado may use the Texas Community Development Program funds and TDOC will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

Objectives to State Release of Funds
Texas Department of

Commerce will accept on objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDOC; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step application to the project in the environmental review process. objections must be prepared and

submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58.75) and may be addressed to Texas Community Development Program; Texas Department of

Commerce, P.O. Box 12728, Capital Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

Objectives to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by TDOC. No objection received after January 2, 1991 will be considered by TDOC. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Eldorado is Richard Preston, Mayor.

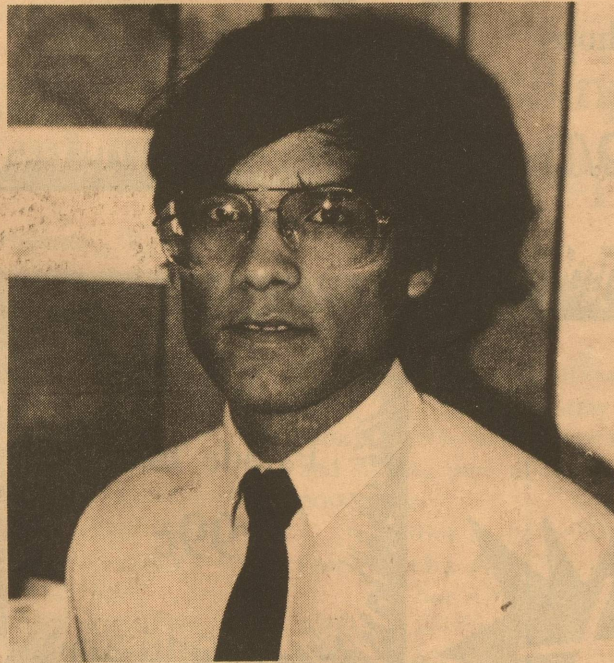
