

DPS Trooper Danny Nunez recently confiscated more than a pound of crystal methamphetamine, the purest form of the narcotic, valued at more than \$20,000.00, after stopping to help a stranded motorist

change a flat tire. Nunez reports that the driver of the vehicle,

Raquel Miranda, 47, of Del Rio, gave him inconsistent stories about where she was going. It was at that time that Nunez noticed that Miranda's 12-year-old male passenger appeared to be concealing something in his waistband. Nun-

"brick" of crystal methamphetamine hidden under the youth's shirt and tucked inside his waistband. Nunez arrested Miranda and the juvenile passenger and confiscated the dope.

A subsequent canine search of the ve-

hicle didn't turn up any more drugs but the dope seized was more than enough to file federal charges with the DEA.

At press time, Miranda remains in the Schleicher County jail in lieu of \$200,000 bond. The juvenile passenger was booked into the Schleicher County Jail but later transferred to the Tom Green County Juvenile Detention Center.

Four Houston men were arrested Saturday, May 15, after Trooper Nunez found six bottles of illegal steroids hidden in their car. Nunez pulled over the men's 2003

Honda for speeding in the wee hours of the morning. At that time, the men told Nunez they had been stopped by U.S. Customs agents and fined \$613 for attempting to smuggle a bottle of steroids into the country. The men even produced a document verifying their story.

That would have probably been that, except for the fact that Trooper Nunez located six more bottles of the illicit drug inside the car. He said the street value of the steroids was over \$5,000.

Nunez then arrested Robert Kelly Hoover, Christopher Alan Rigsby, Micha-

el Thomas Crabtree and Christopher G. Buckley, all 20-years of age and all from Houston. The men told Nunez they were on their way back to college in Lubbock after a trip to Mexico.

The four men were all arraigned before Peace Justice James C. Doyle and each was released on \$5,000 surety

# Sheriff tours Colorado City/Hildale area as construction continues at YFZ Ranch

### Community leaders dismiss stories of mass exodus to Texas

Sheriff David Doran and Chief Deputy George Arispe showed up in Colorado City, Arizona on Monday, May 17, a day earlier than expected. They walked down the city streets, mingled with diners in the Mark Twain Restaurant, the town's largest eatery, and paid a visit to Police Chief Sam Roundy, the Colorado City's chief law enforcement officer.

"We basically wanted to get an overview of things, sort of get the lay of the land before we made contact with any of the town's leaders," Doran told the Success in a telephone interview Tuesday evening.

What the men saw was a town that is growing. "They have industry here," Doran said. "They have a dairy, a cheese plant and a large machine shop."

Nowhere, Doran said, did he see signs that anyone was planning a mass move to Texas.

Doran said that Chief Roundy was very open with him while at the same time asserting that as a member of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints the practice of polygamy, or plural marriage, is the cornerstone of his faith.

"It is a principle that they are not willing to compromise on," Doran stated

Otherwise, Doran said, the town was very hospitable.

The motivation behind the trip to the Utah/Arizona border was the recent move of the FLDS, or at least a portion of it, to Schleicher County. At first, the man who bought 1,600 acres of land on behalf of the FLDS claimed to be putting in a corporate hunting retreat. But, local citizens, who are keenly aware of how many deer can be harvested from a ranch that size, didn't buy into the story. When Flora Jessop, an anti-polygamy activist from Phoenix, brought national media attention to Schleicher County, the group was soon forced to drop the charade of a hunting retreat and admitted that they were building an FLDS community.

In an unprecedented move, FLDS church leaders met with Sheriff Doran and Schleicher County Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle three weeks ago. At that time, four FLDS church members, including David Allred, the man who purchased the land for the church, said that the hunting retreat story had been a ruse to deflect media attention. Instead, the said the land would be a FLDS community, housing as many as 200 of Prophet Warren Jeffs most faithful members.

Even as Doran and Arispe made their way to Utah, work progressed on two new buildings at the YFZ Ranch (see photos below) and speculation began anew as to their purpose.

Doran said his trip to the Utah/Ari-

zona border was intended to get answers about the YFZ Ranch and to sort out the facts from the media hype about the FLDS Church.

One of the biggest media stories surrounding the FLDS church in recent months involved the "rescue" of two 16-year-old girls, Fawn Broadbent and Fawn Holm, from their families by Flora Jessop, who claimed the girls were about to be forced into polygamous marriages.

Doran said he was able to meet with Fawn Broadbent's parents, Matthew and Karen, at the city park. "They seemed like nice people. We went over the situation and they told me that their daughter is now living with relatives and that they get to visit with her from time to

time."

Doran said his purpose in Colorado City was to gather information and not to make judgements. He said he handled the meeting with the Broadbents with that in mind.

Among the sights that Doran and Arispe saw was the walled compound belonging to FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs. "Chief Roundy told us that media attention prompted the walls to be built." the sheriff said

Doran said they also saw the town's Fire Department. "They have a really nice volunteer fire department and ambulance service with sixty volunteers, seventeen of them are paramedics," Doran explained.


The town's hospital, or medical clinic, once the site of a showdown between community members and anti-polygamy activists, also sits behind a wall. "They have cameras around and let you through the gate if you need medical care," Doran said.

Another stop on the trip was the now-infamous baby cemetery on the Utah side of the border where activists claim numerous unmarked graves hold the remains of children who died from birth defects due to decades of inbreeding

"Chief Roundy denied that story and said that all burials in the cemetery are reported and investigated by the authorities," Doran said. "The town actually has two cemeteries, one on the Utah side and another on the Arizona side."

Others who received a visit from Doran and Arispe included Richard Allred, who took over as mayor of Colorado City recently when former mayor Dan Barlow was excommunicated from the FLDS Church by Prophet Warren Jeffs and forced to leave town. Barlow's brother Sam Barlow, himself a former Colorado City police chief, also met with Doran and Arispe.

The tour continued Tuesday when they met with Sheriff Kirk Smith of Continued On Page 8

Learning safe hunting skills...

Math, science and language struction young Texans need, at least if they come from a family where hunting is a tradition.

State law requires that anyone member put it, "Right now, I doubt job. The children of Texas deserve born after Sept. 2, 1971 who is at least 17 years old must complete a 10-hour hunter safety course to get a hunting license. Those 12 to 16 years old must pass the course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter. Budding hunters younger than 12 can take the course, but they cannot be certified.

More than 4,400 providers offer the course across the state, and it's available in all 254 counties. Last year, about 33,000 students took the course.


The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, which oversees the training program, believes it has saved lives. Though the state has more than a million licensed hunters, last year only 44 hunting-related accidents were reported.

for many years. For example, unruly behavior, fighting or drug use exacerbate both the penalty and the detention treatment. Rather than a shelter for youth, such are simply put in jail.

Second offenses for underage infractions will automatically trigger legal processes that may result in incarceration, according to officials. Garza emphasized that the purpose of the crackdown is not punitive toward American visitors, and certainly is not intended to diminish tourism on which the city depends to a great extent.

Bar, disco and club owners are ponying up fines, too. Officials declared that fines for the owners, where underage drinkers are taken into custody, range from \$1,200 to \$3,500, depending on circumstances of intoxication. And, Garza added, the fines skyrocket if the physician's exam shows drug use and the owner is implicated in the availability of the controlled substances.

Garza hastened to explain that the crackdown is not aimed exclusively at American youngsters, and that Mexican youths are treated identically. Thus far, the program has resulted in evenly split numbers of apprehensions from each country.

Garza stressed the protection theme, explaining that 70 percent of the detained youths this far into the program are young girls, and fines are higher for girls than boys, too. According to Garza, the recent emphasis is directly accruable to one startling claim: Ciudad Acuña has the highest recorded rates of sexual assault and teen pregnancy in all of Mexico.

Officials on both sides of the border fervently hope that parents and civic leaders understand the child protection motive of the current thrust. "We are trying to work with the people of Del Rio and other areas to help kids have a safe environment, not as a deterrent to tourism. We are promoting a clean atmosphere for tourism for everyone who comes to Mexico.


