1940 FARM & RANCH OUTLOOK BRIGHTEST IN RECENT YEARS

A prosperous year is promised Schleicher county farmers and ranchmen as father time passes the scythe on to his infant son, 1940, and records '39 on the page of history.

Primarily due to life-giving showers that have fallen during the closing months of the old year, a brief survey of farm and range conditions, gives promise of a banner year during the forthcoming

months.

Pasture conditions are well above normal in almost every part of the county, reports indicate, resulting in less feeding to rough cattle and other livestock through winter months.

An increase of 20 per cent in the mutton lamb crop is estimated by County Agent W. G. Godwin, and market prices are favorable. An increase of 15 per cent is also

estimated in cattle being fed for market. This does not include cattle being roughed through the winter.

Both farmers and ranchmen have become more conservation minded and more work is now being done than ever before to improve farm and ranch lands, the county agent points out.

Of tremendous importance at this time, is the unusually large

quantity of small grain that is furnishing supplementary grazing.

These factors combined with the excellent conditions of pasture lands caused by ideal rainfall during fall and early winter months, result in a promise of the most ideal year for livestock producers in recent years.

The outstanding feature of this year's rainfall is the manner and time the showers were received.

AWARDS TO EMPLOYEES

In the belief that among its 30,000 employees there were many who might have new ideas concerning various phases of railroad operation that would be worthy of adoption, the Illinois Central instituted an employees' suggestion system early last spring.

By this plan cash awards in varying sums are given for suggestions actually adopted by the management.

The results obtained in the first nine months since the plan was put into effect were most gratifying—even surprising. During that time 10,495 suggestions were received, and checks totalling more than \$6,200 have been distributed among the 581 employees whose suggestions were adopted.

One employee received no less than 17 cash awards during the 9 month period, another received three to six awards each, accord-

ing to Harvey C. Marmaduke, manager of the suggestion system, who said:

"Thus, I. C. employees have had the satisfaction of seeing their constructive thinking put into practice, and at the same time they have added to their incomes. The management welcomes new ideas that will help to improve operation and service and eliminate waste."

PROFITABLE FEEDING

The extent to which improved feeding practices have been developed through scientific research by federal state and private experiment stations is hardly realized by the general public, but the benefits of these efforts are becoming more fully appreciated by farmers who engage in livestock feeding, dairying and poultry raising.

As a result, former haphazard methods of feeding are rapidly giving away to those which have proved to be more effective and economical, and consequently more profitable.

A striking illustration of this trend is being seen in the success which has been achieved in recent years through the use of soybean oilmeal as a protein ingredient of feeds for all domestic animals.

To meet an ever increasing demand for feeding purposes the production of soybean oilmeal has risen from 21,000 tons in 1929 to more than 900,000 tons for the last year. The amazing growth in popularity of this product is attributed to its palatability, digestibility and high nutritional value for hogs, dairy cattle and poultry, as well as to its comparatively low cost.

The 1939 soybean crop was by far the largest on record, yet farmers received prices considerably above those obtained in 1933. In some sections, particularly in the Middle West, many farmers now look upon soybeans as one of their most dependable and profitable cash crops.

WORK PLAN ACCOMPLISHED BY CLUBS DURING 1939

That club women have been working during the past year is evident by the following report turned in by the county Home Demonstration agent, Miss Margaret Stewart.

With 75 women enrolled in six adult clubs with the supervision of the home demonstration and assistance through 291.5 days devoted to 97 home visits, 778 office calls, 469 telephone calls, 198 news stories, 186 individual letters, 43 different circulation letters, 2419 bulletins distributed, 1 radio talk, 4 exhibits with 268 attending 42 training meetings, 1698 attending 113 method demonstrations, 653 attending 18 result demonstrations and 774 attending 92 meetings held by local leaders and the co-operation of their families third year kitchen demonstration and Home Food Supply demonstration emphasizing poultry.

To produce food at home 71 dairy cows, 2483 laying hens, 1783 pullets added, 51 feed and watering devices made for fowls, 39 incubated purebred chicks and 56,319 rows feet of vegetables planted.

To conserve food at home 2837 quarts of fruits and vegetables were canned, 319 qts., of vegetables brined, 919 qts., of meat canned, 6,906 lbs., of meat cured, 230 lbs., nuts stored, 2 ventilated pantries built, 23 pantries organized, 23 made balanced preservation budget, and no., filling balance preservation budget 22.

To improve food preparation 46 families used Texas Food Standard to plan meals, 75 improved family table setting, service and etiquette, 153 small pieces of kitchen equipment added to add in preparation of food, 36 organized for prepared and staple foods, and 37 have tested recipe files. In improving the interest of the home 9 bedrooms have been added, 25 bedrooms improved, 2 living rooms added, 10 living rooms improved, 5 kitchens added, 13 kitchens improved, 7 roofs repaired or replaced, 2 foundations made secure, 5 houses painted, 3 chimneys

added, 6 windows added, 4 porch steps repaired, 8 bathrooms equipped, 8 closets built in or added, 5 cleaning closets added, 8 kitchens with work surfaces adjusted to comfortable height, 43 pieces of living room furniture added, 95 pieces of bedroom furniture added, 22 facilities for recreation added, 14 mattresses made at home, 285 pieces of bed linen added, 8 bedding protectors added, 21 bedspreads added, 5 woolen covers added, 55 dresser scarfs added, with the total amount spent on repairing the house \$1385.00, total spent on improving the kitchen \$436.85, total spent on improving the living room \$465.00, and total spent on improving the bedroom \$382.80.

The women have fostered their home, community and county life by sending two delegates to district meeting of Texas Home Demonstration Association. In Snyder in May sending 3 delegates to Short Course in July, and 3 delegates to Texas Home Demonstration Association in Lubbock

The girls were engaged in other achievements, 2 delegates sent to Short Course, 5 girls attended Girls' District Show, Lamesa, and had annual Encampment.

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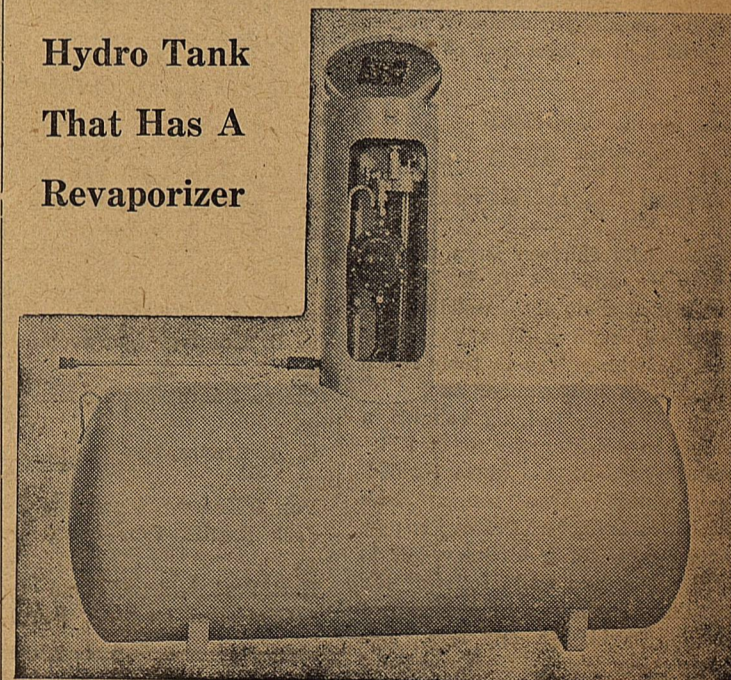

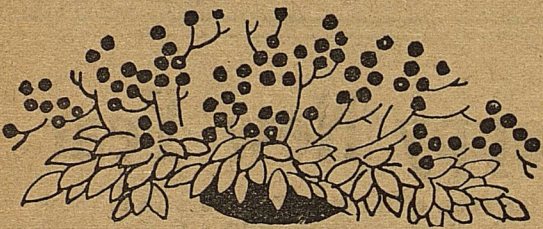

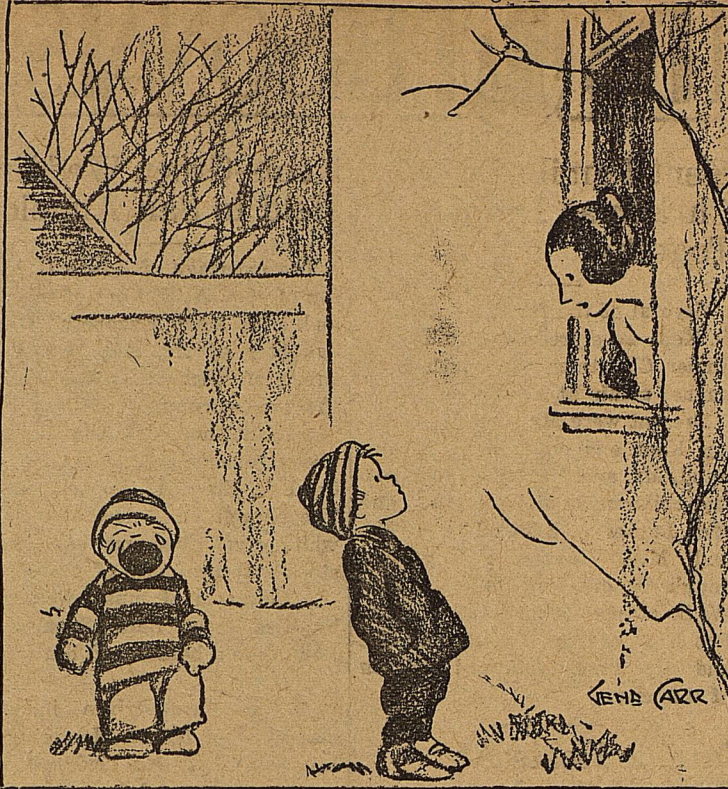

Yard Demonstrators Set 1940 Goals

Yard improvement demonstrators for 1940 will have a meeting in the office of the Home Demonstration Agent Saturday, December 30th at 2:30 P. M., announced Miss Margaret Stewart this week.

1940 demonstrators are Miss Lottie Reynolds, Adams club; Mrs. W. J. Humphry, Busy Bee; Mrs. James Williams and Mrs. W. E. Bruton, Reynolds; Mrs. Mack Roberts and Mrs. S. D. Harper, Cliff; Mrs. Claude Alexander and Mrs. Ray Alexander, Country Woman's; Mrs. Palmer West, Mrs. E. E. Menges, Miss Ruth Baker and Mrs. Jim Williams, Eldorado club.

Goals set to accomplish are: 1. Have a thoroughly clean and orderly arranged yard. 2. Make a cutting bed of at least 100 cuttings (have at least threefourths evergreens). 3. Plant at least 10 evergreens foundation plants and 10 screen plantings. 4. Level yard and protect by terrace. 5. Make at least one piece of play equipment. 6. Add one piece of yard furniture. 7. Care for shrubs properly during summer and winter months. 8. Locate, fertilize and plant rose garden of at least 10 roses.

CORRECT FEEDING MEANS LAYING HENS

Feeding laying mash, grain, giving hens warm water these cool mornings and feeding green feed is why Mrs. E. M. Roberts of Cliff Home Demonstration Club says her 51 hens are laying at the rate of not less than 25 eggs a day and as much as 31 eggs per day. In the month of November the hens layed 585 eggs or an average of 11 eggs for the month per hen. The average to the 17th. of this month is 7 or a total of 284.

Mrs. Roberts keeps the hens closed up in the house until 8:30 or 9:00 each morning with laying mash and warm water out for them. She says if she did not keep the hens up they would not eat the mash as they should, therefore, she would not get the eggs that she is getting. Mrs. Roberts made a bed of green feed for her hens.

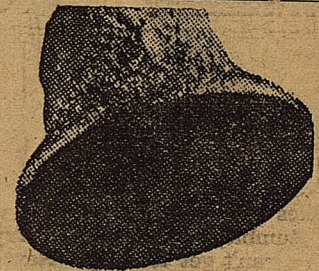

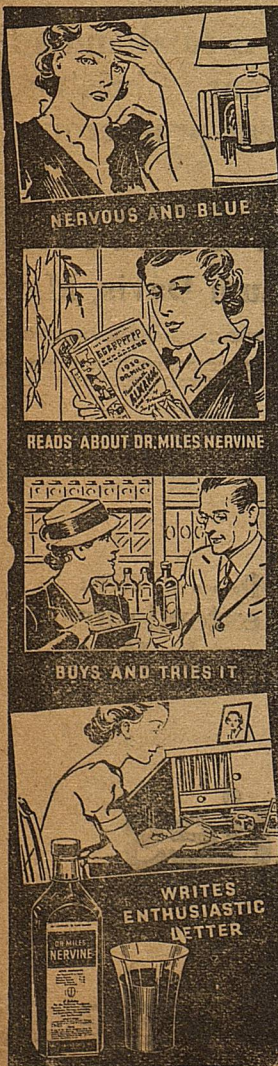

The Orange Bowl will have Mis-

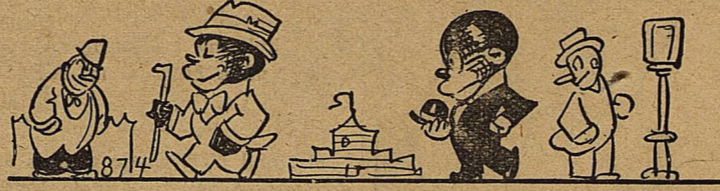

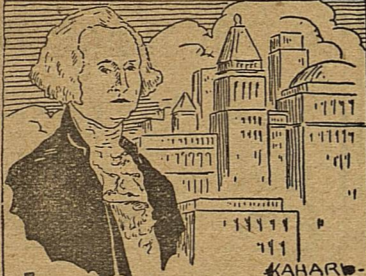

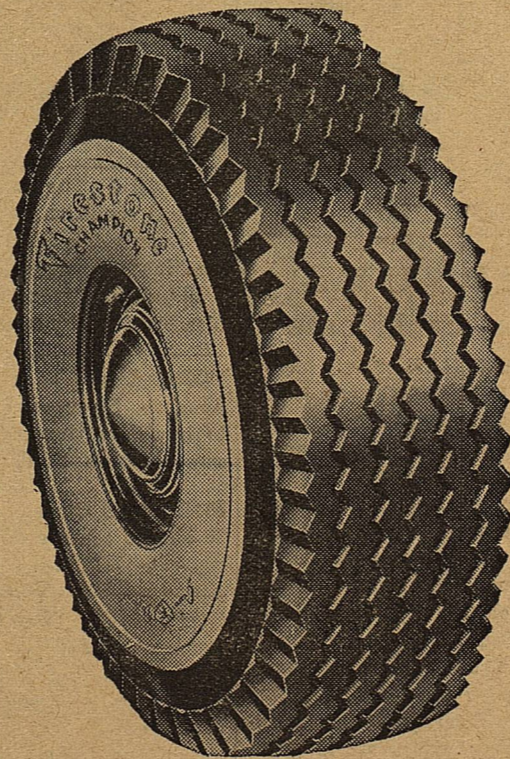
