Unofficial City Council Minutes

The City Council of the City of Eldorado held its Regular Meeting January 8, 1991, at 7:30 P.M. at the City Hall with all Councilmembers in attendance. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Preston. Also present were Thelma Bosmans, Roger Powell, Deputy David Doran and Sheriff Ronnie Norris.

MEET WITH CITIZENS PRESENT: Ms. Bosmans met with the Council on several items including the upcoming water tower project. She expressed concern for the location, safety, and advantages. The Councilmembers reviewed procedures, TCDP benefits, and agreed to obtain pictures, information and someone to answer questions about the tower to help alleviate any resident's safety concerns. This information will be made available in the near future. Fireman Roger Powell volunteered to assist as necessary.

Ms. Bosmans further asked for the Council's help with the continued removal of debris in Christian Addition as needed and inquired into the status of the complaints filed in Municipal Court regarding livestock and chickens.

FIRE DEPARTMENT: Roger Powell requested the Council's consideration to his appointment as Fire Marshal, due to the need for inspections required by the various state agencies monitoring child care facilities, the hospital/nursing home, and the school. After brief discussion, motion was made by John Callison and John Nikolauk that Roger Powell be appointed to the position to replace Richard Harris and Ronnie Norris. Motion carried.

Mr. Powell reported Fire Department personnel had logged 474 manhours in 1990 with 28 runs made (9 city fires, 18 county fires, 1 out-of-county assistance run to Mertzon). He also

reported 4 false alarms from controlled burns. He further requested the Council's assistance in planning for additional fire plugs. He will be compiling a plan for submittal to the Council in the near future.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE: Deputy David Doran reported on incident the night of December 25 in which the City Nightwatchman assisted the Sheriff's office at a disturbance. Legal guidelines from the City's attorney were reviewed, and the Council discussed procedures and instances to which the Nightwatchman may respond.

Sheriff Norris stated that plans were being laid for holding a HIV training session in Schleicher County. Further information will be forthcoming from his office so that personnel needing training may be included.

PUBLIC HEARING 1987 TCDP PROJECT:

Mayor Preston called the hearing to order on the 1987 Project to review Performance including the actual use of TCDP funds. Kay Howard of Gary R. Traylor & Associates was unable to attend due to illness. There were no visitors present for the hearing, and after brief discussion of the project, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Barbara Jackson that the Mayor be authorized to execute documents (Certificate of Completion and Completion Report) for submittal to TDOC. Motion carried.

UPDATE - 1989 PROJECTS:

Regarding the 1989 Water Tower Project, letter to the Catholic Church Diocese requesting acquisition of property for water tower site was reviewed. After discussion and clarification, motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by John Callison that the letter be executed by Mayor

Preston with changes made as noted. Motion carried.

Jim Allen of Utility Service Company was scheduled to attend; however, due to his illness with the flu, the Secretary reported that he would meet with the Council in about 10 days to discuss repairs to the ground storage tank as well as options available for his inspection of the water tower project as requested. The Secretary explained that the engineer warranties the design of the project and the contractor warranties his work for a limited period; however, limited inspection will be completed by the engineer and the City Superintendent.

David Todd was agreeable to working with Mr. Allen as the Council desired, but any fees charged by Mr. Allen for inspection of paint, welds, etc. is not a TCDP benefit cost and would be paid by the City. The projected fee per trip was discussed, and it was the unanimous decision of the Council that the extra inspection would be in the City's best interests. Due to receipt of the necessary waivers from TDOC and the Historical Commission, Mayor Preston executed the Todd Engineering Contract and the Gary R. Traylor & Associates Administration

by Jerry Swift County Extension Agent - Schleicher County WATER QUALITY FOR LIVESTOCK

Livestock require adequate amounts of safe water every day, otherwise their intake of feed will be reduced, production will be lowered, and the producer will suffer an economic loss.

Water accounts for 60 to 70 percent of the body weight of livestock, and consumption of water is more important than the consumption of food nutrients.

But livestock may experience health problems if only substandard water is available for drink.

In determining the quality of water available for livestock, decide whether the performance of livestock will be affected, if the water could serve as a carrier to spread disease, or if the acceptability or safety of animal products for human consumption will be affected.

Several elements found in water seldom offer problems to livestock because they do not occur at high levels in soluble form, or they are toxic only in excessive concentrations. These elements -- iron, copper, cobalt, zinc, iodide and manganese -- do not appear to accumulate in meat and milk products to the extent they would cause a problem.

But decaying animal and plant protein, animal metabolic waste, nitrogen fertilizers, silage juices and soil high in nitrogen-fixing bacteria may be sources of nitrates and nitrites. They are water-soluble and may leach into water tables or ponds.

Bacterial loads are carried by all surface waters, and livestock must be kept away from contaminated water that has not been adequately oxygenated because of bacterial pathogens there. To disinfect a water storage tank, add 1 ounce of chlorine bleach per 30 gallons of water, and hold for 12 hours before draining. Then refill with clean water.

Chlorination also can control certain bacteria.

Protect livestock from drinking unsafe water by providing alternate sources of safe water.

Livestock grazing operations may influence stream water quality where cattle are watered in or along streams or other drainage areas. Livestock manure accumulations around water wells, stock pens, spray pens, dipping vats and disposal sites for agricultural chemicals or their containers are potential sources for localized groundwater contamination.

Other potential nonpoint pollution sources -- or areas that may contribute uncontrolled rainfall runoff where pollutants are entrained and conveyed through diffuse drainage pathways to streams and lakes -- require careful site selection and management. These include open, unpaved feedlots, wastewater holding ponds, lagoons,

manure stockpiles, silos, dead animal disposal sites and on-site sewage treatment systems. Water wells should be located at least 150 to 300 feet from livestock corrals, septic tanks, manure treatment lagoons, and runoff holding ponds. Wells should be cased and grouted down to a restrictive layer or to the water table, and sealed around the well head with a concrete pad to prevent infiltration.

Specific recommended limits of concentration of some potentially toxic substances in livestock drinking water from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, National Academy of Sciences and the Council for Agricultural Science and Technology are included in L-2374, "Water Quality: Its Relationship to Livestock." The National Academy of Sciences also has a guide for use of saline waters for livestock in that publication. Ask for it at your local county office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Letter To The Editor

"If appearances are to be believed, and do not necessarily believe that they are to be believed, the United States is headed for military assault on Iraq in the coming weeks, possibly an assault initiated by the U.S. command in the Gulf, possibly an assault initiated by breakaway allies Israel or Britain or both in which the United States then becomes implicated. The tens of thousands of wounded even crippled survivors of the military conflict. And look in the imagination, into the eyes of the family members of those Americans who would die or be crippled or injured and so forth

in a war in that region. "That war is not worth the life or the crippling of a single American, because a just and equitable peace through negotiations with Iraq's President Saddam Hussein is so obviously available.

"If the President Bush doesn't

believe that such a peace can be negotiated, then he should delegate Lyndon LaRouche to negotiate it. I assure you that Lyndon LaRouche can negotiate a lasting peace with economic development.

This program is designed to assist elderly persons and low income families. Only one person in a household can receive commodity foods. Guidelines are based on household income.

Contract as authorized at the previous meeting of the Council. Work is projected to begin shortly after site is secured; construction is scheduled to begin in the Spring.

Concerning the 1989 Urgent Need Project (Wastewater Plant repairs), the Secretary reported that work was projected for Summer when the weather permits.

DECEMBER MINUTES, TAX REPORT, FINANCIAL REPORTS & BILLINGS:

The December 4 minutes were reviewed, and motion was made by John Nikolauk and seconded by Dora Bosmans that they be approved. Motion carried.

The December Tax Report was circulated for initialing, and the current billings were reviewed. Motion was made to approve the billings in motion by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Dora Bosmans. Motion carried. 1989-90 Audit Reports were distributed as well as December Financial Reports with various items pointed out by the Secretary.

PARKER & PARSLEY:

The Secretary reviewed correspondence from the Texas Water Commission regarding the TWC and TDH opposition to the application. One suggestion was that the City establish Wellhead Protection Program through the TWC which would delineate water wells and any possible sources of pollution (septic tanks, landfills, oil/gas wells, buried fuel tanks, etc.). Ms. Mayo reported that she had contacted Joe David Ross of the Sutton County Water Conservation District and Steve Williams of the Schleicher County Water District. Mr. Ross had provided information regarding Sutton County's progress, and the local district has indicated an interest in the program; however, according to information received, the City must begin the process. After discussion regarding testing/monitoring and costs and procedures involved, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that the City proceed with efforts to establish a Wellhead Protection Program for the City of Eldorado. Motion carried. The Secretary will report back as she obtains more information and begins date inventory.

TRAINING SEMINARS:

The Secretary reported on various seminars that she was interested in attending, particularly one dealing with compliance with the new Workman's Compensation Laws. Cost of the seminar was \$50.00 + one night's stay in either New Braunfels or Lubbock. After discussion, her request was denied. Other seminars included budgeting, records management, and the election law. No action was taken on these.

SALARY REVIEW/PERSONNEL POLICIES:

The Salary Review scheduled previously for November was held with all Councilmembers in attendance. Mr. Dean made recommendations regarding outside personnel and his recommendations were approved in motion by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans. Supervisory personnel were also approved for 3% increase with all increases effective February 1. Motion carried.

Discussion was held concerning merit and cost of living increases, as well as incentives to employees who make an extra effort.

The accumulation of Compensatory Time by several of the outside personnel was reviewed. No limitations were set in variance with the FLSA guidelines; however, it was recommended that personnel take the time as soon as work schedules could permit.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Jack Dean reported on ongoing street repair work and the accident adjacent to the City's gas plant on Hwy 190E. He reported that he had been in contact with State Highway Department personnel and he would continue to take allowed precautions at the site, including guardrails inside the City property. He reported that the RRC had cited the City for failure to have the necessary Drug Testing procedures completed, including educational requirements, and that he would be pursuing completion of those requirements.

Mr. Dean also reported continued problems with a restaurant's sewer stoppages due to grease, and he asked the Council for input. A letter is to be prepared by Mr. Dean for Mayor Preston's execution.

Regarding possible illegal dumping of wastes into the City's dumpsters, a letter will be prepared by Mr. Dean for Mayor Preston's signature to the company under investigation.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at approximately 11:30 P.M.
