Mittel Appointed To Tech Committee

Breast Cancer Detection Unit Scheduled For Friday

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Eldorado, Texas today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer

Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and

quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast Cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule.

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Eldorado, Texas on Friday, January 4th. You may call 853-2507 for an appointment.

Stock Show Scheduled January 10-12

The Schleicher County Livestock, Foods & Crafts Show will be held January 10-12. The creative arts department will be open to the public at 2 p.m. on Thursday, January 10. All livestock exhibits will be in place Thursday evening. The rabbit show will begin at 5 p.m.

Friday's show will begin at 9 a.m. with the judging of range ewes, range goats and market lambs, the dog show and swine. The dog show will be at 5 p.m. and always seems to be the most popular spectator event. There are two categories in the dog show: groomed and dressed. Boys and girls wishing to enter their pet in the dog show should have their dog at the show barn before 5 p.m. All dogs must be

on a leash. You may show your dog in both classes, but only once in each class.

Saturday's events begin at 8:30 a.m. with fitted lambs and meat goats, the youth food show, breeding cattle, steers, barbecue lunch, presentation of awards and the premium sale. The day will close with a dance from 8-12.

Boys and girls wishing to enter the youth food show should turn in their entry to the extension office by Wednesday, January 9 at 5 p.m. All foods must fit in one of the following categories. Categories are: (1) Yeast Breads, (2) Cakes, (3) Pies, (4) Candies, (5) Cookies. Food should not require refrigeration. No quick breads, muffins, etc. No cream pies. No cupcakes. No mixes. Recipes must be generous. To sell you must have at least 3 dozen cookies or 3 dozen pieces of candy. You must exhibit the entire recipe.

Any food not meeting these requirements will not be allowed to show or sell. You may enter as many categories as you like, but may sell only one entry. You must be a 4-H member, FFA member or FHA member to enter the food show. Age categories are as follows: (1) Sub-Junior - Kindergarten, first grade, second grade and third grade, (2) Junior - fourth grade through eighth grade, (3) Senior - ninth grade through twelfth grade.

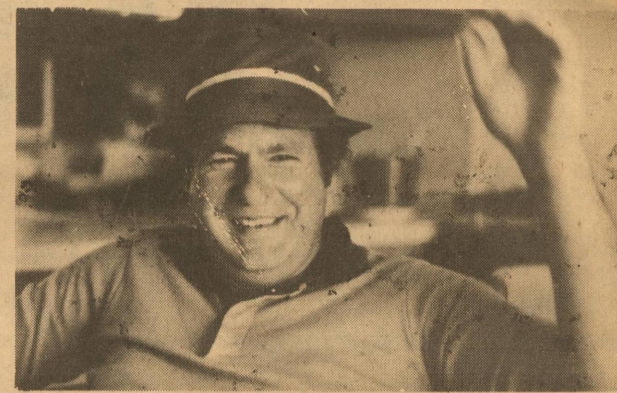
This article is not long enough to chronicle all of the divisions of humanity, many of

Might Mike Takes on Bindweed

A small mite has been given the okay for a big job - controlling one of the worst weeds that strangles domestic crops.

It took exhaustive studies, but Agricultural Research Service entomologist Sara S. Rosenthal proved that a mite from Europe, *Aceria malherbae*, attacks only field bindweed and a few closely related weeds.

Field bindweed is a vine - actually an out-of-control morningglory - that can squeeze out crop plants by growing around their stems. With roots that may reach 30 feet into the soil, bindweed steals nutrients that should feed crops. It also serves as a reservoir for crop insects and diseases, says Rosenthal, of ARS' Rangeland Weeds Laboratory in Bozeman, Montana.

The weed is most serious in the West and Midwest where it is difficult and expensive to control with herbicides and cultivation. It continues to spread despite the use of newer herbicides developed for perennial weeds.

Field bindweed is the 15th worst weed in the United States; crops that are particularly hard hit include corn and wheat. Culver J. Deloach, Jr., and Paul E. Boldt, ARS entomologists at the Grassland Protection Research unit, Temple, Texas, cooperated with Rosenthal in introducing the bindweed-eating mite to the United States.

They released mites in the spring of 1989 in northern Texas and New Jersey. At both sites, the mite overwintered, an indication that it's adapting to its new home. The scientists will continue to measure how well *Aceria malherbae* thrives and controls bindweed.

The mite joins another imported moth that attacks bindweed, *Tyta luctuosa*. This summer marks scientists' third attempt at getting it established;

previous releases failed because the areas were too hot or too dry. This summer the moth was released in more favorable climates-southwestern Arkansas and central Missouri.

Rosenthal and fellow entomologists continue their search for other exotic mites and insects. Often it's a combination of hungry bugs that brings weeds under control. Some eat roots; others, like these, feed on stems or leaves. Eventually, when the insects take enough energy from

the weed, it dies.

Scientists at the agency's Biological Control of Weeds Laboratory located near Rome, Italy, collect and ship the mites to Boldt and Deloach, the Rome laboratory specializes in locating such European insects. Many of our trouble-some weeds were accidentally brought to the United States with the imported crop seed. Unfortunately, their weed-eating enemies usually stayed behind in the old country.

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Civilian Astronaut Sweepstakes

Less than a year from now, someone will get the word he or she has been selected to go into space to visit Mir, the Soviet space station orbiting the Earth.

It's the first time virtually everyone has a chance to become an astronaut. The astronaut doesn't have to be a test pilot...or a scientist...or compete against other candidates. It could be almost anyone from almost anywhere. It could be you.

The three men who've made it happen are Texans, all from suburban Houston.

Their company, Space Travel Services Corp., is headquartered in the Clear Lake area of Houston, right across NASA Road 1 from the Johnson Space Center, where the US manned space program is planned and managed. All three have close ties to the space program and share its commitment to putting and keeping people in space.

David J. Mayer, president and chief executive officer of Space Travel, studied physics at the University of Houston, where he was president of both the University Space Society and University of Houston Students for the Exploration and Development of Space. David has worked in computer system development and construction in the NASA area. He lives in Webster, adjacent to the NASA complex.

His Space Travel co-founder, Howard J. Stringer, of Stafford, also has a background in computer systems and other high-tech fields. He graduated cum laude from the University of Texas and his Masters of Business Administration is from UH. Howard, too, is active in organizations which support

space programs. He's a director of the Houston Space Society and has served as its president, secretary and treasurer.

The third member of Space Travel's management team is James El. Davidson, senior vice president for marketing and business development, of Friendswood. Jim graduated from Columbia University, then earned his MBA from Rice. He's been working for companies planning commercial launches of space vehicles. Davidson shares Mayer's and Stringer's commitment to keeping man and women in space. He is, like Howard, a former treasurer and president of the Houston Space Society and serves as a director of the group. Jim's a former director of the National Space Society and is a senior associate of the Space Studies Institute.

The company has a contract with the Soviet space bureau to put an American aboard a Soyuz space capsule with two cosmonauts and fly him or her to Mir, the space station in orbit 400 kilometers above the Earth. (400 km is about the distance from Space Travel's office to Dallas, but without the traffic.)

Anyone interested in the trip to space can call the Space Travel information number, 1-900-258-2MIR for details. There is a \$2.99 charge per call. Callers

who wish to be considered as potential guest astronauts for the flight may stay on the line and register at no additional charge.

The selection will be made next December, when an independent judging organization selects one person at random from among the registrants. That person will have the option of taking a million-dollar cash prize or, sometime in late 1992 or early 1993, riding a Russian rocket to the space station, Mir. He or she will spend about a week in orbit and then return...a permanent part of space history.

"We don't know who that person will be," Mayer said, "and we've turned over complete control of the selection to an outside firm. But it sure wouldn't disappoint us any if that person turned out to be a fellow Texan."
