

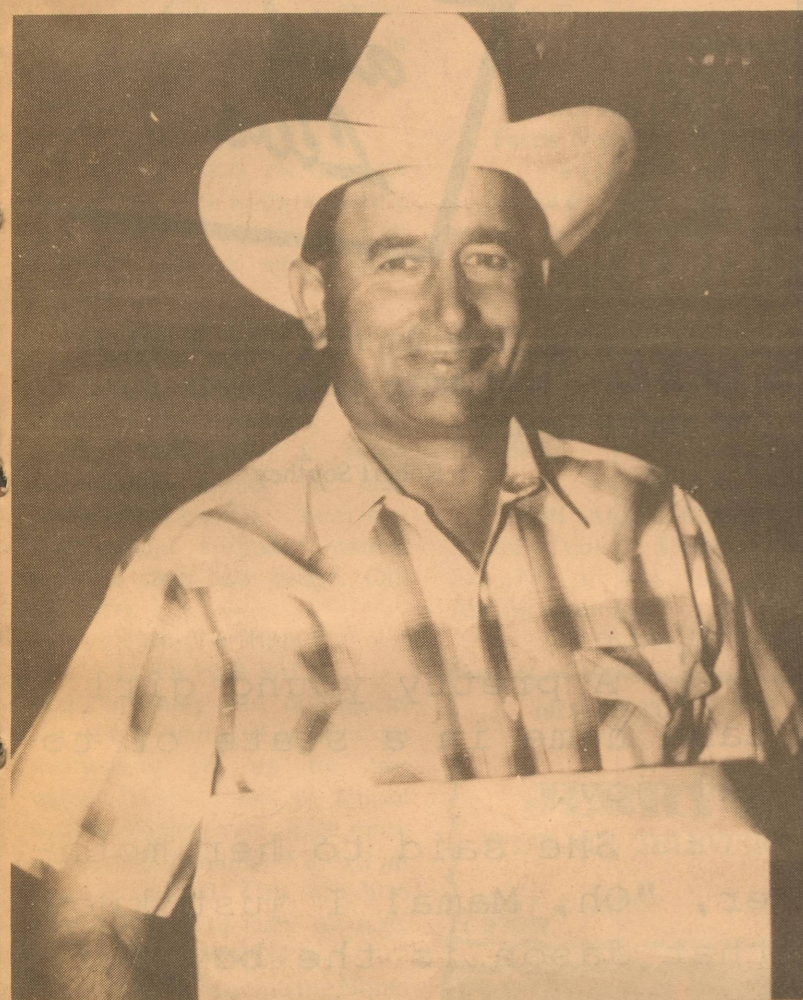

De Lux

Lux - Outstanding Conservationist

The Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District is proud to have De Lux as its outstanding conservationist this past year. De owns 320 acres and operates an additional 1135 acres in Schleicher County.

De has been active in many civic activities to help improve the community he lives in. He served as County Commissioner for three years.

From 1976 to 1985, he served as a director on the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District board. He

was very active in promoting conservation education activities for youth.

De farms about 1200 acres, raising cotton and milo as his primary crops. He has been involved in three Great Plains Conservation Program contracts. During these contracts he has applied excellent conservation management practices.

De understands that maintaining cover crops and residues on the soil surface helps to reduce soil erosion.

He realizes that productivity is linked to good soil

management. Residues are incorporated back into the soil to improve soil condition.

Slopes in Schleicher County are very complex due to topography. Terraces are necessary to prevent rill and gully erosion and conserve moisture.

De has constructed over 62,500 feet of terraces. He has an additional 30,000 feet yet to construct.

Rangeland management is also a concern to De. De operates about 250 acres of rangeland. Treedoing and range seeding have changed this low

productive pasture into a high quality producing pasture. This sideots grama has replaced mesquite, pricklypear and other less desirable plants.

Prescribed burning and aerial spraying have also been used to enhance forage quality and suppress undesirable plants such as this mesquite and pricklypear.

The directors express their sincere gratitude to De Lux for his outstanding accomplishments in promoting conservation education and application in Schleicher County.

West Texas Anglers

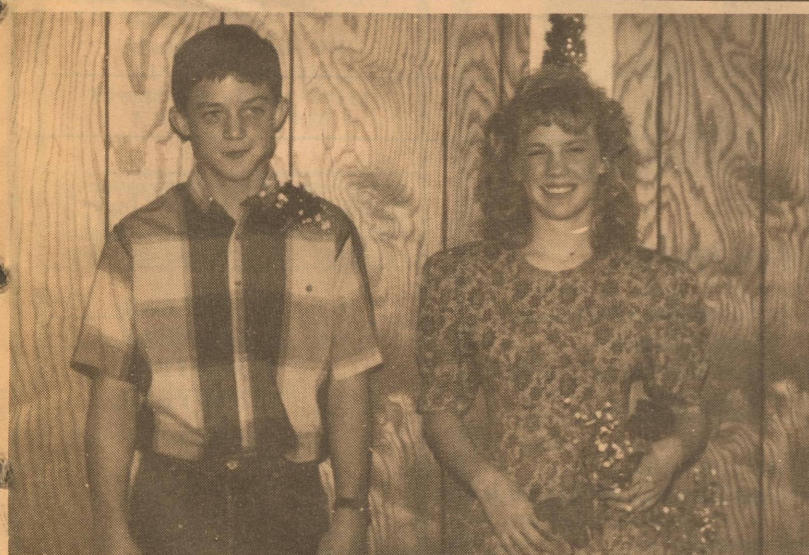

The WTA encourages all catch and release practices. They hope to improve their skills as bass anglers through a friendly exchange of bass-catching techniques.

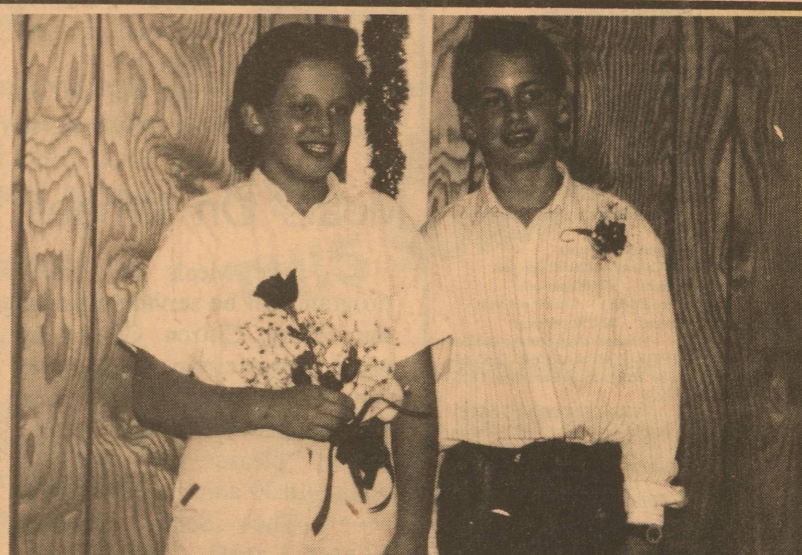

Life Among The Fishes

This is my first winter with a wood stove. The thing eats wood at a pretty rapid rate. Although I have several sources of firewood it is no easy thing cutting it, getting it stacked and then watching it disappear into the belly of the iron can. It does keep the house warm but I am grateful that this is not Minnesota and I have an

alternative heating system. Where I grew up coal stoves were still in use until I hit double figures. Many of the older houses had them. I remember my Grandfather's. It was black with white porcelain handles and my Aunt Jennie could make some of the most delicious roast pork it that oven. I never could figure out how she knew the temperature was just right since

there did not appear to be a thermometer anywhere. On very cold winter Sundays when we visited we, at the time there were six of us children, would sit on a long wooden bench beside the stove. It was always warm and being very young I often became drowsy as we sat there listening to the Italian conversation of the adults, understanding little of it.

My Aunt often cooked yams in that coal stove and they not only warmed a hungry kids stomach they warmed his hands and heart also.

I am afraid my kids don't sit by the stove and as yet I have not cooked yams in it but the fire does have a warmth that forced air just doesn't seem to give.

your equipment has water level controls - and buying a washer with a built-in suds return.

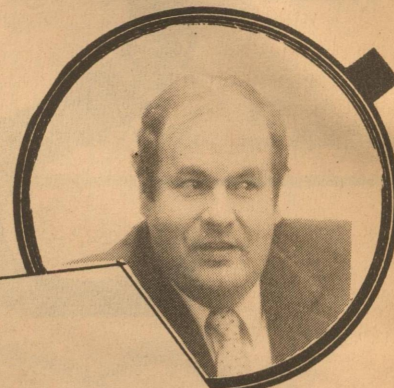
Running your dishwasher only when it's full and letting your dishes air-dry will conserve both water and electricity. If you wash dishes by hand, use a dishpan, put dishes in a rack and rinse them all at once.

Watering your lawn and washing your car can account for as much as 50 percent of your warm weather water use, according to water conservation authorities.

To cut lawn watering usage, water in early morning with a low spraying sprinkler to decrease evaporation losses, and mulch around trees to hold moisture longer.

Use a bucket of soapy water to wash your car and rinse it with a hose that has a shut-off nozzle.

have determined that two-thirds of the water used in an average home is used in the bathroom. They advise taking a short shower instead of a bath, to save up to 35 gallons of water, and to further conserve water by installing a flow control device in the shower and an aerator on the lavatory tap.

Turning off the water while you soap up, apply shampoo or brush your teeth is an easy way to add to your savings.

Placing a water-filled, capped, 1-quart plastic bottle (not glass) in the toilet tank can save about one-fourth of each gallon out of the normal 3 to 7 gallons per flush. Also, check the toilet for leaks by putting a few drops of food coloring in the tank. If colored water shows in the bowl after 15 to 30 minutes without flushing, you have a leak that

needs repairing.

To detect leaks throughout your home, Extension specialists suggest you turn off everything in the house that uses water, check your meter reading, then check it again in an hour. If it hasn't moved, you have a watertight home; if it has, check hose connections, toilets and faucets for leaks.

A faucet that leaks on drop per second wastes 2,400 gallons per year, enough to run 160 full cycles on an automatic dishwasher, so it's important to check and replace faulty washers.

Careful use of appliances and other water-related equipment can also put more money in your pocket, according to Schleicher County Extension agent Jerry Swift.

Other economy measures include washing only full loads - unless

patient, the basic fee is \$40.00. The charge will be greater depending on what service the physician provides while in the E.R. The charge may also be greater depending on the time of day; for example, between midnight and 6 a.m. their minimum charge is \$80. Physician fees can easily be much greater depending on the service rendered.

Total: The hospital's E.R. fee and the physician's E.R. fee will add up to at least \$87.00, even if the patient just has the sniffles. For problems which are not emergencies, it is more

economical to see the physician during regular office hours. Of course, the hospital and physicians are here to serve you 24 hours a day, in case of emergency.

How are charges established? The physicians set their own fees, physician fees are not controlled by the hospital. The hospital reviews its charges at least annually, in the light of actual cost of service and in the light of what other hospitals charge for the same service. Adjustments in charges generally must be approved by the board

of directors and by Blue Cross before being implemented. Blue Cross has contracts with nearly every hospital in Texas. They know what costs are reasonable, and agree only to those price increases which are in line with the actual cost of providing service and in line with what other hospitals have to charge for their services.

Conclusion: While E.R. charges may seem high, they are generally in line with the cost of providing service and in line with the price of that same service at other hospitals.

Emergency Care Is Expensive

One of the main reasons for maintaining a hospital in a rural community is the provision of emergency care. While this is an important service, it is also a costly service.

The hospital charge: The basic Emergency Room fee is \$47.00. Lab tests, x-rays, other diagnostic procedures, supplies, medicines, etc. all cost extra. E.R. charges totaling over \$180 are not unusual.

The doctor charge: When a physician is called to the emergency room to meet a

Do you ever wonder when some of the older buildings in Eldorado were built and who constructed them? In researching a few of the buildings, I found their history to be very interesting.

The Glidden Foods building was constructed in 1928-29 by F.D. Keel. It was said the construction of the store was a

business investment during the oil boom of 1928-29. He leased the building.

The building was partitioned into business spaces. One part being a Barber shop leased by Bill Clovis, the other a grocery store leased by A.D. Richey.

Jack Hext opened a locker plant in the building in 1945, closing after Rural

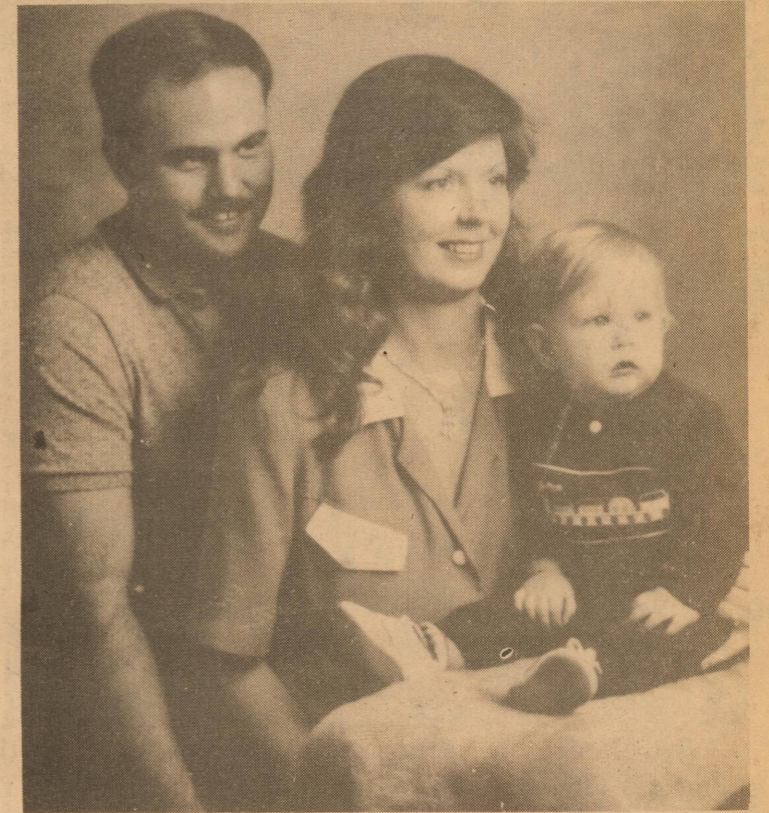
Electrification Association brought power to Schleicher County and customers began buying home freezers. He then opened a grocery store in the entire building.

Granville Hext came to Eldorado to manage the grocery business and later bought it from Jack.

Jim and Sue Glidden

bought the grocery business from Granville in 1985. Glidden Foods suffered a great loss from a fire in 1990, but has rebuilt to operate a prominent business today.

The building that houses the business is still in the Hext family, owned by Judy Skaggs, daughter of Jack and Ernestine Hext.

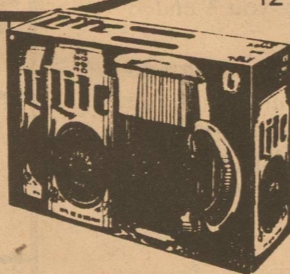


