## Paul McCallum To Speak At Taste Of Eldorado

Paul W. McCallum, executive director of the Grapevine Convention and Visitors Bureau, will be the guest speaker for the Chamber of Commerce's Taste of Eldorado. This event will be held at 6:30 on Saturday, January 26th at the Memorial Building.

Mr. McCallum is currently serving as President of Texas Association of Convention & Visitors Bureaus. He is also currently serving on the Boards of the Texas Festivals Association, the Dallas Fort Worth Area Tourism Council, The Texas Girls Choir and is current chairman of the Grapevine Historic Preservation and Cultural Resources Foundation.

Mr. McCallum has been in the hospitality industry for eighteen years and has held positions with Europort BV, Industrial Presentations, Inc., Melbourne Tourism Authority, Fort Worth Convention & Visitors Bureau and is currently the Director of The Grapevine Convention & Visitors Bureau.

Mr. McCallum has tourism promotion experience in Australia, Europe, Japan and North America. McCallum notes two experiences that he feels will help him in his presentation to the Eldorado Chamber of Commerce. First being while he was with the Melbourne Tourism Authority, he worked with the Victorian Government in establishing tourism programs in

the remote areas of that state and secondly, during the middle 1980's while he was on the Board of the West Texas Tourism Council he made a number of presentations to small West Texas towns located on Interstate 10 and 20. Mr. McCallum said, "a good local tourism promotion program has much of the same elements irregardless of the size of the community and that the basics are the same for a community of 1,000 or 1 million." McCallum has attended colleges in both Australia and Texas and holds degrees in Business Administration, Marketing and Psychology.

He has received the coveted International Association

of Convention & Visitors Bureaus Marketing Award twice. McCallum is currently a member of the Society of America Travel Writers, American Society of Travel Agents, SKAL, American Society of Association Executives and Travel Industry Association of America. He has also either founded or chaired at least five major festivals and has served on many national and international hospitality industry advisory committees. He is an active member of the Grapevine Rotary Club, the American Cancer Society and First Presbyterian Church of Grapevine. ### RUSSELL CLARK

Hi, my name is Marvin Russell Clark. I go by Russell because my grandfather, great-grandfather and my dad are all Marvins too. I'm 11 years old and live in Eldorado, Texas. My sister, Amy and I are taught at home and I am in the fifth grade. I'm active in 4-H and a boys group at our church, called Royal Rangers. I also have 2 pigs for a 4-H project.

I have raised rabbits for 4 years. My sister and I started with 2 Holland Lops and one crossbreed. I presently raise Harlequins, Californians, Dutch, Netherland Dwarfs, Holland Lops, and MiniLops. I am also a member of the National Specialty Club of each breed. My favorite breed is the Harlequin. I have blue and lilac magpies.

My family started showing rabbits 3 years ago. We go to 2 or 3 shows a month during show season. This was my second National Convention. I had my birthday, November 8, on the road to Tampa for Convention. Winning Rabbit Prince was a nice, late birthday surprise.

Conventions are lots of fun. You get to see all the neat stuff in the booths. I saw some rabbits I had never seen before. My new friend I met from Kansas, Wesley Vogts and I spent a lot of time on the paddleboats and at the remote control boats outside the Convention Building.

The tests were harder this year than last year, so I was really surprised when they called out Prince as Marvin Clark. I wasn't sure it was really me because I am usually called

Russell. My parents sent me on up to get my plaque, medal, sash and a really neat cap.

I have been a member of the ARBA for about 3 years. I am also a member of the Eldorado Rabbit Club and the Texas Rabbit Breeders Association. I enjoy showing Rabbits. It is hard to get up at, 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning to drive 4 to 5 hours to go to a show. I have learned that awards come with hard work and study. It is not easy to cull or lose rabbits that you get attached to, but is necessary. I really like playing with the babies when they start hopping out of the nestbox. I really dislike disinfecting water bottles and cleaning out the barns. We have about 85 holes and those rabbits sure make a lot of fertilizer.

My parents say that we are going to California for the next convention. I hope other kids who read this will come to the convention and enter the royalty contest. The grownups who put on the youth part of the convention do a good job. I would like to say thank you to them and to the ARBA for having a youth program and for the opportunity to be the National Rabbit Prince.

These employees have the words embroidered on the back of their shirts. I guess they are sort of a 911 corps for grocery problems. Imagine being lost in the vegetable section unable to find the canned goods. Soon over the intercom comes the message, "Shopper down in produce needs assistance, send

one of the Service Corp." Springing to your rescue is some marketing major in fatigues and a red beret who immediately whisks you off to the canned goods, or paper products, just before the bin of rutabagas crashes on your child occupying the grocery cart.

I may be wrong about these Service Corps. Maybe they are there to keep you from making bad purchases. They leap out at you if they see you buying too many items with "palm oil" or getting the cereals with too much sugar

added. "Excuse me sir, I don't think you should be buying quite so many donuts, considering you had to enter the store through the service entrance. in voluntarily applying conservation practices that will help protect or improve water quality.

The Upper North Bosque River Watershed contains 229,760 acres in Erath, Hamilton and Bosque Counties. The primary objective of the project will be to assist dairies in installing animal waste management systems and applying the best management practices needed to significantly reduce or prevent the potential for pollution of surface and groundwater.

Accomplishing rapid, voluntary producer adoption of recommended

practices and systems through extensive and focused educational, technical and financial assistance programs is the overall goal of the project.

Four lead agencies responsible for the project include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

A Technical Advisory Task Force composed of personnel from the four agencies has been established to conduct project activities. An Interagency

Planning Team and a Local Coordinating Committee will aid the task force in carrying out the goals of the project.

A five-year plan will take the project through fiscal year 1994. Informational and educational programs developed throughout this period will benefit not only local producers, but will extend to other regions and resource areas with similar concerns.

These concentrated efforts will greatly enhance producer and public awareness of their major roles and ways for citizens to contribute to protection of the water resource.

## SCISD Board Of Trustees Meet

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on January 14, 1991, at 6:00 p.m. in the Administration Building.

The meeting was called to order by Phil McCormick, President of the Board. Ray Ballew reported that the proposed 36-inch pipeline scheduled to pass through the county has been reduced to a 10-inch line. Tax collections are proceeding well, and the district continues to pursue delinquent taxes.

Scott Barton, Middle School Principal, presented the Principal's Report for this month. He reported that present enrollment at Eldorado Middle School is 250 students. This number includes 59 fifth graders, 58 sixth graders, 54 seventh graders, and 79 eighth graders. The average daily attendance has been 97.9%. Barton reported that his campus is currently serving approximately thirty special education students, and that

number may be even higher next year. He feels that for next year another special education aide or teacher is needed. In 1991-92 Barton plans to go back to an eight period day with a full year of reading for seventh and eighth graders, and he would like to offer a vocational program for at least one period per day next year. Mr. Barton reported that the middle school basketball teams are doing well, and that the student council took up canned goods, and purchased hams and delivered them to several needy families during the Christmas holidays.

Judy Blair discussed the preliminary results of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test that was given in October. She noted that remediation efforts are being implemented for those students who did not pass one or more sections of the test, and that the district expects final results from the state in late January or early February.

Dr. Larry Blair reported that the district has been requested through an attorney to provide services locally for a

deaf child rather than send him to the Regional Day School for the Deaf in San Angelo. An ARD committee must determine the best placement for the child. According to Dr. Blair, Southwest Track Builders, Inc. has returned again to finish the track; however, the district is not satisfied with the results and is withholding final payment until the work has been satisfactorily completed.

Board members were informed that the damaged floor in the elementary school continues to be a point of contention between SCISD and the asbestos abatement contractor. The district has received an estimate for the cost of repairing the damage, and an attempt will be made to reach a compromise with the abatement contractor.

Board members were given information on salaries in area districts and an analysis of similar districts across the state and of local businesses. In action items, the Board approved the financial report as presented for the month of December and the revised Technology Plan as presented. They also approved the application for an American Express card for school use. Action on the school-owned property adjacent to the Ag Barn was tabled pending a decision by the County Commissioner's Court. Board Members went into executive session to discuss personnel issues. Following the reconvening into regular session, the meeting was adjourned.

**Gene Found for Osteoarthritis:** Very early findings from a single family have pinpointed a particular gene that appears to be responsible for severe generalized osteoarthritis at an early age. ## Rural Hospital Facts & Figures

by Steve Goode

Rural Texas has 20 percent of the State's population and 42 percent of the state's licensed hospitals; that makes it sound as if we rural folks have more than our share. But remember, these are small hospitals. Here is another way to look at it: rural Texas has 20 percent of the state's population and only 16 percent of the state's licensed hospital beds. Now that sounds as if we have less than our share. But rural hospitals take care of the basics and refer complicated matters to specialists. As a result, while rural Texas has 20 percent of the population and 16 percent of the beds, we have only 11 percent of the hospital admissions.

A community must recognize the warning signs of a hospital in danger. As a rule of thumb, to be self supporting, a

hospital needs to serve a population of 18,000, have 10 doctors, and an average daily census of 20. Another warning sign is if the Medicare/Medicaid patient load is over 50 percent of admissions. Not having enough revenue and patients appears to affect virtually all hospitals that close; however, "some circumstance peculiar to an individual hospital can make the difference between closure and continued operation... Some hospitals that are financially sound will nevertheless close. Some financially troubled hospitals will survive, perhaps because a determined community is prepared to pay additional taxes to keep its hospital open\*\* such as has been the case in Schleicher County.

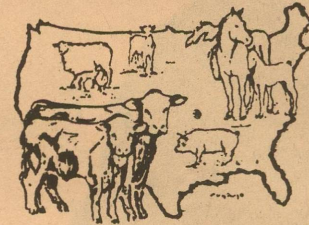

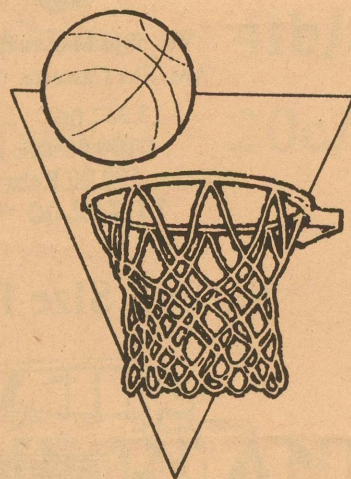

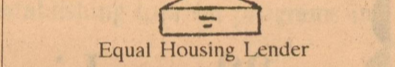
