### Buckle Up For Love



Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week, sponsored by Texas Department of Health and Schleicher County EMS, will be observed February 10-16, 1991 with the theme "Buckle Up for Love."

Gene Weatherall, chief of the health department's Bureau of Emergency Management, said that in 1989 more than 700 Texas children died of

injuries that could have been prevented. "The good news," Weatherall said, "is that child safety seats prevented 28,000 children may ride in a safety seat or buckled by a safety belt. Everyone in the front seat, no matter what their age, must ride buckled up. Parents who want to borrow a child safety seat can contact the health department's Saferiders Program at

1-800-252-8255."

"We hope the Buckle Up for Love program will make the residents of Eldorado more aware of the positive aspects of buckling their safety belts," said Susie Richters, EMS volunteer. Injuries and about 200 deaths in children four and younger in this country last year.

"Trauma is still the number one killer of children,"

said Ray Ballew, EMS President, "and children are most vulnerable to trauma when they ride in motor vehicles." According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, child safety seats are 71 percent effective in preventing fatalities.

Texas law requires children under age 2 to ride in a safety seat; from age 2 to 4,

## County Agents Report

### SOME PLANT DEATH IS PREVENTABLE

Have you ever had a plant die, even one that you had carefully planted and pampered? Of course you have. Plants die all the time. They die on everyone, from the professional horticulturist to the novice gardener. Regardless of the care we may give plants, they just don't seem able to survive. And it may have been no fault of your own.

There are, however, some problems and situations that are the avoidable kind. These can be categorized as follows:

**Poorly adapted plants** - Don't waste your time, labor and money on plants not suited to your area. There are many from which to select, including a multitude of outstanding native trees and shrubs.

**Transplanting at the wrong time** - While we can buy and plant balled and burlapped and container-grown nursery stock year-round, we should only dig up and transplant established plants in December, January or February when the plants are dormant. When digging and transplanting plants, it is essential that you prune a fourth to half of the canopy on transplanted materials to bring the top into balance with what's left of the damaged root system.

**Excessive fill over feeder roots** - Adding more than six inches of heavy clay soil over the feeder roots of trees will often suffocate and kill established trees in two or three years. This condition is especially prevalent following new home construction. Even the repeated movement of heavy equipment under and around trees on the construction site can prove to be fatal due to soil compaction and resulting root damage.

**Lack of deep watering** - All plants, but especially newly planted trees and shrubs need deep, thorough soakings. This is

especially critical during the summer months. The best way to water woody plants is to lay your hose under the dripline, turn it on slowly and soak the soil thoroughly. Simply watering the lawn or sprinkling the flower beds is not enough for your woody plants in hot weather.

Too much fertilizer

Over-fertilization by over-zealous gardeners can deal a fatal blow to landscape plants. Use fertilizer with care and caution, especially during hot weather, and always read and follow the manufacturer's directions on the bag or box.

Failure to mulch - Research indicates mulching does more to

help new plants establish than any other single factor. A heavy mulch applied around newly planted or established trees and shrubs will work wonders and help to ensure survival and improved growth. What to use? Pine bark, grass clippings, pine needles, compost, straw, hay. All are excellent.

## Houston Livestock Show

Four FFA members and ten 4-H members from Eldorado will be joining other FFA and 4-H members from throughout the state for showing competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 16 through March 3 at the Astrohall.

Those FFA members attending from Eldorado are: Jimmy Barton - Market Lambs, Christy Robinson - Market Lambs, Ericka Schooley - Market Lambs, and Gabe Schooley - Market Lambs. Local 4-H members to attend are: Lindsay Griffin - Market Lambs, Jodie Hooten - Market Steers, Lindsay Johnson - Market Lambs, Carmen Joy - Market Lambs, Madolyn Joy - Market Lambs, Justin Leggett - Market Lambs, Crissi McCormick - Market Steers, Matt McCormick - Market Steers, Eric McGinnis - Market Lambs, and Whitney McGinnis - Market Lambs.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing 862 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed

13,000 entries this year. A variety of animals are shown in the junior show division: market steers, market swine, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Total money paid in 1990 at the four junior show auctions exceeded \$2.7 million.

"The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is committed to benefiting youth and supporting education. We feel we accomplish these goals through the active role we take in

supporting the second week of livestock competition, our junior show. This second week features the livestock projects of youngsters from all over the state and we're proud of the dedication and hard work they give to each of their animals," said Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo assistant manager.

All net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state. Currently, more than 1,000 students receive some form of Show-sponsored financial assistance, with 30 research projects funded. More than 9,000 volunteers ensure the success of each year's event.

## Special Meeting Of City Council

A Special Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held at 5:00 P.M. on Monday, February 11, 1991, at the City Hall. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Preston. All Councilmembers were in attendance.

### JIM ALLEN:

Jim Allen, Utility Service Company, met with the Council to review findings after his inspection of the City's 500,000 gal. ground water storage tank. He reported that the mid-sixties tank was in good condition; however, he reported that there were a large number of pittings as well as rust on the roof beams. He proposed sandblasting and applying 12 mil of epoxy to the tank with spot repairs to the floor which was fiberglassed in approximately 1979. Estimated cost was \$20,000 with a 10 yr. guarantee on the

epoxy coating. He suggested the tank be drained and inspected every 5 years. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the emergency repairs be authorized. Motion carried.

### ACCIDENT:

A second billing from Jim Bass Ford for additional repairs to Don Baker's pickup was presented. After discussion among themselves and with the City's attorney via telephone, it was the unanimous decision of the Council to deny to pay the second billing for \$588.89 due to the Council's good faith payment of the \$1338.94 first billing. ## Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, February 5, 1991, at 7:30 P.M. at the City Hall with all Councilmembers present, with the exception of Richard Preston. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Pro Tem John Nikolauk. No citizens were present.

### HANOVER ENERGY:

Randy Lentz, representing Hanover Energy, requested the City's consideration to request City sewer service, should the company select that option. The Council discussed options available, guidelines for acceptance, maintenance, restrictions and the need for Hanover to install a pump. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that Hanover be allowed to tie into the sewer system with a private pump line. Motion carried. Sewage fee will be determined at a future date.

### JANUARY MINUTES, TAX REPORT, FINANCIAL REPORTS, BILLINGS:

The Minutes of the January 8 and January 22 meetings were reviewed with some clarifications being made. Motion was made by Dora Bosmans that the minutes be approved as presented. Motion carried.

The January Tax Report was circulated for initiating, and the January Financial Reports were distributed. Discussion was held concerning the changes in the Balance Sheet from the previous year's figures.

Billings were circulated for approval, and motion was made by John Callison that they be approved as presented. Motion was seconded by Dora Bosmans. Motion carried.

### UPDATES:

The item "Drug Testing Compliance" on the agenda was deleted due to no further developments being reportable. The Secretary reported that the expenses billed to Floyd Butler were unpaid, and asked for input from the Council, who asked her to pursue collection by legal means. The Garves Yates Trucking billing for damages is also unpaid. She reported that she had written collection letters on various outstanding accounts.

Concerning the January 16 accident involving City equipment, John Nikolauk reviewed recommendation from Thomas Giovannitti and Mayor Preston's conversation with Don Baker, the other party involved in the accident, who refused to settle for the \$1000 offered. After discussion, motion was made by Barbara Jackson that the City pay 100% of the damage estimate (\$1338.94) from Jim Bass Ford. Motion was seconded by Debbie Ballew. Voting "for" was Dora Bosmans, with John Callison voting "against". Motion carried.

Concerning the R & H truck bypass, John Callison reported on his conversation with Tony Cain who suggested the City make an offer on the property the City desired. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that a letter be written to Mr. Cain offering \$2500.00 for Lots 1 & 6 in Block 88 and Lots 1 & 6 in Block 89. Motion carried.

### JIM ALLEN, UTILITY SERVICE COMPANY:

Jim Allen met with the Council to review scope of inspection services on the upcoming water tower project. He discussed mill scale removal and the tie rod and weld inspections necessary to ensure a well-built water tower. After discussion, it was agreed that the Secretary would contact Mr. Allen when the bid specifications are completed and that he be present at the bid opening, with his fee set at \$175.00/trip.

According to Mr. Allen, the City crew will begin draining the ground storage tank, and he expects to have the tank ready for Council viewing at 5:00 P.M. on Monday, February 11.

### WORKER'S COMPENSATION:

Discussion was held concerning Don Griffin's followup letter to the Council after his meeting with Giovannitti, Callison and Mayo, and his telephone conversation with Tippy Foster of the Texas Worker's Compensation Commission. The Secretary reported on the plan adopted by the Schleicher County Medical Center and the County as well as her conversation with Crawford & Co. Adjustors, who are in the process of revamping their proposal "of services to the City. Upcoming area TWCC seminars were reviewed, and it was agreed that arrangements be made to attend, if possible. The Secretary reported on changes made on the Worker's Comp statement attached to the job application forms. She was instructed to contact Mrs. Foster about the City's status as "self-insured" vs. "non-subscriber" and follow up with a confirmation letter.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Jack Dean reported on the latest landfill inspection. He also reported that several items of equipment were in need of repairs.

Regarding the wastewater plant test results, he circulated lab reports for January 22 and January 28 which showed results within compliance. He reported trash pickup resumed at Western, and that he had visited with R & H supervisors about the gas regulator situation.

Mr. Dean further reported that street repairs were ongoing and that the South water well needed repairs.

### TCDP PROJECTS (1989):

After discussion, motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the Council approve the Resolution establishing a policy for Records Retention, the Resolution establishing an Affirmative-Action Plan, and a Plan for Affirmative Action. Motion carried. Mayor Pro Tem executed the documents in the Mayor's absence.

### MAY 4 OFFICER ELECTION:

After brief discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the Order and Notice for the May 4 Officer Election be executed for the election of the Mayor and two Councilmembers (2 year terms). Motion carried.

### CHRISTIAN LEASE AGREEMENT:

The Councilmembers reviewed and discussed the materials from the Extension Service and the example of an acceptable lease as sent by Todd's office for the Council's use in making a preliminary draft. After input from all parties present, the Secretary was instructed to obtain a legal opinion from Tom Giovannitti and then to proceed with the draft which must be prepared by March 20 according to the TWC Order. Final negotiations must be completed by August 20.

### AMENDMENT #2, UTILITY ORDINANCE #101-89:

Proposed Amendment #2 requiring the installation of water and gas cutoffs on the private side of all future taps was reviewed. Motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the Amendment #2 be approved. Motion carried.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at 11:15 P.M.

## SCISC Board Of Trustees Meet

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on February 11, 1991, at 6:00 P.M. in the Administration Building.

"Chef extraordinaire," Danny Crowder was presented a Bravo Award to show the district's appreciation for the many volunteer hours he has spent cooking for school activities. Paige Ragsdale, high school G/T teacher, also received a Bravo Award for her work in coordinating a very successful career day for the high school students.

Ken Newman, High School Principal, shared the high school calendar with Board Members and reported on recent happenings at his campus. Among the items he reported are the following: World Studies is being taught this spring semester; two student teachers, Mr. Heath and Ms. Sheffler, are on the high school campus this semester; TAAS remediation is in progress; G/T students hosted a successful career day; a career decision making inventory will be given to freshmen and eighth graders in February; the Student Council will sponsor "Target Middle School" to help parents and students plan for college; Typing I classes are typing letters to ex-students of SCISD who are in Saudi Arabia; the Discipline Management Planning Committee met to review the district plan; present plans are for an eight period day next year; the UIL One Act play this year is *One Foot in Heaven*; 30 students qualified for the Academic Excellence Foundation Scholarships last semester with averages of 92 or better; the Academic Honors Banquet will be held April 30th to honor students who have maintained an 89.5 average or better for the year; and TAFE students are sponsoring Project Desert Storm in which they send various items to troops in Saudi Arabia.

Under information items Dr. Blair reported that Southwest Track Builders, Inc. has returned to do track resurfacing. The track should be finished within a week. Blair also noted that Campus Improvement Committees have been meeting to determine a common set of goals.

Board members reviewed the latest update from the Texas Association of School Boards reporting their accumulated board training credits, and Dr. Blair shared a letter from Mrs. Leverman, the second appraiser. Mrs. Leverman was complimentary of all aspects of the district from maintenance

to teaching methods. She expressed appreciation for her opportunity to experience professional growth in Eldorado.

According to Dr. Blair, Eldorado was not selected for a Head Start program. Successful applicants came primarily from the urban areas.

Another item of information presented was that the two HVAC units on the elementary wing have been upgraded to provide an additional 100,000 BTU's each. The manufacturer indicated that new and larger valves and offices would do the job without damage to the units. The cost was approximately \$2,716 compared to an estimated \$10,000 to add new units. The work has been done and appears to be working.

An alternative education finance plan that has been proposed is a state property tax. A close review of the effect of that solution indicates that it would be negative for SCISD. The Board agreed to draft a letter to both Senator Sims and Representative Hilderbran opposing the state property tax.

Under action items, the Board approved the financial report and budget amendments for the month of January, and called for the election on May 4, 1991, to fill the following positions:

Seat occupied by Tip Finley - 3 year term 1991 - 1994.

Seat occupied by Dobs Lively - 3 year term 1991 - 1994.

The Board also adopted Texas Association of School Boards Localized Policy Update, 38; adopted a resolution to participate in the State of Texas Purchasing program which would allow them to purchase goods at substantially lower prices through the state; approved the revised Drug Free Schools Plan; and heard a presentation concerning catastrophic loss coverage for workmen's compensation for any loss in excess of \$50,000. The Board requested further information be presented at a later meeting.

Further, an Energy Conservation Management Policy was adopted and members approved the application for a textbook waiver to allow the district to adopt textbooks not included on the state adoption list.

The final action of the Board was to extend the contracts of Principals Harold Steele, Scott Barton, and Ken Newman; of Athletic Director Doug Kuhlmann; and of Curriculum Director Judy Blair.

## American Legion

The American Legion Post #257 held its regular monthly meeting in the Legion Room at the Memorial Building on Feb. 7th. Ten members attended, with Commander Gene McCalla conducting the meeting. All members present read the Preamble and gave the Pledge of Allegiance. The prayer was given by Post Chaplain Leon Stricklan.

Operation Desert Storm was discussed and it was decided by all present to give every kind of support possible to those

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### Preventing electrical fires at home

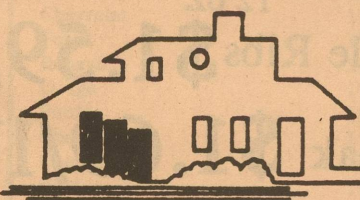
Electricity serves us well... and safely if we treat it with the respect it deserves. Most often we think of electrocution when we consider the dangers of electricity. But another hazard is electrical fires. Recent reports indicate that arcing or overloaded electrical equipment ranks second only to cigarettes as a cause of multiple-death fires.

#### Here's what you need to know:

- Circuit breakers or fuses help protect against overloads and short circuits. If the breaker or fuse "blows" often or repeatedly, have an electrician check it immediately.
- The smell of burning plastic, warm wall receptacles, and flickering or dimming lights signal serious wiring problems.
- Electrical cords (especially extension cords) can be overloaded or short-circuited easily.
- Aluminum wiring in some houses built between 1965 and 1973 can pose hazardous situations because it expands and contracts easily and can come loose at connection points.
- If a cord or plug gets warm, it's overloaded.

#### Here's what you need to do:

- Discard damaged extension cords (even slightly damaged ones).
- Use only extension cords designed for outdoor use for electrical needs outside.
- Don't overload circuits.
- Keep appliances and motors clean and in good working order.
- Don't leave appliances such as clothes dryers running when you're away from home.
- All appliances and extension cords should carry the mark of a recognized testing facility, such as Underwriters Laboratories.



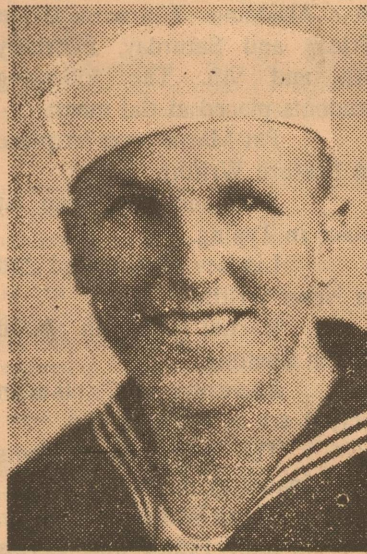

## A Touch Of History



Wesley D. McAlpine

Over fifty years ago the U.S. was engaged in another war, World War II. Many men fought and died for our country's rights and freedom. This is a story of one sailor's experience.

June 11, 1942

"We kept our faith in God and never felt that we would not be rescued."

With those simple words, tall bronzed young, Wesley McAlpine began his tale of 33

days adrift on a 7-by-10 life raft.

Speaking softly but without hesitation, 22-year-old McAlpine told of how his merchant vessel was sunk by a torpedo from an axis submarine. They were in the Caribbean Sea. The date was May 23, 1942. Seven men were able to get into the life raft.

McAlpine told of the wave-battered experience in which sleep was almost impossible. Each day began with prayers and singing of hymns. Each seaman felt they would be rescued and never gave up hope even after they felt they were spotted by at least two ships, but failed to approach because they feared a trap. Some planes were seen, but were too high to sight them.

At one point three of the seven men were swept overboard and pulled back into the life raft by the other four. One seaman became hysterical and had to be held for four days to prevent him from jumping into the sea.

Although the food was consumed early in their voyage, the men caught and ate raw fish to survive. The men longed for a cool drink of water or juice. Man-eating sharks were seen in the waters around them, but the seamen were able to scare them away.

"The greatest sight ever," McAlpine related, was the British vessel which pulled them out of the raft, and the best thing he had ever tasted was the warm bowl of oatmeal he was fed.

McAlpine, who had applied for Naval enlistment the day after the war began, took a 15-day leave. He later stated he was ready to go back to sea.

Wesley McAlpine was welcomed home by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.G. McAlpine, and over 1,000 other Eldoradoans in a grand festivity.

A brave native son - a hero indeed!

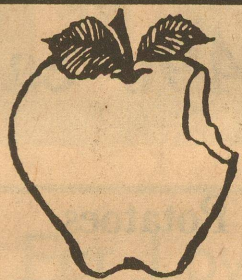
