Eldorado Citizens Challenged

Eldorado fits in the category of West Texas communities which have a population of less than 5,000 and are plagued by a drop in population, employment, and economy. Statistically, this is a reversible situation as many small towns have exhibited a high degree of success in bringing tourism, retirement communities, and new business to their area.

Paul McCallum has actively worked with many of the towns in West Texas. He has provided leadership and made available resources which the State of Texas provides for its citizens. The following are a few of the suggestions Paul recommended for Eldorado:

1. Start a marketing committee. The membership should include representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, organizations in town, staff and representatives of the City and County government and members of the business community. This coordinating group would establish short-term objectives and long-term goals using marketing tools available through the State Board of Tourism and other state agencies.

2. Slow down the hundreds of vehicles that pass through Eldorado daily with a sign on each approaching highway. List the businesses that the weary traveler needs: lodging, restaurants, gasoline, and groceries. Make available items which these families may want as mementoes of their trip and which advertise Eldorado.

3. Many tourists are very

interested in their heritage and make an effort to locate historical sites. Make applications for the approval of the older buildings in Eldorado as historical sites and provide a walk-through tour for people to utilize.

4. Have a calendar of events of the entire city published monthly in the newspaper. Take advantage of a brochure to distribute locally, through-out Sonora, San Angelo, Fredericksburg and the ports of entry at the State lines.

Paul has challenged Eldorado to a marketing campaign. He contributed the \$100 gratuity he required from the Chamber of Commerce to be the first deposit on a fund set aside for this purpose.

The reader's response to the formation of a marketing committee may be: "Why wouldn't marketing Schleicher County and Eldorado be a responsibility of the Chamber of Commerce?" The answer is that your Chamber sponsors many activities and events throughout the calendar year requiring many hours of planning, work and participation. Their output of energy, enthusiasm and finances leave little resources for a major marketing effort.

Paul will return to Eldorado to visit with us this time next year! Let's meet his challenge in a timely responsible manner by considering his suggestions for marketing our city. Those persons interested in initiating a marketing committee may call the Chamber Office at 853-3109.

EMT Class Offered

An Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Course will be offered in Sonora beginning February 7, 1991. The course will be sponsored by Sutton County and a grant from the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation.

Classes will be held at the Sutton County Emergency Service Building from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays through May 9, 1991. There will be one Saturday class held on April 27, 1991.

The EMT course provides emergency medical training in areas such as bleeding and shock therapy, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, airway obstruction, emergency childbirth, pediatric care, and other emergency illnesses and trauma.

While attending the course, the student will be required to spend four hours observation time in the operating

room and sixteen hours working in the emergency room at Angelo Community Hospital. It is also necessary to make three emergency ambulance runs with a certified ambulance service.

Upon completion of the course, a student would be trained to work for public or private ambulance firms and in some hospital trauma centers.

Ordinarily, EMT classes cost approximately \$250.00 per person. The Texas Department of Highways and Transportation grant will make this class available at \$75.00 per student. This includes books, state license fee, and other class material.

Registration must be made in advance. If you are interested in this type training, contact the Sutton County Emergency Service Office between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on weekdays. The office is located at 211 East Third Street and the phone number is (915) 387-5132.

County Agents Report

1991 EXPECTED PRICES

Livestock Marketing Report

Prices for feeder cattle should average slightly higher in 1991 as expected expansion efforts will restrict growth in feeder cattle supplies. Fed cattle marketings could increase slightly. Fed cattle prices could come under pressure from higher beef import levels and more competition from larger domestic supplies of chicken and pork. Price patterns for feeders and feeds should closely parallel those of 1989 and 1990.

Hog prices for 1991 are expected to average slightly below those of IWO as pork production is expected to increase at least during the last half of 1991. Texas pork producers will probably experience lower prices during 1991 as they will be forced to seek residual markets for their slaughter hogs. Large discounts will likely be common for those hogs of lesser quality.

It appears sheep and lamb producers have not reduced their inventories in response to the lower prices during 1990. Lamb and yearling slaughter has been up about 5 percent for the year, but mature sheep slaughter has been down about 5 percent. This would imply there has not been a large level of culling in breeding stock. Lamb and yearling slaughter has been up about the same percentage as that of the 1990 breeding flock, indicating that retention of ewe lambs for breeding is enough to maintain breeding flocks. These factors indicate the January 1, 1991 breeding flock should be about the same as a year ago. Production for 1991 is expected to be about the same as that of 30.0 percent of the U.S. meat consumption. Pork's share of the meat market will be 27.2 percent and turkey will increase its share to 8.5 percent. Total U.S. poultry consumption is expected to exceed 40 percent of total red meat and poultry consumption.

1990 and 1991 sheep and lamb prices are expected to be about the same as those received in 1990.

1990 AND 1991 MEAT SUPPLIES

Total red meat and poultry supplies for 1990 were once again at record level equaling the 1989 record of 220.5 pounds per capita, retail weight basis. Beef consumption is being estimated at 67.8 pounds per capita while chicken consumption is, for the first time, expected to exceed beef. Per capita pork consumption fell to 60.1 pounds

during 1990 but is expected to increase at least 61.7 pounds in 1991.

During 1990, red meat production dropped to 130.4 pounds per capita, a 3 percent decline from 1989. The decline in red meat production/consumption was compensated for by increased poultry supplies (primarily broilers). Chicken supplies increased 3 pounds to 71.8 pounds per capita during 1990.

Poultry supplies are expected to again increase in 1991. Per capita chicken

consumption is expected to exceed beef consumption again during 1991. Presently, 1991 per capita chicken consumption is being estimated at 75.3 pounds, retail weight basis, a 5 percent increase. On the other hand, U.S. per capita consumption of beef is expected to stabilize at 67.8 pounds per capita.

U.S. beef production is actually expected to increase slightly during 1991 because of the expected increase in fed cattle production. But per capita U.S. beef consumption is expected to remain the same because of U.S. population growth. Beef will account for

For almost seven years, Schleicher County Medical Center has offered an emergency response system called LifeLine. This is a system which calls the hospital for help when the client presses a button, which is worn on a neckchain or on a wrist strap.

This system is now available to qualified persons who cannot afford the service out of their own pocket. The Texas

The Texas Department of Human Services has a need to pay for up to 16 Lifeline units for qualified clients. At this time, there are still 10 units available under this program.

Recreational Drugs Can Lead to Stroke:

Investigators at Stanford University found that drug abuse was the second greatest risk factor in 214 cases of stroke victims matched with nonstroke patients aged 17 to 44 years.

It was the greatest risk

factor for stroke among those under 35 years old.

The risk was highest in the first 6 hours after drug use, and among those who had a stroke in that time period, nearly all had used cocaine or an amphetamine. Twenty-six percent of the stroke patients died.

A Touch Of History



Ernest Hill

1917 - For the second time in a little over 20 years, the newspaper reported the U.S. entry into war April 6.

Schleicher County was organized in 1901, and WWI was the first war citizens took part in.

Registration of soldiers began June 20, 1917. A board of exemption was appointed by the Governor of Texas. The first Liberty Bonds were bought June 15, that same year.

The first boys from our county to go to war were ten volunteers in Company H in San Angelo. They were Charlie Lewis,

Edwin Wilhite, Horace Craig, Simon Gay, Rufus Key, Robert Sheppard, John Lawrence Neill, Bev McCormick, William Foley, and Herbert T. Finley.

The food conservation began in Schleicher County about February 1918, with J.A. Whitten as food administrator. The County citizens passed a resolution to eat no more white flour, but to send it to the army.

Ernest Hill, like most young men in Schleicher County, could not rest until he had volunteered. He wanted to be a pilot, but his eyes were too weak so he went into the Tank Corps. While his company sailed for France, Hill lay in a hospital bed with pneumonia, a disappointed young man. Remaining in Cettysburg, Pa., he became aide to his commander, Col. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

General Eisenhower later remembered Ernest as one of the fifteen boys from Texas in his command, and requested his presence, as a member of his party, during his presidential campaign speech in San Antonio.

Six men from Schleicher County lost their lives during WWI. They were: Thomas Ballew, Roach Robledo, Neal Kelly, Bev McCormick, Sam Niclos Jr., and Roy Stevenson.

They are remembered for their bravery, idealism, and willing sacrifice that the cause of right might prevail.

UIL Results

January Sales Tax

"This month's local sales tax rebates are positive proof that our Texas economy is steadily improving," Comptroller John Sharp said Monday.

Sharp announced that his office this month sent checks totaling \$91 million to the cities and counties across Texas that collect local sales taxes.

This month's sales tax rebates to cities increased 15 percent over the January 1990 figures.

"A good portion of that increase is due to Texas' stronger economy, but some of the rise is because more cities collect sales tax this year than did last year. A few other cities have also

increased their local tax rates which makes for higher rebate checks from the state," Sharp said.

Sharp recently reported in his Biennial Revenue Estimate to the state Legislature an increase of \$1.9 billion in available revenue for fiscal years 1992-93 because of Texas' growing and increasingly diversified economy. However, Sharp also warned that the state could face a potential shortfall due to increased spending requirements.

This month's payments to cities totaled \$81 million with Houston receiving \$13 million, the states largest payment. Dallas

received the state's second largest payment of \$8 million. San Antonio received \$4 million and Austin received \$3 million.

Rebate checks to counties totaled more than \$9.6 million this month for an increase of almost 33 percent over last January's payments. As with cities, the hefty increase is partly due to more counties collecting sales tax than did at this time last year.

The January rebate checks reflect taxes collected on November sales and reported in late December by businesses filing monthly returns.

December rebate checks, encompassing the Christmas

shopping season, will be mailed to Texas cities and counties next month.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state retains its share and sends cities and counties the local portion of the sales tax each month.

File Income Taxes Electronically

Warnock Tax Service, of Eldorado is one of a select number of firms accepted by the Internal Revenue Service to eliminate paper tax returns. Warnock Tax Service files your returns electronically to the IRS increasing the speed of its clients tax refunds, providing better accuracy and reducing the cost of processing tax returns for the U.S. Government. The IRS calls this new method electronic filing.

The IRS began accepting refund-due tax returns electronically five years ago as a test in two cities. Over 16,000

returns were received electronically that year. Last year the program went national and over 4 million returns were accepted by the IRS.

Electronic filing is accomplished by using a computer, a modem and an IRS-accepted software program. Tax information is entered into the computer and formatted according to IRS specifications. An IRS-accepted filer, such as Warnock Tax Service, then transmits that tax information to the IRS or through an electronic clearinghouse.

The IRS responds to the electronic filer within 24 hours with an acknowledgement that the tax returns are correct and that the refund will be paid. Refunds take 10-20 days, several weeks faster than traditionally filed returns. Some filers even have the means to offer loans against refunds, resulting in money within a few days.

This year the IRS expects over 8 million returns to be filed electronically, including several

thousand balance-owing returns on a test basis. Although the incentive to file a balance-owing return electronically is slim -- there is no refund to get back faster -- the IRS fully believes that electronically filed returns will replace all paper returns in the near future.

IRS electronic filing statistics and further information can be obtained from Warnock Tax Service.

WTU To Reconcile Fuel Costs

West Texas Utilities Company will file a request early next week with the Public Utility Commission to reconcile historical fuel costs and increase our fixed fuel factors to reflect expected increases in the cost of fuel.

The new factors are not expected to affect customers' bills until later this year or early in 1992. The actual date will be determined by the time it takes to complete the regulatory process.

Leroy Reeves, WTU local manager, said the new factors will increase the average residential customers' bill by \$1.44 a month, or 2.5 percent, based on consumption of 660 kilowatt-hours per month.

"Our cost to residential customers is essentially divided

into two major parts, the base rate and the fuel factor," said Reeves. Fuel factors make up about forty percent of the total cost to customers.

The company is requesting the increase now primarily for three reasons. First, it has under-recovered retail fuel and purchased power costs through December 1990 by \$3,050,015.

Second, the PUC has recently expressed the opinion that fuel costs should be reconciled at least every three years through either a rate case or a fuel reconciliation case such as we are filing. WTU's fuel costs were last reconciled in a rate case which covered a period ending with March 31, 1987, almost four years ago.

Third, while WTU may

be over-recovering during some of this year (partly as a result of renegotiated terms in a major gas contract), they expect that will change to some extent during 1992. In other words, by the time a decision is reached in Austin the company expects the new fuel factors will be necessary.

The company is not asking to collect its present under-recovery balance at this time. Instead, it is asking to update the balance just prior to conclusion of the case and make a refund or surcharge over a twelve-month period if that is warranted.

During the upcoming proceeding the company will present information on all fuel and purchased power costs since April 1987 to demonstrate that it has generated electricity

efficiently, use effective cost controls, and negotiated fuel-related contracts in a manner that produced the lowest reasonable costs for customers.

The company's cost control efforts include construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide access to more suppliers, renegotiation of supply and transportation contracts for gas and coal and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so that they burn less fuel to make electricity.

Legal notices of this filing will be published in newspapers of general circulation in WTU's service area. In addition, customers will receive individual notice by post card according to requirements of the commission.

Roy and Mildred Holt moved to Eldorado in 1927. Roy was hired as superintendent and Mildred was hired as a math teacher for Eldorado Schools.

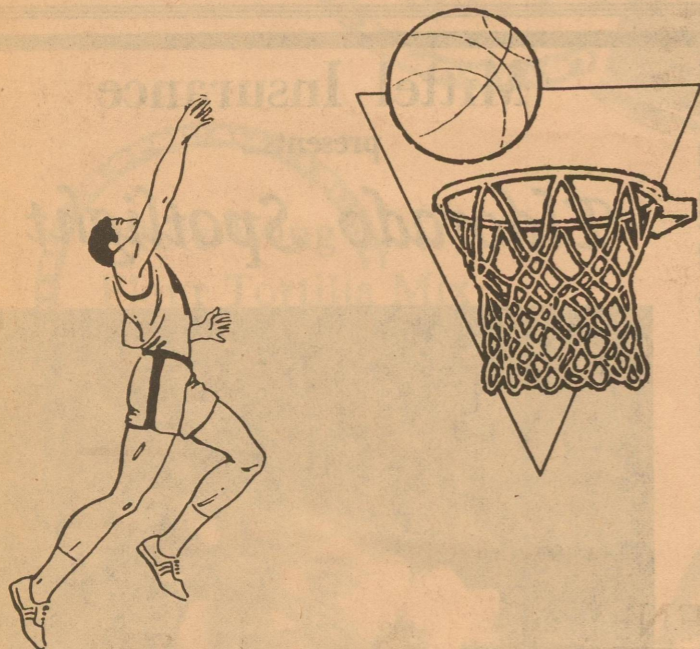
Both Holt children, Roy D. Jr., and Nancy, were born in Eldorado.
