Life Among The Fishes

I seldom write about the judicial system, partly because I work in it and partly because I am not so sure that it is all that interesting to anyone except those of us who come in contact with the law every day.

There is one thing though that I often find somewhat difficult to understand. Some of what are otherwise the most law abiding citizens seem to feel that they should be afforded considerable leeway when it

comes to the enforcement of the traffic laws. I am sure that many of the people who receive speeding tickets have, what in their minds, are legitimate reasons for going faster than the posted speed. All of these reasons may be very logical, even important, but they are not defenses to the offense of speeding.

Many of these same people who feel they should be given every opportunity to avoid getting a moving violation on

their driving record want the criminal justice system to "throw the book" at other violators of our laws. However, if it is suggested that they receive the maximum fine for their offense they protest that they are law abiding citizens and should be given every break afforded by our system of justice. In other words, it appears to me that sometimes "justice" is in the eye of the perpetrator.

Oh, granted a speeding ticket or other offense against the traffic regulations of this state are not in the same league as even some misdemeanor offenses, but I think that the mental process of the offender may be the same. Isn't it that any offender of the law decides that the law, at least that particular law, does not apply to him? The next time you are exceeding the speed limit give that some thought.

One of the most important considerations when selecting a fruit variety is resistance to disease, says a plant pathologist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Although planting time is rapidly approaching, it is better to wait another year and obtain a disease-resistant variety than to plant a tree that will not produce quality fruit or be weakened by disease," said Dr. George Philley, Extension Service plant pathologist at Overton. "Also, various varieties are adapted to certain regions of the country and will not produce well in other regions."

Pecan varieties should have good resistance to scab disease. For East Texas, Choctaw, Cheyenne, Shawnee, Kiowa and Desirable are on the recommended list. Size of the nut and other tree characteristics should also be considered.

"All peach varieties are susceptible to brown rot, the most destructive peach disease," Philley said. "Basically, peach varieties are recommended on fruit quality and ripening time rather than disease resistance. All peach and plum varieties should be on a root knot nematode-resistant rootstock."

"Orient and Kieffer pears have the best fire blight resistance," Philley said. "Garber and Pineapple varieties are somewhat tolerant to the disease. Moonglow and Mangess are moderately susceptible, while Bartlett and LeConte are highly susceptible. Do not plant susceptible varieties."

Local county Extension agents have lists available of recommended varieties. The Extension Service lists are based on disease resistance, yield, quality and other factors.

Variety selection is one of the most important steps in successful fruit growing. A variety

may perform in one area of Texas and be a complete failure in our county. For this reason, your extension office has prepared a list of varieties that have demonstrated satisfactory performance for several years.

Many of the older varieties such as 'ELBERTA' peach, 'BARTLETT' pear, or 'STUART' pecan are not recommended for this area.

Fruit trees do not grow 'true' from seed. Instead, they are budded or grafted into a suitable rootstock adapted for our area. The correct rootstock is just as important as the recommended variety.

Dear Rep. Smith:

While I believe that we need to balance the federal budget, I also believe that President Bush's proposed budget calls for the Medicare program to contribute more than its fair share to the process. Last year a five year agreement was worked out, and now President Bush wants more. This is not acceptable. The President needs to be held to the agreement. Not only does the President's new proposal violate the five year budget agreement, but these cuts further endanger the survival of hospitals in Texas, especially small/rural hospitals. When a small/rural hospital closes, it impacts the local economy, but worse, the extra travel time to go an additional 43 miles (in our case) to another hospital can make the difference between life and death. There are at least two people in this town of 2000 who probably would have died if they had to travel that extra distance; and that is JUST THIS YEAR

that I am talking about. How or forced out of business. The Medicare program must not be forced to make further cuts, or many lives will we sacrifice, year after year, if we let our hospitals

the availability of life itself, not just the quality of life, will be affected in rural Texas.

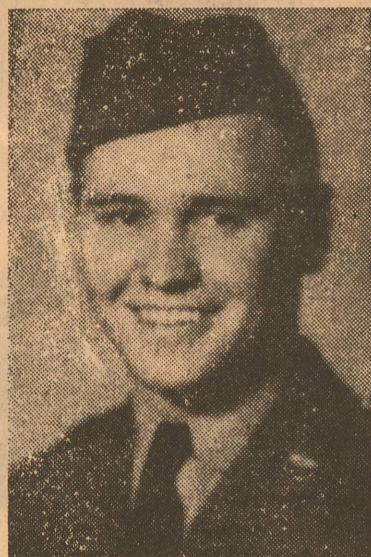
A Touch Of History

In reminiscing of earlier wars that the U.S. has fought in, I have found that Schleicher County citizens participated much the same as they are today in Desert Storm, with honor, support, and involvement.

Over 300 Schleicher County men and women answered the call to the colors. They served in every branch of the service and in every theater of war where American troops fought in World War II.

Many families had several sons and daughters in the war at this time. One of these Eldorado families was the Frank Bradley family. The following article is a reprint from August 23, 1943.

Three Sons from Eldorado Family in Armed Service

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bradley have three sons in the service. They are Tech. Sgt. Frank M. Bradley, Jr., who is crew chief serving with fighter squadron in North Africa. He enlisted on June 1, 1941 and has been overseas since Feb. 15, 1943.

Sgt. Robert K. Bradley is also stationed in North Africa. He enlisted Jan. 1, 1942, and has been in foreign service since Dec. 28, 1942. The two brothers recently visited each other in North Africa for the first time since leaving the States, this being the first time they had met since June, 1942 while they were both stationed in Washington. They write from Africa that they are about 300 miles apart.

A third son, Thomas Duncan Bradley, A.S., is stationed at the U.S. Naval Training Station in San Diego, Calif.

Preventing electrical fires at home
Electricity serves us well... and safely if we treat it with the respect it deserves. Most often we think of electrocution when we consider the dangers of electricity. But another hazard is electrical fires. Recent reports indicate that arcing or overloaded electrical equipment ranks second only to cigarettes as a cause of multiple-death fires.

Here's what you need to know:

- Circuit breakers or fuses help protect against overloads and short circuits. If the breaker or fuse "blows" often or repeatedly, have an electrician check it immediately.
- The smell of burning plastic, warm wall receptacles, and flickering or dimming lights signal serious wiring problems.
- Electrical cords (especially extension cords) can be overloaded or short-circuited easily.
- Aluminum wiring in some houses built between 1965 and 1973 can pose hazardous situations because it expands and contracts easily and can come loose at connection points.
- If a cord or plug gets warm, it's overloaded.

Here's what you need to do:

- Discard damaged extension cords (even slightly damaged ones).
- Use only extension cords designed for outdoor use for electrical needs outside.
- Don't overload circuits.
- Keep appliances and motors clean and in good working order.
- Don't leave appliances such as clothes dryers running when you're away from home.
- All appliances and extension cords should carry the mark of a recognized testing facility, such as Underwriters Laboratories.
