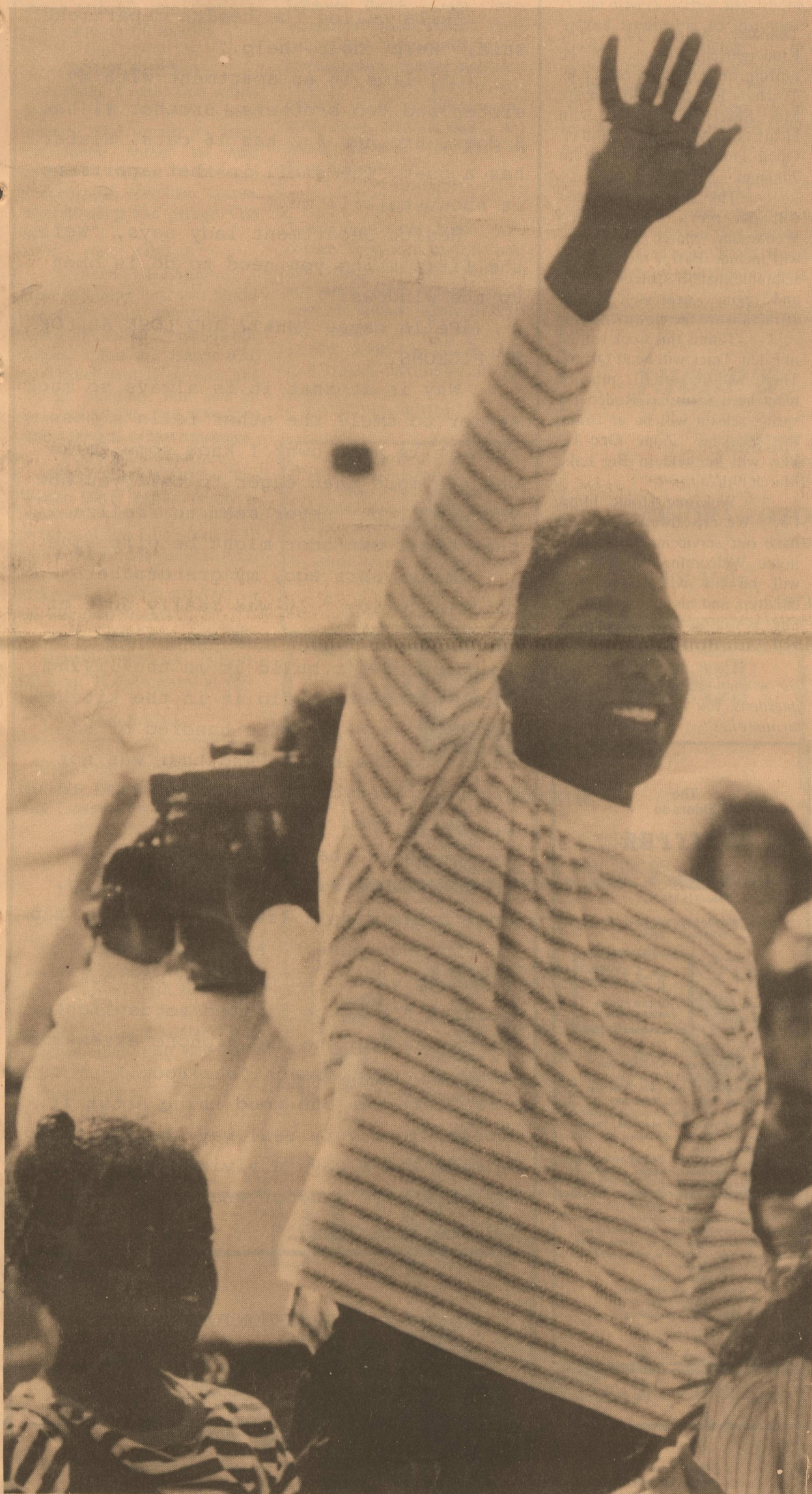

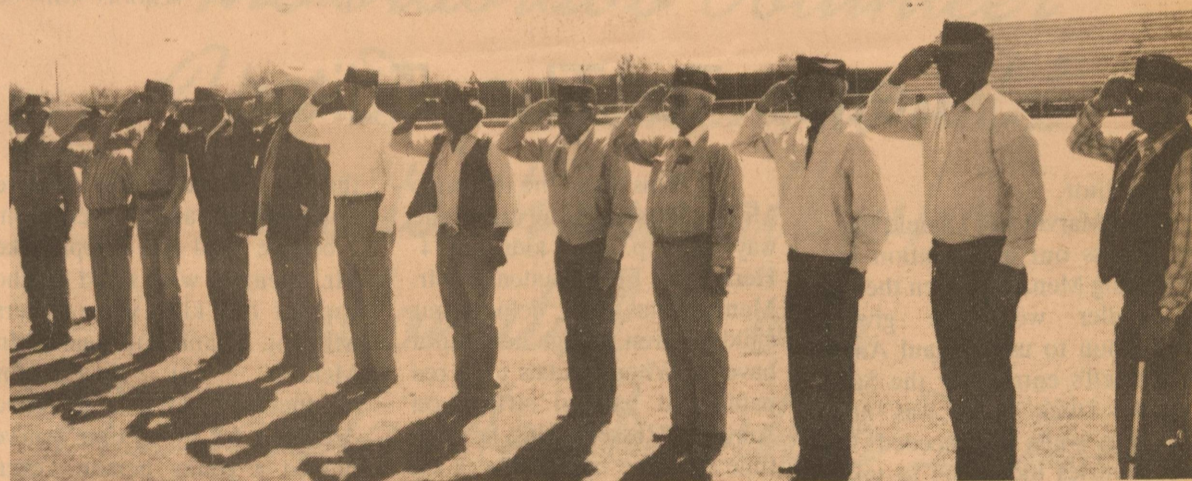
Judge Johnny Griffin proclaimed, "Welcome home Floyd Fay. Today is your day."

### Sheriff's Report

The Schleicher County Sheriff's Department received a total of 115 complaints for the month of February.

These complaints include: Vehicle Thefts-2, Larceny Theft-2, Burglary-4, Disturbance-11, Vehicle

Accidents-1, Loose Livestock-8, Suspicious Persons-7, Assist Motorist-7, Criminal Mischief-3, Other-52. There were 3 fires reported in the city, 2 in the county, and 13 controlled fires.

A total of 6 civil process were served, and one out-of-county warrant was served.

According to the Sheriff's Department, all of these cases have been solved.

### Filing Deadline Nears

Wednesday, March 20 is the deadline for filing for application for a place on the ballot for the May 4 elections. A number of city and county offices are to be filled.

The terms of Hospital Directors William Edmiston, C.R. Sproul and George Gower are expiring. These are two year terms.

Mayor Richard Preston's term is expiring as is Councilmembers Barbara Jackson and John Nikolauk.

The terms of Tip Finley and Dobs Lively, School District Trustees, are expiring.

The tenure for Water Commissioners Steve Sykes and Howard Derrick has expired. They are both ineligible to run in this election.

Our hospital, schools, water, and local government are of vital concern to our community.

Local officials are urging citizens of Eldorado and Schleicher County to file for these positions.

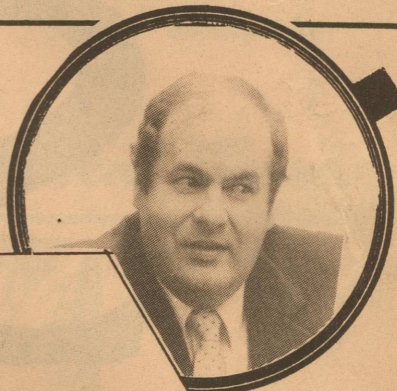
Golf Teams will be in McCamey the Saturday to compete in their first District meet. According to Coach Doug Kuhlmann there will be 4 meets.

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## Ritchie Receives Award

Gerald Ritchie, Iraan elementary principal, received the eighth annual *Regular Educator of the Year Award* at the annual meeting of the Texas Council of Administrators of Special Education (TCASE) in Austin, January 30, 1991. Ritchie was selected as the most outstanding regular educator in Texas by a committee of TCASE. A committee of special education directors from each service center region nominates an outstanding teacher or principal and a statewide committee makes the final selection from these twenty nominees.

Ritchie has been principal of Iraan Elementary for 6 years. During that time he has worked to provide leadership to parents, administrators, teachers, and others in developing the mainstreaming concept for handicapped students. He has made presentations at teacher inservice and served on a statewide committee to develop guidelines for the Least Restrictive Environment plan recommended by the Texas Education Agency.

The following writeup was part of the information submitted by Region 18 TCASE to nominate Ritchie as educator of the year.

"We at Iraan have a mission at our school. It is our

obligation and our responsibility to educate all of the children of the community to the fullest of their potential regardless of any handicapping conditions they may come to us with. The principal and all of the personnel in this building feel very strongly that children who have differences are entitled to the same educational opportunities as their non-handicapped peers. It is our belief that all students benefit by having the handicapped and non-handicapped educated together." *Gerald Ritchie, Principal, Iraan Elementary, Iraan-Sheffield, ISD.*

Iraan Elementary has a truly remarkable man as its principal. Gerald Ritchie is committed to providing every child with the opportunities to attain success. He challenges the teachers, parents and pupils to educate all students with handicaps in the mainstream. A walk down the halls reveals these typical activities: A boy with Downs Syndrome takes turns counting pumpkin seeds in a first grade classroom; a fifth grader who is hearing impaired wears his auditory trainer as fellow students help him with new vocabulary words; a third grade wheel-chair bound boy with cerebral palsy participates in spelling dictation using a specially mounted computer screen; a boy who is emotionally

disturbed can always depend on the principal to walk him down the hall, visiting and providing encouragement to help bridge the return from residential placement to his home-room; and a second grade girl who is hyperactive smiles as he reassures her that she can stay on task during seat work drill. The frightened parent is comforted because the principal will take the time to drive mother and daughter three hundred miles to see a specialist. As students gather in the lounge for WOW pictures and treats, a second grader who is language delayed lines up with the other students.

Concerned teachers look to him to provide suggestions for the techniques and materials to meet the needs of special education students in the regular classroom. Members of the special education team can depend on him to be involved in the observation and referral process. His support and concern has provided instructional aides in the mainstream classes to ensure success for more students.

His commitment to improving educational opportunities in mainstream education for students with special needs extends beyond the boundaries of his campus and or past "work hours." He utilized his carpentry skills combined with technical specifications from an occupational therapist to design and build adaptive equipment to be utilized by a student with cerebral palsy. He has been an invaluable member of the regional Least Restrictive Environment Task Force. Gerald Ritchie is a dedicated man with a purpose. This instructional leader has set the standard for providing educational opportunities in the least restrictive environment for students with mild and severe disabilities.

## Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, March 5, 1991, at the City Hall with all Councilmembers in attendance. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Preston.

**CHAMBER PRIDE COMMITTEE:**  
Jackie Napier and Ronnie Sauer, representing the Chamber of Commerce, met with the Council. They proposed cleanup and the planting of flowers on the old Hotel Lot at the corner of SW Main and Hwy 190 (Murchison Avenue). They also proposed the possibility of Christmas lighting at some time in the future.

Also, Mrs. Napier reviewed proposal for the Glendale Addition Island across from the Catholic Church, on which the Committee proposes to build a 25x16x3 rock wall with planter. All parties reviewed the presence of utilities, signs and Highway Department set-back restrictions. After discussion, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by John Nikolauk that approval to the building of the planter be granted. Motion carried.

Further discussion was held concerning the Hotel lot. Motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Debbie Ballew that approval be given to obtaining a lease with the owners allowing for use as a park and plantings as proposed. Voting for were Jackson, Ballew and Nikolauk. Voting against were Callison and Bosmans. Motion carried.

The Committee and Council discussed the possibility of obtaining Block 6 of Glendale for the planter and flowers. Ownership will be further investigated by Mr. Sauer with further action pending.

Concerning the City Hall property, the Secretary was authorized to obtain a flag and flagpole and to participate in the Chamber's flower planting project with perennial flowers if possible.

**MINUTES, TAX REPORT, FINANCIAL REPORTS & BILLINGS:**  
Minutes of the February 5 and February 11 meetings were reviewed and motion was made by John Nikolauk and seconded by Dora Bosmans that they be approved. Motion carried.

The February Tax Report was circulated for initialing, and the Financial Reports were distributed. Billings were reviewed and motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by John Nikolauk that the bills be approved as presented. Motion carried.

**DRUG TESTING:**  
The Secretary reported that she had contacted Tom Finney with the Railroad Commission concerning his

citing of violation for failure to have proper Drug Testing Procedure in effect. She reported that Mr. Finney had not reviewed all materials available, and she had forwarded them to him for his review and comment within a few days. Mr. Finney's office is in the process of preparing DOT/RRC Model Policies. The Secretary also reported on requirement from the Texas Worker's Compensation Commission for all employers with 15 or more employees to have a written Drug Abuse Policy adopted by April 15, 1991. The model Policy has not been drafted by TWCC as yet; therefore, as information is available, a revised Policy will be presented to the Council for adoption which will satisfy both DOT and TWCC regulations.

**TEXAS WATER COMMISSION ENFORCEMENT:**

The Secretary reported that \$1620.00 penalty check (1/2 due March 20) would be mailed March 11 as well as the draft of Working Agreement proposed to the Christian family. A letter of transmittal was executed by Mayor Preston. All other items on the schedule of the Enforcement Order were reported as being met as necessary, with a plan and schedule to be submitted to the TWC by the Engineer David Todd by the March 20 deadline. Discussion was held concerning response received from the Christian family and the City's reply. Terms were discussed with the Secretary to convey the City's counter-proposal.

**SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:**

No response has been received from the City's proposal to Concho Concrete, so Jack Dean proceeded with his report in which he reported a need to purchase replacement gaskets for the Christian irrigation pump line. Also, he reported that the recycling pump at the plant was in for repairs, and that the City was again discharging onto the Christian property due to weather affecting the plant's compliance.

He presented a chart showing the Chain of Command utilized by the outside crew and coverage adjustments made due to absence of personnel. He briefly reviewed information received from the RRC seminar he recently attended.

Regarding the Water Department, he reported prices for tapping tools, with approval given to purchase as necessary. He answered questions regarding reasons for recent water outages.

**CRAWFORD & COMPANY:**  
A proposal from Crawford & Company to represent the City with the Texas Workers' Compensation Commission in Austin was reviewed. After discussion of fees and procedures, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that the City accept their proposal. Motion carried. Administration of claims will be handled locally with referrals made to Crawford & Company as necessary for investigations, etc. on an hourly basis.

The Secretary reported an additional Texas Workers' Compensation Commission seminar being available in San Angelo next week, and her desire to attend it rather than one in Odessa or Abilene. She invited Councilmembers to attend with her, and John Callison requested reservations be made for him also.

**TCDP - URGENT NEED:**

On the upcoming Wastewater Plant repairs under the TCDP Urgent Need Program, the Secretary reported a need to designate, via Resolution, three persons authorized as signators on financial draws, checks, etc. Motion was made by John Callison that Debbie Ballew, Dora Bosmans and Carolyn Mayo be designated as signators. Motion was seconded by Barbara Jackson. Motion carried.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at approximately 10:30 p.m.

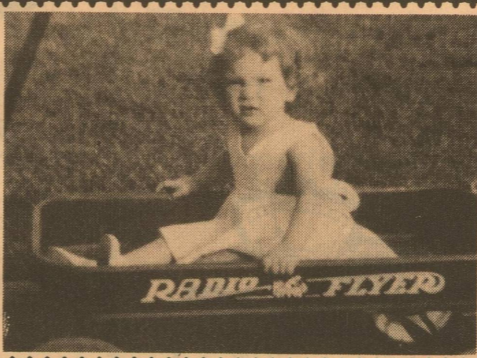

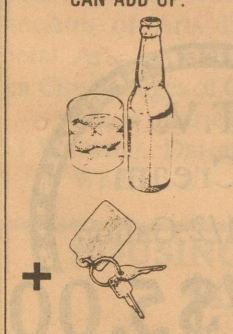

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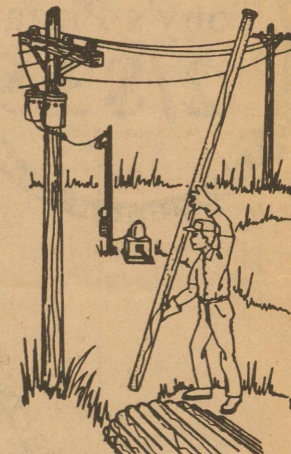

## Irrigation Pipe: A Deadly Diversion

Irrigation pipes spread the flow of needed water through croplands, but they may also divert a deadlier current—electricity! The mishandling of irrigation pipe is a major cause of accidental contact with overhead electric lines in farming areas.

Several factors may set the stage for a tragedy:

- When not in use, pipe is often stored at the edge of the field—the most likely location for overhead lines.
- An irrigation pump motor may be electrically powered, requiring an overhead service line from the distribution line.
- Most power lines are easily within contact range of the 30' sections of pipe.
- Irrigation pipe is made of aluminum, which is one of the best conductors of electricity. Most new distribution lines are made of aluminum.
- The pipe is often used by small animals as a refuge or a nesting place. Hunters or children may turn the section on end to dislodge game.
- Workers may upend sections to relocate them or clear them of debris.



Any contact with an overhead line may prove fatal, whether that line is an insulated service conductor at 480 volts or an open-wire distribution conductor at 7,200 volts. Always remember to look *before* you lift.





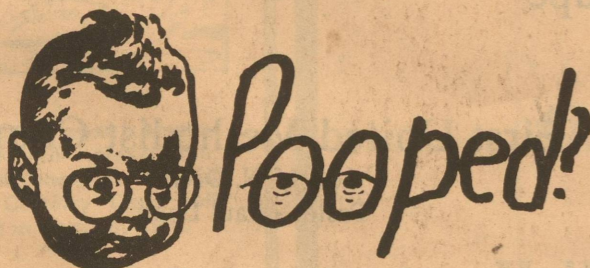

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## Commercial Drivers License Test

The DPS is now testing all currently licensed commercial truck and bus drivers.

All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded are required to have a commercial drivers license (CDL) by April 1, 1992. Bus drivers, including school bus and church bus drivers, who drive buses designed to carry 16 or more passengers, including the driver, will also be required to obtain a CDL by the same date.

Exempt from the CDL requirements are farmers when they are driving within 150 miles of their farm, military personnel, recreational vehicle operators, emergency vehicle operators, and fire fighters when operating fire fighting vehicles or equipment.

Commercial drivers who must carry the new CDLs cannot renew their current licenses due to expire between now and April 1, 1992. They

should plan to visit the DPS Driver License offices for CDL testing as soon as possible and no later than one month before the expiration date.

To ensure that all commercial drivers in Texas who must have the CDLs obtain them in time to avoid penalties, the DPS Troopers have set a special date for CDL testing in this area. The test will be conducted on April 9, 1991, from 3:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. at the Schleicher County Memorial Building, Eldorado, Texas. For applications and details on taking this test, contact your local Drivers License Office as soon as possible. Free CDL handbooks are available at all drivers license offices.

We encourage everyone to prepare and take advantage of this opportunity to test. For more information contact: Drivers License Service Eldorado, Texas 915/853-2901 Sponsored by Sheriff Ronnie Norris.

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) began issuing Commercial Drivers Licenses (CDL) on September 17, 1990. On December 31, 1990 only 19,000 CDLs had been issued for an average of 268 licenses a day. We believe that Texas has approximately 962,000 CDL drivers that must be tested and licensed by April 1, 1992. In order to license the remaining 943,000 CDL drivers before the deadline DPS must average testing and issuing licenses to 3,143 drivers each working day.

All truck and bus companies are being encouraged to contact their nearest DPS Drivers License Office to schedule CDL testing for their

drivers as soon as possible. Those that postpone getting their drivers tested may find themselves without properly licensed drivers on April 1, 1992.

Almost two-thirds of the drivers hold Class A & B licenses that will not expire until after the April 1, 1992 deadline; however, after that date they cannot legally drive a commercial motor vehicle without a CDL. The drivers will be given \$4.00 credit for each full year of validity on their present Texas driver license when obtain a CDL. The CDL costs \$40.00. There is no fee for making applying or taking as many tests as are necessary to qualify for the CDL.




