District UIL To Be Held

"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the academic contests," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "In fact, the League began as a debating league in 1910 and then later merged with a track and field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests."

Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing, speaking, mathematics and science," Marshall added.

UIL academic contests cover several subject areas including math, science, business, language arts, journalism, speech, and theatre. Recently, contests in current issues and events and computer skills were added this year.

The purpose of the UIL academic program is to use competition to develop students' higher order thinking skills. "A primary objective for League directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in extracurricular competition," said Janet Wiman,

UIL academic director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves."

Students who compete at the State Meet level also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1990-91, the TILF awarded more than \$490,000 in scholarship grants to 380 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1991-92, the TILF expects to award an estimated 480 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$590,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

Jaime Robles, an Eldorado Elementary School 4th grader, was the 1990

recipient of the conservation poster contest award. His poster depicted farming practices for erosion control pertinent to Schleicher County. Jaime, accompanied by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Zeke Robles, also attended the banquet.

The winners in each division are chosen by the local Soil and Water Conservation District directors, an organization composed of elected landowners in each county.

County Agents Report

by Jerry Swift County Extension Agent - Schleicher County

Under the 1990 federal farm bill, it's no longer "business as usual" for Texas agricultural producers. Agricultural leaders will examine several provisions of the bill during the annual Texas Agricultural Forum in Lubbock on March 25 and discuss their impact on the state and the nation.

Changes in federal support programs, planting and conservation regulations and farm credit will be examined, along with federal proposals regarding trade with Europe and Mexico, said Dr. Ed Smith. He is an agricultural economist and specialist in marketing and policy with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Col lege Station.

The forum will be from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. at the Holiday Inn-Civic Center, 801 Avenue Q. Registration is \$25 and includes lunch.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry will be the luncheon speaker. He will explain the role of the Texas Department of Agriculture in formulating agricultural policy.

The forum will open with discussion of 1991 farm programs. It will be led by Terry Harman, executive director or the Texas office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Soil conservation

considerations facing producers under the farm bill will be addressed by Wes Oneth, state conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service. Harman and Oneth then will lead a panel discussion of federal program and conservation provisions.

Farm credit provisions of the bill will be discussed by Dr. Gary Condra, visiting associate professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock. Condra is project leader for the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program.

An update on 1991 planting intentions will be provided by Dennis Findley, state statistician with the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

Long term effects of the farm bill will be analyzed by Dr. Ron Knutson, Extension Service economist and specialist in marketing and policy, College Station. He is director of the Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M University.

The status of the proposed General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and the free trade agreement with Mexico will be reported by Dr. Parr Rosson. He is an Extension Service agricultural economist and specialist in international trade and marketing.

"As with all our forums, the speakers will provide ample time for questions and comments," Smith said.
