District UIL To Be Held

"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the academic contests," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "In fact, the League began as a debating league in 1910 and then later merged with a track and field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests."

Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing, speaking, mathematics and science," Marshall added.

UIL academic contests cover several subject areas including math, science, business, language arts, journalism, speech, and theatre. Recently, contests in current issues and events and computer skills were added this year.

The purpose of the UIL academic program is to use competition to develop students' higher order thinking skills. "A primary objective for League directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in extracurricular

competition," said Janet Wiman,

UIL academic director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves."

Students who compete at the State Meet level also qualify for Texas Interscholastic Foundation League scholarships. During 1990-91, the TILF awarded more than \$490,000 in scholarship grants to 380 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1991-92, the TILF expects to award an estimated 480 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$590,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has over \$\$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

Mr. Hite has been with the T.H.C. for seven years with the responsibility to review all West Texas territory west of Interstate Highway 35 to El Paso in regard to Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks, Courthouses, grant programs, tax credit programs, and federal projects. Mr. Hite's credits include a Bachelor of Arts degree in Architecture from California Polytechnic

State University, and graduate work at Columbia University on Restoration of Historic Structures. Prior to moving to Texas, Mr. Hite worked in eight states on restoration projects. Mr. Hite resides in Austin with is wife, Jessie, who is acting director of Huntington Art museum, University of Texas, and their four year-olddaughter, Catherine.

As we drove into the



- Always use wood, plastic and paper in kites; never use wire or metal.
- Always fly kites on dry, clear days, remember, wet string will conduct electricity.
- □ Always fly kites in open areas FAR FROM **ELECTRIC POWER LINES and avoid busy** streets and highways.
- Always call WTU if your kite gets snagged in a power line; do not pull on the string to retrieve it.



Remember: Kite flying should be fun, please keep it safe.
