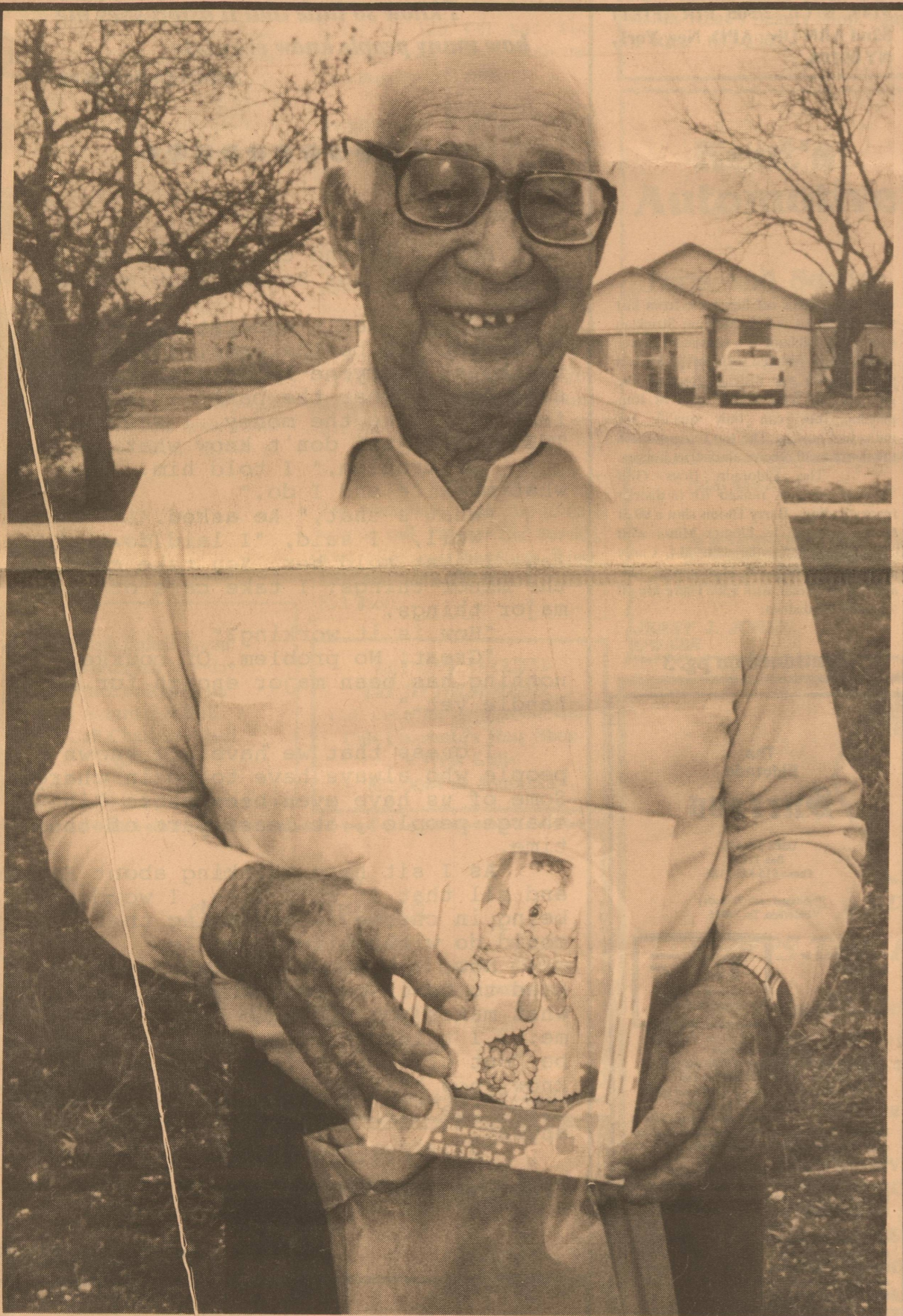

The warm weather and spring blossoms are the season indicators that Spring is upon us once again. After winter's cloudy days and cold North winds, everyone is outdoors enjoying the change of season. Gardening is a source of great pleasure to many people. The Chamber Pride Committee hopes Eldorado will support the floral theme "Eldorado, the City of Gold," by planting many yellow flowers again this year.

The City, the Chamber of Commerce, and Chamber Pride Committee are working together to plant yellow flowers on three city parks and in the

corner lot across from Glidden Foods and Super S. The planter barrels located in the downtown area with displays of green and yellow plants are a great contribution to the flower theme. Many businesses and private homes are providing additional color with beautiful spring planting. As a community, join with these groups and do your part to make our city a place of beautiful flowers.

Some tips for planting in West Texas are as follows: Prepare your garden area by tilling the soil or turning it up with a hoe four to six inches deep; mix with this soil a lot of humus or compost and organic fertilizer; the plants must be mulched to withstand the Texas sun on their root system; rotting hay makes a good mulch as well as leaves and bark mulch; the mulch slows down water loss by evaporation; water your plants frequently!

County Agents Report

Spring is here. Flower colors are warm and beautiful. The Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce Beautification Committee is once again trying to beautify Eldorado.

Eldorado is Spanish for "Golden." Hence, the golden marigold was used to symbolize the City of Eldorado last summer and fall. We had a small problem, to be more specific a small red problem known as the "spider mite." A very tough little fellow and they are hard on marigolds.

Marigolds and all the golden flowers are again being used to brighten up Eldorado

this spring. To save everyone a lot of time and money, the usage of a systemic insecticide will hopefully solve the spider mite situation. The systemic needs to be put into the soil at planting or shortly thereafter. There are a number of different systemic insecticides on the market. By applying the insecticide according to label recommendations, your flowers will keep pretty most of the summer, along with water, fertilizer, love and kindness.

The First Wildlife Management Co-op

Talking to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Dennis Brown is like opening a window into Texas' wildlife history. Dennis was one of the first technical guidance biologists appointed to work with private landowners in 1973 along with George Litton, Tommy Hailley, Jimmy May and Murphy Ray. Technical guidance biologists were charged to work with private landowners who wanted advice and assistance to incorporate wildlife management into their on-going ranching and farming operations. The "super biologists" they were called.

"I received a call from Brian Denman of the LK Cattle company in Gonzales and a member of the Kokernut family," recalls Brown. "He wanted me to help him get a group of landowners together to cooperate in a deer management plan." Brown told him "One of you (landowners) has to do it, has to organize it, get it rolling and stay on top of it. Otherwise it just looks like the government is interfering in private business. We'll put on a program and talk and help set up a management plan, but the establishment of goals and commitment has to come from the group."

Goodneighbor Club

The Goodneighbor and Reynolds Extension Clubs met in the home of Nancy Lester on Monday, March 18th with 13 people attending.

Dorothy Taylor, of Texas A&M University, was the speaker. Dorothy spoke on the many issues concerned with

Denman agreed. Of course he was no stranger to the results of good deer management. His cousin and an adjacent landowner was Al Brothers, a former TPWD biologist who has been working with several large ranches in South Texas and obtaining outstanding results. "Al made a believer out of me when I saw what he was doing on those ranches," Denman said. "I asked how we could do this on our lands in Gonzales County, and Al noted our tracts were too small with still smaller landowners in and around us." Brothers suggested that Denman should call the neighbors, get them together and show them what could be done if they would be willing to coordinate deer management efforts.

Brian Denman hit the phones and began visiting with neighbors trying to convince them of the wisdom of forming a landowner cooperative. There were worries that their lease hunters or other landowners wouldn't cooperate or wouldn't want to take more does; that some of the small landowners wouldn't reduce their buck kill. But in the end, he did get them to come to a meeting to hear Dennis Brown and Donnie Harmel (TPWD biologist at the Kerr Wildlife Management Area) discuss deer management - and it was an eye opener.

Harmel talked of deer

nutrition and habitat, and what makes a healthy deer and a healthy deer population. Deer die-offs in the late 60's and again in the early 70's were still fresh on the minds of most of these folks. Populations had mushroomed to a deer to 2 or 3 acres, and crashed back to a deer to 15 to 20. Harmel stressed keeping the herd within the bounds of the habitat's ability to support them. Brown discussed the skewed sex ratios due to the intense hunting pressure on bucks. A ratio of one buck per 8-10 does was a sign of an out-of-balance population. Fawn survival was low and body weights were light. Most of the bucks being killed were only 1 1/2 years old. He suggested taking fewer bucks and a heavier antlerless harvest to bring the ratio to 1 buck per 3-4 does, and stressed once there, they had to keep it there. He noted that for every doe removed, room was created for more bucks. Based on acreages, Brown allotted the number of bucks and does each landowner should take. The agreement was struck and the Peach Creek Co-op was formed.

Brown helped them set up their census lines and demonstrated survey methods so the Co-op could make their own counts. He showed them how to collect population and harvest data, how to age and weigh deer, and take antler measurements. He discussed browse plants, and the signs of overpopulation.

Co-op members began seeing results right away. "It (management) does work, and it doesn't take long to see it work!" Denman emphasized. "The bucks came on up. Bucks from the Co-op began to regularly win and place in the top 3 or

4 in the Big Buck Contest in Shiner for deer from surrounding counties." Brown recalled the Co-op deer were winning with such regularity that contest officials removed them from the open category and created a new "deer management" slot. The Peach Creek Co-op became well known and hunters sought leases in the area.

Now, years later, where are they? "We are still trying to do the same thing," says Brian Denman. "We're not as organized as we used to be, but we still cooperate and shoot for the same goals as before. We know what to do for the deer." Some landowners have changed, and some land use practices are different, but the people know each other and talk back and forth. "We are working with turkeys now, like we used to work with deer," he notes about their current wildlife management efforts. "We like to see all the wildlife that comes from working together."

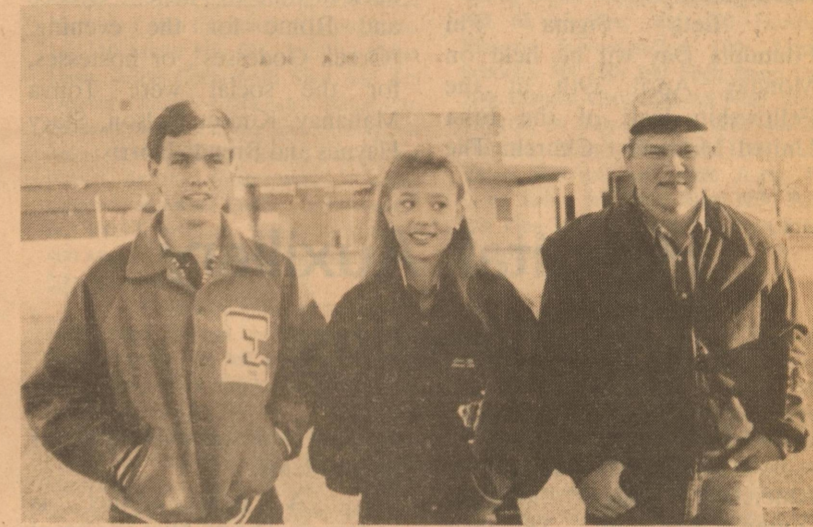
Mondee Nelson receives the Showmanship award at the San Angelo Livestock Show for her Angora Goats.

Friday afternoon, Jimmy Barton showed his pig and placed 9th in tough competition.

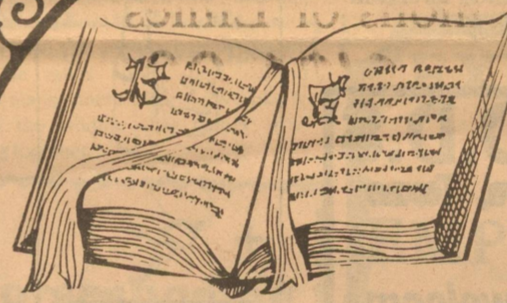

SCISD Board Of Trustees Meet

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on March 11, 1991, at 6:00 P.M. in the Administration Building.

In information items, Dr. Blair reported the following to the board:

The South Texas Insulation asbestos abatement issue has been finalized. The company agreed to accept 50% of the outstanding balance of \$9059 as a compromise solution for the damaged floor in the elementary building.

Southwest Track Builders returned and applied a second seal coat to the entire track. SCISD will host the district tennis meet for this year. The tennis courts are being repainted in preparation for that meet.

The school finance issue is still undecided and no one is sure what will happen. SCISD could lose money if some of the suggested proposals are adopted.

Open house activities were planned for Thursday, March 14, 1991. Each campus has an activity that evening whereby parents can meet teachers and view the facilities.

Two teachers from each campus are working with Dr. Blair on the development of a proposed 1991-92 school calendar. Board members will receive a draft prior to the April meeting when the calendar is to be adopted.

The latest enrollment figures reveal 769 students. The previous high enrollment was 746 in 1985-86. This high enrollment presents several points for consideration:

*one additional first

grade student will require another second grade class next year due to the 22 to 1 requirement.

*already limited cafeteria and gym space will become more critical.

Harold Steele advised that Debbie Griffin was getting together a wish list from the teachers for deciding what was needed regarding computers and software.

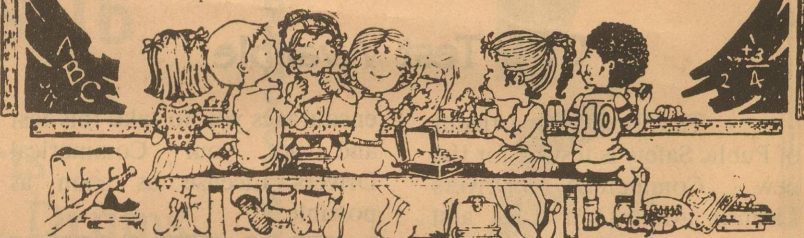
