Life Among The Fishes

External parasite control is an important component in the management of sheep and goats in Texas. With the emphasis on integrated management, this reproductive component will become increasingly important.

This management will discuss first external parasites that are somewhat unique to either sheep or goats, then some pests common to both. Included will be the general biology of the parasite, the damage it causes and ways to manage or control it.

Two pests which seem to be becoming increasingly important to sheep producers in Texas include biting lice and sheep keds. The primary reason for this, in my opinion, is because producers have become very lax in the good management practice of spraying sheep immediately after shearing. For many years producers sprayed sheep after shearing to keep screwworms from infesting cuts and scrapes obtained during shearing, in addition to controlling lice and keds. Since screwworms are no longer prevalent in Texas, this practice has been discontinued by many producers.

Lice: Lice on sheep as well as other animals are of two distinct types, blood sucking lice and biting or chewing

lice. Blood sucking lice are usually the more serious species since they actually extract blood from the animal and may cause scabby, bleeding areas which invite bacterial attack, fly attack or other

Chewing lice feed primarily on hair, wool, skin scales or other materials on the host. The primary damage done by chewing lice is due to the action taken by the animal to relieve the "itch" caused by lice crawling on the body. This may include scratching, rubbing, or biting the skin or wool. Evidence

of infestation of chewing lice normally observed by producers is wool strung out on fences, trees or feed troughs.

Two species of lice are important on sheep in Texas. One, the foot louse, is a blood sucking louse which infests the lower hairy parts of the body including the shanks, belly and scrotum. Young lambs are most heavily infested and large infestations can result in lameness, although this is rare.

The sheep biting louse, Bivicola ovis, is the louse which I have most commonly observed on sheep in the Edwards Plateau. It is small (about 1/20 inch long) and generally white in color except for the darker head and thorax. This louse is active and moves rapidly over the wool fibers near the skin. It

favors the upper sides of the sheep. It is the louse that is commonly observed at

shearing time. The life cycle of the sheep biting louse is about 1 month, with all stages occurring on the host. The heavily infested-fleece becomes ragged and torn and reduced in value. Also, heavily infested sheep tend to be unthrifty or stunted. A few heavily infested sheep may infest a whole herd.

Probably the easiest and most efficient time to control lice is immediately after shearing. This is true for several reasons: 1) the sheep are already gathered and penned and treating at this time saves labor, 2) the short fleece makes penetration of insecticides to the skin level much easier, and 3) the population of lice is much reduced after shearing due to physical removal of a portion of the population and due to habitat modification, survival of the remaining lice is actually lower.

Insecticides which may be used for lice control on sheep include Ectrin, Co-Ral, Ciodirin, diazinon, and lindane among others. Good coverage is important for lice control. If lice infestations are heavy, a second application might be necessary 14 days after the first to kill lice which hatch from eggs present during the first treatment

Spray should be applied early in the day to allow time for sheep to dry. Sheep being moved into a flock which has been sprayed should be checked for lice and, if lice are present, the sheep should be sprayed before putting them with the main flock.

Keds: The sheep ked, Melophagus ovinus, more commonly called the sheep tick, is a wingless fly with a tick-like appearance. It can be distinguished from true ticks by the following characteristics: (1) Keds have six legs, adult ticks eight legs. (2) Keds have three body regions, ticks two body

This insect has an unusual way of reproducing. An egg hatches within the uterus of the female ked and the young larva develops to maturity on food secreted by the nutritive glands of the mother. Only one larva develops at a time. The mature larva is cemented to the sheep's wool after about eight days of feeding. It then transforms into a red, barrel-shaped pupariam. After about 22 days it develops into an adult.

The entire life cycle is spent in the fleece and keds that fall off usually die within a week. These present little danger of infesting a tlock. Ked populations are usually highest during

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

Continued from Page 2 fall and winter months, but decline after spring shearing. Keds from shorn ewes often move to young lambs.

Everett and coworkers (1971) found that lambs infested with keds averaged 2.4 pounds per carcass less than uninfested lambs and had 1.6 pounds less of clean wool per fleece. Also, it was discovered that ked bites are one cause of a defect in sheepskins called "cockle". Cockle is a series of raised pimple-like blemishes which cannot be completely flattened out or covered with dyes. This reduces the value of skins to the leather industry. Annual losses due to this condition in the United States has been estimated at about 4 million dollars.

The sheep ked is a relatively easy insect to control. Several methods of control may be used including dipping, high pressure sprays (300-350 psi), low pressure sprays (100 psi), dusting or sprinkling with a sprinkler can. In addition, Ectrin pour-on has recently been labelled and is extremely effective. this again is most efficiently done immediately after shearing for the same reasons as already mentioned for lice

Nose bots: Approximately 96 percent of the sheep necropsied during studies conducted in Texas and New Mexico were infested with larvae of the

Oestrus ovis: The number of larvae ranged from 1 to 75 with an average of about 8 in Texas sheep. Goat and deer are also subject to attack. The adult sheep bot is a fly about one-half inch long which resembles a small honey bee. The fly deposits live larvae in the nostrils of the animals. This activity excites the sheep and interferes with proper handling and grazing. Sheep shake their heads, keep their noses against each other or next on the ground to keep the flies from entering their

Larva or grubs move up the nasal passages and enter the sinus cavity where they feed until mature. This predisposes sheep to bacterial infections and causes a nasal discharge referred to by producers as "snotty nose". The discharge becomes viscous making it difficult for the animal to breathe. Under these conditions older or weak sheep may die. When grubs are mature

they return to the nasal passage, drop out to the ground and burrow in the soil where they pupate before emerging as adult flies within 21-30 days.

There are currently no insecticides approved or registered for control of sheep bots. Ivermectin, while not currently labelled is anticipated to be labelled in the near future. It has experimentally provided excellent





IRRIGATION PERMIT/CHRISTIAN LEASE:

Mr. Dean reported that the water line replacement in Block 52 was proceeding well; however, problems from previous gas line replacements were being discovered.



A Touch Of History

1905, Farm and ranch land was selling cheap in Schleicher County. The county was just opening up for farming and good land could be bought at a reasonable price. The large open range was being divided into small tract farms and ranches. Many people were moving into this Soouthwest Texas area.

On December 29, 1906, a group of investors met in Eldorado with the idea of forming a bank to meet the needs of the community. The original incorporating officers were: Sol Mayer, Chairman; W.B. Silliman, secretary; stock holder committee: McKnight, C.H. Murphy, R.W. Murchison, William Bevans, and Ave Mayer. The name formed was The First National Bank of Eldorado, Texas. It was agreed that a new rock building would be erected to house the new institution.

February 18, 1907: The directors of the First National Bank of Eldorado met and voted to purchase a lot from I.H. Elder for the purpose of erecting a stone building. This motion, and also a motion to close a contract with Drew & Harvey for construction, carried.

This old bank building still stands on Main Street, the second oldest building in Eldorado. It is very important to save this proof of Eldorado's beginning for the future. The old bank building, as well as other old buildings, needs some restoration. The community can help save our heritage by contributing to a fund established at the First National "Historic called Restoration Fund.'

In order to meet the standards set for Texas Markers,

buildings need repair which is costly.

by Pat Sykes In just four short years, Eldorado will be celebrating it's Centennial!

In preparing for this historical occasion Schleicher County Historical Society and the Historical Restoration Committee are hoping to qualify for as many recorded Texas Historic Landmarks as possible by restoring some of our older buildings. The only existing Texas Historic Marker is on the 1906 old jail.

Rene Calcote, Museum Director, has prepared and submitted an application for a marker on the 1924 Schleicher Courthouse. building was recently inspected by Gerron Hite, Historic Architect, Texas Historical Commission, and found to be a very candidate for a marker.

Because the 1907 First National Bank building, Eldorado's second building, is in relatively good condition and has been altered very little it is the best candidate for another application.

After recent inspection, Mr. Hite recommended the specific steps and methods of restoration for the front of this historic structure. First was the removal of the canopy which had been added at a later date.

After a Historical Fund Restoration established at the First National

Prior to adjournment, Jack Dean asked the Council consider the costs of making water taps vs. the outlined Ordinance fees. The Secretary will draft amended fee schedule for the Council's consideration.

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
