Pina To Go To State

Eldorado High School has qualified one student for the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, and one student placed fifth in the regional meet. The State Meet will be held on May 2-4 at the University of Texas at Austin.

Adrienne Pina earned eligibility by placing 2nd in Keyboarding at the UIL regional meet, held at Abilene Christian University on April 20th. Shannon Chrisman placed 5th in Spelling, but did not qualify for the State Meet.

"Reaching the State level of academic competition shows determination and preparation on the part of the contestant and sponsor,:" Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director said. "Students who compete at the UIL State Meet represent the elite in their field. The development of the skills to handle the intense competition and the attainment of knowledge required to achieve this honor will benefit the contestant far beyond the high school years."

Contests range from headline writing to Lincoln-Douglas debate, calculator applications to accounting. Of the million and a half students who participated in UIL activities in 1989-90, over onehalf million students competed in one or more of the 20 general academic contests.

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1990-91, the TILF awarded more than \$504,000 in scholarship grants to 382 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1991-92, the TILF expects to award an estimated 500 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$600,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has almost \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.


Students that have a 90 or above average in all subjects will be honored guests. These students will be recognized with a dinner and the presentation of an Academic Excellence medal.

I have an opportunity tonight that prompts the question "What can I say that will make a difference in the future of Eldorado?"

I'd like to cover three issues tonight.

1. I'll cover marketing your community.

2. I'll provide a assessment thumbnail of Eldorado in the context of a competitive market.

3. Issue a challenge to you to make Eldorado a better

place to live and work.

Times are tough. All across the United States communities are losing jobs and businesses are closing. Many communities consider themselves lucky to maintain the status quo. Business has changed dramatically over the past several years. Real Estate is no longer the investment it once was and that is affecting growth in the u.s. and growth in Eldorado. The global market is impacting the u.s. and Eldorado. Every small town in the U.S. is claiming that their town is a great place to live and they are.

Two things make the difference between a successful small town and one not as

successful.

1. Marketing. 2. Attitude.

What is Marketing? It is impressive management. It is presenting a specific image of your product. Why conduct marketing

activities?

Marketing will help people feel good about a community and reinvest in that community. The bottom line is increased tax value, increased income, increased government services, lower taxes, more jobs and a higher quality of life.

Marketing by volunteer committees through the Chamber of Commerce produce a tremendous return for the

investment. The Texas Main Street Project approach to community redevelopment involves hiring a project director and mobilizes volunteers. Successful Main Street cities have seen a return af \$25 to \$90 of private reinvestment for every dollar of operational cost. The Federal Government considers a six dollar return on one dollar

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Dear Pat Sykes.

The purpose of this letter is to record some of my first impressions about the historic resources of Eldorado and how they may be preserved and interpreted. The development of Eldorado only dates from 1895, but because of the city's historical and architectural importance to the county and to the state, it's architecture certainly deserves preservation. There are many ways that this may be accomplished. This letter will outline some of these options and we hope that some of them will be implemented in the near future.

It is important to determine a plan and to educate the decision makers in the community. The Texas Historical Commission daily sees historical buildings destroyed. Many times these buildings could have been saved if the decision makers had taken the time to really explore all options, compared new construction costs versus rehabilitation costs, and understood how their building relates historically and architecturally to the neighborhood and the community.

Some of my thoughts are as follows:

*Having a building designated as a N.R. (National Register of Historic Places); RTHL (Recorded Texas Historic Landmark); and SAL (State Archeological Landmark) lesglation provided some protection by delaying demolition and requiring review of proposed changes. However, some towns have decided that more protection is needed in the form of a local historic district, tax-incentives, and/or design review boards. Local historic building plaques do help in the process of education the public is to which

structures are historical and therefor need the protected. *I found your courthouse and jail to define examples of public architecture, worthy of preservation The jail relates architecturally to the first Courthouse while the replacement courthouse differs in its Architectural style. I will be siting to the county judge about my observations of the courthouse. I should also mention the memorial building that deserved preservation and will be 50 years old in just seven years.

*Other public structures such as the fire station and the storage tank

would hope that no more of these buildings be demolished.

*An important first step in the preservation of these commercial structures, as well as any historic buildings is to secure them from the weather. Repainting an old storefront while the roof on the building is leaking is not efficient utilization of time and materials. A roof repair, maybe a patch until a whole roof can be installed, is far better than allowing a roof leak to continue destroying the roof structure, ceiling, furniture, and the flooring in the process.

Also, vacant buildings need to be secured from possible vandalism. The goal is to stabilize the buildings until an owner and a compatible use an be found. It is my hope that the proposed work on the Old First National Bank will encourage building owners in the area to look at their building and perhaps initiate some rehabilitation work. I hope that if preservation work is initiated that it is based on historic photographs or physical evidence. The worse thing that could happen is that the work initiated makes the building look older than it is or tries

*The Eldorado Woolen Mil1 West Texas Woolen Mill) is a key historic resource for Eldorado. The mill tells the story of wool production and processing in what is considered the heart of the sheep raising region, contributing to the growth of the area, and illustrates machine technology where the whole process of making woolen products can be seen in what is apparently the 1st woolen mill in Texas. This source needs to be promoted and advertised.





major focus of Rev. Wolfe's ministry. He is a graduate of the Logos Youth Club Administration School in Pittsburgh PA, and has been founding director of two midweek youth clubs in Deerfield IL and Midland TX. His article on history theme trips for youth -tracing the old routes of the Underground Railroad and the Cherokee "Trail of Tears" --was published in the national denominational magazine Presbyterian Survey (May 1985). Working with the ill and aging has also been a hallmark of Rev. Wolfe's ministry. Physicians of the Lake County (IL) Medical Society awarded him their annual service award in 1986 for "spiritual support of the terminally ill." Wolfe believes that "the visible caring presence of others greatly aids in a person's total healing process. He states, "I am personally committed to carry on a ministry of visitation in Eldorado."

Rev. Wolfe also expresses a desire to offer a strong teaching ministry in Eldorado, meltding together the great powers of faith and reason: "to me faith and reason are the twin pillars upholding our lives -- without either one of them our personality can begin to become structurally unsound." Mr. Wolfe's academic credentials include a Phi Beta Kappa key from Cornell University, the E. L. Waile Memorial Prize in New Testament Studies at Princeton, and a year of study abroad in Cambridge, England, on a Rotary Foundation grant. This spring he was guest instructor for a course at Midland College entitled "History of the Early

Church A.D. 33-337".







223, we worked with-Texas parks and Wildlife to develop an 1834 Stagecoach Inn. It took five years but the impact of that development is equal to the impact of a small industry with 100 employees. Eldorado can utilize Fort McKavett.

You can promote a unique industry. Fredericksburg got it's start as a tourist destination because of its wonderful German bakeries. Yoakum is known as the Leather Capital due to its leather industries. The small town of Poteet has a Strawberry Festival. I heard that Poteet is expecting 100,000 people to attend the Festival. Abilene recently held a successful Railroad Festival. Eldorado should market the Holly House and the Woolen Mill. You can promote unique geography. The Hill Country has bluebonnets. East Texas is known for trees and lakes. The coast has the beach. Eldorado has the slogan "Top of the Divide".

It's important to develop support facilities such as retail, hotel and eating and drinking places. And don't forget to develop activities. Special events are one day promotions which primarily impact local people. Fort Stockton has a special event for every Holiday. Christmas retail promotions are good. Festivals are longer than one day. They require so much time, effort and funds to be that successful small communities should focus on one a vear.

When you have a marketable product, you then begin marketing activities.

Try to get advertising for your community through television and radio public service announcements and news stories. Ask your newspaper or television reporter to submit the story to Associated Press or CNN.

Navasota had a story on the front page of the Washington Post from an article a Houston reporter wrote. You can erect billboards, highway signs (you should have one that says "Chamber of Commerce"

community. Tourist brochures are good if it really is a tourism brochure. It must focus on tourist attractions. Tourists do not want to see pictures of the Bank, School or the hospital. Create a 24 hour info window at the Chamber. Provide maps and consider a newsletter and direct mail materials.

Promotions also help market your community. Try to get a registry of out of town attendance.

I've just covered a number or things you can do to market your community. I said earlier that marketing and attitude make communities successful. The attitude must be a "can do" attitude with vision and effort behind it. I like to tell the tale of two Texas cities. Both are in West Texas, have the same population and similar strengths and weaknesses. I worked in Wichita Falls for three years and heard "we need a Coliseum". "We need a new Civic Center".

Abilene, on the other hand, has a Coliseum. Abilene has a new Civic Center expansion. Abilene has a zoo. Abilene has a new Cultural Center opening in October.

The people in Abilene decided 10 years ago to develop these facilities. They had vision, follow through and a "can do" attitude.

I see that "can do" attitude in Eldorado. I've spoken to other cities which have better resources than Eldorado but are less likely to accomplish anything because of lack of follow through and positive attitude.

The people of Eldorado have started some great things like the Chamber of Commerce, the Chamber Pride Committee, the County Museum and the Community Theater. I charge you tonight to do even more, to involve more people, and to work hard! Chamber Each

committee should select three things to do and go do them. After a year or two there will be many positive changes. YOU will not run out of things to do or ways to improve your community. But you will be well




