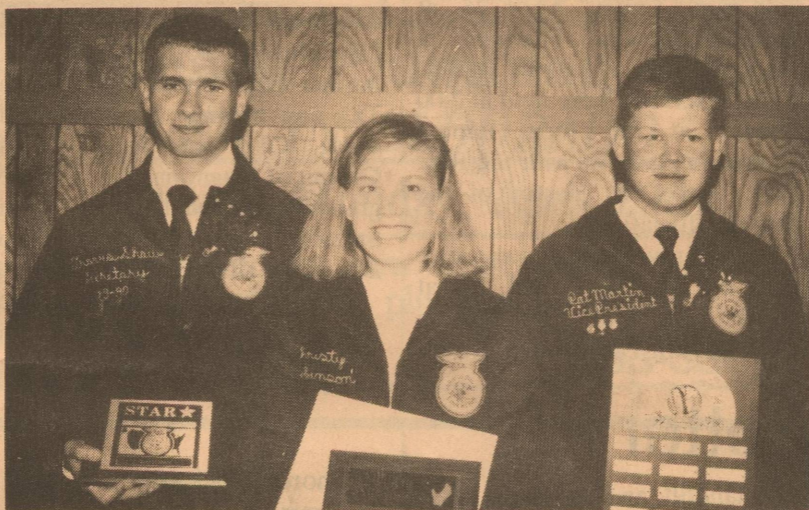

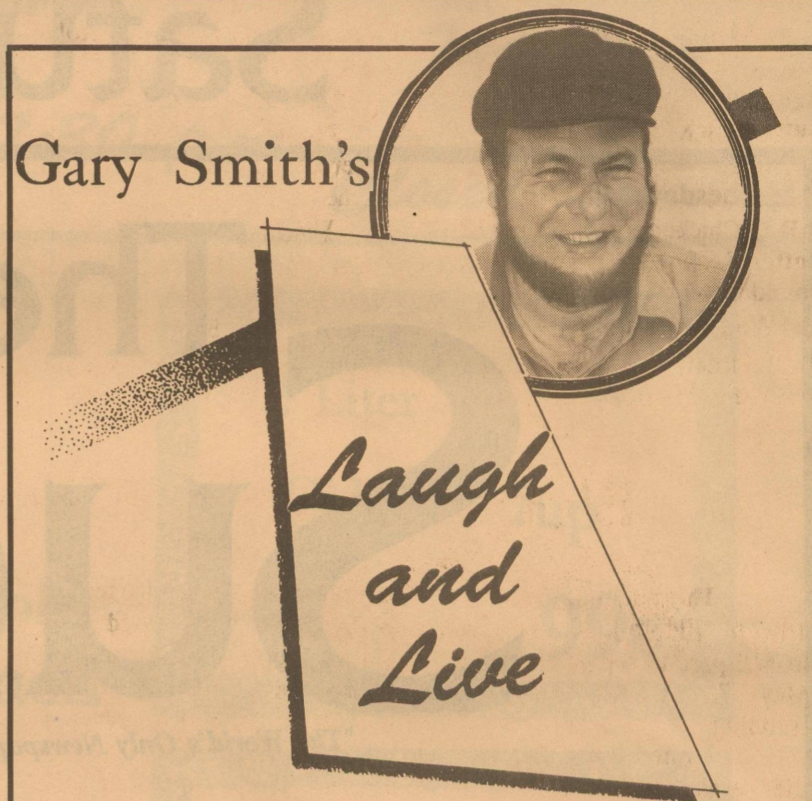
Graveside services were held on Monday, April 29, at 10:00 a.m. at Desdemona Cemetery, in Desdemona, Texas.

Blood Drive

The community blood drive in Eldorado will be held from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday, May 7, at the Memorial Building.

United Blood Services, the area's nonprofit blood center located in San Angelo, provides all the blood and blood components used at the 23 hospitals in Central and West Texas including Schleicher County Hospital.

People in this region give blood as a community service so blood will be available for anyone who needs it. In order to adequately meet patient blood needs, nearly 60 donors are needed each day. Since the blood is given by volunteer donors, there is no charge for the blood itself at any hospital served by United Blood Services. Patients are charged only a service fee, which represents the cost of collecting, testing, processing and distributing the blood. Most medical insurance policies cover the service fee.

Hospitals that are not affiliated with United Blood Services may charge a nonreplacement fee (a charge

in addition to the service fee). If a person donates blood with United Blood Services and then he or a member of his immediate family receives blood at a hospital that charges a nonreplacement fee, United Blood Services can make arrangements to take care of this nonreplacement fee. The service fee, covered by most major insurance policies, still will be charged.

"The goal for this blood drive is to have up 30 donors," said Sherry Lux, coordinator of the blood drive.

Donating blood is a safe and simple procedure which takes only 30 minutes. First, the donor will answer some medical history questions to assure patient and donor safety. Next, the donor's pulse, temperature, blood pressure and blood iron level will be checked. The actual blood donations takes only about 10 minutes and is followed by refreshments.

After the drive, the blood is sent to the United Blood Services laboratory for typing, testing and labeling, and then it is distributed to area hospitals.

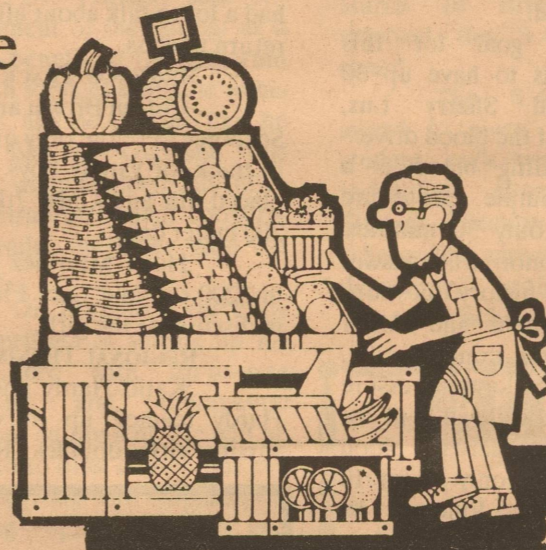

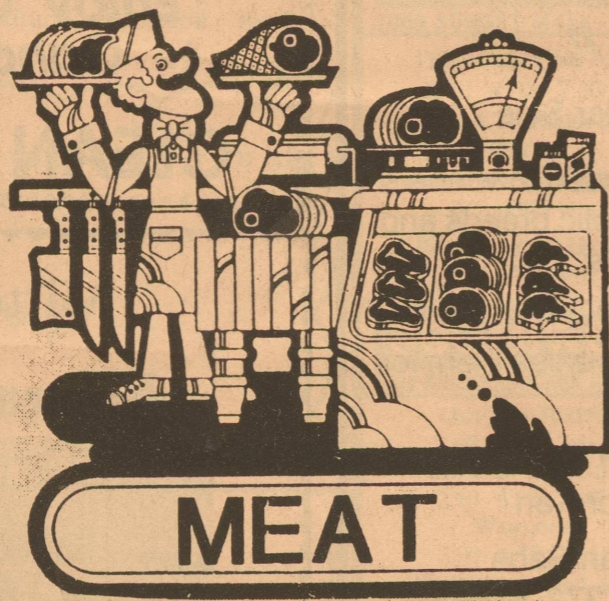

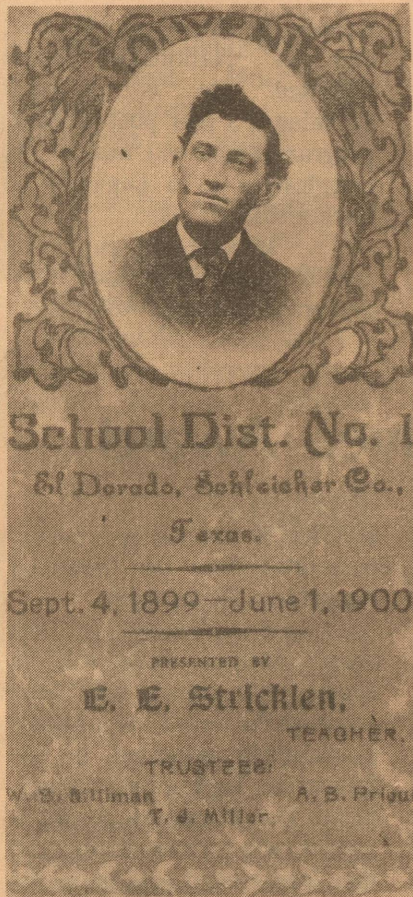

In 1897 E.E. Stricklen was the teacher of Eldorado's one-room, eight student school with three trustees, W.B. Silliman, A.B. Priour, and T.J. Miller.

As Schleicher County's population grew, rural schools established throughout the county. In 1929, there were twelve schools in the county. By 1948, all of these common school districts had annexed to the Eldorado Independent District. During the 1948-50 years, a huge building program was begun and completed. In 1986, a middle school was built, and a field house added to the gym. Two years prior a new elementary addition was completed.

Eldorado has always maintained a standard of excellence in its school district. Out of these halls came students who became doctors, lawyers, generals, successful business men and women, educators, and many other successful citizens.

The "Eldorado Academic Excellence Foundation" has been created to support and further the goals of SCISD. The goal of the foundation is to promote academic excellence through performance in the classroom by offering scholarships to qualifying students.

Support this foundation and help our students. Let us maintain the same excellence that began back in that first one-room Schleicher County school in 1894.

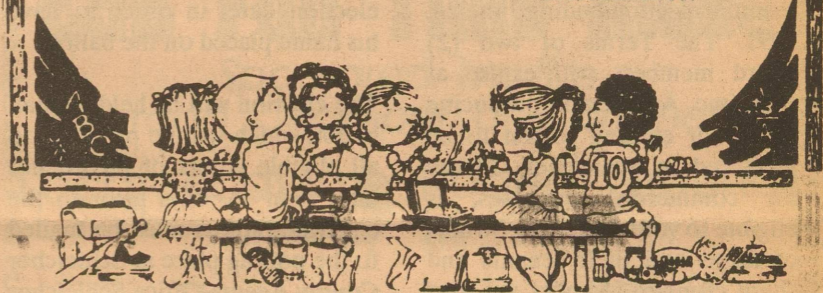



Schleicher County Cotton Producers Board will hold its biennial election ending June 28, 1991. The Terms of two (2) board members will expire at that time. Any person producing cotton or causing cotton to be produced in Schleicher County for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers. Minors are also eligible to vote in the election based on the way the law defines a producer.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for a six-year term on the Schleicher County Cotton Producers Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least ten

other producers eligible to vote in the election. Such applications must be received at least 30-days prior to the election date, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters of record not later than 15-days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Schleicher County Agents Office Schleicher County Courthouse Eldorado Texas 76936 and postmarked before midnight on date of election.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days prior to the election, may obtain one at the county agricultural extension service office.
